CHAIRMAN WAITS: Okay. We are ready to begin. And we call to order the Lander County Commissioners' meeting, Town of —Board of Battle Mountain and Austin, Board of County Highway Commissioners for September 19, 2019.

And welcome, everyone.

And please remember to mute your cell phones for us.

There is general information on the agenda about how our schedule works and where your public comment can be made on the different items if you so choose.

And be- -- before we begin the Pledge of Allegiance this morning, it -- it's probably in the history as we give a -- our salute to the flag. It may be one of the last times that we'll be saluting the 50 because Congress is voting on our 51st state today. So we'll see if Washington, D.C., will become a state and we'll change to 51 stars.

So if you'll all rise and give our salute to this 50 stars and join us in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Lander County Commissioners may break for lunch from 12:00 o'clock to 1:15. Any item -- any agenda item may be taken out of order, may be combined for consideration by the public body, and items may be pulled or removed from the agenda at any time.

# COMMISSIONER REPORTS

CHAIRMAN WAITS: We'll begin with our commissioners' reports.

And we'll start with you, Art. Do you have anything to report on for us?

COMMISSIONER CLARK: We met with Senator Masto Cortez informally. We talked about a few things.

One thing that stood out was -- for me -- was that the senator did not understand or even know about the PROMISE plan, which led to the Marjory Stoneman Douglas school shooting on February 14th last year. So I gave her a copy.

Since that time, a couple weeks ago, Andrew Pollack wrote a book about his daughter, Why Meadow Died. And it lists all the things in the book of what led up to what the school did and what the sheriff's office did that led up to the shooting and the killing of 17 different people. And I would suggest you get a copy of this book and read it because it's pretty darn scary.

CHAIRMAN WAITS: Thank you.

Kathy?

COMMISSIONER ANCHO: Just a hospital board meeting. I'm not -- make sure to report on that. All -- everything else is out break for the summer. And we'll be restarting this next month.

CHAIRMAN WAITS: Okay. Bryan?

Thank you.

I did have a few I'll just share quickly.

Yes, the meeting with Senator Cortez Masto is always

appreciated. She seems to do that Highway 80 for us and -- and take us in and remember us. And we sincerely appreciate that.

We also discussed the public lands and how our bill was coming with that. She had been contacted already by -- by our folks that are handling that.

On August 28th I did have an NNRDA meeting. And this is our regional development. They have signed a two-year contract with GOED, the Governor's Office on Economic Development. And we're working on the new contract that will be including Humboldt to join us.

On August 29th we had the Kingston Town Board meeting. And actually the CEO from the hospital, Jason Bleak, attended and gave them a heads up on where they are as far as the clinic. And they're still discussing that with hospital on the Kingston clinic and what's going to happen.

But he's really pretty sure everybody's going to go with the closure if they don't find somebody else to take that over. And they've been at least contacting the Nevada Rural Health Centers to see if they might be interested.

On August 30th I did have a NACo meeting. Of course we're getting ready for conference. But there's a couple things. We had — we had a speaker from the Forest Service. And she really gave us quite a bit of information on — on their — their new — their new ideas of — of how they're going to work with our ranchers, our grazing. They're looking at all year-round grazing, actually. There's several things that they are considering that seem a lot more user friendly to — to the ranchers and to our citizens. So it was — that was good.

And, of course, the conference is coming up next Wednesday and Thursday in Sparks. And so there's a lot on that. We do have one of our national deputy legislators that will be out -- that handles legislation -- that will be out to speak with us.

And also along that -- and I think most of you have probably got the information as far as our commissioners -- but on September 12th the Trump administration released a final rule to repeal the Waters of the US. So that was the one that was in 2015 under Obama. And that has been officially repealed. We've been hearing about that for a long time.

So the definition and reinstatement goes back to 1986, how it was before. I think they'll be addressing that again. But

at least we don't have that terribly strong and -- definition that we had that was so difficult for all of the counties.

On September 4th I did attend a LEDA meeting. Actually, they're going forward with a lot of different things, main street program and such. And I had excellent response from the — the outside of our new bike trail. They had been selling benches and trees. And we had an excellent response that the citizens have turned out to — to handle that. And it should be really beautiful.

On September 9th we had an Austin Airport Advisory Board meeting. Actually, there were six different folks that we had out of the naval air station in Fallon. And that's also on -- on the agenda today. So I won't be going into that.

And on September 16th the Cooperative Extension search committee met and did final interviews for our new educator for Lander County. And we had two of them that came in that were our top two choices. And they will be making a decision on that, not just the search committee, but, of course, they interview with all the folks in Reno and such too.

So hopefully that decision will be done soon and we will have an educator before the end of the year. We're looking forward to that.

# STAFF REPORTS

CHAIRMAN WAITS: Moving on. We'll go into staff reports on meetings, conferences, and seminars attended.

Keith?

KEITH WESTENGARD: The -- the only thing I have today is with a -- a lot of work from Ms. Madonna Long. We've completed our Amercas -- Americans with Disabilities Act transition plan.

There's a copy here. It's been submitted into the NDOT. And so we're moving forward. And we will have an ADA plan in place in Lander County shortly.

JUDGE DENISE FORTUNE: Looking at me.

CHAIRMAN WAITS: Judge, good morning.

JUDGE DENISE FORTUNE: Good morning.

Denise Fortune, for the record. Argenta Justice Court justice of the peace.

I'm here this morning just to give you guys kind of a heads up. I was hoping to get on the next agenda, but I'm not going to have my ducks in a row by then because it's a lot of information to get.

So kind of in a nutshell, it's kind of all tied in together. But what I'm going to be asking for is a possible bailiff, court marshal, somebody for the Argenta Justice Court.

Out of 20 courts in the state of Nevada -- and I've known this. I've been an employee there for 25 years -- we are -- there are three courts, three rural courts out of 20 that do not have security. We are one of them.

It's kind of funny. We just found this out. Of the three that do not have security -- Judge Shirley and I just realized this the other day -- it is Mineral County, which is Hawthorne, which falls under Judge Shirley, which he doesn't -- I'm not saying it's his fault. It's not. It's just these three ended up being Judge Shirley is our district judge. Hawthorne, Lovelock, and Lander, us three do not have any type of security in the courtroom.

It's been an issue for myself, as an employee, for a lot of years. I used to give Max a hard time about it, going, "Hey, we want some security."

And he -- he's an ex-cop. He's a guy. He's -- you know,

he never felt that he needed security.

Last week, for the first time, I had a defendant in court -- this has never happened before -- after -- nice guy. Don't know the guy. But after his case, said, "Your Honor, can I ask you a question?"

And I said, "Sure."

And he said, "Why don't you have a bailiff in here?"
Nobody's ever asked us that question, and it kind of made the hair on the back of my neck stand up a little bit. And my clerk kind of looked at me and went like, you know, Why did -- why are they asking us why we don't have a bailiff in here?

Makes you a little bit nervous.

The law says district courts have to have bailiffs in court. So the sheriff's office provides bailiffs to the district court.

The sheriff's office provides bailiffs to us when they're doing transport from the Lander County Sheriff's Office and the people are in custody.

But besides those times, I do not have any security in the courtroom.

There's no security getting into this courthouse to get to the courtroom.

For the safety of myself, the public, the defendants, my staff, we want some security.

My plan, which I had talked to Cindy about this the other day, since I got into office my plan had always been to come to you guys next fiscal year, you know, have it in my budget, have all my ducks in a row and come see you guys.

Well, we had a law passed last Thursday, one week from today. Justice courts in all state — in the state of Nevada, all justice courts now have to do jury trials. Justice courts don't do jury trials. If you guys have been watching the news, every justice court in the state of Nevada right now are losing their minds. I'm not the only one in front of their commissioners saying, Hey, I've got jury trials.

I did talk to Judge Shirley a couple days ago. He showed me a letter. I don't know if he has submitted it to you or not, explaining to you -- thank goodness, Judge Shirley has the funds right now to cover us. He has a -- a jury commissioner who will do the -- send out the summons, do all of that. We have a court reporter. Monetary-wise, it's not going to affect justice court

right now because Judge Shirley has it in his budget to cover his three counties, which, thank goodness, we're underneath that one.

So for now, if you haven't received a letter yet, you're receiving a letter from Judge Surely that says, Hey, justice court's got to do jury trials. There's going to be a lot of cost for that.

Okay. You have gotten it. Okay.

For now, we're good. But we may have to come.

One of the things that we're not good at is if I have a jury trial, I have to have bailiffs. I have to have a bailiff in there. It is the law. I have to have a bailiff in there.

I have had a meeting with Ron and Robert. Sheriff's Office is very good to us. They've always been very good to us. They'll help us out when they can. But it's not guaranteed, you know, if I need a bailiff that — if they're short staffed or they've got an important call going on or district court's going on, I may not be able to have a bailiff. I have to have a bailiff.

So we're researching it right now.

I -- for the last few months -- had thought it would be pretty simple. I could create a position in justice court, ask you guys for the money, pay them as a position under the justice court, and I would have a bailiff.

There's also another law that is in effect. It's ADKT 539. All courts now have to do a risk assessment tool.

It is Lander County's policy -- at least our policy, justice court's policy. We do not usually OR on felonies. Well, the law changed. And if they fall under certain criteria, I have to OR.

COMMISSIONER SPARKS: Hm.

JUDGE DENISE FORTUNE: So I have to help figure out if I can OR them, if I should OR them, and who's going to keep track of these alleged felons while they're out on OR.

Well, I need somebody that carries a gun and can drug test people to do that.

So if I have a bailiff, we're hoping to implement that in with it also. So it will not just be a bailiff. The law says I have to do risk assessment now on everybody that goes to jail. If they can't bail out, I have to look at certain criteria to

see if I have to OR them.

So I'm also stating -- in case I forget to in the future -- when the public's wondering why there's felons being let out of jail, just so that they know, I -- I don't have control anymore. The law says if they fall under these guidelines, I have to let them out.

So I have also talked to Liz Barela at the HR department because, again, I had thought it would be a simple thing, creating the position, putting it out.

We're rural. We're small. I may not get anybody that wants to do it. I don't know. I may not have somebody that is going to be qualified to do it. But I need to at least try.

Ms. Barela brought up the issue, which I didn't even think of, of the liability, insurance liability. And I think Robert and Ron touched on it when I was over there meeting with them the other day.

As a Lander County employee, I fall under certain umbrella for liability. Law enforcement falls under another one.

So this is kind of one of the things we need to figure out. Do we get an employee that is a court employee, but we have to worry about the liability insurance? Do we get an employee but is considered a Lander County employee and which one do you put them under? Or do we hopefully, if -- if we need to, give the money to the Lander County Sheriff's Office and say, here's an employee that is -- with an agreement that they're my employee first.

CHAIRMAN WAITS: Judge, may I ask you a question? JUDGE DENISE FORTUNE: Uh-huh.

CHAIRMAN WAITS: Because I know we're way over the three minutes.

JUDGE DENISE FORTUNE: Oh, I'm --

CHAIRMAN WAITS: But --

JUDGE DENISE FORTUNE: -- sorry..

Action may include censure, admonishment, or other such action deemed appropriate by the board.

This is -- this is a sad one to put on.

And we, as a commission, were getting a little bit uncomfortable with some of the things that were going on. And we thought this would be good, actually, for all of us to consider. But we need to look at the professionalism and the respect and the courtesy that we have as commissioners.

There's a reason that they call us honorable. If we slip from that, we certainly need to be on our toes and we apologize.

It's unfortunate that -- that this did have to be addressed. But it was felt that if we did that perhaps we might be able to do a little bit more on a better decorum with our -- our agendas and our -- our commission meetings from now on.

COMMISSIONER SPARKS: So I'd like to say something. I'm -- I'm removing myself from this item because I felt strong. I don't think it's the forum to ridicule an elected official. That's my -- my beliefs. That's my integrity. It changed no -- and it's no different than when we had the legal outside of our

meeting where we had a consensus that it wasn't the right road to go down. And I'm still holding to that opinion. So I'll have nothing more to say about the issue.

CHAIRMAN WAITS: Okay.

And whereas in the Water Fund, 226, Lander County road (verbatim) of Commissioners desire to fund an additional 400,000 -- four -- is that -- is it four million four --

JOJO MYERS CAMPOS: Perfect.

For the record, can we have your last name? It's Jojo; right?

JOJO MYERS CAMPOS: Correct. My- -- for the record, it is Jojo Myers Campos. And I am the state broadband development manager for the Governor's Office of Science, Innovation and Technology.

CHAIRMAN WAITS: Thank you.

Kyla, are you going to start us on this? Or Keith? KEITH WESTENGARD: Well, I -- I -- Jojo --

CHAIRMAN WAITS: Oh.

KEITH WESTENGARD: Jojo, this is Keith. If you could explain what the survey is about.

I don't know if she can hear me. Could she hear me?

JOJO MYERS CAMPOS: I'm sorry. I -- I did not hear that.

CHAIRMAN WAITS: No, Keith wants you to -- to start it out and tell us what the survey's about.

JOJO MYERS CAMPOS: Oh, yes. Absolutely.

When we come into a community and we do what is called a whole community connectivity approach, we always start with a survey. We have done this exact approach in Elko, including the Spring Creek, City of Elko, and Elko County. We have also done this process in Ely, Nevada, as well as all of the surrounding areas there in White Pine County. We have also done this in Humboldt. We have also done this in Mesquite. And we've also done this in Pershing, Lovelock, and to include the surrounding areas, of course, of Rye Patch and Imlay as well.

So when we want to really start looking at how can we get a city and/or county completely connected -- and that means schools, libraries, public safety, transportation, which will also increase economic development opportunities -- we always start with a survey.

What the survey does is it starts giving me a baseline of the true issue, both commercial and residential. Well, most of the time, the commercial and residential will look very, very similar. And what it states is -- and it's only, like, ten questions in

that -- is basically do you think you have what you need on an everyday basis to conduct business, to close the gap of public safety, to increase any of your health care clinics that could also do, say, telemedicine. Also this lets us know about schools, libraries.

And so, therefore, when we send out the survey, it creates a baseline so I can start doing a -- a -- a business case. Because my next step is then to start attracting providers that would be interested -- and that's going to sometimes be both middle-mile and last-mile providers that would be inter- -- interested in coming in and doing some kind of infrastructure broadband solution.

So when I can show a provider, ROI -- so that's going to be the bottom line. If we -- if we have a business, we do not have a business, if we're going to go broke. We have a business that can -- that can actually help us propel and actually have a healthy bottom line.

So these surveys we give directly to providers saying, See? This entire area is looking for better connectivity.

Then we start the negotiations of what they can bring to the table.

But without the survey, it is very difficult for me to start describing a business case.

CHAIRMAN WAITS: Thank you.

One of my questions, then, is you keep saying "area." And I'm assuming that's Battle Mountain area. However, on the agenda, we do have Lander County.

JOJO MYERS CAMPOS: That's correct. It is going to be Battle Mountain and Austin.

CHAIRMAN WAITS: Great.

JOJO MYERS CAMPOS: We have already started doing some improvements in Austin. And so we want to make sure that we continue the progress that we're already working with.

CHAIRMAN WAITS: Thank you. That's what we wanted to hear.

KIM SCHACHT: What are the improvements they've already started working on here in Austin?

JOJO MYERS CAMPOS: In Austin, we actually have a fiber build that will be going directly to the school. Your school is not -- I mean, as you already know, it is not in good shape. So we went out for an E-rate build for the school district through the USAC SBC program called the E-rate program.

Every single district has already a discount rate with that. So we take, actually, the district rate. We take -- I have what's called a state match through the Nevada Connect Kids initiative.

Any time a state has state match and I put an additional 10 percent to help you build that, they then have to match me. So you get another 10 percent from the FCC.

What the school district did -- and I was so, so thankful that the superintendent was so -- so pro-progress because they actually -- the entire fiber build is only going to cost \$36,000 because the rest of it all got paid for by -- through my office and through the FCC and the USAC office out of D.C.

And so that school for the first time, starting in the spring, will have a fiber connectivity, allowing those students to then expand all of their digital and distance learning. They will be able to, then, do online curriculum.

And so that is -- that is going to be a game changer.

One of the things we heard when we went there last year, there was some parents actually doing home schooling because they did not feel that the Austin school had what it took to actually keep up with today's demand.

Well, now they will have that demand because they will have

a fiber connection. And they will be able to build and expand. And it will be completely sustainable.

The other thing that we have done, we are going out -- we have the RFP ready to go. So we will be going out for an RFP for the Austin library. And then we are going out for a fiber build for the library.

So now when you get fiber through the USAC program, both to the library and the school, what this does is it's going to set you up to have a provider come in. This will be a last-mile provider. Because being that this -- we -- we put in -- we always request a big bundle of fiber, not like, you know, four strands, six strands. We will request 48 to 96 strands of fiber. We will then cost allocate out the fiber to be used by the library, the fiber to be used by the school, allowing the rest of that fiber to be used by a last-mile provider to then actually benefit your residents and any other key stakeholders you have there in Austin.

CHAIRMAN WAITS: Thank you.

And this is Humboldt, Elko, and Lander have 29 been hit hard with this ISO. 30 If we don't cha- -- if we don't adopt the '18 codes, we are 31 going to go to a ten, and everybody's premiums are going to go 32 through the roof. 33 The code change is to -- because it's more stringent than 34 the 2003, which makes the liability less -- better for the 35 homeowner for the building code to be more up to date. 36 COMMISSIONER SPARKS: Yeah. KEITH WESTENGARD: So it's not ISO that's saying it. What -- what ISO does is they rate the community. They rate the county as a whole.

And like Anna said, it's based on -- a lot of it's based on fire department, their response times. It's -- it's rated on -- on the type of equipment that they have, the -- their gallons per minute that the engine can pump, their -- their records of maintenance. It's rated on a lot of things, on several different things.

So when ISO says, for instance, we have a -- say we have a ten. It's -- it's based on one to ten. Ten is the worst, the worst rating that you can get. One is obviously the best.

So they come in and say, okay. Our building code -- and -- and they base it on our building codes. And I'll get to Eureka in a minute, Commissioner. But -- so they say -- okay -- Lander County or -- or Battle Mountain has a -- a ten rating as a -- as an example. That's the worst.

Now ISO just gives the rating. Then the insurance companies will -- will -- will come in there or the -- the mortgage companies will come in and say, Well, you guys have a ten. So based on that ten, we're going to give you the -- the highest rates possible because you're -- whatever it may be. Our building codes are outdated, our response times are long, our -- our equipment -- and I'm not saying it is. I just want -- I'm using this as an example. Your equipment is outdated or it doesn't meet minimum GPM flow with gallons per minute flow.

So the -- but that's how -- that's how the ISO gives their -- their rating. Then the mortgage companies are basing it on -- on that part of it, that one to ten. Ten being the worst.

Eureka doesn't have a building department so they're not rated on a buil- -- on their building department. So that part of it is -- gets left out of the -- the -- the equation, so to speak. Is that --

We do not have -- I have the money in the budget. We did not budget this much money for this particular project. So we'll have to do some -- some changing in some of our projects. I'll have to get with Cindy on that if we do approve this.

But I do believe we need to approve this because to stay in compliance with the state and our -- you know, the effluent that we discharge to the river, we're high in nitrates and our TDS, which is Total Dissolved Solids.

So if we -- if we put all this out into a wetlands, it's -- it's not a problem. We're in compliance a hundred percent with the state at that point.

And a lot of this is infiltration from groundwater. So when we have high water years, like we did the last couple of years, some of our pipes and manholes aren't perfectly watertight so we end up getting a lot of water in.

That doesn't sound like much, but it — it changes the numbers of what we're putting out. For example, some of the roads get a lot of salt on them in the winter and then you see these great big puddles and you'll see little bubbles coming up. That's a manhole with the holes in it sucking water in from the street that has a bunch of salt in it. And it really throws our plant into a tailspin.

We've -- I've -- we've talk requested J-U-B several times about this.

There are -- they're putting it in areas, the recommended areas that they've put in the book here, in no way will affect our projects that we have upcoming in the next year. So it shouldn't be an issue there.

And -- and I believe it's going to be good for the county to -- to put this out there for the navy -- navy to use.

They'll be buying fuel. They'll be using our facility for their -- like I say -- their training.
