Purpose: The Benzie County Board of Commissioners is a public policy setting body and subject to the Open Meetings Act (PA 267 of 1976). The Board also operates under a set of "Benzie County Board Rules (section 7.3)" which provides for public input during their meetings. It continually strives to receive input from the residents of the county and reserves two opportunities during the monthly scheduled meeting for you the public to voice opinions, concerns and sharing of any other items of common interest. There are however, in concert with meeting conduct certain rules to follow.

Speaking Time: Agenda items may be added or removed by the board but initially at least two times are devoted to Public Input. Generally, however, attendees wishing to speak will be informed how long they may speak by the chairman. All speakers are asked to give their name, residence and topic they wish to address. This and the statements/comments will be entered into the public record (minutes of the meeting). Should there be a number of speakers wishing to voice similar opinions, an option for a longer presentation may be more appropriate for the group and one or more speakers may talk within that time frame.

Group Presentations – 15 minutes Individual Presentations – 3 minutes

Board Response: Generally, as this is an "Input" option, the board will not comment or respond to presenters. Silence or non-response from the board should not be interpreted as disinterest or disagreement by the board. However, should the board individually or collectively wish to address the comments of the speaker(s) at the approval of the Chair and within a time frame previously established, responses may be made by the board. Additionally, the presenter may be in need of a more lengthy understanding of an issue or topic and may be referred to a committee appropriate to address those issues.

Public Input is very important in public policy settings and is only one means for an interchange of information or dialogue. Each commissioner represents a district within the county and he/she may be individually contacted should greater depth or understanding of an issue be sought. Personal contact is encouraged and helpful to both residents and the board.

Below are outlined many of the activities I have been involved in for the month of March 2017.

NIMS ICS for the Fire Service

On Saturday March 4th and 5th, 2017 I assisted in teaching a Fire Officer Series Class to Benzie County Fire Officers. National Incident Management System or NIMS: Incident Command System or ICS for the Fire Service is a 16 hour course on planning and organizing complex incidents.

2. Region 7 Homeland Security Planning Board

On March 9th, 2017 I chaired the Region 7 Homeland Security Planning Board Meeting in Grayling.

Attendance of the CERT Monthly Meeting 3.

March 8th, 2017 I attended the monthly meeting of Citizens Emergency Response Team (CERT).

4. **Education Methodology**

On March 18th and 19th, 2017 I assisted in teaching another Fire Officer Series Class to Benzie County Fire Officers. Educational Methodology is a 16 hour course on developing training for fire departments as well as teaching skills for educating firefighters

5. **LEPC Meeting**

The LEPC meeting for March was cancelled because of an overwhelming amount of information that had to be updated regarding the Off-Site Response Plans for the businesses that use, transport or store hazardous materials. Annually these companies are required to report the hazardous materials no later than March 1st of each year. It is extremely time intensive to update the information for the plans.

Attendance at the Benzie County Fire/EMS Association Meeting 6.

On Tuesday March 21st, 2017 I attended the Benzie County Fire/EMS Association Meeting at the Frankfort Fire Department. The training schedule for this spring is set and includes Fire Officer Prerequisite Classes Starting in March 2017 include:

- i. Incident Safety Officer (4/1 and 2)
- Preparation for Initial Company Operations (PICO) 4/15 and 16) ii.
- Managing Company Tactical Operations (MCTO) Decision-making (4/22 and 23) iii.
- Strategies and Tactics (STICO) (5/20 and 21) iv.

7. Michigan Critical Incident Management System Training

The Michigan Critical Incident Management System (MI CIMS) is operated and maintained by the Michigan State Police, Emergency Management and Homeland Security Division (MSP/EMHSD) for the use by its staff, state and local emergency management partners, and other authorized users.

We had 11 attend the Refresher Training and 11 attend the New User Training.

Meeting of the Local Emergency Planning Committee Local Planning Team (LPT) 8. On Thursday March 23rd, 2017 we held our LPT meeting in the EOC. We had extensive conversations regarding:

- Mass Casualty Plan Development-We are developing our local plan on dealing with events that may outstrip our Emergency Medical Service delivery system.
- Exercise Design Team One of the shortcomings we have observed in our exercises and some recent events is failures in communications. To improve our communications we will be developing of a Communications Functional Exercise that we hope to put into place in October of this year.



Response to Water Rescue Events - Last year there were 3 drownings in Sleeping Bear Dunes and 2 individuals washed off the pier in Frankfort. We began the task of looking at training and/or equipment to make the emergency first responders safer when responding to such events.

MI CIMS Train the Trainer 9.

On March 29th, 2017 I attended Michigan Critical Incident Management System Train the Trainer in Lansing. This will allow me to teach the use of the MI CIMS system to the emergency first responder community.






NUMBER OF ARRESTS 2016





1. Medical Examiner

All three agreements have been executed by the various required signatories to start Dr. Goslinoski as the new Benzie County Medical Examiner starting April 1, 2017. EMS picked up the two person body cooler from Mecosta County. The Cost was \$3,500, which will be paid for in the current Medical Examiner budget. Currently Dr. Goslinoski is working with the funeral home to set up the morgue where autopsies will be performed locally.

Benzie County representatives (Law enforcement, prosecuting attorney, EMS and 911 are meeting with the new ME on Monday April 10, 2017 to discuss process and procedures for a smooth operation.

2. Maples Work Group Update

The Maples Work Group meet on Wednesday April 5, 2017 for their third meeting. The results of the meeting were as follows: Recommendation to the Building Authority to hire an independent professional construction management firm to assess the current construction situation and help direct the Building Authority to complete the existing contracts to finish the Maples Medical Care Facility. In addition the Construction Management firm needs to evaluate the feasibility of phase 3 demolition and remodeling of the existing facility. The Maples Work Group is slated to make a presentation to the full BOC at their 4/11/17 meeting.

3. Phone Installation update

The Govt. Center phone installation continues, slower than anticipated. The current County IT provider was unable to get their requirements completed in front of the phone installation, as promised. Phone installation should be completed by Tuesday April 11, 2017. The go live date is now set for Wednesday April 19, 2017. Training for Govt. Center employees is still slated for Wednesday April 12, 2017. Yesterday it was identified by the phone installer that we need an additional 48 port Cisco POE (Phone Over Ethernet) switch, which will be an additional cost to the new phone system.

Originally our current IT provider informed us that there were sufficient number of ports, which was determined inaccurate.


4. POLC Negotiation Update

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Executive Summary

This Executive Summary provides an overview of the Economic Strategy for Benzie and Manistee Counties conducted by Fourth Economy for the Alliance for Economic Success from May to December of 2016. The Executive Summary provides an overview explaining the goals of the project, the process involved, how the recommendations were developed and the final recommended clusters and how this information can be used for retention and recruitment.

Overview of the Project

The Alliance for Economic Success retained Fourth Economy to analyze the opportunities for manufacturing in Benzie and Manistee Counties and develop strategic recommendations to support the growth of their market opportunities through improving their economic development assets, programs, and policies. The recommendations focus on supporting the growth of existing companies and the development of new companies.

Overview of the Process

Fourth Economy began data collection and analysis in May of 2016 and continued through most of the project. Data included local, county, regional, state and national data (see Data Sources below). Interviews with regional and local industry representatives and stakeholders were conducted in June and July. The identification of market opportunities synthesized the data collected and the interview responses to identify strategic themes for the region to build on as well as specific market and industry opportunities to investigate, a process that continued through September. The development of recommendations began in August and draft recommendations were presented to the steering committee in October. As feedback from the committee was received, additional data collection and analysis refined the recommendations until they were finalized in November of 2016. The final report was completed in December of 2016.

Development of the Recommendations

The full report, AES Findings, Recommendations & Targets (November 2016) provides all of the elements of the analysis in a PowerPoint document. It includes all of the findings and analysis related to existing conditions and economic trends including the following:

 - Economic Development Ecosystem

All of this analysis, as well as the interview results were synthesized into a SWOT analysis to summarize the key assets and gaps facing the region. The supporting charts and figures are not repeated here but can be viewed in the accompanying document.

Gaps & Threats

There is a general lack of available housing and very little that is affordable for manufacturing workers at current wage levels, which are below the state average. There is a shortage of rental housing below \$750 per month and ownership housing priced below \$150,000 that would be affordable for the average manufacturing worker.

The workforce, particularly the manufacturing workforce is aging with 428 workers that could retire in the next ten years with only 149

younger workers to replace them.

 There are conflicting requirements for funding and regulations between the local, state and federal levels that create catch-22s for local businesses where following one set of regulations or requirements puts them out of compliance with others.

Utilities are not available for all sites and energy costs, especially for

areas not served by natural gas can be high.

 Transportation costs for road and rail (but not water) are higher because of the remote location of the region and its role as an origin for resource based shipments. Trucks and trains coming to the region are generally arriving empty (deadweighting) which increases the costs for local firms.


There is limited broadband availability in the region.

 There are a significant number of Brownfield sites for a region of this size and the cleanup costs are high relative to the market values.

Specific recommendations were developed to address the various gaps and threats. These recommendations are detailed in the November 2016 report, AES Findings, Recommendations & Targets. For the recommended clusters for retention and recruitment, Fourth Economy synthesized all of the analysis with a focus on identifying targets that could leverage the region's key assets but would not be inhibited by any gaps or threats that are being addressed.

Recommended Clusters & Use of the Profiles

The recommended clusters are all within sectors that are either growing nationally, such as food manufacturing and beverage and tobacco products, or there is strong local presence, such as paper manufacturing and furniture manufacturing and wood products.



Industry Presence or Relative Strength in Benzie & Manistee Counties

Within each of these larger sectors, Fourth Economy identified specific industry targets with current or future growth trends an identified key suppliers that support that growth and which may be able to leverage the assets of the region. The following decision tree summarizes the process by which the targets were identified:








BENZIE COUNTY 2016 Tax Collection




BENZIE COUNTY 2016 Taxable Value




BENZIE COUNTY 2016 S.E.V.

MUTUAL AID EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICE AGREEMENT

This agreement is made and entered into on the 1^{st} day of April, 2017 by and between Almira Twp. EMS operated by Almira Twp. And Benzie County EMS (individually referred to as the "Party" and together as the "Parties").

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Township of Almira, Benzie County, State of Michigan, has an emergency medical service operation called Almira Twp. EMS operated by Almira Twp.;

WHEREAS, the County of Benzie, State of Michigan, has an emergency medical service operation called Benzie County EMS out of Beulah;

WHEREAS, the service areas of the Parties are neighboring and adjoined to each other;

WHEREAS, the Parties are recognized by their respective County Medical Control Authority and Licensed by the Michigan Department of Consumer and Industry Services with appropriate apparatus, equipment and personnel for their operations:

WHEREAS, each Party while serving its medical service area has the threat of a medical emergency or disaster that may exceed it capacity; and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the Parties to enter into this Mutual Aid Emergency Medical Service Agreement together with the terms and conditions herein;

THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises made by the Parties hereto, each Party respectively covenants, promises, and agrees as follows:

- 1. In response to a request for mutual aid and assistance by a Party (the "Requesting Party") the other Party (the "Responding Party") shall provide all emergency medical services aid and assistance that is reasonably available and reasonably necessary, each to the other Party to the agreement.
- 2. The aid and assistance delivered to the Requesting Party mentioned in paragraph one (1) above shall be an amount and duration necessary for the emergent situation up to and including all available aid and assistance of the Responding Party, save only the reasonable demands and requirements of the Responding Party to maintain in reserve reasonable service for the safety or the residents of its own service area.

- 3. The aid and assistance mentioned in paragraph one above shall be rendered without any charge or payment between the Parties other than the mutual reciprocity of services hereupon agreed.
- 4. Notwithstanding paragraph three (3) above, the Responding Party at its own cost may bill and collect reasonable charges from an appropriate third party payer for serves rendered under this agreement.
- 5. Each Party shall, to the extent permitted by law, indemnify and hold harmless the other Party from all loss, liabilities, or damages, including reasonable attorney fees and costs of defense, which might arise out of a claim by a third party based on the aid or assistance rendered by indemnifying Party to the other Party pursuant to the Agreement. The Parties recognized that injury or death to person or damage to property can occur in and/or during those times when one or more of the Parties hereto are in the course of rendering mutual aid and assistance under the terms of the Agreement. No Party hereto shall, by the virtue of the execution of the Agreement, not by virtue of anything said herein, assume the legal liability, if any, to the other Party for such personal injury, death, or property damage. This provision shall include but be not limited to any worker's compensation.
- 6. It is agreed that request for mutual aid and assistance shall be of two types:
 - a. Type I- Individual Assistance
 This type shall include those incidents, which only require the
 assistance of one additional emergency medical service. Request for
 mutual aid of this type shall be made by the requesting ambulance
 service through the emergency medical service's central dispatch
 center (Benzie County Dispatch).
 - b. Type II-County Disaster Plan

 This type of mutual aid shall include those incidents of major disaster nature, which requires the services of not only many other emergency medical services, but also the implementation of the county's disaster plan, request for mutual aid of the type will be made through the emergency medical service's central dispatch center (Benzie County Dispatch).

- 7. It is agreed that it shall be the responsibility of the Requesting Party in whose area a mutual aid and assistance incident occurs, to provide for coordination at the scene. It is further agreed that the Responding Party shall report to the triage and transportation officer(s) or designee for instructions on desired mutual aid and assistance. Notwithstanding the Requesting Party's coordination of and/or triage at the scene, the Requesting Party shall not interfere or exercise any control over the Responding Party's professional medical judgment in providing emergency medical services under this Agreement.
- 8. It is further agreed that this agreement shall not supersede nor replace any written protocols or pre-hospital care guidelines of any County Medical Control Authority with jurisdiction under this Agreement.
- 9. Communications of any problems arising from the implementation of this Agreement should be made first (1) in writing, as soon as possible after the problem arises and second (2) sent to the respective Medical Control Authorities of both Parties involved, with a copy retained by the complaining Party and another copy sent to the other Party. Written disposition of such incident, including all recommended corrective action, shall accompany the initial communications, if possible, or within twenty-four (24) hours after such recommended corrective action has been formulated in its final form.
- 10. The term of the Agreement is indefinite unless and until one Party terminated it as follows: Either Party may terminate the Agreement, with or without cause, at any time with thirty (30) days written notice signed by the authorized representative of one Party to the other Party of this Agreement.
- 11. All notices and other communications required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be in writing, addressed to the party at the address set forth below, or to such other address as either Party may designate from time to time. All notices and other communications shall be mailed by registered or certified mail. Return receipt requested; postage prepaid or transmitted by hand-delivery. Except as otherwise provided herein, all notices shall be effective as of the date of delivery, for mailed notices, or on the date of receipt, for hand delivery.

Highlights included; second year pension liability; graphs on revenues and expenditures for the last five year (not showing the County appropriations, only showing operating source of revenues); fund balance of the last five years; revenues comparison; expenditures comparison. Over all things look pretty good again this year. The pension liability increase is due to the market doing poorly. In order to stay compliant, he encouraged the Department to keep up with the rule changes for the Single Audit Act.

Health Officer Update – Lisa Peacock

Northern Michigan Public Health Alliance Update: The Alliance is composed of six local health departments that work together across a 25-county region to increase public health capacity, maximize resources, reduce duplication, and improve health status. It focuses on uniform planning, legislative advocacy, workforce development coordinated technology and marketing/communications.

Engaging and Educating Policy-Makers Work Group

The Alliance received a cross jurisdictional sharing grant from Michigan Department of Flealth and Human Services that includes development of a Legislative Advocacy Plan (among other things). Its purpose is to align responses to proposed legislation and State budget planning and provide unified communications to enhance public health through collective and unified advocacy. Priorities for 2017 are:

- Public health infrastructure 50/50 cost sharing for mandated public health services
- Strong immunization requirements, including universal access
- Maternal and child health initiatives
- Chronic disease prevention initiatives
- Access to healthcare, especially by assuring residents are enrolled in health insurance
- Support for the Affordable Care Act s Public Health & Prevention Fund

Recently a grant was submitted by the Health Department of Northwest Michigan on behalf of the Alliance partners for the purpose of increasing Family Planning/STD services outreach through further development of the beforeplayorg website, implementation of a condom distribution program, and coordination with the Medicaid Health Plans.

Public Health & Prevention Fund Resolution & Letter - Action

Affordable Care Acti(ACA)/Prevention and Public Health Fund: While repeal and replacement is being discussed and considered there are a number of facts that are relevant to our district and a number of advocacy efforts underway. The obvious concern is the number of residents of our district that have been enrolled in insurance plans that would lose their coverage if the Healthy Michigan Plan and/or the Marketplace plans were repealed. This high level of coverage has an important positive impact on the health of our community and has decreased the level of hospital uncompensated care costs by greater than 40%. Equally as concerning is that repeal would also include elimination of the Prevention and Public Health Fund which would result in the elimination of funding for many public health services including elimination of funding for over 49% of the vaccines provided in our country and would greatly decrease funding for other crucial activities such as cancer screening and lab testing for communicable diseases. These are basic functions of public health which have been funded since

the early 1980's. A series of education and advocacy efforts are happening to educate and inform legislators about this consequence which may not be clear to them. These efforts include letters, phone calls, and board resolutions passed in support of maintaining this funding. Please see the attached description of the public health programs that would be impacted by this change as well as a draft resolution you may choose to adopt (requesting action) and a draft letter to U.S. Congressman Bergman outlining these concerns should you choose to sign it (requesting action). Peacock stressed that this letter is not intended to define what a replacement should be, only to bring information, for the purpose of understanding that some of the monies for Public Health is tied up in the ACA. Further explaining unfunded Public Health mandated services.

State Innovation Model (SIM)

Northern Michigan Community Health Innovation Region

The NMCHIR is one of five community health innovation regions in the State Innovation Model (SIM) Project, funded with a major prant from the US Centers for Medicare and Medicaid to achieve the "Triple Aim": better care at reduced cost with greater patient satisfaction. The NMCHIR is governed by a cross-sector Steering Committee that embraces a collective impact approach across a 10-county region (Prosperity Region 2).

NMCHIR Local Operations Plan

The primary activities within the NMCHIR are related to finalizing a Local Operations Plan focused on reducing hospital Emergency Department utilization, due to the SIM Team on April 3, 2017. In addition to detailing the governance structure and infrastructure support, it describes

- Clinical community linkages model that blends the best features from three models
- Community health needs assessment, including a thorough assessment of the reasons why residents use the Emergency Department inappropriately and resource database and asset maps
- Community health improvement plan that addresses the root causes of inappropriate Emergency Department visits with evidence-based interventions

April -Aug 1st is the planning period. August 1st is planned for being up and operational.

Benzie Resource Center:

Construction in the lower level and the dental area is complete. Dental services have become fully available. The EH and Admin staff are moved in and functioning in their new space. Lower level meeting rooms are back in active use. The front desk/reception/clinical space is complete, as well as the lobby. The integration team is also working hard on clinic flow improvements that reduce congestion at the front desk. Completely separate from the construction project is repair work that occurred in response to a leaking bathroom fixture in the upstairs men's restroom which is also now complete.

Reduction of Temporary Food License Fee - Low Risk Food

Tom Fountain reported that Michigan's Food Law is often updated which allows local health departments across the state to implement change certain procedures to conduct business. One recent update deals with temporary food service events serving low risk foods. Michigan's Food Law, Act No. 142 P.A. 2015, 1109(L), 3115 (3-4) (attached) defines low risk foods and allows temporary food service events serving low risk foods to receive a consultation instead of an on-site evaluation.

Consultation at the Health Department prior to the event allows the operator (person in charge) to be educated and the proposed operations reviewed in detail. A health risk assessment is conducted by the Sanitarian and allows the temporary food service license to be issued at that time. No field inspection would be mandated during the food service event but is optional at the discretion of the Health Department.

This policy is designed to save the Benzie Beelanau District Health Department time, staff availability, financial resources, pass sayings onto the food service license applicant and at no time increase risk to the public. A reduced food service license fee will be established and adjusted each year similar to the departments existing procedures. *(For the remainder of FY 2017 a reduced fee of \$50.00 and \$30.00 (non-profit) is proposed.)

Following is a list of some low risk foods commonly licensed by the Department:

- Popcorn
 - Pretzels
- Nuts.
- Lemonade
- Cotton candy
- Deep fried vegetables
- · Precooked hot dogs and brats

The applicant must allow a minimum of 5 working days in advance of the event to arrange the office consultation with the Sanitarian or be subject to a late fee. All fees shall be paid in full at the time off consultation and license issuance.

Increase in Water Test Lab Fees for EH Well & Evaluation Permits

Tom Fountain reported a recent fee increase from our water lab vendor, SOS Analytical will result in a loss of revenue for the remainder of Fiscal Year 2017. Coliform bacteria and Nitrate testing has risen from \$30.00 to \$40.00 and initial follow-up Coliform tests will no longer be at no charge but rather \$20.00.

This increase will affect revenue from our Point of Sale inspection program and Well Permit program as water sample analysis is mandated in each of these Health Department functions. Approximately 20% of samples fail the initial bacterial test and require additional samples. To offset the expected loss of revenue the following fee adjustments are proposed.

- Increase all well permit fees \$15.00.
- Increase Point of Sale fees (with wells) \$15.00.

Staff Reports

Administrative – Dodie Putney

The new personnel policy draft has been given to the Employee Committee and the Board of Health Personnel and Finance Committee for review.

Perspective buyer for the Leelanau Building - There is a serious perspective buyer in the Building. It is very early in the process and it is not known if the Health Department would continue on as renter. There has been communication with the Northern Health Foundation and the realtor.

Environmental Health Director - Tom Fountain

Fountain updated the Board regarding Bahia Vista Site Condominiums. Due to the complexity of the situation the Department has retained out legal advisor James Young. The department wants to make sure the master deed requirements are met by the developer.

Fountain reported he attended a workshop at the Leelanau Conservancy with other regional stakeholders regarding water quality and water protection. We are in the water business and it is important to collaborate with other groups with the same goals. Fountain commented on the two water quality stories in the latest Leelanau Enterprise.

Personal Health - Michelle Klein

Vaccines are one of the greatest success stories in public health. Through the use of vaccines, we have eradicated smallpox and nearly eliminated wild polio virus. The number of people who experience devastating effects or preventable infectious diseases like measles, diphtheria, and whooping cough is at an all-time low.

Immunizations at the Health Department

Immunizations at the Treath Department
Immunizations are integrated into all services provided at the Benzie-Leelanau District
Health Department. The Michigan Care Improvement Registry (MCIR) is Michigan's
statewide electronic immunization record. MCIR records are reviewed for every client, and
vaccines provided as needed.

The health department participates in and coordinates the Michigan Vaccines For Children Program (VFC). Through federal and state funding, the VFC program provides vaccine at no charge for children under age 19 who are uninsured. Native American, or on Medicaid. This program also provides select vaccines for uninsured high risk adults. In 2016, the health department began billing private insurance and therefore is now able to provide all vaccines to both insured and uninsured children and adults.

Vaccines administered in 2016: 828 doses of VFC vaccines

306 doses of private pay/insured vaccine
1134 Total doses of vaccine

Michigan ranks 44th out of 50 states for immunization coverage, in part due to a large number of parents who opt out or "waive" immunizations. Within the state of Michigan, Leelanau County has a relatively high rate of immunization waivers, although this number is improving. A few years ago, Leelanau County had the highest percentage of immunization waivers in the state, currently this county is ranked 79 out of 84 counties.

The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) provides a quarterly "Immunization Report Card" with detailed information about the immunization status of residents in each county.

Percent Vaccinated with all recommended vaccines (see attachment)

The Health Department, Immunizations, and the Community Schools: The Health Department provides vaccine support services to schools and health care providers. Schools are required to report the immunization status of students in November and February, with an expectation that by February 95% of their students will

be fully vaccinated or have a valid immunization waiver on file. The health department assists all our schools to ensure compliance.

Private Providers: Through annual site visits, individualized training, monitoring of VFC vaccine program requirements, and sharing immunization rate information, the health department provides substantial support to local health care providers to ensure that vaccines are stored, administered, and documented correctly and that all VFC requirements are met.

Reminder/Recall: Every month the health department sends letters or makes phone calls to families of children who are overdue for receiving vaccines. Aftercall of 20 month olds is conducted monthly, and a recall of 24-36 month olds and adolescents is conducted quarterly.

Other Immunization Activities

Currently the health department is participating in a regional 31 county grant to work toward improving our immunization rates. There are several components to this grant:

- School Based Immunization Clinics Immunization clinics were conducted at Glen Lake School and Benzie Central High School last fall. This coming summer, the health department will partner with NMHSL to offer immunizations in conjunction with sports physicals.
- Promotion of adolescent vaccines through a "Protect me with Three" campaign (Tdap, Meningococcal, and HPV) and an HPV Sweepstakes
- Provider Support: Education and updates through webinars and newsletters
- Reminder-Recall: Partnering with physician's offices to send immunization reminders to patients through a centralized system.

Klein has contacted the Career Tech Center in Traverse City – The Art Class/Department is developing a new logo for the Health Department.

Medical Director - Dr. Joshua Meyerson not in attendance (medical leave) Reacock shared Dn Meyerson has been nominated and received a prestigious award from the MDHHS, as part of the Hometown Hero Project, recognizing someone for excellence in Public Fleath leadership the award will be presented on April 19, 2017 in Lansing.


Public Input: Ron Evitts commented on the recycling and the Fewins Rd project.

Executive Director's Column



I would dub 2016 as a year of reflection and a missed opportunity for the State of Michigan. In 2016 Centra Wellness Network (CWN) was selected as one of only 14 behavioral health clinics in the State to apply for a special status called a Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic (CCBHC). This status would have allowed CWN to provide services to the entire community including veterans and people suffering from substance use issues. Today, in order to be eligible for services through CWN, an individual will have severe or persistent limitations in their ability to function in the community. This includes persons with intellectual and developmental disabilities, mental illness, and children with severe emotional disturbance. It does not include persons with primary substance use diagnoses, which are exclusions from service eligibility. Unfortunately Michigan was not one of the final 8 states selected to enhance behavioral health services. This limits our ability to serve the whole community based on our contractual obligations and requirements with the state of Michigan.

However, all of our hard work to meet the new CCBHC standards has not entirely gone without purpose. It has encouraged us to look carefully at what we do and to seek new partnerships. Here is the outcome of that introspection:

- 1. We continue to build on our Northern Michigan Health Coalition partnerships and work carefully with them to provide non-mandated behavioral health services in physician's offices where you and I go first seek help. This has been a learning curve for all involved as we negotiate the regulations. We must be aware of and establish working relationships with our partners;
- 2. We have begun establishing a relationship with the Veterans' administration out of Saginaw to bring tele-health to veterans in our area which saves them from having to travel long distances to get the assistance they need; and
- 3. Finally through a partnership with Benzie County EMT, Sheriff's Office, Westbrook Recovery Center, Catholic Human Services, and Pine Rest, we have begun to look at developing treatment options for individuals suffering from Opiate addictions.

We are very hopeful this will bear fruit in 2017 and our community partners will be updated regularly as to our efforts.

Finally, it is with great respect and sadness that I take a moment to acknowledge the passing of Manistee-Benzie Community Mental Health's (later Centra Wellness Network) founding member Betty Noteware. Betty served MBCMH for over 40 years. She was involved in the formation of the Board, and was elected to the first board of directors for MBCMH. She was very active in the community and in politics. Most notably, she promoted the creation of West Shore Community College, served as Manistee County Commissioner for 12 years, served on the Manistee Area Public Schools Board, and served as editor of the Manistee News Advocate. She also had deep involvement with the following organizations: Manistee Area Chamber of Commerce, Republican State Central Committee, Michigan Republican Women's Club, Health and Human Resources Committee of the County Board of Commissioners and was appointed to the Manistee County Social Welfare Committee by the governor. Without her, local services to the citizens of Manistee and Benzie Counties most assuredly would look much different than they do today.

Thank you Betty for your commitment to behavioral health services and for making a difference in people's lives.

Our Services

Centra Wellness Network (CWN) provides a recovery-oriented, person-centered planning approach to services that supports individuals living with mental illness, intellectual/developmental disabilities and children living with emotional disturbances. Our purpose is to help qualified individuals of all ages in their pursuit of happiness by removing any barriers towards recovery to achieve good mental health and to fully participate in community life, with all of its resources, in accordance with their individual needs, strengths, abilities and preferences.

Once an individual is determined to qualify for services at Centra Wellness Network, a CWN clinical team member will work with the individual utilizing a Person Centered Planning approach, which includes full participation of the person wanting services (including their wish to include significant others) in order to develop an individual plan of service. Person Centered Planning is designed to ensure that the person's needs and preferences are addressed in their plan of service. The individual plan of service is amended at any time as the person progresses with his/her life.

The supports and services resulting from this process are provided on an individual basis. The individual has the right to choose the staff, personnel, and service provider organizations he/she wishes to utilize within reasonable financial and organizational parameters of the Centra Wellness Network provider panel. The person also has a right to hire his/her own support staff with the use of a Fiscal Intermediary, which is a third party that is used to help the person manage an allocated support budget.

Centra Wellness Network also provides medical services which are available to individuals in need of medication management support. CWN encourages individuals receiving medication management services to consent to sharing information regarding their medications and health condition with his/her primary and specialty care providers to ensure CWN can assist in coordinating the best health and wellness outcomes.



Community Service Relations

Centra Wellness Network (CWN) is proud to be a partner and collaborator with our community colleagues and area agencies in Manistee and Benzie counties. To maintain a close connection with our community partners, CWN purposely developed the Community Services and Relations Committee (CSR) which is designed to continually assess the needs of the community and collaborate in vital community partnerships. Our agency places great value on our community partners. To show our appreciation, CSR Committee presents Certificate of Recognition awards to community partners on a quarterly basis. In 2016 four individuals were recognized for their contributions to the community and excellent collaboration and partnerships with CWN. Sonja Mayo, Spectrum Health Ludington Hospital



New Electronic Medical Record Improves Services to Clients & Customers

Our agency went through exciting change this year with the move to a new electronic medical record (EMR) system in June 2016. This move was the result of a deliberate, strategic decision made by our Board of Directors to choose an EMR that streamlines and improves clinical documentation recording, increases billing efficiencies, and provides a platform to improve the agency's reporting and analytic capabilities.

"We are very excited about the new system, specifically the efficiencies we've seen since going live in June," says Chip Johnston, Executive Director of Centra Wellness Network (CWN). "But we're more excited about the data reporting capabilities which will help us improve the quality of services we provide to the clients of Manistee and Benzie counties". Data reporting will help CWN evaluate the effectiveness of our programs and services which will be used to improve the client experience as well as provide high quality care.



The new EMR not only impacts CWN, but it has also had a positive impact on our customers. Providers now have the ability to submit claims electronically to CWN and send electronic prescriptions to pharmacies which makes life easier for the clients we serve. For clients, we have initiated a pilot program using a HIPAA compliant patient portal which will allow clients to have access to their online records. CWN plans to continue expansion of this pilot program in 2017.

Centra Wellness Network (CWN) has three very dedicated consumers who actively serve on the Northern Michigan Regional Entity, Regional Entity Partners and Recovery Advisory Council. Our CWN consumer representatives are Tammy Rushing, Steve Henry and Eric Lilly. These individuals provide a voice for consumers receiving services in Manistee and Benzie counties. Once a month they gather with consumer representatives from the other counties within our entity. As consumer representatives they have the opportunity to share the ideas and concerns brought to them from other consumers about the services provided within the agency. They are sending a strong message by letting everyone know that recovery is possible and they want this to be the first thing a person hears when they walk into their local CMH for help.


Tammy, Steve and Eric understand the importance of having a voice and speaking for others who may not be able to be


