And the -- and the property density right 6 now, it wouldn't justify a sewer because they're five-acre 7 parcels. 8 So according to the -- the people who say you can get your 9 money back out of -- out of investment, it needs to be 10 2 1/2 acres or smaller to have sewer pay for itself in -- in the 11 long run. 12 So at five-acre parcels, it's cheaper to have them just go 13 on their own septic. 14 Then the --15 If you guys wanted to take some money out of Number 3, 16 that's the -- you guys approved the lift station to be installed 17 on this -- on this project out here out of the current money we 18 had. 19 Do you guys remember? 20 COMMISSIONER ANCHO: Uh-huh. 21 BERT RAMOS: I'm trying to think of the right wording here 22 t.o --23 I came in front you guys and asked for a change order 24 for -- for a lift station. 25 CHAIRMAN WAITS: And that will take care of the whole lift 26 station? 27 BERT RAMOS: And -- and it'll take care of the whole lift 28 station side of that, but the forced main will still be there. 29 So it's -- it's going to knock -- you know, if you guys wanted 30 to make that \$2 million, we'd -- we'd -- that'd be enough for 31 that project. 32 I don't have an exact number for that. I was hoping to 33 have that for you, but I don't. 34 CHAIRMAN WAITS: Okay. Approximately \$2 million on Number 35 3, new lift station, is okay. So the 8-inch forced main, 36 approximately \$2 million to complete that. 37 BERT RAMOS: Yes. 38 CHAIRMAN WAITS: Is that right? 39 Okay.

And Number 4? The rehab on the lift station?

If we're going to go through and have the Sheep Creek sewer main, which is -- which is back here by the golf course, come and dump into this lift station that's out front here and that's to take a bunch of people off septics and to open up the -- this side for -- for more growth, then -- then we need to do the -- the rehab on this lift station out front here.

CHAIRMAN WAITS: So is that something you want to try and tackle next year? Or $\ensuremath{^{--}}$

BERT RAMOS: That's something I would like to tackle this year. You know, kind of -- I -- I honestly would -- almost wanted to put that into the same project as the Sheep Creek, the 12-inch sewer main down Sheep Creek. It -- it's almost one project because you have to have one with the other.

COMMISSIONER ALLAN: So my question is, when you put -- when you install of all of this, you can't force these people to install, can you?

I mean, some -- directly you can, can't you? But -- BERT RAMOS: So -- so is how it works is the same with the water, like with wells. If somebody has a current existing well and we run water by them, they can operate their well and replace any wear parts. They can replace the pumps. They can -- but the minute that the well fails, they have no -- they can never redrill a well or replace it. They have to go to the city water if it's within 400 feet of their property.

So the same thing applies to -- to the sewer. Anybody who has a septic, the minute that the septic fails, they have to hook up. It's not optional.

So it's --

COMMISSIONER CLARK: Bert.

BERT RAMOS: And is what this helps is our -- is our planning and zoning. When people come before them and say, Hey, I'd love to put this house in, but your guys' septic density is way over the top here, they have a hard time approving them for it.

And is what's happened in -- in other municipalities, they approve all these and then their septics get oversaturated and they have their monitoring wells start failing, and then it is the responsibility of the county to -- or the city to hook them

Bryan seconded that. 17 Any other discussion from the board? 18 COMMISSIONER SPARKS: Lura's got --19 CHAIRMAN WAITS: Public comment? 20 LURA DUVALL: This might be a good time to bring this up in 21 conjunction to this. 22 Lura Duvall, assessor, for the record. 23 This infrastructure is so critical to the financial 24 well-being of the county. And here's partly the reason why. 25 Ever since they introduced the abasement cap in 2005, the 26 maximum cap on nonowned occupied properties is 8 percent. 27 That abatement cap is based on new construction and growth 28 in the counties. 29 We're probably the only county that sustained that 8 30 percent cap all these years until this year. We just dropped 31 down to 7.4. 32 And that's because we're not -- we don't have the 33 development. We don't have the growth. We don't have the new 34 construction. 35 What that means in tax dollars is for all these 36 properties -- businesses, vacant land -- that are not owner 37 occupied, the maximum their tax bill could go up in one year is 38 8 percent. 39 Well, now the maximum it can go up is only 7.4. 40 dropped it down. That's the first time ever in 15 years that

that's happened to us.

So this is very critical because in order to get us back up to that 8 percent cap, barring anything strange happening in legislature, which there's some interesting things out there, this is critical. We need new homes. We need the new construction. We need the growth in order to get our numbers back up, our new construction numbers. Because the mines haven't been doing as much. For most of these years, that's what's kept us at that 8 percent cap is the mines.

But now we've got to look at diversifying a little bit. And we've got to look at our -- our growth and our -- can't have growth without infrastructure. This is so critical --

COMMISSIONER CLARK: The other thing --

LURA DUVALL: -- to our future. Because those numbers, when they start dropping, there's counties that go -- it can go all the way down to a 3 percent cap.

COMMISSIONER CLARK: The other thing I -- LURA DUVALL: And that's dangerous.

COMMISSIONER CLARK: Go ahead.

LURA DUVALL: So that affects our tax revenue.

COMMISSIONER CLARK: Right. Well, the other thing I want to say -- and it's something that Doug Mills brought up and I really -- I really agree with it. And I don't mean, like, 17 motorcycle bikes, but like bikes, really nice bike trails that 18 they have made out there that you have the actual water. 19 then you have all these phenomenal bike trails that have been 20 made over the last, I don't know how -- well, several years. 21 And the water -- the water fowl and stuff out there is 22 actually kind of cool. And, you know, there's a lot of 23 apparently it must have been a dump or something before because 24 of all the garbage and the stuff that needed to be cleaned up 25 around there. 26 But it was actually kind of cool for people who like to 27 cycle. So even if this doesn't go through, it's still a really 28 neat place out there to -- for people who -- in town who cycle 29 because it's kind of cool out there. 30 CHAIRMAN WAITS: Industrial park. And when that came 31 before us, we said we'll look into that and see what it's all 32 going to be. So that was 15 million that we're adding on here 33 to look into.

And the AARF for airports, 350,000. And that was your estimate? Keith?

Due to the fact that we have the air tankers out there, I got a call, actually last week, from Stead Air Base. They want to use our field for the -- the C-130 touch-and-goes. And they wanted to know specifically what type of crash rescue -- crash rescue we had, which what we have out there -- and no offense, Ron -- but it doesn't meet the criteria for crash fire rescue --

CHAIRMAN WAITS: Got it.

KEITH WESTENGARD: -- equipment.

CHAIRMAN WAITS: Okay. I'd also like to look at one of them that I think we'd at least consider for future, and that's the pedestrian bridge that we talked about for some time. And it's still on NDOT's radar -- radar and still the RTC. And that was the one crossing Highway 80 for emergencies.

It would be -- I know what we need to put into it. We had 3 million that was set aside a few years ago to put towards it. And that 3 million was taken out and used for the pool.

So I would like to see some of that come back into it, as we look on it to the future. And I'd like to see a little bit more with it.

COMMISSIONER SPARKS: Well, so, yeah, what's the pedestrian bridge?

KEITH WESTENGARD: That's -- that would be the bridge that goes over the freeway. And at one point, it was talked about that it would be an access, an emergency access, if for some reason the fire department or emergency vehicles couldn't cross the bridge to get to this side -- to the south side, that they would have access over a foot bridge.

It was talked about. It would be built wide enough with -- to accommodate a side-by-side or Gator or something along those lines to get across the freeway.

COMMISSIONER ALLAN: And I think primarily, though -- I mean, that was -- that was secondary to -- to the -- the original purpose of it was for the school kids, to keep them off the overpass on 305.

CHAIRMAN WAITS: We -- we felt that was still extremely dangerous. And that's their only way over. Also, we have the hazardous materials that are numerous per day that go over our current bridge. And anything could happen.

And the other thing was just the convenience -- convenience of senior center, the seniors, who live on the other side who

So one of the things that I wanted to kind of give you a heads-up as an overall as far as all the offices, everything is being replaced by ADS. And so whether you've been here for a year or you've been here for 20, 25 years, everybody's learning new systems.

And so when it comes down to the training or having those employees, whether they've been here for that amount of time or not, it's crucial that you have enough staffing to be able to train for that.

So to not address anything that Art had those concerns, I have the history. So then that way, you would know what the clerk's office has had as staff and then where it has gone. Because there's even more than just the -- the court's portion. So was I just going to read that into the record if you would like to today.
