Minutes of the public meeting of the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Dunellen held on April 17, 2023.

Mayor Jason F. Cilento called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. and he led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Municipal Clerk William Robins read the Sunshine Statement and called the Roll.

On the motion of Mr. Sigmon and seconded by Mrs. Rios it was moved to accept the Minutes of the Meeting of April 3, 2023.

Autism Awareness & Acceptance Month Proclamation

WHEREAS, Autism spectrum disorder (ASD) is a developmental disability that can cause significant social, communication and behavioral challenges. Autism is the fastest growing developmental disorder. There is often nothing about how people with ASD look that sets them apart from other people. People with ASD may communicate, interact, behave, and learn in ways that are different from neurotypical people. The learning, thinking, and problem-solving abilities of people with ASD can range from gifted to severely challenged. Some people with ASD need a lot of help in their daily lives; others need less; and

WHEREAS, a diagnosis of ASD now includes several conditions that used to be diagnosed separately: autistic disorder, pervasive developmental disorder not otherwise specified (PDD-NOS), and Asperger syndrome. These conditions are now all called autism spectrum disorder or ASD; and

WHEREAS, about 1 in 68 children has been identified with autism spectrum disorder (ASD) according to estimates and ASD is about 4.5 times more common among boys (1 in 42) than among girls (1 in 189). ASD prevalence has increased by 6-26 percent each year from 2002 to 2020. More than 3.5 million Americans live with an autism spectrum disorder; and

WHEREAS, people with ASD often have problems with social, emotional, and communication skills. They might repeat certain behaviors and might not want change in their daily activities. Many people with ASD also have different ways of learning, paying attention, or reacting to things. Signs of ASD begin during early childhood and typically last throughout a person's life; and

Whereas, ASD can sometimes be detected at 18 months or younger. By age 2, a diagnosis by an experienced professional can be considered very reliable. However, many children do not receive a final diagnosis until they are much older. This delay means that children with ASD might not get the early help they need; and

WHEREAS, research shows that early intervention treatment services can improve a child's development. Early intervention services help children from birth to 3 years old learn important skills. Services can include therapies to help the child talk, walk, interact with others, communicate, and control behaviors, including physical aggression and self-injury behavior.

WHEREAS, during the month of April, we strive to promote autism awareness, inclusion, and self-determination for all, and assure that each person with ASD is provided an opportunity to achieve the highest possible quality of life.

NOW THEREFORE, I, Jason F. Cilento, Mayor of the Borough of Dunellen, New Jersey, do here-by proclaim the month of April to be designated as **Autism Awareness & Acceptance Month** and urge our community to help others in creating awareness and acceptance for this disorder.

Ordinance 2023-11

The following ordinance was Introduced for first reading on April 3, 2023, and a second reading and public hearing is being held at 7:00 p.m. in the Dunellen Borough Municipal Building, 355 North Avenue, Dunellen, New Jersey on the 17th day of April, 2023, and copies of this Ordinance have been posted on the public bulletin board prior to the date for second reading and final passage and copies of this Ordinance have been available at the Office of the Borough Clerk for any interested members of the public.

**CALENDAR YEAR 2023
MODEL ORDINANCE TO EXCEED THE MUNICIPAL BUDGET APPROPRIATION
LIMITS AND TO ESTABLISH A CAP BANK
(N.J.S.A. 40A: 4-45.14)**

WHEREAS, the Local Government Cap Law, N.J.S. 40A: 4-45.1 et seq., provides that in the preparation of its annual budget, a municipality shall limit any increase in said budget up to 2.5% unless authorized by ordinance to increase it to 3.5% over the previous year's final appropriations, subject to certain exceptions; and,

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 40A: 4-45.15a provides that a municipality may, when authorized by ordinance, appropriate the difference between the amount of its actual final appropriation and the 3.5% percentage rate as an exception to its final appropriations in either of the next two succeeding years; and,

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Borough Council of the Borough of Dunellen, in the County of Middlesex finds it advisable and necessary to increase its CY 2023 budget by up to 3.5% over the previous year's final appropriations, in the interest of promoting the health, safety and welfare of the citizens; and,

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Borough Council hereby determines that a 2.5% increase in the budget for said year, amounting to \$158,237.98 in excess of the increase in final appropriations otherwise permitted by the Local Government Cap Law, is advisable and necessary; and,

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Borough Council hereby determines that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED, by the Mayor and Borough Council of the Borough of Dunellen, in the County of Middlesex, a majority of the full authorized membership of this governing body affirmatively concurring, that, in the CY 2023 budget year, the final appropriations of the Borough of Dunellen shall, in accordance with this ordinance and N.J.S.A. 40A: 4-45.14, be increased by 3.5%, amounting to \$221,533.17 and that the CY 2023 municipal budget for the Borough of Dunellen, be approved and adopted in accordance with this ordinance; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that any that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that a certified copy of this ordinance as introduced be filed with the Director of the Division of Local Government Services within 5 days of introduction; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that a certified copy of this ordinance upon adoption, with the recorded vote included thereon, be filed with said Director within 5 days after such adoption.

Dr. Robins provided a brief explanation of the CAP Bank ordinance. For a fuller elucidation, Local Finance Notice 2022-18 is recommended, from which the following section is excerpted. LFN 2022-18 can be found here:

Cost of Living Cap Adjustment: An annual Cost-of-Living Adjustment is authorized under the original 1977 budget cap law, currently reflected as N.J.S.A. 40A: 4-45.1a. Current law affecting municipal and county budgets requires compliance with both the 1977 cap law and the 2010 levy cap law. Under the 1977 cap law, the Director of the Division of Local Government Services must promulgate the Cost-of-Living Adjustment (COLA, formerly called Index Rate). The COLA is based on the Implicit Price Deflator for State and Local Governments, calculated by the U.S. Department of Commerce, Bureau of Economic Analysis. The COLA for CY 2023 budgets is two and one-half percent (2.5%). Pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:4-45.2, “municipalities and counties shall be prohibited from increasing their final appropriations by more than 2.5%...” unless action is taken by the governing body to increase their final appropriations subject to the cap to the statutorily permitted three and a half percent (3.5%). In the case of counties, the increase applies to the property tax levy, not final appropriations. In other words, the automatic increase to the 1977 cap law base is 2.5%, which is the statutory maximum. The governing body may pass a COLA ordinance, increasing the cap base by 3.5%. A municipality may by ordinance, or a county by resolution, increase the COLA percentage up to

3.5% [N.J.S.A. 40A:4-45.14(b)] or bank (for up to two years) the difference between its final appropriation subject to the cap and 3.5%. Cap banking is not automatic. A single ordinance or resolution can be used to accomplish both activities: increasing appropriations and banking any unappropriated balance. Cap bank balances from 2021 and 2022 are available for use in 2023.

No one from the public spoke.

Dr. Dunne asked if it was a necessary ordinance for our Budget? Dr. Robins replied that it is intertwined with our Budget. It is not required, but having a CAP Bank ordinance is desirable.

Dr. Dunne: 1) Recreation--Spring Tennis opened up on Saturday April 15th with the maximum number of players (40 children registered). Open Soccer starts tomorrow. We have 90 children signed up for this new spring program. Opening Day Baseball & Softball is Saturday April 22nd starting at 10 am from Washington Memorial Park to McCoy Park. Senior Movie Monday: will continue at the Dunellen Theater on the first Monday of the month, May 1st, June 5th, July 3rd, and August 7th. Movie starts at 10 am and the cost is \$5.00 for the movie, pizza, soda, popcorn; 2) Jogging Club--Jogging Club is growing! We plan to participate in a number of events this spring. Catch us at Spring into Wellness and other activities around town. We will continue to do a walk/jog around Washington Park and will continue to up our time and/or distance weekly. We encourage anyone interested to join. Registration is required, but the program is free!; 3) Municipal Alliance – is applying for the 2024 Alliance grant, a mental health grant; 4) Shade Tree Commission – the Commission members will be celebrating Arbor Day in Faber on April 28th with the first-grade class. This annual event is always popular with the students. As always, if you are interested in having a tree planted, please contact the DSTC. The next meeting will be on April 19th at 7 pm in the Senior Center; 5) the Parking Authority will hold its next meeting on May 10th at 7 pm at the Parking Authority.

Mr. Sigmon: 1) DPW crew has been cleaning the downtown daily and all our Borough Properties & Parks.

- Weeded the downtown.
- Continued preparation and maintenance for all the ball fields for spring sports.
- Assisted PSE&G on removal of 4 dead trees in the powerlines.
- Grass maintenance at the parks.
- Street sweeping as scheduled.
- Rebuilt 2 more catch basins.

The Dunellen Borough Police Department will be partnering with the Dunellen Public Library to participate in the 24th National Take Back Initiative on Saturday, April 22, from 10am – 2pm at The Dunellen Library. They will be there collecting the anonymous disposal of all medications; 2) PARSA--will be videoing the Sewer Main on Washington Avenue between First Street and North Avenue on May 1st. This section of Washington Avenue will be part of the 2023 NJ American Water main replacement.

Mayor Cilento:

This year's Mural project had some timing difficulties but we hope to revisit it next year with Rutgers as they are still open to discussions.

PSE&G Street Paving Project: PSE&G completed their paving phase from their 2022 gas main replacement project. This pavement project paved approximately $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile of roadway which is estimated to cost around \$260,000.00 and it was at no cost to the Borough of Dunellen. These roads included: 800 block of First Street; 700 & 800 block of Dunellen Avenue; 200 block of Orange Street and Front Street from Madison Avenue to Middlesex border. PSE&G anticipates coming back to Dunellen on 4/18/2023 to complete their striping phase of the project.

Piscataway Mill & Pave Shared Service Project: in coordination with Piscataway Township, we are working to pave Center Street. It is anticipated that Piscataway Township will place the project out to bid before the end of April.

Mobile Office Hours with Assemblywoman Michele Matsikoudis and Mayor Jason Cilento: join us on Saturday, April 29 between 10 am – 12 pm at Jackie's Sweets located at 330 North Avenue for our joint Mobile Office event. Mayor's Alliance for a Clean Green Brook Waterway: the annual Stream Clean Up event is scheduled for Sunday, May 7 at 10 am. Volunteers should meet at McCoy Park in Dunellen. Walks and Talks with the Mayor: the next Walks and Talks with the Mayor will be on Saturday, May 13th at 9:30 am at Columbia Park.

Planning for the Future: In 2022, the Borough engaged its planning consultant DMR Architects to prepare two plans: a Master Plan Reexamination and a Climate Resiliency Plan. DMR has moved diligently through the planning process and engaged the public by requesting feedback through surveys and hosting a community meeting. The two plans were also discussed during a Mayoral Town Hall presentation in December 2022. Why do we need these plans? New Jersey requires a periodic reexamination of a master plan every ten years and Dunellen's previous master plan was prepared in 2011 and adopted in 2012. The master plan reexamination revisits issues and objectives stated in the Borough's 2011 Master Plan, examines how conditions have changed since the plan was written, modifies the objectives stated in that plan, and identifies actions the Borough can take to advance those objectives over the coming years. As for the Climate Resiliency Plan, New Jersey recently amended the Municipal Land Use Law to require municipalities to include a climate-change related hazard vulnerability assessment into any new Master Plan land use element being adopted. Dunellen's Climate Resiliency Plan will be one of the first such documents adopted in the state and will outline current and future climate related risks to the Borough and list recommended actions the Borough can take to reduce its exposure to natural hazards. These two planning reports will be presented to the Mayor and Council at the Council meeting on May 1 at 7 pm and will be considered for adoption by the Planning Board at the Planning Board meeting on May 22 at 7 pm. FY 2023 Local Recreation Improvement Grant (LRIG): I was recently informed that the Borough of Dunellen has been awarded \$80,000.00 from State of New Jersey for their FY 2023 Local Recreation Improvement Grant. The Local Recreation Improvement Grant is a competitive grant that supports improvement and repair of public recreation facilities including local parks, municipal recreation centers, and local stadiums. The Borough of Dunellen submitted to construct three pickle ball courts at Gavornik Park. We will be working with RVE Engineers on this project and will report out the timeline for installation as we develop our capital improvement plan this year. It's exciting to note that since 2020, Dunellen has received over \$3M in grants to help with park, infrastructure, and beautification projects.
