





YOUR POLICE CALLS ARE BEING RECORDED — Del Hedding (left), juvenile officer of the Fort Atkinson police department, and Police Chief William Ciske were pictured looking over the department's new "logging tape recorder system." This apparatus has been installed to record all incoming and outgoing telephone calls and radio transmissions at the police station. Records of these calls are kept on tape for at least a month to provide proof of calls made and can be played back to clarify emergency calls. The total cost of this recorder was \$6,000, with the federal government paying 75 per cent through its Omnibus Crime Bill. Hereafter, those calling the police department any time of the day or night should remember they are on "candid telephone."—Daily Union Staff Photo. 8–23–73


