[1] PROCEEDINGS  
[2] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Meeting come to order.  
[3] There's two or three seats around  
[4] there. We don't need anybody standing in the  
[5] door if we can help it, please.  
[6] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** Don't stand in  
[7] the door.  
[8] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Please don't, in case  
[9] somebody has to get out. There's a couple of  
[10] seats over here (indicating).  
[11] Cell phones off, please. That's the  
[12] order of an ordinance we have.  
[13] Meeting come to order.  
[14] One thing, the first thing I'll bring  
[15] up before we get started is there will be  
[16] nothing brought up on H-Mart or Peachtree  
[17] Pavilion tonight. Nothing. That's off the  
[18] agenda, and --  
[19] **COUNCILMAN LOWE:** Health insurance.  
[20] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Huh?  
[21] **COUNCILMAN LOWE:** Health insurance is  
[22] off, too; right?  
[23] **MAYOR JENKINS:** (Nods head  
[24] affirmatively.)  
[25] (Inaudible)

[1] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Do what, now?  
[2] All motions, we'll -- we'll called the  
[3] roll on all motions tonight. Instead of raising  
[4] our hand or whatever, we'll have a roll call.  
[5] I would like to get the minutes  
[6] approved for May 21st, 2007, regular Council  
[7] meeting. The minutes, please; do I get a  
[8] motion?  
[9] **COUNCILMAN HART:** I'd like to make a  
[10] motion to pass the minutes.  
[11] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Second?  
[12] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** Second.  
[13] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Any discussion?  
[14] Clerk will call the roll.  
[15] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Ms. Hadden?  
[16] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** Here.  
[17] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Mr. Hart?  
[18] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Here.  
[19] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Mr. Lowe?  
[20] **COUNCILMAN LOWE:** Here.  
[21] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Ms. Pittman?  
[22] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** Here.  
[23] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Mr. Spangler?  
[24] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** Here.  
[25] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. I'll have her

[1] call the roll on the motion which is to approve  
[2] the minutes.  
[3] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Ms. Hadden?  
[4] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** Aye.  
[5] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Mr. Hart?  
[6] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Aye.  
[7] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Mr. Lowe?  
[8] **COUNCILMAN LOWE:** Aye.  
[9] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Ms. Pittman?  
[10] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** Aye.  
[11] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Mr. Spangler?  
[12] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** Aye.  
[13] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Passes 5-0.  
[14] **MAYOR JENKINS:** We're going to take  
[15] Mr. Jones off the agenda tonight, --  
[16] **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** Yes, sir.  
[17] **MAYOR JENKINS:** -- Rick, because he  
[18] didn't feel good and he's got the information  
[19] for us, and we're going to have it on Monday.  
[20] **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** He may even have  
[21] some additional information, he said, so --  
[22] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Melanie --  
[23] Is it Pearch?  
[24] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** Pearch, yes.  
[25] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Melanie Pearch, would

[1] School has earned the State honor of Title I  
[2] Distinguished School for the current school  
[3] year;  
[4] Whereas, Cary Reynolds Elementary  
[5] School was honored as 2004 Outstanding  
[6] Achievement School by the Department of  
[7] Education;  
[8] Whereas, in 2005, Cary Reynolds  
[9] Elementary School was selected as a Georgia  
[10] Junior Achievement School by the Department of  
[11] Education out of 400 schools --  
[12] That's beautiful.  
[13] (Applause)  
[14] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** (Reading) And  
[15] whereas Cary Reynolds Elementary School has also  
[16] been asked to serve as a Model School by the  
[17] District based on its students' success;  
[18] And whereas Melanie L. Pearch gives  
[19] credit to her outstanding staff for the progress  
[20] made by the progress of Cary Reynolds Elementary  
[21] School;  
[22] Now, therefore, be it resolved that the  
[23] Mayor and the City Council of the City of  
[24] Doraville express their admiration and commend  
[25] Melanie L. Pearch, her staff, the parents, and,

[1] you come up to the microphone, please?  
[2] Hi, Ms. Pearch, how are you doing?  
[3] Ladies and gentlemen, this is Melanie  
[4] Pearch and she is the principal of Cary Reynolds  
[5] Elementary School which is in the Northwoods  
[6] neighborhood, and I'm very pleased that she's  
[7] joining us this evening.  
[8] We have a special resolution to present  
[9] to her, her teachers and her students because  
[10] they have made great strides. Cary Reynolds, as  
[11] a lot of us know, has received a bad rap not  
[12] through its own fault. And that's gone on for  
[13] awhile, and I think it'll stop this evening. We  
[14] have some great progress to report, and counsel  
[15] and Mayor are presenting Ms. Pearch and Cary  
[16] Reynolds with a Special Resolution;  
[17] (Reading) "Whereas, Melanie L. Pearch  
[18] is the Principal of Cary Reynolds Elementary  
[19] School;  
[20] And whereas Cary Reynolds Elementary  
[21] School entered into a partnership with Georgia  
[22] State University as one of the three Dekalb  
[23] schools to become a Professional Development  
[24] School;  
[25] Whereas, Cary Reynolds Elementary

[1] most importantly, the students of Cary Reynolds  
[2] Elementary School for their great achievements.  
[3] Thank you.  
[4] (Applause.)  
[5] **MS. PEARCH:** Thank you all very much.  
[6] And I just want -- you know, and we just kind of  
[7] quietly go about our business. I've been here  
[8] for six years.  
[9] We have so many challenges and we just  
[10] kind of take them head on. Obviously, our  
[11] English-language learners are our biggest  
[12] challenge, but we still try to work very, very,  
[13] very hard and take very seriously our challenge  
[14] of moving our students who come in speaking  
[15] English and have a knowledge of reading coming  
[16] into our schools, moving them up to advanced  
[17] levels of achievement, so that that has always  
[18] been our goal. And it's just a challenge  
[19] working with both groups, but we've done it very  
[20] successfully. We're not done, so you'll hear  
[21] more about us.  
[22] But we do take so much pride in this  
[23] neighborhood and the whole revitalization of  
[24] Doraville.  
[25] I invite anyone in here any time to

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[1] come to our school unannounced. Pick any  
[2] classroom, and I guarantee that there will be  
[3] the highest quality teaching going on. So  
[4] everyone has an open invite.  
[5] So thank you again.  
[6] (Applause)  
[7] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** And in keeping on  
[8] the theme of Cary Reynolds Elementary, Eleanor  
[9] is heading up a project where if we have any of  
[10] the cartridges from our printers, there are  
[11] certain makes and models that Eleanor will  
[12] accept -- and I'm hoping the Mayor will let us  
[13] have a box under our councilpeople's mailboxes  
[14] -- bring any empty cartridges in, and we can get  
[15] them to Eleanor. She can come and pick them up.  
[16] She gets \$3 for some, \$5 for others, for Cary  
[17] Reynolds Elementary.  
[18] So any of your ink cartridges, please  
[19] bring them to City Hall, or call me, I'll come  
[20] by and get them, and we can get them to Eleanor  
[21] for Cary Reynolds Elementary. Thank you very  
[22] much Eleanor and Melanie. Thank you.  
[23] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Thank you.  
[24] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I want to get a  
[25] motion --

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[1] Oh, let me do this first. I want to  
[2] introduce Mayor of Chamblee, Eric Clarkson.  
[3] Quite an honor to have the Mayor of Chamblee  
[4] here.  
[5] (Applause)  
[6] **MAYOR JENKINS:** And we have Ryan Deal  
[7] from Channel 46 here with us tonight.  
[8] (Applause)  
[9] **MAYOR JENKINS:** We welcome you every  
[10] meeting. Why don't you come to some of the  
[11] other meetings?  
[12] **MR. DEAL:** If only there were time.  
[13] **MAYOR JENKINS:** You're always welcome.  
[14] Let's put it --  
[15] **MR. DEAL:** Thank you.  
[16] **MAYOR JENKINS:** -- that way.  
[17] And you, too, Eric.  
[18] **MAYOR CLARKSON:** Thank you, Mayor.  
[19] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Anybody else I missed?  
[20] I know we got a lot of celebrities in here, but  
[21] I mean special ones.  
[22] I'd like to get a motion to approve the  
[23] resignation of Jason Anavitarte who retired May  
[24] 31st, and I believe he's with us tonight. But I  
[25] need a motion to accept his resignation.

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[1] **COUNCILMAN HART:** I make that motion.  
[2] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Second?  
[3] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** Second.  
[4] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Any more discussion?  
[5] Clerk, call the roll.  
[6] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Mr. Hart?  
[7] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Aye.  
[8] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Yes or no?  
[9] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Yes; aye.  
[10] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Mr. Lowe?  
[11] **COUNCILMAN LOWE:** Yes.  
[12] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Ms. Pittman?  
[13] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** Yes.  
[14] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Mr. Spangler?  
[15] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** Yes.  
[16] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Ms. Hadden?  
[17] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** Yes.  
[18] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Passes 5-0.  
[19] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. We have a  
[20] reception for Jason, Wednesday, 12:00 noon to  
[21] 2:00 or whatever. That is, this Wednesday, the  
[22] 6th, here at the City Hall, we'll have a  
[23] reception for Jason Anavitarte; so welcome,  
[24] everybody.  
[25] Okay. We've got to put somebody in

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[1] Jason's spot, so I want to ask Bob Spangler.  
[2] I'm going to give him first chance at this. So  
[3] Bob?  
[4] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** My nomination is  
[5] a long-time resident of Oakcliff, and he's been  
[6] very active in working with neighbors and also  
[7] working with Code Enforcement, and he's been a  
[8] terrific neighbor to all of us, and it would be  
[9] Charles Livingston.  
[10] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Will you make that in  
[11] the form of a motion, Bob?  
[12] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** I make a motion  
[13] to nominate Charles Livingston to fill the  
[14] vacancy for the District 3 Council.  
[15] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Do I get a second?  
[16] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** Second.  
[17] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Anymore discussion on  
[18] it?  
[19] (Brief, inaudible discussion by  
[20] Councilman Hart.)  
[21] **MAYOR JENKINS:** We've got a motion on  
[22] the table. Any discussion?  
[23] Clerk, call the roll?  
[24] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Mr. Lowe?  
[25] **COUNCILMAN LOWE:** Aye.

[1] CITY CLERK PAQUET: Ms. Pittman?  
[2] COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN: Aye.  
[3] CITY CLERK PAQUET: Mr. Spangler?  
[4] COUNCILMAN SPANGLER: Aye.  
[5] CITY CLERK PAQUET: Ms. Hadden?  
[6] COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN: I abstain.  
[7] CITY CLERK PAQUET: Mr. Hart?  
[8] COUNCILMAN HART: I abstain.  
[9] CITY CLERK PAQUET: Motion fails.  
[10] Three yes, two abstentions.  
[11] CITY ATTORNEY POWELL: Mayor, would you  
[12] explain to the audience the --  
[13] MAYOR JENKINS: The reason for that is  
[14] this is one particular thing that the Mayor  
[15] cannot make a motion on, I mean cannot vote on.  
[16] Has to be four Council members to nominate  
[17] somebody for a position.  
[18] UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: We couldn't hear  
[19] the voting very well, either.  
[20] MAYOR JENKINS: Call the roll again,  
[21] then.  
[22] CITY CLERK PAQUET: Mr. Lowe?  
[23] COUNCILMAN LOWE: Aye.  
[24] CITY CLERK PAQUET: Ms. Pittman?  
[25] COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN: Aye.

[1] CITY CLERK PAQUET: Mr. Spangler?  
[2] COUNCILMAN SPANGLER: Aye.  
[3] CITY CLERK PAQUET: Ms. Hadden?  
[4] COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN: I abstain.  
[5] CITY CLERK PAQUET: Mr. Hart?  
[6] COUNCILMAN HART: I abstain.  
[7] MAYOR JENKINS: Did you hear that?  
[8] UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Yes.  
[9] MAYOR JENKINS: I guess the next step  
[10] is ask for another motion? Is that correct?  
[11] CITY ATTORNEY POWELL: If there's  
[12] anyone else that wants to nominate.  
[13] MAYOR JENKINS: Anybody else that wants  
[14] to make a motion?  
[15] COUNCILMAN HART: I'd like to nominate  
[16] another long-term resident that's been quite  
[17] active in the community.  
[18] UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Speak up.  
[19] UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Speak up.  
[20] UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: We can't hear  
[21] you.  
[22] UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: We can't hear  
[23] you.  
[24] UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: We can't hear  
[25] you.

[1] COUNCILMAN HART: I'm sorry.  
[2] UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: We can't hear  
[3] you.  
[4] COUNCILMAN HART: I'm deaf in this year  
[5] and I can't -- sometimes it's hard to modulate  
[6] my voice.  
[7] I'd like to nominate another long-term  
[8] resident of Oakcliff who's been quite active in  
[9] giving up his time and energies to promote a  
[10] better Doraville, and that would be Steve  
[11] Koontz.  
[12] UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: He's out of town  
[13] for six weeks.  
[14] MAYOR JENKINS: Excuse me just a  
[15] minute. What was that, Mr. Hart?  
[16] COUNCILMAN HART: I nominate Steve  
[17] Koontz.  
[18] MAYOR JENKINS: I have a motion on the  
[19] floor for Steve Koontz. Do I get a second?  
[20] COUNCILMAN LOWE: Second.  
[21] MAYOR JENKINS: Did I get a second?  
[22] COUNCILMAN LOWE: (Nods head  
[23] affirmatively.)  
[24] MAYOR JENKINS: Anymore discussion?  
[25] Clerk, call the roll.

[1] CITY CLERK PAQUET: Ms. Pittman?  
[2] COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN: Abstain. I  
[3] don't really know him. Abstain.  
[4] CITY CLERK PAQUET: Mr. Spangler?  
[5] COUNCILMAN SPANGLER: No.  
[6] CITY CLERK PAQUET: Ms. Hadden?  
[7] COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN: No.  
[8] CITY CLERK PAQUET: Mr. Hart?  
[9] COUNCILMAN HART: Yes.  
[10] CITY CLERK PAQUET: Mr. Lowe?  
[11] COUNCILMAN LOWE: Aye.  
[12] CITY CLERK PAQUET: Two ayes, two noes,  
[13] one abstention.  
[14] MAYOR JENKINS: Didn't work; right?  
[15] CITY CLERK PAQUET: (Shakes head  
[16] negatively.)  
[17] MAYOR JENKINS: Okay. I'll ask if  
[18] there are anymore motions from the floor -- I  
[19] mean -- excuse me -- from the table. Do I have  
[20] anymore motions?  
[21] If we do not get somebody tonight,  
[22] it'll still be open. The seat will be open  
[23] until January, and we'll have a bunch of people,  
[24] I'm sure, running for that seat. And it's no  
[25] problem to go without a commissioner until

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[1] January.  
[2] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** Well, Mr. Mayor,  
[3] I think --  
[4] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** I think it is  
[5] for us in Oakcliff. We'd like to have both  
[6] seats to represent us. Is this the last  
[7] opportunity tonight?  
[8] **MAYOR JENKINS:** No. It'll still be  
[9] open. Any meeting between now and January. But  
[10] still, they'll have to run for elections in  
[11] August.  
[12] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** Right.  
[13] **MAYOR JENKINS:** They'll have to qualify  
[14] in August.  
[15] Do I have anymore motions?  
[16] Okay. We do not have anybody to fill  
[17] Jason's spot.  
[18] Okay. I need to --  
[19] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** He has a  
[20] question over here.  
[21] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Excuse me?  
[22] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** He has a  
[23] question.  
[24] **MR. ANDERSON:** I read the charter, and  
[25] it doesn't state that the application or the

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[1] nomination has to be from a City Council member,  
[2] so I conjecture that it might be made from the  
[3] floor?  
[4] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I don't think it does.  
[5] **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** I believe it  
[6] says the Council shall choose.  
[7] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Council will nominate,  
[8] not the audience.  
[9] **MR. ANDERSON:** I apologize. It said  
[10] Council will take four votes, but I didn't . . .  
[11] I didn't read that Council will make the  
[12] selection or the nomination.  
[13] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I'd like to get -- we  
[14] got the GMA convention coming up in June, and we  
[15] usually make a motion to dispense \$800 for each  
[16] commissioner that would care to go. And of  
[17] course when they come back, they fill out a  
[18] voucher for what they spent or whatever.  
[19] So I would like to have a motion that  
[20] we dispense \$800 to each commissioner for the  
[21] convention, that is going to the convention. Do  
[22] I get a motion?  
[23] **COUNCILMAN LOWE:** So moved.  
[24] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Second?  
[25] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** I'll second.

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[1] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Anymore discussion?  
[2] Call the roll.  
[3] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Mr. Spangler?  
[4] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** Aye.  
[5] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Ms. Hadden?  
[6] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** Aye.  
[7] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Mr. Hart?  
[8] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Aye.  
[9] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Mr. Lowe?  
[10] **COUNCILMAN LOWE:** Aye.  
[11] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Ms. Pittman?  
[12] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** Aye.  
[13] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Passes 5-0.  
[14] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. You said the  
[15] lights for the cars are going to be \$400 each.  
[16] And you haven't had a chance to find out what I  
[17] asked about that? Or do we need to make a  
[18] motion to come out of regular budget? I guess  
[19] that's what I'm trying to say.  
[20] **CHIEF KING:** Mayor, probably we can  
[21] discuss after the meeting some options that we  
[22] have.  
[23] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. But we will . . .  
[24] . we will be able to get them; is that correct?  
[25] **CHIEF KING:** We're going to be able.

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[1] It's just a matter of where we get the money  
[2] from, but we'll discuss that.  
[3] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Well, that's what I was  
[4] saying. Do I need -- if it comes out of the  
[5] regular budget, I have to have a motion.  
[6] **CHIEF KING:** Yes, sir. At this point  
[7] in the budget process, that would be my  
[8] recommendation, sir.  
[9] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. Do I have a  
[10] motion that we expend \$400 for each car that  
[11] does not have a spotlight on it -- police car?  
[12] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** Motion.  
[13] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** So moved.  
[14] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** Second.  
[15] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Second.  
[16] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** Second.  
[17] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Anymore discussion?  
[18] Call the roll, please.  
[19] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Ms. Hadden?  
[20] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** Aye.  
[21] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Mr. Hart?  
[22] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Aye.  
[23] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Mr. Lowe?  
[24] **COUNCILMAN LOWE:** Aye.  
[25] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Ms. Pittman?

[1] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** Aye.  
 [2] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Mr. Spangler?  
 [3] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** Aye.  
 [4] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** It passes  
 [5] unanimately.  
 [6] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Nominations for the  
 [7] Planning Board, Planning Commission.  
 [8] I suggested last month that we put  
 [9] Mr. O'Connor on the Planning Commission, and I'd  
 [10] like to have a motion that we go ahead and put  
 [11] Mr. O'Connor on the --  
 [12] **COUNCILMAN HART:** I think before we  
 [13] nominate someone else for the Planning Board or  
 [14] Planning Commission is that we haven't really --  
 [15] we set the Planning Commission up but we never  
 [16] set them up with bylaws and an adequate  
 [17] structure.  
 [18] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Well, wait just a  
 [19] minute.  
 [20] Do I get a second on that?  
 [21] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** No, but I'll make  
 [22] a motion for Mr. O'Connor to be put on the  
 [23] Planning Commission.  
 [24] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Do I get a second?  
 [25] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** Second.

[1] before this meeting, and the person wishes for  
 [2] those items to remain not public, to move  
 [3] forward.  
 [4] And here she is raising her hand now.  
 [5] Does the Mayor recognize --  
 [6] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Now, wait just a  
 [7] minute.  
 [8] I have an obligation to put somebody on  
 [9] the Planning Board. It is a standing -- a  
 [10] running commission. And I want to put somebody  
 [11] on the Planning Board. If they want to --  
 [12] whatever they do is fine.  
 [13] I've got a motion and a second. Will  
 [14] you call the roll, please, ma'am?  
 [15] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Mr. Hart?  
 [16] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Abstain.  
 [17] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Mr. Lowe?  
 [18] **COUNCILMAN LOWE:** Aye.  
 [19] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Ms. Pittman?  
 [20] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** Aye.  
 [21] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Mr. Spangler?  
 [22] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** Aye.  
 [23] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Ms. Hadden?  
 [24] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** Aye.  
 [25] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Mr. Hart?

[1] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. Discussion?  
 [2] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Well, like I said,  
 [3] before we go into, you know, adding another  
 [4] person to the Planning Commission was to get the  
 [5] bylaws and the structure of the Planning  
 [6] Commission set up so that it could be -- instead  
 [7] of being set up on their own and operating on  
 [8] their own, they could be --  
 [9] They're supposed to be operating as an  
 [10] advisory panel for the City Council. And to do  
 [11] so, we haven't really been -- we've never set up  
 [12] the rules and structure by which they operate.  
 [13] And the reason why we're replacing a person on  
 [14] the Planning Commission now is the chairman of  
 [15] the board of the Planning Commission basically  
 [16] quit because of the way they were operating.  
 [17] So we never looked into the way that  
 [18] the Planning Commission was operating. We don't  
 [19] know what the bylaws are, we don't know  
 [20] basically what they're up for, and we don't know  
 [21] why the chairman of the Planning Commission got  
 [22] up and quit. We started to get into that at the  
 [23] last Council meeting and it was never resolved.  
 [24] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** I spoke with the  
 [25] former chairman of the Planning Commission

[1] Oh, I'm sorry.  
 [2] Passes 4 to 1.  
 [3] **MR. ANDERSON:** Could he stand up so we  
 [4] can see who he is?  
 [5] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** What  
 [6] neighborhood is that person from?  
 [7] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** Northwoods.  
 [8] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Is Mr. O'Connor here?  
 [9] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** They're all from  
 [10] Northwoods.  
 [11] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** No, they're not.  
 [12] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** No, they're not.  
 [13] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** How many in  
 [14] Northwoods?  
 [15] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** One.  
 [16] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** One.  
 [17] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** How many are  
 [18] Oakcliff?  
 [19] **MR. CRAWFORD:** One.  
 [20] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** One.  
 [21] **MR. CRAWFORD:** There's two --  
 [22] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Wait just a minute,  
 [23] please.  
 [24] You say it's what, 4 to 1?  
 [25] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Yes.

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[1]           **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. Is Mr. O'Connor  
[2] here?  
[3]           **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** I don't think  
[4] he's here.  
[5]           **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** He's not here.  
[6]           **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** He's not here.  
[7]           **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. Towing service  
[8] bids.  
[9]           You got the bids?  
[10]          **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Yes, I do.  
[11]          **MAYOR JENKINS:** We've tried to get more  
[12] than two bids, but we couldn't get but two. The  
[13] towing service people have to be within a 10-  
[14] mile radius, and it's hard to get anybody to bid  
[15] on it, but we do have two bids.  
[16]          (Brief, inaudible conversation among  
[17] Council members.)  
[18]          **MAYOR JENKINS:** Can everybody hear now?  
[19] Can you hear?  
[20]          **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** Yes.  
[21]          **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** Yes.  
[22]          (Brief inaudible conversation among  
[23] Council members.)  
[24]          **MAYOR JENKINS:** Go ahead.  
[25]          **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** Mr. Powell is

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[1]           suggesting that we turn the bids over to him so  
[2] he can then come back and --  
[3]           **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** And I'll --  
[4]           **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** -- talk to us  
[5] about it.  
[6]           **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** -- make copies  
[7] for all of you-all to review, too, but it's . .  
[8] . it's a fairly complicated proposal, so.  
[9]           **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** Even though this  
[10] one's kind of --  
[11]          **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. Then, we'll vote  
[12] it at the next meeting.  
[13]          **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** Yeah, I would  
[14] suggest that.  
[15]          **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. That's good.  
[16]          **COUNCILMAN LOWE:** You want to make a  
[17] motion to table this?  
[18]          **MAYOR JENKINS:** Do I get a motion to  
[19] table it for the next meeting?  
[20]          **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** So moved.  
[21]          **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** We have to have a  
[22] motion to table it.  
[23]          **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** Second.  
[24]          **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** We have to have a  
[25] motion on the floor.

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[1]           **MAYOR JENKINS:** We got a motion and a  
[2] second.  
[3]           **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** I just want to  
[4] ask a question. The one that we currently have,  
[5] is there any way to resolve the current issues,  
[6] do you think?  
[7]           **CHIEF KING:** I think the current issues  
[8] that we have with the current . . . with the  
[9] current towing company is difficult to overcome.  
[10]          The key -- the component that we're  
[11] having a problem with is the fact that they're  
[12] towing -- they're charging victims of crime a  
[13] towing fee. For example, if you get your car  
[14] stolen, then you're charged a towing fee.  
[15]          **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** That's right.  
[16]          **CHIEF KING:** And we just feel that that  
[17] -- that seems to be kind of unjust. I mean you  
[18] get doubly victimized by the criminal element  
[19] and then you have to pay a fee.  
[20]          And also they're passing on, when we  
[21] bring a vehicle to our police department to  
[22] process it for fingerprints, then they're  
[23] charging a fee for that towing process to the  
[24] victim. We just feel that that -- we'd rather  
[25] let the capitalists -- you know, basically we

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[1]           had to have a monopoly. I think they ought to  
[2] compete for the business and see who comes out  
[3] the best.  
[4]           **MAYOR JENKINS:** Does that answer your  
[5] question?  
[6]           **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** Yes. Thank you.  
[7]           **MAYOR JENKINS:** Anymore discussion?  
[8]           You say we do need a motion to table  
[9] this; is that correct?  
[10]          **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** There's really  
[11] nothing to table. It's just if y'all just . . .  
[12] just do what you said. I'll take it, make  
[13] copies, and it'll come on the next agenda.  
[14]          **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. Very good.  
[15]          At the work session, we discussed the  
[16] zoning ordinance. And Rick, will you tell them  
[17] what we decided to do on the zoning ordinance?  
[18]          **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** The Council  
[19] wants me to run ads for the public hearings to  
[20] run -- the first ad would run a week from  
[21] Thursday, to have the hearing the first -- we  
[22] believe it will be July the 2nd, subject to our  
[23] checking the number of days it needs to be ahead  
[24] of time; and then the second one would be  
[25] subsequent to that. But there are requirements

[1] that these ads run, and I have to get the ad in  
[2] the paper or to the paper by noon Thursday for  
[3] it to run in the next Thursday's paper.

[4] And that's what was discussed when you  
[5] weren't here, Mr. Hart.

[6] But I'll do whatever the Council  
[7] instructs me to do on that issue.

[8] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Okay. We're going to  
[9] run an ad in the newspaper on what zoning  
[10] ordinance?

[11] **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** On the zoning  
[12] ordinance that you-all are going to propose to  
[13] adopt.

[14] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Well, we have  
[15] (inaudible) zoning ordinance, so what are we  
[16] advertising?

[17] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** Advertising  
[18] public hearings, work sessions where the public  
[19] can come and give input, ask questions, make  
[20] suggestions that they'd like on the zoning  
[21] ordinance, and some of us that possibly have not  
[22] done that before might do so, you know.

[23] We need to go ahead and have the public  
[24] hearings on that and get the public's input.

[25] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Okay. Well, all

[1] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** July 2nd.  
[2] **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** I believe it was  
[3] July the 2nd if that gives us the correct amount  
[4] of days. We think that is.

[5] **COUNCILMAN HART:** I think we can get  
[6] enough finished at that point to --

[7] **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** And it doesn't  
[8] have to be completely finished by then.

[9] **COUNCILMAN HART:** I think it can be,  
[10] but you're going to -- we're going to have to go  
[11] out and employ some expertise to finish it.

[12] **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** And Mr. Hart, I  
[13] told the Council at the work session that I  
[14] intend to get some different software to scan  
[15] the one we've got --

[16] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Well --

[17] **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** -- into a form  
[18] that can be worked with. It's in a PDF form  
[19] now, and that's all they --

[20] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Well, we've already  
[21] converted that. I mean --

[22] **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** The newest one?

[23] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Yeah.

[24] **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** Oh, okay.

[25] **COUNCILMAN HART:** And we were -- we're

[1] right. I had zoning ordinance on there because,  
[2] you know, Pond hasn't finished it.

[3] What we were trying to do is we were  
[4] trying to go to another source. When we were  
[5] doing it, when we were rewriting the zoning  
[6] ordinance, we looked at a lot of cities like  
[7] Sandy Springs, and you can either plagiarize  
[8] part of Sandy Springs' or you can hire C2MHILL  
[9] to help us with the zoning ordinance.

[10] So we have experts -- at C2MHILL,  
[11] Johnny Lawler and Mike Worth at Keck & Woods --  
[12] to help us finish this zoning ordinance so it's  
[13] something that we can show the public and  
[14] something we could do in short order. But we  
[15] have to -- you know, you can either plagiarize  
[16] the material or we can pay C2MHILL for a couple  
[17] of chapters. And so to finish it up in short  
[18] time, you're going to have to spend a little bit  
[19] of money, you know, to get these other people to  
[20] help us finish it.

[21] **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** I was just  
[22] conveying to you what they instructed me at the  
[23] work session.

[24] **COUNCILMAN HART:** So when would be the  
[25] first public hearing?

[1] already into 10 chapters of it.

[2] But the thing is, we go to like a tree  
[3] ordinance in Sandy Springs, we can't just like  
[4] borrow it from them. I mean you have to --

[5] **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** So you have a  
[6] copy that's --

[7] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Yeah.

[8] **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** -- scanned?

[9] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Yeah. We've  
[10] already -- like I said, we've already finished  
[11] 10 of the 22 articles.

[12] **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** Who is "we?"

[13] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Myself and about  
[14] eight other people. I mean it's --

[15] **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** Okay.

[16] **COUNCILMAN HART:** But the thing is when  
[17] you're looking at six other cities, you're going  
[18] to have to -- I mean somebody wrote those  
[19] articles at the other cities, and so, I mean,  
[20] you're going to have to -- Some of it's C2MHILL,  
[21] some of it's Keck & Wood, some of it's, you  
[22] know, Lawler, you know. So you're going to have  
[23] to, I guess, reimburse them for it.

[24] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Bonita, you had a  
[25] question. Bonita Hoffmeister.

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[1] **MS. HOFFMEISTER:** Honorable Mayor and  
[2] City Councillors, my name is Bonita Hoffmeister.  
[3] I'm a resident and I also work here. I also am  
[4] on the Dekalb Community Planning Commission.  
[5] I had a lot of words about plagiarizing  
[6] cities that do not have industrial parks. Bear  
[7] in mind we as citizens expect our city  
[8] ordinances to be at least to the standard that  
[9] we have now, to at least the standard of Dekalb  
[10] County.  
[11] I have read the ones online, just  
[12] glanced at them. Mayor, I apologize, but I do  
[13] not see the verbiage that I expected for  
[14] industrial parks.  
[15] I have copied Dekalb County's; I'm  
[16] going to pass them out. Please incorporate this  
[17] in the zoning ordinance.  
[18] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Thank you.  
[19] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Okay. I mean that's  
[20] exactly, you know, what we need to do, because  
[21] what we have now is not presentable.  
[22] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. We're going to  
[23] be working on it; right?  
[24] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Right.  
[25] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. Next item.

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[1] **COUNCILMAN HART:** All right. The  
[2] second item is recycling. We had focus groups,  
[3] town hall groups talking about recycling.  
[4] So we're going to put out a letter --  
[5] it's actually a marketing letter sent to the  
[6] residents of the city -- asking them whether  
[7] they want to recycle or not. But we would like  
[8] to present at least -- well, this is a pretty  
[9] neutral letter. It just simply says, do you  
[10] want curbside recycling or do you not? And then  
[11] when we get these back, then we're going to  
[12] decide the method in which we're going to do it.  
[13] There's four key parts to it. The  
[14] first thing is the billing part: how you're  
[15] going to pay for it, if people get credits for  
[16] recycling. Do the people that just want to  
[17] recycle, do they pay? Is it multi-stream,  
[18] single stream?  
[19] So there's some decisions to be made,  
[20] but the first part of this, to send this letter  
[21] out and find out if people want curbside  
[22] recycling.  
[23] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. Everybody  
[24] approve of this letter?  
[25] **COUNCILMAN HART:** So I'd like to have a

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[1] motion to send out a letter.  
[2] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** This is -- this  
[3] is not the letter; is that correct?  
[4] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Right. There's a  
[5] little added wordage --  
[6] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** Okay. Because  
[7] there's --  
[8] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** -- in the yeses and  
[9] noes.  
[10] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** There's a  
[11] different letter, so this is not the correct  
[12] one.  
[13] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Oh.  
[14] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** Is there a way  
[15] you can get us a copy of the letter?  
[16] **MAYOR JENKINS:** The difference would be  
[17] the price; is that correct?  
[18] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Well, we didn't want  
[19] to put the price --  
[20] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** That's one of  
[21] them.  
[22] **COUNCILMAN HART:** -- because that gets  
[23] into a key element, how you're going to recycle.  
[24] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** If you could  
[25] tell us what the difference is between the two

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[1] letters.  
[2] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** The only difference  
[3] is I added the words that after, "Yes, I'm in  
[4] favor of residential curbside recycled pickup,"  
[5] I added the words, "I would sign up for this  
[6] service if provided."  
[7] Under the "No, I am not in favor of the  
[8] City of Doraville providing this service," I  
[9] added the words, "I would not sign up for this  
[10] service if provided."  
[11] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** And they're also  
[12] going to be putting -- she's going to be  
[13] checking with Mr. Edwards in reference to the  
[14] schedule to make sure that is correct.  
[15] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Well, you know,  
[16] Mr. Edwards is not in the recycling business --  
[17] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** No, no.  
[18] **COUNCILMAN HART:** -- as of yet.  
[19] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** On the sanitation  
[20] schedule.  
[21] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** On the  
[22] sanitation, the schedule.  
[23] **MAYOR JENKINS:** That won't have  
[24] anything to do with the letter.  
[25] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Okay.

[1] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. I got a motion.  
[2] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Okay.  
[3] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Do I get a second?  
[4] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** Second.  
[5] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Any discussion?  
[6] Call the roll, please.  
[7] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Ms. Hadden?  
[8] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** Aye.  
[9] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Mr. Hart?  
[10] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Aye.  
[11] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Mr. Lowe?  
[12] **COUNCILMAN LOWE:** Aye.  
[13] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Ms. Pittman?  
[14] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** Aye.  
[15] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Mr. Spangler?  
[16] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** Aye.  
[17] **CITY CLERK PAQUET:** Passes unanimous.  
[18] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay.  
[19] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Okay. The next part  
[20] is the Planning Commission, and this has to do  
[21] with bylaws and the structure of the Planning  
[22] Commission.  
[23] When we first set up the Planning  
[24] Commission, all this started years back.  
[25] Somebody will take -- everybody takes credit for

[1] government. It's simply there to review  
[2] variances of land use.  
[3] And so what we'd like to do is because  
[4] of the things that happened in the Planning  
[5] Commission, we'd like to get a copy of the  
[6] bylaws of the Planning Commission and work with  
[7] Rick Powell and see if we have to restructure  
[8] things so that it becomes what it was supposed  
[9] to be to begin with: a citizen-review Planning  
[10] Committee.  
[11] So I'd like to -- is the chairman of  
[12] the Planning Commission here tonight? Could we  
[13] get a copy of the bylaws, basically rules by  
[14] which you guys operate?  
[15] **MR. CRAWFORD:** Name is Ben Crawford.  
[16] I'm acting chairperson for the Planning  
[17] Commission advisory board for the City of  
[18] Doraville.  
[19] And our bylaws -- due to some internal  
[20] problems, our bylaws got lost. We don't have a  
[21] copy. We have been working on it since our last  
[22] meeting. We should have it completed in July  
[23] and a copy to City Council.  
[24] And it is actually something that we  
[25] should operate by. I don't think it's something

[1] starting things, but it -- just attended these  
[2] planning commission meetings up in Norcross, and  
[3] the fellow that ran the planning commission  
[4] meetings up in Norcross was a fellow named  
[5] Johnny Lawler who does a lot of work for Sandy  
[6] Springs and the various new cities starting up.  
[7] And these meetings were made up of professional  
[8] people that looked at the city's future, and  
[9] they looked through the new buildings built in  
[10] the city and made recommendations to the city  
[11] council. There was a council member there. It  
[12] was well constructed. I mean their work was  
[13] first rate.  
[14] But we have a Planning Commission now  
[15] that we set up here, but they were never given  
[16] any bylaws or structure to operate with. You  
[17] know, Jason and I expanded their duties to  
[18] include review of zoning ordinances --  
[19] I know it's five minutes.  
[20] -- zoning ordinances, to look at plans  
[21] that required variances, and changes of land  
[22] use. And that's basically what they're there  
[23] for. And it's not to involve themselves in  
[24] other department heads. It's not there to  
[25] involve themselves in other areas of city

[1] that really has to be mandatory that the City  
[2] get involved in how it's written, because it's  
[3] something on how we operate. If you see  
[4] problems with it, you should inform us what the  
[5] problems are.  
[6] But we are following a format on how to  
[7] write our bylaws. We're trying to make it  
[8] workable for the community and the City, to help  
[9] the City. And we also operate by Roberts Rules  
[10] of Order when we hold our meetings, and we're  
[11] also going to have a section in there concerning  
[12] the ethical conduct of the Planning Commission  
[13] members.  
[14] So all items will be covered and we'll  
[15] make sure that the City does get a copy of that.  
[16] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Well, I mean that's .  
[17] . . that's good. But the thing is that the  
[18] Planning Commission is appointed by the City  
[19] Council.  
[20] **MR. CRAWFORD:** That's correct, to be  
[21] advisory by nature only. So the final decision  
[22] is made by the City government.  
[23] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Right. And so -- and  
[24] also the --  
[25] **MR. CRAWFORD:** And also, Tom, a

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[1] question you made -- remark you made earlier  
[2] about the Planning Commission, all of us have  
[3] spent a lot of our own time and a lot of our own  
[4] effort on studying and research and everything  
[5] else. And anything that comes before us, I feel  
[6] like we do at least as good a job as City  
[7] Council, if not better in some cases, on  
[8] reviewing these things that come before us, and  
[9] with the citizens and mind and also the City in  
[10] mind.  
[11] We're tasked by the City to do a job.  
[12] We do the best we can with what resources we  
[13] have, and we work hard at it for no pay  
[14] whatsoever.  
[15] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Okay, well, Ben, I've  
[16] attended a lot of City Planning meetings. I was  
[17] the only City Councilperson that did attend the  
[18] Planning meetings. I also with Mr. Lowe were  
[19] the only City Council members that attended the  
[20] planning cases that you're required to take.  
[21] Did you take any planning classes?  
[22] **MR. CRAWFORD:** No, but I have done  
[23] reading on my own time. I actually have 12  
[24] years with the State of Georgia involving code  
[25] work. I think that I more than have a

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[1] background more so than many people sitting up  
[2] there, in code enforcement.  
[3] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Well, we're not  
[4] asking about code enforcement.  
[5] **MR. CRAWFORD:** And I actually did take  
[6] a class, too, when I had the time to do it.  
[7] **COUNCILMAN LOWE:** You didn't take the  
[8] one at Acworth.  
[9] **MR. CRAWFORD:** Yes, I did. I took a  
[10] class in Acworth that I went to on my own time.  
[11] But I also have current copies of all  
[12] the building codes, NFPA code, plumbing code. I  
[13] mean the list goes on. Should I continue?  
[14] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Okay. But we'd like  
[15] to get a copy of the bylaws so that --  
[16] **MR. CRAWFORD:** Mr. Hart, I just got  
[17] through saying earlier you would get it in July.  
[18] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Okay.  
[19] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay, Ben. That's  
[20] fine. Thank you, sir.  
[21] **COUNCILMAN HART:** I am done.  
[22] **MAYOR JENKINS:** The next item is the  
[23] pool access.  
[24] **COUNCILMAN HART:** I'm done.  
[25] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Ms. Hadden?

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[1] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** All right.  
[2] Autumn Park update.  
[3] A lot of people are aware that we have  
[4] been trying to receive a grant through Home  
[5] Depot, their Kaboom program, for a playground  
[6] for children 5 to 12 years old. We have some  
[7] toddler play equipment on the lower side of the  
[8] park and one swing set on the upper side of the  
[9] park.  
[10] And they changed personnel on us, so we  
[11] are not hearing as soon as we should whether we  
[12] won the grant or not, which could be in the  
[13] neighborhood of 35 to 50 thousand dollars' worth  
[14] of playground equipment for us. However, the  
[15] new young lady that has taken over our  
[16] application has assured me that we will hear  
[17] something probably within the next 30 to 45  
[18] days. So it's hurry up and wait, hurry up and  
[19] wait on the Kaboom program.  
[20] Then, the stream bank restoration. I  
[21] met here at City Hall this past week with  
[22] Mr. Lowe, and Carole Stephens out of our Parks &  
[23] Recreation Department, and a gentleman from the  
[24] Wetland Ecological Consultants firm that did the  
[25] study on how to mitigate the erosion on Autumn

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[1] Park's creek.  
[2] And the next thing that will happen is  
[3] that Mr. Powell will be in receipt of some  
[4] wording for an RFP that Council has already  
[5] allowed that we can put out for bid to have such  
[6] mitigation measures put in place and correct the  
[7] erosion in Autumn Park, and then thereby we can  
[8] go ahead and start upgrading with some new  
[9] trees, different plantings, possibly a small  
[10] walking trail; repair the two bridges that cross  
[11] the creek.  
[12] And so that's coming along nicely and  
[13] we'll just have to wade through the bureaucratic  
[14] paperwork on all of that.  
[15] And that's all I have, Mayor.  
[16] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay.  
[17] Yes, Cat.  
[18] **MS. SHERLOCK:** Can I just ask what the  
[19] ballpark of the remediation --  
[20] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Cat Sherlock.  
[21] **MS. SHERLOCK:** I'm sorry. My name is  
[22] Cat Sherlock. I'm just wondering what the  
[23] ballpark was for the remediation for Autumn  
[24] Park.  
[25] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** I don't think we

[1] have a real good idea on that yet, and that's  
[2] why when we send it our for bids --  
[3] We are actually compiling a list of  
[4] different companies that would do this type of  
[5] remediation, and I think when those come in, we  
[6] can really take a good hard look at them and see  
[7] which might be the best way to go.

[8] We certainly don't need to do the most  
[9] expensive, but, then, we don't want to do the el  
[10] cheapo, either, so.

[11] **MS. SHERLOCK:** But there's not like an  
[12] existing budget for how much we're going to  
[13] spend for this?

[14] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** No, but I don't  
[15] think we're going to get into hundreds of  
[16] thousands of dollars. It's not going to be that  
[17] huge.

[18] It's basically what we were told is the  
[19] Raymond Drive portion is basically going to need  
[20] some reworking and some replantings, and right  
[21] now the kudzu's kind of holding it in place.

[22] And it's the other end of the park near the  
[23] McClave side that, when we do have downpours,  
[24] that floods out and floods McClave and actually  
[25] goes into some yards in that area, and that's

[1] did not want to speak with me, quoting Mayor  
[2] Jenkins, "I can't talk to him."

[3] Thursday, May the 24th a.m., Mayor  
[4] Jenkins left a message, a voice message for  
[5] Ms. Pittman, and later Councilman Lowe called  
[6] Ms. Pittman to let her know the Mayor was trying  
[7] to reach her.

[8] Later, I contacted Mayor Jenkins to  
[9] schedule the meeting. The Mayor had me on  
[10] speaker phone, and Councilman Lowe and Attorney  
[11] Powell were in his office. All parties  
[12] participated in discussion of planning the  
[13] meeting to occur at 5:00 p.m. that day, which  
[14] was Thursday, May the 24th.

[15] During the discussion, Councilman Lowe  
[16] asked to attend the meeting as a witness and  
[17] wanted to hear what was happening.

[18] The Mayor asked Attorney Powell to be  
[19] there. Mr. Powell had a previous commitment and  
[20] made a -- said he would not be able to attend.

[21] I suggested that the meeting be taped  
[22] and made record with the City. I did not want  
[23] nor suggest a secret meeting. All agreed and  
[24] discussed the details of Priscilla setting up  
[25] the taping prior to leaving for the day.

[1] where most of the work would probably take  
[2] place.

[3] **MS. SHERLOCK:** Thank you.

[4] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. Are you  
[5] finished?

[6] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** Yes.

[7] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Bob?

[8] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** Okay. Recent  
[9] incidents resulting in request for a meeting.

[10] There have been many false rumors  
[11] circulating about an incident that recently  
[12] occurred. Much of what is being said that I  
[13] said was actually someone else. Most of what is  
[14] being said is actually false.

[15] It is my duty as a City Councilperson  
[16] to set the record straight. To keep the facts  
[17] straight, I will read from my notes.

[18] On Wednesday, May the 23rd, I left a  
[19] message for Mayor Jenkins, to request a meeting  
[20] to discuss some of my concerns with the city.

[21] Instead of returning my call, Mayor  
[22] Jenkins called Councilperson Pittman to find out  
[23] why I wanted this meeting. Ms. Pittman told the  
[24] Mayor that he should call me direct to inquire.  
[25] Mayor Jenkins responded to Ms. Pittman that he

[1] Mayor Jenkins voiced concern that this  
[2] would be illegal as it would make a quorum.  
[3] However, Attorney Powell indicated that it was  
[4] not a quorum since only three Councilpeople  
[5] would be in attendance. The discussion ended  
[6] with the meeting to take place.

[7] Mayor Jenkins asked Councilman Lowe  
[8] what the meeting was about. Mr. Lowe responded  
[9] that he didn't really know, however, stated a  
[10] very vague statement of what he thought the  
[11] subject would be about.

[12] Mayor Jenkins became irate and stated  
[13] that Councilman Lowe, Councilman Pittman and I  
[14] would hurt ourselves by discussing the subject.

[15] Councilman Lowe and Attorney Powell  
[16] went to lunch to discuss the employee-handbook  
[17] project. I called Mr. Lowe to discuss the  
[18] meeting and also was able to ask Attorney Powell  
[19] a legal question.

[20] After lunch, Mr. Lowe returned to City  
[21] Hall and was told the meeting was off. Mayor  
[22] Jenkins had consulted with another attorney and  
[23] was told yes, it would be illegal because he  
[24] would be counted to make the quorum of four.

[25] On Thursday afternoon, May the 24th, at

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[1] approximately 2:00 p.m., Mayor Jenkins contacted  
[2] me to cancel the meeting and did not offer any  
[3] other alternative forums to discuss my concerns.  
[4] Instead, he decided not to deal with me or my  
[5] concerns and canceled the meeting.  
[6] Thursday afternoon at approximately  
[7] 5 o'clock, the first e-mail was posted to the  
[8] neighborhood boards stating the truth of what  
[9] the meeting was supposed to be. This was based  
[10] on rumor, not fact, of what I specifically had  
[11] asked for in the meeting.  
[12] Thursday at 8:46 p.m., Councilwoman  
[13] Hadden posted to the news groups that she spoke  
[14] to Mayor Jenkins. Quote, "I have spoken with  
[15] Ray Jenkins. Ray assured me that he did not  
[16] allow any meeting to occur. He confirmed that  
[17] Ed, Donna and Bob did request such a meeting or  
[18] special meeting for Council and that apparently  
[19] there are not any real charges or any cases for  
[20] dismissal," end quote.  
[21] I had not provided any details to the  
[22] Mayor what the meeting was to be about. If this  
[23] is what Mayor Jenkins told Councilperson Hadden,  
[24] then it was based purely on speculation.  
[25] In the same e-mail from Ms. Hadden, she

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[1] states, and I quote, "Ladies and gentlemen, time  
[2] to step up to the plate and demand more from us,  
[3] your elected officials, than these types of  
[4] personal power-trip shenanigans, don't you  
[5] think?", end of quote.  
[6] Ms. Hadden did not attempt to contact  
[7] me upon learning about a possible meeting and  
[8] Ms. Hadden has yet to contact me for the fact.  
[9] Therefore, Councilperson Hadden made these truth  
[10] statements based on rumor.  
[11] This meeting was to discuss concerns  
[12] about our city, concerns that I have as well as  
[13] what neighbors have shared as a concern of  
[14] theirs.  
[15] For all I know, the meeting could have  
[16] taken place and our Mayor may have been able to  
[17] provide some unknown facts that would have  
[18] quickly resolved these issues and that would  
[19] have ended that. Instead, this was mishandled  
[20] with false information which has only served to  
[21] upset residents, thereby dividing our city and  
[22] Council even more.  
[23] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** I did speak with  
[24] Ray Jenkins, Mayor, that afternoon. It was  
[25] late. I had no knowledge of any meeting being

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[1] called or asked to take place, and I am a City  
[2] Council member.  
[3] When I talked to the Mayor, he assured  
[4] me he did not allow any meeting to occur. He  
[5] confirmed that Ed, Donna and Bob did request  
[6] such a meeting for Council and that there were  
[7] not any real charges or a case for dismissal.  
[8] Further, with Chief King in D.C., there would be  
[9] no such meeting behind Chief's back.  
[10] Mr. Hart was not a participant in  
[11] asking for this or working with Ed, Donna or Bob  
[12] on this.  
[13] This is not rumor. This is a conversa-  
[14] tion that the Mayor allowed me to post at about  
[15] quarter to 8:00 that night, and this is what  
[16] Mayor Jenkins told me. And as a matter of fact,  
[17] he called and told me that I quoted him very  
[18] well even though I didn't use quote marks. So  
[19] that's that.  
[20] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** Actually, I'd  
[21] like to add to that because I did not request a  
[22] meeting. I was asked to attend a meeting. And  
[23] I believe that Mr. Powell can attest once I  
[24] realized there were other members that possibly  
[25] would be there, I told him that I was sick,

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[1] anyways, that I was not going to be there. And  
[2] I believe I told you that as well: if it was  
[3] questionable, I wasn't going to be there. But I  
[4] requested no meeting. I was invited.  
[5] **MAYOR JENKINS:** You was invited by who?  
[6] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** Mr. Spangler.  
[7] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Mr. Lowe?  
[8] **COUNCILMAN LOWE:** My only purpose there  
[9] was to be a witness, as Mr. Spangler said.  
[10] **MAYOR JENKINS:** You set in front of my  
[11] desk with the City Attorney and agreed with him  
[12] that we should have a meeting at 5 o'clock. And  
[13] I asked you a question. I says what do you --  
[14] what is your reason for this?  
[15] You gave me a couple of things. You  
[16] said, "Mayor, I'm not at liberty to discuss this  
[17] with you." What does that mean?  
[18] **COUNCILMAN LOWE:** First of all, I think  
[19] you got your facts a little bit mistaken.  
[20] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I don't know the facts.  
[21] That's what I'm telling you.  
[22] **COUNCILMAN LOWE:** I asked if I could be  
[23] a witness at this meeting.  
[24] **MAYOR JENKINS:** A witness?  
[25] **COUNCILMAN LOWE:** A witness, yes; a

[1] witness.  
[2] **MAYOR JENKINS:** You wanted the  
[3] meeting --  
[4] **COUNCILMAN LOWE:** I wanted to be --  
[5] **MAYOR JENKINS:** -- Mr. Lowe, and I  
[6] apologize to you.  
[7] **COUNCILMAN LOWE:** -- with the meeting.  
[8] **MAYOR JENKINS:** How about --  
[9] **COUNCILMAN LOWE:** Mr. Powell --  
[10] **MAYOR JENKINS:** -- it, Rick?  
[11] **COUNCILMAN LOWE:** Mr. Powell will  
[12] verify that.  
[13] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. Let him verify  
[14] it.  
[15] **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** First, I want to  
[16] say that I did make a mistake and I went and  
[17] looked at the charter later, and it would have  
[18] been an illegal meeting.  
[19] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I knew that on my own.  
[20] **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** The way that  
[21] it's worded, the wording, it clearly would have,  
[22] and I was incorrect when asked when I came into  
[23] the City Hall.  
[24] And as far as what was going to happen,  
[25] I don't know. Mr. Lowe indicated that if there

[1] understand some of Bob's statements because I  
[2] don't know anything about what you wanted to  
[3] have the meeting for. I would have met with  
[4] you, any of them, one on one.  
[5] But you know why I didn't try to get it  
[6] one on one?  
[7] What did I ask this gentleman? and he  
[8] says, "not at liberty to discuss anything with  
[9] you."  
[10] That's what you told me. Why should I  
[11] try to talk to one on one under those  
[12] circumstances?  
[13] And I'll say this: I called -- it was  
[14] about 2 clock when I called you --  
[15] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** Yes, sir, it was.  
[16] **MAYOR JENKINS:** -- and told you there  
[17] would be no meeting.  
[18] At that particular time, I said to  
[19] myself, "This whole thing is over," but I sure  
[20] was mistaken.  
[21] And I'm going to say one more thing.  
[22] Rick Powell called the other councilmen.  
[23] I'm going to say this, Rick, because  
[24] you did. You called the other councilmen about  
[25] this. It was over. There was no meeting or

[1] was a problem, he would step out and not  
[2] participate.  
[3] **COUNCILMAN LOWE:** That's right.  
[4] **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** He did say that.  
[5] But there was never -- I haven't read  
[6] all the things that have gone around, but there  
[7] was definitely no meeting.  
[8] And it was unfortunate that Mr. Lowe  
[9] and I had set up to go work on the employee  
[10] manual at that time, because I got brought into  
[11] that because of it when I walked in.  
[12] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I was asked to have a  
[13] meeting with three councilmen and a city  
[14] attorney. And then at that particular time, you  
[15] said, "I cannot be there."  
[16] **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** Right. That's  
[17] correct.  
[18] **MAYOR JENKINS:** And at that time, I  
[19] thought about the meeting, but I said to you, "I  
[20] don't feel right about this," so I went and  
[21] called another attorney.  
[22] **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** I know.  
[23] **MAYOR JENKINS:** And I sure am glad I  
[24] did.  
[25] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Anyway, I don't

[1] nothing. Why did you call the other councilmen  
[2] then?  
[3] **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** Because I felt  
[4] like that everybody needed -- I don't . . . I  
[5] don't represent any --  
[6] **MAYOR JENKINS:** That would have been my  
[7] place.  
[8] **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** -- particular  
[9] councilperson.  
[10] **MAYOR JENKINS:** That would have been my  
[11] place to call the other councilmen, not you.  
[12] **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** I did . . . I  
[13] did inform the other members that there was a  
[14] possible meeting.  
[15] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Possible meeting. Did  
[16] you tell them that there was no meeting?  
[17] **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** Yes.  
[18] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. So I'm saying  
[19] why did you go any further than my decision not  
[20] to have a meeting? I knew it wasn't right.  
[21] And I'm not going to say that . . .  
[22] that there was three councilmen that wanted that  
[23] meeting. Now, I apologize. And all I'm going  
[24] to say is this: I did not have the meeting, I  
[25] done the right thing, and I still don't know

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[1] what it's all about. Put it that way.  
[2] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** Everybody else  
[3] in the room does.  
[4] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** Can I ask a  
[5] question? A meeting should be to handle this  
[6] kind of stuff?  
[7] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Anymore discussion at  
[8] the table?  
[9] Bob, can I have a copy of your --  
[10] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** Yes, you may,  
[11] Mayor.  
[12] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Thank you.  
[13] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** The only thing I  
[14] can say is, Mr. Mayor, if you would only have  
[15] agreed to have a follow-up meeting one on one or  
[16] whatever --  
[17] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I certainly --  
[18] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** -- I would have  
[19] been more than happy to.  
[20] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I certainly would have  
[21] agreed to a one on one meeting. It's just like  
[22] I said. If -- why would I have a one on one  
[23] meeting when I got an answer from the Vice Mayor  
[24] of "not at liberty to discuss anything with  
[25] you?"

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[1] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** Well, that was  
[2] not me.  
[3] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. I shut the  
[4] meeting down. You should have called me --  
[5] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** I understand.  
[6] **MAYOR JENKINS:** -- and said.  
[7] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** I understand.  
[8] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I would have talked to  
[9] any of you personally one on one, yes.  
[10] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** I just wished you  
[11] had said, "The meeting's canceled. I will be  
[12] willing to meet with you one on one" at whatever  
[13] time.  
[14] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Well, you should have  
[15] said that to me.  
[16] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** No. You had --  
[17] it was in your hands, Mayor.  
[18] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Well, I canceled the  
[19] meeting, right?  
[20] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** Can I ask a  
[21] question?  
[22] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Wait just a minute,  
[23] sir.  
[24] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** That's all I have  
[25] to say.

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[1] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. Anymore  
[2] discussion at the table?  
[3] A short, sir?  
[4] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** Yes. My  
[5] question is I think a lot of us behind here are  
[6] confused as to what --  
[7] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I'm confused, too, sir.  
[8] I'm very confused.  
[9] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** I think --  
[10] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I'm just saying to you.  
[11] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** I think that's  
[12] fair what you're saying. I think that's fair.  
[13] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Yes.  
[14] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** What is the  
[15] issue, Mr. Spangler?  
[16] **MAYOR JENKINS:** We do not know what the  
[17] issue is, sir.  
[18] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** We're not going  
[19] to bring that up now. We did not have an  
[20] opportunity to have the meeting. I'm not going  
[21] to bring it up at this time.  
[22] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** I mean it's a  
[23] public forum. This is the public.  
[24] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** It's a public --  
[25] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** How about the

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[1] public's right to know?  
[2] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** The public will  
[3] know but not at this time.  
[4] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** Not at this  
[5] time?  
[6] **MAYOR JENKINS:** That's right.  
[7] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** It sounds like  
[8] you wanted to set something straight.  
[9] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** I don't think  
[10] that's appropriate.  
[11] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** You didn't tell  
[12] us what you wanted to set straight.  
[13] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** We have probably  
[14] the best police chief and the best police force  
[15] in the state of Georgia, and I think we have a  
[16] right to know. I think we have a right to know  
[17] what the problem is.  
[18] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Excuse me, sir.  
[19] I'll agree with everybody a hundred  
[20] percent. We got the best Police Chief anywhere.  
[21] I don't know what was behind the meeting, and  
[22] personally I don't want to. Okay?  
[23] I did my part. I stopped the meeting;  
[24] it did not happen. And if Mr. Spangler's got a  
[25] problem, maybe he can bring it out later. And

[1] it will come out in a full meeting with the  
[2] public, not behind closed doors. Okay?  
[3] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** Thank you, Mayor.  
[4] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Do you have anything  
[5] else, Bob?  
[6] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** That's it.  
[7] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Anymore discussion?  
[8] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Yeah. I have a  
[9] question.  
[10] I wasn't involved with this, but the  
[11] question I have is like if Bob had a question  
[12] for you and he needed to discuss something, why  
[13] didn't the two of you sit in the office and have  
[14] a discussion? What was all this about? That's  
[15] what I don't get.  
[16] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I would have been glad  
[17] to do that.  
[18] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Well, why didn't you?  
[19] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Because I was not asked  
[20] to do it, Mr. Hart. I just got through telling  
[21] you that.  
[22] **COUNCILMAN HART:** I mean didn't you  
[23] want to --  
[24] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** I asked for the  
[25] meeting, Tom. I'll give you a copy.

[1] is something very, very positive. Anyone can  
[2] use these most of the time. They're voice  
[3] activated, and anyone can just grab one and walk  
[4] through the process. So we will have to put  
[5] that in the budget to be able to order the  
[6] additional for each public building and a couple  
[7] extra for the Police Department.  
[8] **MAYOR JENKINS:** You're not ready to  
[9] make a motion.  
[10] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** Well, I mean I  
[11] can.  
[12] **MAYOR JENKINS:** But I mean you don't  
[13] know the prices.  
[14] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** Captain, can you  
[15] remember the prices? I mean you have your high  
[16] end and your --  
[17] **CAPTAIN ATKINSON:** Low end was \$1200  
[18] and high end was \$3600, I believe.  
[19] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** Thirty-six.  
[20] Okay. Somewhere in the middle should probably  
[21] do the job, I would think.  
[22] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Why don't we --  
[23] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** We can make a  
[24] motion.  
[25] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** We can put it in

[1] **MAYOR JENKINS:** He asked for a meeting  
[2] of three councilmen.  
[3] Okay.  
[4] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** Mine's just  
[5] work-session stuff. It's just work session.  
[6] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Well, tell the  
[7] audience.  
[8] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** Okay. I can.  
[9] We had brought up at the last meeting,  
[10] the automated defibrillators, wanting them.  
[11] We've actually tried to get a couple extra for  
[12] the Police Department. And I was speaking with  
[13] Sergeant Sigler (phonetic), and he was telling  
[14] me that as of 2008, they're going to be required  
[15] in every public building. So I just -- really,  
[16] I brought it up in the work session for budget  
[17] purposes.  
[18] This is something that I thought the  
[19] Police Department has one, but they certainly  
[20] need one for on the road and one for the jail,  
[21] but now we're going to need one for every public  
[22] building and it's a great -- yes, absolutely,  
[23] one for here.  
[24] And it's a really good -- it will be a  
[25] good investment. It's saved many lives, so this

[1] the budget.  
[2] **COUNCILMAN LOWE:** We can put the price  
[3] in the budget.  
[4] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Yes.  
[5] Okay. Rick?  
[6] **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** The only thing I  
[7] have is the discussion that you had at the work  
[8] session, if you're going to put the City Planner  
[9] position out for RFP's.  
[10] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay.  
[11] **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** And that's you-  
[12] all's decision.  
[13] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. On the towing  
[14] service, we tabled that.  
[15] **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** Are you going to  
[16] direct us to put together RFP's for the City  
[17] Planner?  
[18] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Yes.  
[19] **COUNCILMAN HART:** Yes. I'd like to  
[20] make a motion to put out RFP's for the City  
[21] Planner.  
[22] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Do I get a second?  
[23] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** Second.  
[24] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Any discussion?  
[25] Clerk will call the roll?

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[1] CITY CLERK PAQUET: Mr. Hart?  
[2] COUNCILMAN HART: Aye.  
[3] CITY CLERK PAQUET: Mr. Lowe?  
[4] COUNCILMAN LOWE: Aye.  
[5] CITY CLERK PAQUET: Ms. Pittman?  
[6] COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN: Aye.  
[7] CITY CLERK PAQUET: Mr. Spangler?  
[8] COUNCILMAN SPANGLER: Aye.  
[9] CITY CLERK PAQUET: Ms. Hadden?  
[10] COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN: Aye.  
[11] CITY CLERK PAQUET: Passes unanimously.  
[12] MAYOR JENKINS: Thank you.  
[13] Employees' manual, do you want to bring  
[14] anything up on that?  
[15] CITY ATTORNEY POWELL: No.  
[16] MAYOR JENKINS: I have citizens'  
[17] comments, and it will be five minutes. We've  
[18] got about five already signed up. So you'll  
[19] come to the podium as I call your name.  
[20] Ms. Donna Snyder.  
[21] COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN: This gentleman's  
[22] off?  
[23] MAYOR JENKINS: Yeah. He's not here.  
[24] COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN: Okay.  
[25] MS. SNYDER: I don't want to beat a

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[1] dead horse, but I do appreciate the floor,  
[2] Mayor, Council members.  
[3] MAYOR JENKINS: Donna Snyder.  
[4] MS. SNYDER: Donna Snyder.  
[5] The recent incident that occurred with  
[6] Councilman Spangler asking for a meeting is very  
[7] alarming to me. One is that I would expect our  
[8] councilperson, -people, residents, businesses,  
[9] could at any time take you up, Mayor, on your  
[10] open-door policy to talk to you about what our  
[11] concerns are.  
[12] MAYOR JENKINS: Right.  
[13] MS. SNYDER: Now, I happen to know that  
[14] Councilman Spangler had multiple concerns,  
[15] multiple issues to discuss, so I'm real  
[16] concerned that he didn't get the opportunity to  
[17] do so. I hope that he will have the opportunity  
[18] to speak with you about those concerns.  
[19] I'm very disappointed to hear that our  
[20] City Attorney took it upon himself to go and  
[21] contact all of our City Councilpeople versus  
[22] having the process work as it should.  
[23] I'm also very disappointed in  
[24] Councilperson Hadden for going out and basing  
[25] several e-mails on what she believed to be the

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[1] facts based on what Mayor Jenkins had told her.  
[2] And I think, Mayor, a minute ago you said you  
[3] didn't know what the meeting was about.  
[4] But based on these e-mails, I mean it's  
[5] pretty clear to me it's very derogatory and very  
[6] negative towards our Chief of Police and our  
[7] Police Department, which we all very much  
[8] respect and support. If there's any concerns  
[9] there, possibly it could have been handled  
[10] behind closed doors.  
[11] It makes me wonder, though, Councilman  
[12] Hadden, how much did -- did you maybe had heard  
[13] rumor of all the different concerns that were  
[14] going to be discussed? Maybe possibly about  
[15] your own conduct? Would that be why you focused  
[16] in on the Chief of Police and the police force?  
[17] I mean is that a possibility, where there's  
[18] e-mails and things floating around?  
[19] And I guess this would come up with the  
[20] appointment for Jason Anavitarte's seat, I guess  
[21] where you had support for a particular person  
[22] and were discussing other people that might be  
[23] running, someone's girlfriend's son, a child  
[24] molester, naming several people and saying --  
[25] and who knows what other Jenkinite would come

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[1] out of the woodwork? That's just one of the  
[2] issues I could bring up.  
[3] UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Whoa.  
[4] MS. SNYDER: So that makes me wonder in  
[5] looking at all of these people that have taken  
[6] their time to come in tonight, because they were  
[7] very concerned and gave a lot of support, which  
[8] was the right thing to do. But unfortunately,  
[9] it was a waste of energy for the wrong reason.  
[10] I'm just very disappointed.  
[11] COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN: I'd like to  
[12] respond, Mayor.  
[13] COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN: When I talked  
[14] with Mayor Jenkins, I believed what he told me,  
[15] and he told me to post this to the web site,  
[16] which I did. It was about quarter to 8:00 that  
[17] night, and I had no reason to not believe what  
[18] Mayor Jenkins told me.  
[19] MAYOR JENKINS: Yes, sir.  
[20] MR. FIEDLER: Raymond Fiedler. I'll be  
[21] very quick, Your Honor.  
[22] Ms. Johnson -- or Ms. Snyder, how come  
[23] our representative spoke to you about these  
[24] issues but he wouldn't speak to me on the phone  
[25] about it? Are you some kind of friend of his

[1] and I'm not.

[2] **MS. SNYDER:** I was his campaign

[3] manager, and I actually spoke to --

[4] **MR. FIEDLER:** Oh. I thought Jason

[5] Anavitarte was his campaign manager because his

[6] wife wrote him an evil letter cussing him out.

[7] I mean he would tell you but he

[8] wouldn't tell us. That's all I want to know. I

[9] don't believe it.

[10] **MAYOR JENKINS:** John Noonan.

[11] **MR. NOONAN:** I'm John Noonan. I have

[12] the podium. Please reserve your comments till

[13] I've finished.

[14] I am here to bring into question the

[15] conduct of this City Council on several issues.

[16] You are public servants and charged with the

[17] governing of the affairs of the citizens of

[18] Doraville and will be held accountable for your

[19] actions or inactions. Some things you do cannot

[20] be undone.

[21] First issues. Our new zoning ordinance

[22] which the City has spent thousands of dollars

[23] for was due in January. It's now June, six

[24] months late, and we have yet to hold the first

[25] public hearing of the two required hearings.

[1] This leads me to believe that there is

[2] nothing more than petty personal grievances,

[3] again a violation of our Code of Ethics.

[4] I personally spoke with our Chief, John

[5] King, and he stated to me he had no idea what

[6] the request was about and that if such a request

[7] was granted he would request it to be an open

[8] meeting because he had nothing to hide.

[9] Our Chief of Police, John King, is a

[10] decorated military officer who has led his men

[11] into battle in defense of this country. Our

[12] military thinks enough of him to promote him to

[13] the rank of full colonel.

[14] Chief King has assembled and trained

[15] one of the finest police departments in this

[16] state. He has moved his department and

[17] demonstrated to us how a police department

[18] should be run. He has the respect of his men,

[19] the vast majority of the citizens of Doraville

[20] as well as the business community. He knows the

[21] meaning of duty, honor, country. He is a man of

[22] integrity.

[23] To even consider dismissing our Chief

[24] without so much as an ethics complaint shows a

[25] total disregard of public interest by these

[1] This is negligence and a violation of our Code

[2] of Ethics. You need to move our city forward

[3] and not hold us back.

[4] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** Right.

[5] **MR. NOONAN:** Second issue, our Chief of

[6] Police, John King. After reading several

[7] e-mails and hearing rumors about special-called

[8] meetings regarding Chief King's employment with

[9] the City, I decided to find out for myself.

[10] I called Ms. Pittman. She told me she

[11] had some information but would not comment on it

[12] until she had all the information at the

[13] meeting.

[14] I called Mr. Lowe. He told me he knew

[15] nothing about it.

[16] I called Mr. Spangler. I had to leave

[17] a message. He returned my call days later. He

[18] said he would not comment at this time.

[19] I personally spoke with Mayor Ray

[20] Jenkins, and he stated to me that Bob Spangler,

[21] Donna Pittman and Ed Lowe asked him for a

[22] special-called meeting regarding the employment

[23] of our Chief of Police, John King. The Mayor

[24] told me that they had no basis for a meeting and

[25] he would not call a meeting.

[1] councilmen, Ed, Donna and Bob, and a violation

[2] of the Code of Ethics. This brings into

[3] question their competency to govern the affairs

[4] of the people of Doraville.

[5] One good thing this controversy has

[6] done is to unify the people of Doraville behind

[7] a common goal: save our Chief.

[8] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Susan Fraysse.

[9] **MS. FRAYSSE:** I'm Susan Fraysse. I

[10] have a very short update about the status of the

[11] web page for the City.

[12] Several things are going well, and we

[13] got the comprehensive plan. All the components

[14] are up there. I can access them; I can look at

[15] the map. I appreciate it. And so we can look

[16] at the comprehensive plan, and that's important

[17] to all the citizens.

[18] We got a draft of the -- the March 9th

[19] draft of the Doraville zoning ordinance, and

[20] that's on the web page. And thank you very

[21] much, Council. I was glad to be able to see

[22] that.

[23] We actually saw the agenda for

[24] tonight's work session and Council meeting --

[25] and I appreciate that being up there in a timely

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[1] fashion -- and the June City newsletter and  
[2] calendar were there. So thank you on all those  
[3] counts.  
[4] At this point, we still are missing two  
[5] meetings that happened in January, and I've  
[6] mentioned that in e-mails a couple of times.  
[7] And this was something that the Council -- I  
[8] brought it up in September, and the Council  
[9] agreed to have Ronnie Murphy, our person that  
[10] does all the computer stuff, put all the Council  
[11] agendas and minutes on the web site, so I take  
[12] it seriously. The dates for those meetings were  
[13] a regular meeting on January 16th and a special  
[14] council meeting on January 29th. So that would  
[15] make me happy if we could get that up there.  
[16] I appreciate what you do for the web  
[17] page so people can find out about things.  
[18] **MAYOR JENKINS:** We'll see if we can  
[19] make you happy.  
[20] **MS. FRAYSSE:** Thank you.  
[21] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Ms. Kay Byrd.  
[22] **MS. BYRD:** Kay Byrd, Northwoods. I  
[23] have two of my main questions.  
[24] After all this craze for the policeman,  
[25] several of the neighbors were talking about how

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[1] one of the great services we have as citizens of  
[2] Doraville over the years -- and I've lived here  
[3] off and on since 1960 -- was having a patrol car  
[4] that came through our neighborhood two or three  
[5] times a day. We felt like that was one of the  
[6] things that made our neighborhood so good and so  
[7] safe. And for the last two or three years, we  
[8] haven't had that, and I'm sure the situation in  
[9] Doraville has demanded a lot of their time  
[10] elsewhere. And we were wondering if there is a  
[11] way to begin to get more of that.  
[12] We're having a lot of problems with  
[13] speeders in the area, and some of us on Addison  
[14] Drive have started a yelling committee. We have  
[15] about five people who yell at the drivers that  
[16] are driving fast. And they'll stop. They get  
[17] confused. And I realize that a lot of them  
[18] don't know what the speed is. Of if we're  
[19] walking, we'll step out and do this (gesturing).  
[20] I actually even followed one fellow who  
[21] I saw run through three stop signs, until he  
[22] pulled into a driveway. And I pulled in and  
[23] blocked him, and I told him if I ever saw him do  
[24] that in my community again, he would have to  
[25] answer to more than me. And he kept saying,

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[1] "Sorry," and begging to go, and I said, "No, I'm  
[2] not through yet." I said, "We have a lot of  
[3] little children in this neighborhood, and that  
[4] is my concern." And we do.  
[5] So one question my neighbors have is  
[6] what are the regulations on us putting signs in  
[7] our yards? We'd like to do signs down all of  
[8] Addison Drive where I live that say "25 miles an  
[9] hour. Slow down. Children at play."  
[10] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I just ordered some  
[11] signs, and we'll have them in there.  
[12] **MS. BYRD:** Great. Great. Thank you  
[13] very much.  
[14] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Thank you.  
[15] That's the end of my list. Do we have  
[16] anybody else?  
[17] Come up to the podium, please.  
[18] **MS. LIVINGSTON:** My name is Carol  
[19] Livingston and I'd like to say to Marlene and  
[20] Mr. Hart, if you can find a better man, a more  
[21] honest man, a more interested man in the city  
[22] than Charles Livingston, you better hire him and  
[23] hire him tonight, because you're not going to  
[24] find a better person for this Council or any  
[25] other council than Charles Livingston.

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[1] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Who's next?  
[2] Yes, ma'am, come on up.  
[3] **MS. BARKER:** I actually don't need a  
[4] microphone. I have a big mouth. But my name is  
[5] Patty Barker and I live in Northwoods.  
[6] And the first thing I want to say is I  
[7] appreciate the humility -- for those that may  
[8] not agree, I still feel it was humble of Mr.  
[9] Powell to come out and say, "Yes, I was wrong."  
[10] You know, he researched it and he came back and  
[11] he made a wrong right. There's not too many  
[12] people that'll get up in public and say it, so I  
[13] appreciated that.  
[14] And I stood up here about four years  
[15] ago and said that, you know, our police  
[16] department had been through so much bad press --  
[17] some of you may have forgotten it -- with Ron  
[18] Davis and his crowd.  
[19] And I said, you know, we've come so  
[20] far, and I said, you know, let's do something.  
[21] So we created the Police Appreciation Day which  
[22] has come together with the community. It's  
[23] grown, you know. We usually have a wonderful  
[24] turnout every year to show the Police  
[25] Department. And we're not the only ones that

[1] appreciate them. They appreciate us. They work  
[2] very hard to do SWAT team demonstrations and  
[3] canine demonstrations. They take us to the jail  
[4] and show us different things, and they'll answer  
[5] any questions.

[6] And I don't want to go back to the days  
[7] of Ron Davis. And if we have a problem with  
[8] Chief King and we get rid of him, that's what's  
[9] going to happen because he's going to take the  
[10] cream of the crop with him wherever he goes.  
[11] This is the cream of the crop, and we have one  
[12] of the best police departments in the state.  
[13] And we cannot have Bob Spangler -- who was very  
[14] vague in your description.

[15] You spent several minutes awhile ago  
[16] with a description of nothing. You wasted  
[17] several minutes of our time and the Council's  
[18] time, and all you said was, "this matter," "this  
[19] matter." You never were specific about what the  
[20] problem was. That's not fair to this community.  
[21] If you have a problem, you tell this community  
[22] what this problem is and let us come to you as  
[23] people who pay your salary, and come to you and  
[24] ask you, and you be open about it.

[25] I appreciate the Mayor returning my

[1] innocent parties in all of this and that we have  
[2] to be very careful about slinging things around,  
[3] about slanderous remarks and about things that  
[4] will ruin people's reputations. That goes for  
[5] Bob Spangler's, Chief King's and everybody else  
[6] that was involved in this non-issue.

[7] **MR. ANDERSON:** Stuart Anderson.

[8] I was going to speak about some other  
[9] things as well as this, I guess. But since this  
[10] seems to be a hot item, Open Records Act,  
[11] Georgia Open Records Act, 50-14-2 and 50-14-3  
[12] allow that the city council or agency of that  
[13] nature may have -- not "must have" but "may  
[14] have" -- an executive session. And it states  
[15] why they would have an executive session; if  
[16] there are personnel problems, litigation  
[17] problems. These laws exist so that you can have  
[18] personal information come out in closed doors so  
[19] that there is not innuendos, there's not libel  
[20] spread in the streets.

[21] I apologize to Rick, but Rick should  
[22] have been advising the Mayor and the  
[23] participants in this conversation that that's  
[24] how this should have been handled.

[25] **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** What do you know

[1] call. He does have an open-door policy. I can  
[2] walk in there any time. He returns every one of  
[3] my calls. And he left me a wonderful message  
[4] saying, I did not support this meeting and I  
[5] called it off, and I'm behind you a hundred  
[6] percent concerning Chief King.

[7] And I'm going to stand beside you and  
[8] make sure you that you are. Thank you.

[9] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Come to the podium,  
[10] Susan.

[11] **MS. CRAWFORD:** Susan Crawford,  
[12] Oakcliff.

[13] I don't know what's going on, but  
[14] clearly we sort of know. But it appears to be a  
[15] non-issue since the Mayor doesn't even know what  
[16] this was about.

[17] I can only assume that going from --

[18] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Let me clear something  
[19] up, Susan. I knew a little bit about what it  
[20] was about but not how deep or whatever. Okay?

[21] **MS. CRAWFORD:** Okay. So that changes  
[22] the direction. Now I'm up here with nothing to  
[23] say.

[24] But I really -- I feel that the Police  
[25] Department was exploited and that they were very

[1] about what I advised?

[2] **MR. ANDERSON:** Well, you're right. I  
[3] don't know what you advised. I apologize if you  
[4] did. But certainly the advice, if you advised  
[5] 50-14 -2 and -3, they certainly didn't hear you.  
[6] So that's where I stand on that. It should be  
[7] handled as an executive session. If they want  
[8] to handle personnel matters in public, that's up  
[9] to the City Council.

[10] That's all I have to say about that.

[11] That's really not what I stood up to say, but  
[12] there's been a lot of conversation about it.

[13] Did you ever come up with a  
[14] recommendation as to whether the City Council  
[15] had to nominate the replacement city councilman  
[16] or can it be a nomination from the floor --

[17] **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** It says --

[18] **MR. ANDERSON:** -- in the charter?

[19] While he's looking that up, I'll

[20] address something else.

[21] **CITY ATTORNEY POWELL:** -- the Council  
[22] shall appoint a qualified person to fill any  
[23] such vacancy in the office of Councilman for the  
[24] remainder of the unexpired term, provided,  
[25] however, that at least four members of Council

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[1] must vote in favor of the person so appointed.  
[2] **MR. ANDERSON:** I understand that, but  
[3] it doesn't say the Council needs to make the  
[4] nomination. It just says they will appoint,  
[5] which obviously is the case. But so I stand not  
[6] corrected. I think that it should able to be a  
[7] motion from the floor relative to what you just  
[8] read.  
[9] Nonetheless, another issue is Marlene  
[10] brought up the fact about the zoning rewrite.  
[11] Now, we had numerous work sessions. We haven't  
[12] had any work sessions on the zoning rewrite,  
[13] period.  
[14] The one we had was a fiasco. I'm  
[15] sorry, but you invited Dan. And you know, I  
[16] mentioned to some other people that if we had  
[17] Dan here, it was going to be a roast of Dan.  
[18] And that's what it was.  
[19] It was a wasted afternoon. We didn't  
[20] get anything accomplished. Tom got into one or  
[21] two chapters of what he's been working on. I  
[22] applaud him for keeping on with this thing.  
[23] It should not be voted on, it should  
[24] not be published in public hearings so the thing  
[25] is jammed through. If we never get this thing

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[1] through, if we never get it through, we're in  
[2] better shape than if we pass it the way we have  
[3] it.  
[4] We have to think about it. If we have  
[5] to hire some outside people to help us with it,  
[6] that's fine with me. But what we've got at the  
[7] moment for \$110,000 is a city destroying -- the  
[8] function of this city will be destroyed, the way  
[9] we have our housing, the way we have our  
[10] infrastructure. We will be -- well, I'm not  
[11] going to go into what we are. That's my  
[12] opinion and my -- I won't say "professional  
[13] opinion," but I have certainly read this thing.  
[14] And by having work sessions, by doing  
[15] what Tom is doing, by having work sessions where  
[16] we actually communicate to each other and read  
[17] this stuff, we can do this. And if we have to  
[18] have outside, fine. I think we can do it  
[19] internally. But nonetheless, we need to do it,  
[20] not start having votes on it and elections on it  
[21] and pushing it in newspapers. I don't care if  
[22] it never happens. Our book that we've got right  
[23] now is better than the book we spent \$110,000  
[24] for.  
[25] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Thank you.

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[1] **MR. ANDERSON:** I ask you to not --  
[2] I don't think there was a vote, and I'm  
[3] asking was there a vote to have these published  
[4] meetings? Was there a vote? Did you-all vote  
[5] or was it a consensus in the work session? I  
[6] ask Gaye, I guess.  
[7] **MAYOR JENKINS:** We set up meetings.  
[8] **MR. ANDERSON:** Set up meetings. But  
[9] there's a difference between a work session and  
[10] a public hearing which is legally a concept  
[11] wherein if you have two of them, then all of a  
[12] sudden, you got to vote because it's set up that  
[13] way. And that's what's being pushed on.  
[14] **COUNCILWOMAN HADDEN:** First, we have  
[15] had many open work sessions on the new zoning  
[16] ordinance, and they began last year, last  
[17] summer.  
[18] Then when it approached into fall, we  
[19] were asked to please when it came close to  
[20] November, if we would read what had already been  
[21] done, what we'd already worked on, and, by  
[22] January 5th, turn in any suggestions, questions,  
[23] et cetera, we had to Pond & Company.  
[24] Two of us did that and did it on time.  
[25] Mr. Hart did not do his homework. We gave him

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[1] special time, in April, to get any questions,  
[2] input, suggestions, he had in to Pond & Company.  
[3] And when they put the zoning ordinance  
[4] together, with the work sessions that we've  
[5] already had, with input, which we also added the  
[6] Planning Commission onto that, that they could  
[7] also have input and ask questions, we received  
[8] back now a document that is akin and does have  
[9] plagiarism from other cities. And it just needs  
[10] to move forward in that the public will have  
[11] something they can read, they can ask questions  
[12] about. Ms. Hoffmeister graciously gave us some  
[13] good input for it tonight. I trust a lot of her  
[14] judgments on this.  
[15] But we do need to move forward with  
[16] this because it goes hand in hand with the  
[17] comprehensive land use plan that was passed I  
[18] guess in the middle of last year if not the year  
[19] before.  
[20] But it doesn't need to be held up  
[21] anymore. We need to go ahead and introduce it  
[22] to the public. Let the public read it. If they  
[23] want input on it, fine. If they don't, fine.  
[24] But we need to move forward and have the public  
[25] hearings, have the work sessions open to the

[1] public.

[2] You come and give us your input. I

[3] probably have more input as I keep reading it.

[4] So it's not anything that we need to keep just

[5] cooking and cooking and stirring and stirring.

[6] We need to go ahead and hammer it into something

[7] that we can at least plan, and it has to go hand

[8] in hand with the comprehensive land use plan.

[9] **COUNCILMAN HART:** I heard my name, so

[10] I'll respond to it.

[11] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Stuart, time's up.

[12] **COUNCILMAN HART:** I mean Stuart can

[13] stay there for a second because she was doing it

[14] to rebut.

[15] I mean that was -- I don't know where

[16] to start on that rambling, Marlene.

[17] There was only one public meeting,

[18] there was only one meeting at which we discussed

[19] the zoning and where we arranged the zoning book

[20] so we could compare the old one with the new

[21] draft. That lasted about 20 minutes. And after

[22] that, it evolved into a situation where,

[23] Marlene, you were answering your cell phone and

[24] walking in and out of the room. Jason wasn't

[25] here. Bob had to leave because he had to go to

[1] from a personal experience and from a business

[2] experience. I sell real estate. I can get

[3] somebody to buy a house where they shoot guns in

[4] the house next door and sell crack on the street

[5] easier than anybody will buy a house in the city

[6] of Doraville, and I'll tell you that hands down.

[7] It's time to change this town and focus on the

[8] positives and not focus on B.S.

[9] **MR. DEMPSEY:** Well, I left home

[10] confused about what was going on with our Chief.

[11] I'm William Dempsey. I live on Raymond

[12] Drive. And I hate to say it, but I'm going to

[13] leave in a little while no better off than I was

[14] when I came, but I got to tell this Council that

[15] I appreciate you guys because you made this man

[16] Chief of our Police Department. I thank you for

[17] that.

[18] And also I want to tell you this, too:

[19] that what I saw tonight kind of reminded me of a

[20] Chinese fire drill between you people. Nobody

[21] knows nothing about what was going on, and

[22] everybody had a complaint but didn't want to say

[23] about it. And the Legal Department is a Boston

[24] Legal candidate, looks to me like.

[25] But anyway, I'm for this man because

[1] work. And it lasted about two hours in total.

[2] That's the only time we've ever really discussed

[3] the new zoning handbook.

[4] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay, Tom.

[5] Next?

[6] **MR. ABBOTT:** Tom Abbott from

[7] Northwoods.

[8] I would just like to say a couple

[9] things. First of all, on behalf of our Police

[10] Department and the citizens of Doraville, I've

[11] lived here for 16 years, and the only time we

[12] ever get T.V. cameras in this room is when

[13] there's something wrong with this town, and I'm

[14] getting real tired of it.

[15] Tonight we had a great presentation.

[16] We had the principal of Cary Reynolds. That's

[17] the kind of press this town needs, not this kind

[18] of stuff.

[19] I'll compliment Bob Spangler on one

[20] thing: at least he got us all together and he

[21] brought everybody together on a common ground,

[22] as someone said earlier.

[23] But you know what, people? It's time

[24] to look at the positives of this town and stop

[25] focusing on the negative. And I'll tell you

[1] I've seen what happens in our neighborhoods.

[2] I've got two magnolia trees that are 56 years

[3] old. I spend seven days a week in my yard

[4] picking up magnolia leaves, and that man's

[5] black-and-whites, I'll wave at them two or three

[6] times every day.

[7] Thank you, Chief.

[8] **MR. ROACH:** Bob Roach. I live in

[9] Northwoods.

[10] Other people have alluded to it

[11] already. You know, I'm sure there's people up

[12] here I agree with some things and disagree with

[13] other things. You know, I mean I work. We all

[14] agree with, disagree with neighbors, et cetera,

[15] et cetera, but it takes a certain level I think

[16] of maturity to be able to work together. You

[17] know, okay. We fight it out. Maybe I win this

[18] time, maybe you win that time, whatever, but

[19] then we move on to the next thing. This is not

[20] what's happening, obviously.

[21] You know, I read the ethics thing the

[22] other day and the ethics ordinance, and one of

[23] the things it talks about is confidentiality.

[24] And as some other people have said, there is

[25] clearly a need and an appropriate time to have

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[1] executive sessions. But what I find instead is  
[2] that any time something negative comes out, it's  
[3] like by the time the envelope gets opened, it's  
[4] on the internet someplace, and that needs to --  
[5] you know. And it doesn't take a lot of effort  
[6] to figure out who is being attacked and who  
[7] isn't.

[8] You know, right now there's things on  
[9] the internet about pending lawsuits and, you  
[10] know, pretty nasty things are being said about  
[11] people. I'll leave with this question: you  
[12] know, where are these pending lawsuits?

[13] But secondly, I think that we have an  
[14] Ethics Commission and I think the Ethics  
[15] Commission needs to start getting involved. To  
[16] me, bringing out something that could be  
[17] negative against anybody, whether it's the  
[18] Police Chief or a Council member, bringing it  
[19] out in an open meeting like this should be the  
[20] last resort only after all the facts have been  
[21] sorted out; not immediately, not the second  
[22] somebody opens an envelope.

[23] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** Exactly.

[24] **MR. ROACH:** And we've got accustomed to  
[25] stereo. Thank you.

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[1] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Thank you.

[2] Ms. Pittman's got something to say.

[3] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** You know,  
[4] through this whole week, there's been a lot of  
[5] speculation and a lot of rumors, a lot of he  
[6] said/she said. And through all of this, it was  
[7] very unfortunate that our Police Department felt  
[8] the negativity from this.

[9] And I personally want to apologize  
[10] because I think we absolutely -- all you guys  
[11] sitting out there are the best that there is. I  
[12] would match you up to anybody. And I  
[13] apologize --

[14] (Applause)

[15] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** (Inaudible.)

[16] There is absolutely no question in my mind that  
[17] we have the best police department that there is  
[18] anywhere.

[19] And I just want to get that cleared up  
[20] because there was something somehow thrown in  
[21] that people were turning on the Police  
[22] Department. That is not so. There is not, I  
[23] don't think, a person here that would say  
[24] anything different than I do.

[25] **MAYOR JENKINS:** I certainly will

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[1] second, and I can't . . . I can't believe all  
[2] this has come up and all these you might say  
[3] stories have been told. And it really bothers  
[4] me because everybody knows --

[5] Can you will wait till I finish?

[6] **MS. FANG:** (Inaudible)

[7] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Ma'am?

[8] Everybody knows that I have an open-  
[9] door policy. Everybody knows that I will sit  
[10] down and talk to anybody, Bob also. At one  
[11] time, Bob and I used to, on his Wednesday off,  
[12] we'd get together. Okay. We haven't in quite  
[13] some time.

[14] Is that right, Bob?

[15] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** That's correct.

[16] **MAYOR JENKINS:** You could have come to  
[17] me with this at any time.

[18] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** Well, I did come  
[19] to you, Mayor, and I did ask you. You didn't  
[20] offer me an alternative time or place or  
[21] anything. So let's just drop it for right now.

[22] **MAYOR JENKINS:** You mean on this issue.

[23] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** We've dropped it,  
[24] Mayor.

[25] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay.

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[1] **COUNCILMAN SPANGLER:** Move forward.

[2] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay. But anyway, I'll  
[3] talk to anybody here, the Council or anywhere.

[4] And Council will have to agree with me  
[5] that I will talk to anybody at any time, and I  
[6] will not -- zero -- have any secret meetings.

[7] And I agree with the gentlemen that  
[8] said something about the executive sessions. A  
[9] lot of this stuff should go into executive  
[10] session and not sit here and the public have to  
[11] listen to all this stuff.

[12] And I've always been disappointed with  
[13] the e-mails and the Dora-Blog. I think that's  
[14] the worst thing that ever happened to anybody.

[15] Thank you.

[16] Yes, ma'am, come on up.

[17] **MS. RAWLINS:** Thank you, Mayor,  
[18] Council, the audience, the Police Department.

[19] Since the news is here, I want to do  
[20] something positive.

[21] Linda Rawlins. I live in Oakcliff  
[22] Estates.

[23] Since the news is here, I want to do  
[24] something positive. We had a Doraville Citizens  
[25] Police Academy. It was excellent. And if you

[1] were in it, which I'm speaking for the other  
[2] people that were, you could see what Chief King  
[3] has created and what we have. You also if you  
[4] went on a police ride, you saw what they go  
[5] through just simply trying to get home at night.  
[6] We all very much enjoyed it.

[7] And I got a kick out of Chief King one  
[8] night. He says, "People don't call and complain  
[9] or ask questions about crime and how many people  
[10] are getting killed in Doraville or robberies.  
[11] They're talking about ordinance."

[12] I said, "Well, from my standpoint, I  
[13] know I'm one of the ones that has done that."

[14] But we feel comfortable that they can  
[15] handle and are handling those issues, but we did  
[16] want some changes made in the quality-of-life  
[17] side.

[18] But I just can't -- we told them we  
[19] were coming back the next Tuesday after our  
[20] graduation because we enjoyed it so much. And  
[21] we were given these plaques (indicating),  
[22] everybody that participated and graduated.

[23] But I think they're going to have more,  
[24] and I think it was an excellent idea. And like  
[25] I said, if you were within, you saw what is

[1] Dragon Boat because it did not benefit all the  
[2] officers.

[3] They love the officers.  
[4] I never said that.

[5] **MS. FANG:** You did not say that.

[6] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** Yes, I did.

[7] **MS. FANG:** You told me, say, "You won't  
[8] -- you won't believe, I got so many heat."

[9] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** That is correct;  
[10] I did.

[11] **MS. FANG:** That's the reason I say, "In  
[12] that case, Police Department needs to correct  
[13] their problem to please the citizen."

[14] But now you tell me in front of  
[15] everybody, say, you are the one broke Police  
[16] Department.

[17] It hurt my feeling because you lie in  
[18] front of me.

[19] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** Absolutely not.

[20] **MS. FANG:** That's what you said.

[21] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** No, ma'am, I did  
[22] not say that to you.

[23] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay, Donna.

[24] I'm going to bring it up to the table  
[25] if the Council don't have anything to say. I'm

[1] within, and I appreciate every one of them.

[2] **MAYOR JENKINS:** If there's nobody else,  
[3] I'd like to bring it up to the table before I --

[4] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** Charlene.

[5] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** Charlene.

[6] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Go ahead, Charlene.

[7] Come on up.

[8] **MS. FANG:** My name is Charlene Fang.  
[9] I'm the citizen of the Doraville. I just trying  
[10] to respond Donna, the Councilmen, Councilwomens.

[11] Few weeks ago, before we go to the  
[12] Dragon Boat race, I asked -- I'm standing here.  
[13] I ask for fund grant from the Doraville.

[14] You told me after that meeting -- of  
[15] course you denied it -- you told me face to  
[16] face. You said, "Charlene, you won't believe  
[17] how many heat I receive. My people don't like  
[18] Police Department."

[19] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** That's not what  
[20] I said.

[21] **MS. FANG:** Please tell --

[22] Yes, you say that.

[23] **COUNCILWOMAN PITTMAN:** No, ma'am.

[24] What I said to you was I got a lot of  
[25] heat from the citizens about us funding the

[1] going to ask John King if he wants to get up and  
[2] say something or not. I'm not going to . . .

[3] **CHIEF KING:** You know, Mayor, I'm not  
[4] going to turn down a chance to come and . . .

[5] It is a long way from beautiful  
[6] Quantico, Virginia, to beautiful Doraville.

[7] I'm really, really touched by the fact  
[8] that there's so many of our neighbors and  
[9] friends who are here. We could probably do  
[10] without the media, but that's a whole different  
[11] story.

[12] The reason I'm here is because of the  
[13] concerns that I had. I did get wind via the  
[14] City Attorney of the topic of the discussion of  
[15] supposedly the meeting.

[16] And I want you to understand that I  
[17] love this community. I've had many, many  
[18] opportunities to go other places. I love this  
[19] community, and this community -- I am committed  
[20] to this community. This is my dream: to be the  
[21] chief of the greatest community in Georgia. And  
[22] the reason that I'm very proud to be the Chief  
[23] of Police here is because of the people in the  
[24] audience. These fantastic employees that make  
[25] my life, you know, this is who makes our city

[1] special.

[2] I know that there will always be

[3] issues, but I have not confronted a single issue

[4] yet in my career here at Doraville, also with

[5] the Atlanta Police Department, that I have not

[6] been able to overcome with conversation.

[7] I was disturbed. I will be very honest

[8] and blunt with you. I was bothered by the fact

[9] that three members of the City Council were

[10] potentially discussing my termination without

[11] the opportunity to discuss this. And I know

[12] that the -- that there's a vehicle for

[13] discussing personnel issues, and that being the

[14] . . . the executive sessions.

[15] But I came to Doraville without nothing

[16] to hide, and I will leave Doraville whenever the

[17] community doesn't want me here.

[18] I have nothing to hide. I will tell

[19] you right off the bat, I do not have a hundred

[20] percent record. I have made mistakes. I make

[21] mistakes every day. But at least I'm honest to

[22] confront, and there are several people in this

[23] audience -- yes, Corinne -- who have told me

[24] some of the things that I've done wrong, and I

[25] take -- I take heed by those criticisms.

[1] **MAYOR JENKINS:** We'll have some bylaws;

[2] is that correct?

[3] **MR. ANDERSON:** You'll have bylaws in

[4] July. Somehow or other, they kept getting lost

[5] over the last year.

[6] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay.

[7] **MR. ANDERSON:** So that's been gone over

[8] and over and over, but we'll come up with

[9] something for you.

[10] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Okay.

[11] Would you ever answer the question? I

[12] think Oakcliff needs representation, and that's

[13] why I asked the question as to whether the --

[14] **MAYOR JENKINS:** This was a committee

[15] report.

[16] **MR. ANDERSON:** I know. I apologize.

[17] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Thank you, sir.

[18] **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** Yea, Mayor.

[19] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Anybody have anything

[20] at the table?

[21] Meeting adjourned.

[22] (Whereupon, the meeting was adjourned

[23] at approximately 8:45 p.m. the same day.)

[1] I love this community, and that's why I

[2] drove from Quantico, Virginia, to come and show

[3] up for this meeting: because I wanted to hear

[4] what issues I have either dropped the ball or

[5] failed, and either I could address them or you

[6] could, you know, make your decision.

[7] But I was bothered by the fact that the

[8] way that I found out and I did not get an

[9] opportunity to respond.

[10] But I have nothing to hide. I am an

[11] open book to this community.

[12] **MAYOR JENKINS:** Thank you.

[13] Do we have any committee reports?

[14] **MR. ANDERSON:** You asked me to give it

[15] in the work session. I guess you'd asked me to

[16] give it in the work session.

[17] I'm Stuart Anderson.

[18] The Planning Commission worked on two

[19] issues, the variance and zoning rewrite forums,

[20] and a series of thoughts for ourselves as

[21] ethical activities and guidelines for ourselves.

[22] We worked on both of those, and we will vote on

[23] those on June 11th. I presume we'll pass them.

[24] And we will vote on our officers on June 11th as

[25] well. That's what we did in our last meeting.
