One year ago, I was filled with pride to describe the quality services the Sam T. Wilson Public Library provided while enduring the unprecedented challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic. Today, I feel that same pride as we continue to see our impact grow and evolve. This report highlights the Library's impact in a fast changing and rapidly growing community.

Services expanded through print and digital collections and diverse interactive programs. Our library is recognized for its value not only to Arlington but also the surrounding communities.



The Library proudly serves our growing Town and our mission remains the same: to meet the needs and to exceed the expectations of the Arlington community.

The Library updated technology and collection offerings through an American Rescue Plan Act grant. New public computers offer faster and more efficient service to our patrons. Though our facility is small our program attendance has grown, both onsite and at offsite locations like the Arlington Safe Room, the Forest Street Park, and Farmer's Market Pavilions. We partner with the local Senior Center to provide art programs for multiple ages and adult genealogy programs.

Throughout the year we focused on the library resources community members rely on and expanded community outreach. Library staff participated in community reader days in local schools and curriculum days where we registered 70 students and faculty for library membership cards in just one evening! We developed



partnerships with local daycares for weekly storytimes to develop literacy skills.

Thank you for making this a year to remember. The Sam T. Wilson Public Library staff are grateful for the commitment and support of the Town of Arlington, the Library Advisory Board, the Library Friends of Arlington, Library Systems & Services, and the many local partnerships that make our Library an essential resource and the heart of the Arlington community.

/// The library is a pillar of the community, a place for all ages to learn and grow together.

EARLY LITERACY

Arlington's youngest residents learned crucial early literacy skills to set them on a successful path in school through programs including:

- **Tiny Tots Lapsit** – This weekly virtual storytime was introduced in October 2020. Take home sensory kits help parents and caregivers interact more effectively with their little ones while attending Tiny Tots virtually.
- **Read with Me Storytime** – A weekly virtual storytime includes guest readers from community leaders to Town staff. The program for toddlers and preschoolers is designed so children can better see the book and presenter and follow along easily. Following the printed words as a story is read is an important pre-reading skill.
- **Bedtime Storytime** – A weekly virtual storytime contributes to brain development and relieves anxiety.
- **Preschool/Toddler Tuesday Storytimes** – This program is held at Forrest Street Park, the Farmer's Market Pavilion and the Arlington Safe Room. Average weekly attendance at this popular program was 75.

Christmas on the Square 2021

Arlington's annual *Christmas on the Square* event returned to a full community celebration in Fiscal Year 2021-2022. Library staff joined the festivities and distributed more than 400 tree card craft kits, held storytimes, gave out information packets and assisted the Library Friends of Arlington with the Santa Letter Writing Station held inside the historic post office.

The Library participated in *Arlington in April*. Staff hosted storytimes, distributed hundreds of craft kits, registered new patrons for library cards and promoted summer reading. The Library Friends of Arlington held a successful book sale providing support for library programs.



Patrons of all ages have become eager participants in both the annual summer reading and winter bookmark design contest. First Citizens National Bank of Arlington sponsors the contest. Winning bookmarks are added to the bookmark collection at the library and made available to the public.

The third year of *Supply and Forgive for Fines* was a great success. This program encourages patrons with overdue fines to donate school supplies to students in need. This unique program supports Arlington in two ways: Overdue fines are waived for patrons and school supplies are donated to students. In Fiscal Year 2021-2022, 85 school supplies were donated to local schools.

Library fine forgiveness continued into the holidays with the third annual *Food for Fines Forgiveness* program. Through this program, fines are waived for patrons who donate canned goods. The local food pantry received more than 165 food items.



The Library’s Summer Reading program is a vital resource to prevent learning loss. Summer Reading programs are designed as a fun alternative to combat this loss by incentivizing reading.

Summer 2022 registration was exceptional with 511 registrations. The previous year’s registration total was met halfway through this year’s program! Many new families became regular library users during the summer and a new one-month record of 116 library card registrations was set.

More than 1,000 weekly craft kits for all ages were distributed during the first few weeks of summer reading. Interactive programs included children’s book illustrator Rich Davis, and Awesome Aquariums by Dixon Gallery & Gardens. A visit from Tennessee State Park Ranger Overstreet introduced the kids to Sweetpea, a Barred Owl.


Flexibility: Key to a Growing Community

The explosion of use during Fiscal Year 2021-2022 underscores the Library's importance to the community. Many of the innovative services introduced during the pandemic will continue.

Kids Zone DIY Craft Day is a popular monthly event providing themed craft kits with an average of 150 kits picked up at each session. During Fiscal Year 2021-2022 staff prepared more than 3,600 take and make kits.

Library book clubs were a great success, providing flexible opportunities to join the conversation:

- Homeschool Book Club (HSBC) returned to in person meetings with the opportunity to join the online chat. Club titles included great books such as *A Handful of Stars* by Cynthia Lord and *Eragon* by Christopher Paolini.
- The new Elementary Book Club gave the younger group an opportunity to review and discuss a book and to recommend titles to other readers.
- The new Masterminds Tween and Teen Book Club is a more traditional style book club. Participants make projects related to each month's book.

Adults enjoyed a Winter Bingo Reading Challenge. For every bingo that was claimed they received an entry into a prize drawing sponsored by Vinegar Jim's Restaurant, a local Arlington favorite.

The Seed Library is offered from March through June, or as long as the supply lasts. Patrons may check out up to 5 seed packets and often share their successes and failures. More than 300 seed packets were donated by the American Seed Corp., Baker Creek Heirloom, Gurney's Seed & Nursery and many others.


