

## CHAPTER 52 (SF2909) SUMMARY - COUNTY RELATED PROVISIONS

<p><b>COMMUNITY SUPERVISION</b></p>	<p>New Community Supervision Formula –</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• County-provided formula with \$150,000 base per county + per capita rate based on probation population.</li> <li>• \$43 million annual increase to base funding.</li> <li>• Changes in requirements related to reporting to create consistency in reporting between delivery systems.</li> <li>• Creation of the statewide Community Supervision Advisory Committee to provide policy recommendations to the commissioner of corrections and advise the commissioner on the formula workload study to be completed in two years and then every four thereafter.</li> </ul>
<p><b>EMERGENCY RESPONSE AND LAW ENFORCEMENT</b></p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Public Safety Answering Points Increase – \$28 million annually.</li> <li>• NextGen 911 Transition Grants for Local Governments - \$7 million one-time funding.</li> <li>• Statewide Emergency Communications Board operations and local grants - \$1 million per year.</li> <li>• Public Safety radio grants (ARMER) - \$2 million each year, one time, requiring a 5% local match.</li> <li>• Peace Officer Training Reimbursements – approximately \$3 million per year.</li> </ul>
<p><b>YOUTH JUSTICE</b></p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Crossover and Dual Status Youth Model Grants - \$1 million annually.</li> <li>• Creation of the Office of Restorative Practices. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ \$4 million each year for grants to create restorative practice initiatives.</li> </ul> </li> <li>• Ramsey County Youth Treatment Homes and Violence Prevention - \$5 million for each.</li> <li>• Youth Intervention Programs - \$3.5 million increase per year, ongoing.</li> </ul>
<p><b>PUBLIC SAFETY AND JUSTICE PROGRAMS</b></p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Changes responsibility for payment of sexual assault examinations from the county to the state with an appropriation of about \$4 million per year to the state</li> <li>• Funding for crime victim assistance gap related to federal law changes - \$11 million</li> <li>• Creation of the Office of Restorative Practices</li> <li>• Community Crime and Violence Prevention Account- \$70 million, one-time funding <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>○ A local unit of government or a nonprofit community-based entity may apply for the grants which may be used for programs including, but not limited to juvenile diversion, probation innovation, alternatives to incarceration, community-based programs.</li> </ul> </li> <li>• Crisis response grants for local law enforcement and local governments to maintain or expand crisis response teams including social workers or mental health providers.</li> </ul>
<p><b>CORRECTIONS</b></p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Reimbursement to local government for interstate transfer costs - \$250,000 each year, one time.</li> <li>• Tribal Nation Supervision funding - \$2.75 million per year, ongoing.</li> <li>• Regional and County Jails study and report by the commissioner of corrections to make recommendations related to the consolidation or merger of county jails and alternatives to incarceration for person experiencing mental health disorders.</li> <li>• Minnesota Rehabilitation and Reinvestment Act – allows the commissioner of corrections to authorize early release for incarcerated individuals that successfully complete programming while incarcerated or on supervised release.</li> <li>• Changes to revocation statutes related to certain probation violations.</li> <li>• Sunset of local correctional fees in 2027.</li> </ul>
