## Resource for Holiday Observance

2021-2022 School Year

This guide was prepared by the Town of Easton’s Human Rights Committee as a resource for teachers, coaches, and all school personnel to promote cultural proficiency. The purpose of the guide is to explain what “observing” the following holidays means in terms of a student’s ability to be present in school, complete work, or participate in any after-school activities, as well as dietary and other considerations.

**Please note that this guide describes only major holidays that fall during the school year, excluding winter and summer breaks.** We acknowledge that students may be absent for other religious or cultural observances beyond what is on this list, and we ask that school personnel treat such absences with understanding and accommodation.

- † Will be allowed one (1) extra day after return to school to complete work

- \* Holy days usually begin at sundown the day before this date
- \*\* Local or regional customs may use a variation of this date

	November 29-December 6*	Hanukkah ☆ • Festival of lights • Celebrated for 8 nights; sundown candle-lighting and gift giving	--	--	--

	January 21	Lunar/Chinese New Year 🌸 • Pan-Asian celebration • Family reunions, festive meals, and gift-giving	✓	✓	--
	March 2	Ash Wednesday † • First day of Lent, a 40-day period of sacrifice • Forehead may be marked with cross of ashes; refrain from meat	--	--	✓
	March 2-April 14	Lent † • A 40-day time of intense devotion • Observed by fasting, worship, and acts of charity	--	--	✓
	March 19**	Holi ॐ • Celebration of spring and color	✓	✓	--
	March 21	Nouruz ☪ • Two-week celebration of the New Year (rebirth of Earth & first day of spring) • Celebrated by eating and visiting family & friends	✓	✓	--
	March 30	Magha Puja Day 🌸 • A festival in honor of the Buddhist community and a chance for reaffirmation • Celebrated with gifts, gathering, and sermons	--	✓	--
	April 3-May 2**	Ramadan ☪ • 30 days of daylight fasting with special attention to understanding one’s inner self • Ritual evening meal to break fast	✓	--	✓



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April 10	Palm Sunday †	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Celebration for honoring Jesus's entry into Jerusalem</li> <li>• Signifies the beginning of Holy Week</li> <li>• Observed by a special service, including the distribution of palm leaves</li> </ul>	--	--	--
April 14	Mahavir Jayanti 🖐️	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Celebrates the birth of Jain sage Mahavira</li> <li>• Observed with fasting and prayers; refrain from work</li> </ul>	✓	✓	✓
April 15	Good Friday †	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Commemorates crucifixion of Jesus</li> <li>• Observed solemnly with fasting and refrain from work</li> </ul>	✓	✓	✓
April 15-23	Pasech †	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Commemorates the resurrection of Jesus</li> <li>• Celebrated by a series of services and events</li> </ul>	--	--	--
April 16-23*	Passover ☆	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Celebration of exodus from Egypt</li> <li>• Observed by lengthy festive ritual family meals; only consume unleavened grains</li> </ul>	✓	✓	✓
April 17	Easter Sunday †	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Most important holy day for Christians</li> <li>• Commemorates the resurrection of Jesus</li> <li>• Observed by a special church service, gatherings, and other activities</li> </ul>	--	--	--
April 22	Orthodox Good/Holy Friday †	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Commemorates crucifixion of Jesus</li> <li>• Observed solemnly with fasting and refrain from work</li> </ul>	✓	✓	✓
April 27**	Buddha Day 🌀	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Commemorates life cycle of Buddha</li> <li>• Temple observance and refrain from meat</li> </ul>	✓	--	✓
May 3*	Eid-al-Fitr C•	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• A three-day Muslim holiday signifying the end of the holy month of Ramadan</li> <li>• Celebrated by congregational prayers and visiting family and friends</li> </ul>	✓	--	✓
