CHAIRMAN MILLS: Call to order this Lander County
Commission meeting, Town Board of Battle Mountain and Austin,
Board of County Highway Commissioners, January 8th, 2018.
Please join us in the Pledge of Allegiance.

CHAIRMAN MILLS: We would like a moment of silence, please.

(Moment of silence)

CHAIRMAN MILLS: Thank you.

Lander County Commissioners may break for lunch from 12:00 p.m. to 1:15 p.m. Any agenda item may be taken out of order, may be combined for consideration by the public body, and items may be pulled or removed from the agenda at any time.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS

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CHAIRMAN MILLS: Commissioner reports on meetings, conferences, and seminars attended.

Judie?

COMMISSIONER ALLAN: Nothing.

CHAIRMAN MILLS: Nothing?

COMMISSIONER ALLAN: Nothing.

CHAIRMAN MILLS: Okay. I do have a couple of things.

We did have a hospital board meeting last night. It went very well. I'm really excited about how things are going at the hospital.

We do have Jason Bleak here with us today. And he'll be doing a report for us. I'll let him take care of most of that stuff.

But I would like to say we -- Keith and I met with Jason this week, and we talked about the EMS contract. And we'll be bringing something before the board at some point. I would like to continue to support the hospital with EMS.

So that's one of the things we worked on.

Another one that I thought was interesting that we're going to have to do is we -- I've talked in the past about our Phase 2A for construction at the hospital. And we've been kind of kicking that down the road for a while because, basically, it was a little bit of instability in our CEO situation. But now that that's stabilized --

But I was hoping to give Jason a little more opportunity to be here and settle in before we started in on construction. But it has come to light that it's going to probably become necessary to do at least part of that 2A project because of our IT and some things going on with our information technology over there that we're really going to have to do some construction to make a place for IT.

Because right now IT's jammed in a little closet. And it's totally inadequate. And we have to have in place our electronic health record information. And that's not working quite the way it should, which is causing us issues.

So we are kind of faced with the -- we're -- we're kind of being forced into going in construction pretty much immediately. And we're going to have to start working on that and getting that

done.

 So I'll be talking about that quite a bit more as -- as time goes on.

Also yesterday, we had a meeting with LEDA. Had a good discussion with Sheldon Mudd from NNRDA. And they're showing us a lot of support over there at LEDA.

I think -- I -- I talked to him a little bit about trying to encourage them to step up a little bit in some of the projects they do and the things they take on as an advisory board to the commission.

(Cell phone ringing.)

CHAIRMAN MILLS: I'd like to see them do a little bit more about developing some of our infrastructure to make us more friendly towards business that might want to come to the community. So I'm trying to push them a little bit in that direction.

We had a pretty good meeting yesterday, though.

And then also we had a -- Keith and I had a phone call with J---J-U-B, our engineers for the airport down in Austin. So we -- the Austin fuel project's come along pretty well. We finalized some decisions about how to handle that.

And it's -- it's interesting. What we're going to do is that right now we have a fuel tank down there for a hundred low lead. And that fuel tank has a filter coming into it and has a filter going out of it. And it's also got a very high volume pump on it.

Well, that's not re- -- that's not required for hundred low lead. But don't they -- those things are required for jet fuel.

So what we're going to do is we're going to put a new tank in with a smaller pump that will save us money. And it'll only have fuel -- fuel filter on the output of that, which will also save us money.

And then what we're going to do is take -- we're going put the hundred low lead in the new tank and put the Jet A in the existing tank. And that should save us a substantial amount of money, actually. So our engineers are doing a good job for us there. And it's -- it's a pretty good plan, I think.

And that's all I've got that I can remember.

Sean?

 COMMISSIONER BAKKER: The only meeting we had was fireman's. Ron's ordering our new water truck. He's getting quotes, anyway, we budgeted for. We ordered the new cordless Jaws of Life that will be wired into our rescue truck. That's about all that really came out of that meeting. Everyone voted. And we're moving forward with things.

So that's about all I have.

Patsy?

COMMISSIONER WAITS: Thank you. On the 1st of February, I did have our call with the Justice and Public Safety. That's the national NACO meeting.

We're talking about the upcoming legislation. Because we meet from 8:00 in the morning till 5:00 in the evening on that one, all day Saturday, the day before the legislative conference.

So they're getting their resolutions together. Of course, the big focus is, naturally, criminal justice reform and emergency management.

Also that day, we had a meeting regarding our grant for the cemetery. And the Cooperative Extension is heading that one up for us. We're looking at about 25 trees to replace the ones that we have lost. And we're working with the Chamber of Commerce on that.

And so we -- we went around to see what -- what we had to do as far as additional lines for water and such. So we'll be coming before you for your support and okay that we can plant the trees in the -- the county cemetery.

On February 2nd I did attend the NACO workshop. There were 15 counties, actually, represented there. And it was regarding understanding county tax revenues.

I think many of you know Alan Kalt, who was at Churchill for a number of years. And he is now the new CFO at POOL/PACT. And so he -- he gave a great -- great overview of our revenue.

We also had a Douglas County clerk and treasurer there and three folks from the taxation department.

We went through a lot of different things, everything from the distribution of sales tax, property tax. The biggest thing was the consolidated tax. We call it CTX. And there's two different tiers. And that's always been confusing. And -- and that was excellent.

One of the questions came up was whether we really want to stay on a guaranteed status, which we'll become with the -- with the tax department.

And we need to take a look at that real, real closely and see. We might be in a position now that it would benefit us to come off. But what we need to look and see whether we're going to continue with that this year.

Cindy Benson also was there. And I think she was about as excited about it as I was. It really was — was very, very informative.

On the 5th of February, we did have our chamber meeting, which of course we're working on -- as I mentioned -- the -- the cemetery grant for our trees there. Also, some new mountain bike signs. And those are on each end of town. So there'll be two of those.

And our office manager did resign, although she did finally offer to stay on while we looked for someone new, at least on a temporary basis. So we've got some flexible hours there that we're going to manage everything. Dee stepped in to handle at least a day if we need to. And so we're -- we're in a situation again out looking to replace that.

So that -- that's always a sad note when your -- you have to look for new people again when -- sorry to lose them.

But that's all I have. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN MILLS: Art?

COMMISSIONER CLARK: Good morning. Thanks for coming. And welcome to Lander County, Jason.

Senator Heller's office called me a couple of times this last week. And we'll catch up on the most of that with Item Number 14.

But Senator Heller will be at the Owl Club at 11:00 o'clock on Saturday for a meet and greet. And I think Amodei will be there also. So you might want to check that on your calendar.

We'll catch up with the rest of the stuff on Item 14.

STAFF REPORTS

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CHAIRMAN MILLS: Okay. We'll go to staff reports on meetings, conferences, and seminars attended.

KEITH WESTENGARD: Little bit more on our airport. We are

moving forward on our hangars, the design of our hangars out there at the Battle Mountain Airport.

And we are currently in the process of continuing with our Taxiway C realignment project, which is going to the IFE, which is the independent fee estimate right now. It's just a review of our consultants, our engineer's pricing, and projected times and so forth of -- of when the project would be started and -- and completed.

We did receive, two days ago, a letter from the Department of Taxation having to do with our supplemental city-county relief tax. So I have applied for our waiver, as we have in the last four years. That meeting will take place March 5th at 9:00 o'clock in Carson City, to ask that waiver be granted.

I think everybody -- or I hope everybody's aware that the highway out here will be closed -- or will be under pilot-car guidance from 10:00 to 2:00 today. So they have signs up. They're doing some -- some roadwork out there, DOT is.

And then the other things are on the agenda. Thanks.

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1) Update from Lander County EMS presented by the new Battle Mountain General Hospital CEO, Jason Bleak, and all other matters properly related thereto.

CHAIRMAN MILLS: Item Number 1. Update from Lander County EMS presented by the new Battle Mountain General Hospital CEO, Jason Bleak -- or Jason Bleak, and all other matters properly related thereto.

JASON BLEAK: Thank you for having me here today.

And as Doug says, it's stated -- my name's Jason Bleak. It's spelled B-L-E-A-K. I try not to be bleak. Try to keep the smile on my face. But it is pronounced "Blake."

In way of short introduction, I -- I am a rural Nevada guy. I come from Panaca, Nevada. Much smaller than Battle Mountain. I think this is the big city compared to where I've been living for the past little bit.

And I enjoy rural Nevada. I have done my time in the big cities. I've had those wonderful conveniences. And I moved away from them. And so I'm glad to be here.

It is a pleasure for me to be in this position as the CEO at the hospital. And I look forward to the wonderful future that -- that it holds.

I've shared this with my staff. And -- and this is part of introduction. But I think that it's good that everybody knows what my philosophy is in health care.

I've been in health care administration for nearly 17 years. I started in long-term care as a corporate guy. And I wandered all over the country. And 12 1/2 years ago I settled into a hospital setting and have enjoyed it ever since.

But in my career, I found that my style of -- of management and the things I focus on are -- are very simple. There's five C's. And so I've already told this to all my employees. They know what I'm looking for. You guys should know what I'm looking for as well.

These five C's are -- go as -- as follows. Care. We have to give the greatest care possible. That doesn't mean that we're going to provide every service. But those services that we do provide have to be top-notch. They have to be absolutely high

quality.

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Next is cash collections. We have to be able to manage our business in a way that cash is coming in to support the business. Those services that we provide, we should be able to support that with a good, strong business model.

Next is cost containment. We have to make sure that we're doing things as efficiently as possible. Efficiency is -- is kind of in the eye of the beholder. But we have to be able to show our efficiency in -- in outcomes. We have to be able to show that what we have done is giving us great results and a good business result.

Next is census. Some might also refer to this as occupancy, but that doesn't really fit into my five C's. So census is, are we taking care of the community? Are they coming to us? Are they going somewhere else? And if they're going somewhere else, why? And how do we keep them here to take care of our patients and our -- our community the best possible way?

And then the last is cleanliness. And this has kind of a broad meaning. Yes, I do mean making sure that our -- our facilities are clean and -- and infection-free. But also, how is our business run? Is it run in a clean way? How do we present ourselves? Are we professional in our manner, in our demeanor, in our dress? Is our customer service good? And so cleanliness, in my mind, takes a pretty broad definition. And how do we reflect or what do our actions and our -- our demeanor reflect to the public?

And so those things are the areas that I focus on as I wander around the building, as I look at reports, as I start thinking about change and where we need to go. Those things are in my mind.

Not any one of them has any priority over the other. It just depends on what's happening at the moment. Some things may move up and down according to that specific moment.

So with that, I have already begun my process of evaluation at the hospital. And I have identified some areas of improvement, as Doug has noticed and -- or has stated.

Our building construction is -- is needed. Our IT area is needed. We -- we need improvements.

But more specifically for this meeting, our EMS system. I have done some evaluation here. And we're working through the

process. I'm glad that Myra's here. Pat Irwin would have been here, but I think he got called out on a run just -- just before this meeting.

I trust that you guys have received the -- the little information that -- that we sent out.

I do intend to revise that a little bit over the future to make it a little bit more clear as far as billable versus nonbillable runs, versus runs that were done to assist in other health care manners.

COMMISSIONER BAKKER: Thank you.

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JASON BLEAK: And so I'm hoping to break that down a little bit so that it -- it's clear. Because as Myra and I have spoken, we're trying to figure out -- these numbers don't quite add up. So how many of these are runs to assist at the -- at the ER? How many of these runs are to assist with -- with the Austin operations? Things like that. So in the future, we'll break that down.

But you've got the three months: October, November, December. For those -- for the year to date, we have 120 billable runs. Of those billable runs, as you can see in the -- in the top right-hand corner of those three months, Medicare seems to be our biggest user of -- of our billable runs in December. It's 42 percent, which is expected. It is expected.

One of the great things is, is -- is that with the ambulance service or the EMS service under the hospital, which is critical access hospital and designation, we can receive cost-based reimbursement for Medicare runs, which will help us tremendously as we get reimbursed a certain amount per run.

And so it comes very important for us to maintain our costs and make sure that we have accurate documentation of what all of our costs are.

And that's where I -- really relying on Myra and -- and Pat and then the future director to -- to keep us updated on.

The little graph at the -- the very last page is a very simplistic graph. It just shows our revenues. And those are gross revenues per month versus -- and those are in the blue. And then in orange are the expenses per month. They cover this -- this fiscal year, year-to-date fiscal year.

As you can see, July --

CHAIRMAN MILLS: So just -- Jason.

1 JASON BLEAK: Go ahead. 2 CHAIRMAN MILLS: Excuse me. Just for clarification, when you say "gross revenue," you're saying that's what we billed. 3 4 JASON BLEAK: Yeah. 5 CHAIRMAN MILLS: That's not what we received --6 JASON BLEAK: Yep. 7 CHAIRMAN MILLS: -- back from the insurance. 8 JASON BLEAK: That's correct. 9 CHAIRMAN MILLS: Oh. Okay. 10 JASON BLEAK: That's gross revenue. 11 CHAIRMAN MILLS: Okay. 12 JASON BLEAK: And so, as you can see, we are at a deficit 13 other than one month in July. And I can't tell you exactly what 14 happened in that one month of July. We must've really been 15 cranking. 16 But we have some fixing to do. Because functioning at a deficit month after month is -- it's not a very good way to go, 17 especially when I apply my five C's analysis. And so we have to 18 19 be good stewards of -- of our operations. We've got to close that 20 gap. 21 I would love to say that we're going to make money month 22 after month, but I think that would be farfetched. 23 I hope that we can close that gap so that we're a break-even if not a little bit above over the course of a year. 24 25 Because those months, those emergencies, they -- they will ebb and flow. And we will take care of business so that we can 26 27 ebb and flow with them. 28 29

So, seeing that, there are some areas of revenue that we are looking at to increase and improve our revenues. And I'll just list these -- these areas.

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Community paramedicine is kind of a new term. It's probably been brought up -- and it was kind of introduced to the country a little bit through HGH over in Winnemucca. They set out and they started providing some community paramedicine services. that time it wasn't reimbursed at all.

Well, the model has become acceptable to the state and to the federal government. And so now they're -- they're putting together methods of reimbursement for community paramedicine. What this is, is that a -- a patient would go to the doctor. And doctor says, here's your regimen of -- of treatment. Go

home and have fun.

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We could send in a team of paramedics to follow up with that, a few days later or a week later, to make sure that they're following their — their drug regimens, to make sure they're eating appropriate, to make sure that they're taking care of whatever it is appropriately. And then they can suggest, "Come back to the doctor." They can work off of some orders. They can — they can take care of things to try to keep that person from having to go back to the doctor or back to the emergency room. It will cut down on costs overall in health care.

And there is — they are building mechanisms, currently, to pay for that service, which — which can help us. There is a grant through Nevada Rural Hospital Partners right now. They're working on community paramedicine, which would, in essence, give us in the range of \$22,000 to support this service going forward, per year.

And I don't know how long the grant period is, a couple years, three years, maybe. But that is a -- a very good positive way that we can start to build revenue in our EMS service.

The next is having our -- our -- our staffing and our personnel ready to take transfers from Battle Mountain General Hospital to other places as needed.

We hope to cut down on the transfers. I want to keep our patients here locally and -- and take care of them here. But there are going to be those that need to be transferred. And if we can put together a -- a squad or a unit to take that transfer on -- on the second ambulance, it's -- it saves that patient gobs of money because they're not being flown out of here, and it adds to our -- to our revenue pouch.

Yes?

COMMISSIONER CLARK: It doesn't cost anything to fly out of here, Jason, not one penny.

JASON BLEAK: Oh, that's through the --

COMMISSIONER CLARK: Yeah.

JASON BLEAK: I apologize --

COMMISSIONER CLARK: AirMed.

So having her be 17 able to come, pull in if we get a call, that kind of stuff. 18 We are working on that local personnel so we can get some more -- it seems like -- I'm having the ER call me first before 19 20 they send people out. If it's something we can do, we -- we'll 21 pull it together. 22 COMMISSIONER BAKKER: Awesome. Good job. 23 JASON BLEAK: And -- and I am a licensed EMT. And as soon 24 as I have -- feel like I have my arms wrapped around this 25 tornado that I'm riding right now, I plan to run and -- and to 26 assist wherever I can in -- in these transfer processes. 27 The other benefit that our EMS has, in affiliation with the hospital, is that if we get a mass casualty incident coming to the 28 hospital, it gives us those extra hands that they can come to the 29 30 They can help with codes. They can help with some major issues that come -- that may come out here on I-80. 31 And having them there is -- is a -- is a safety blanket. 32 It's a comfort, not only to the doctors but to the nurses and also 33 to the administrator, knowing that we're not going to be 34 35 shorthanded in -- in these issues. 36 And so that is my brief report. 37 You know, I -- I -- I now think -- I introduced myself and I didn't tell you about my family. And I really apologize to my 38 39 family for that. 40 I've got a great wife and five wonderful children.

in Lincoln County. They would be here with me now, but I've got a daughter that's 18 years old and graduating from high school this year.

And she wanted to graduate with her friends. And so we're making that possible.

As soon as school is over, they will join me comp- -- up here. I have bought a house. I'm invested in this community. I look forward to being here for a long time. And it's just a pleasure to be here.

It's -- I -- I feel very fortunate and blessed to have the opportunity to be here.

So with that brief introduction and explanation, I can answer any questions or attempt to or Myra can.

COMMISSIONER WAITS: We sincerely appreciate the update and, of course, the opportunity to -- to welcome you again, because it is exciting.

For the record, on your notation about the -- the revenue taken in and the expenses, of course, it's always very difficult with emergency services to say, boy, I would love these two to -- to come out okay. And I think the county is well aware of that.

So that -- that part is where you break it down. You've identified some good options. And the other thing is, of course, for years we had problems with our billing.

And naturally, that's always a -- a big key. So -- so watching that close and staying on it. Because some people need a little bit more reminder, reminder, reminder when something is due.

So we appreciate everything you've done today and, again, want to welcome you to our community. And, of course, we're very, very excited about it. It's a --

JASON BLEAK: Thank you.

COMMISSIONER WAITS: -- good thing. Thank you.

JASON BLEAK: Thank you.

COMMISSIONER BAKKER: Jason, welcome.

I -- you just mentioned billing, so I just had a thought.

What's your thoughts about billing? Are you -- is the hospital going to take back the billing? Or are you guys still outsourcing it? Or --

JASON BLEAK: I'm assuming you're talking about the private-pay portion of it?

1 Right now it is outsourced. I believe we send out the first 2 -- the first notice. And then, after that, an outside group takes it and -- and works with it from there. 3 4 At this point, I'm not looking at changing. 5 In small communities I've -- I've noticed this, that it -- it 6 becomes difficult for some to ask their neighbors for money. 7 -- and they don't -- that's a nervous feeling when you -- you 8 interact with them at church or at schools at all these different 9 community things. And so that's kind of the fear that we're 10 trying to avoid. 11 That being said, we can't just call in this other group and 12 say, go collect the money at any means possible. They've got to 13 do it in a respectful, professional manner because they represent 14 15 And that's where we have to be more vigilant in sitting 16 down with that outsourcing company, saying, let me see what your 17 notices are. Can I change the wording in it? How are your 18 personnel speaking to our people? Is it respectful? Is -- is 19 it courteous? Is it recorded? Because recordings have an 20 interesting way of cleaning up messes. So that if I can listen 21 to it and I deem, hey, you guys were out of line, I can -- I can 22 then squash that problem. 23 And so right now I'm -- I'm still looking at leaving it 24 there. 25 COMMISSIONER WAITS: I --26 COMMISSIONER BAKKER: I just know --27 JASON BLEAK: But it may --28 COMMISSIONER BAKKER: -- it --29 JASON BLEAK: -- change. 30 COMMISSIONER BAKKER: -- was a big contention in the 31 community. Part of the collections, collection-wise. 32 JASON BLEAK: Yeah. 33 COMMISSIONER WAITS: And --34 COMMISSIONER BAKKER: How it's been --35 COMMISSIONER WAITS: And one --36 COMMISSIONER BAKKER: -- handled. 37 COMMISSIONER WAITS: I'm sorry. And one of the questions 38 is, on the ones that -- that are not paying timely, how many of 39 them are out of the county?

JASON BLEAK: That's a good question.

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1 COMMISSIONER WAITS: So we --2 JASON BLEAK: And I'd have --3 COMMISSIONER WAITS: -- have a lot --4 JASON BLEAK: -- to --5 COMMISSIONER WAITS: -- of accidents --6 JASON BLEAK: -- research that. 7 COMMISSIONER WAITS: -- on Highway 80, a lot out of state. 8 JASON BLEAK: Yes. 9 COMMISSIONER WAITS: And -- and if those folks don't happen 10 to have, you know, their -- their coverage under their vehicle, for example, on any kind of med pay, then -- then they don't --11 12 they don't often pay timely. 13 JASON BLEAK: That's right. 14 COMMISSIONER WAITS: -- I would be interested to know what our collection situation is. If it truly is in the county and 15 16 17 JASON BLEAK: Sure. 18 COMMISSIONER WAITS: -- what the percentage is. 19 JASON BLEAK: Sure. 20 COMMISSIONER BAKKER: I would just -- I just know it was a 21 contention. So I was just curious. So --22 JASON BLEAK: And I have heard those same concerns in the 23 three weeks that I've been here. 24 And that's definitely something that's going to be addressed 25 and make sure that our outsourcing company, if we stick with them, that they are doing things as a good representative of us. 26 27 COMMISSIONER BAKKER: Awesome. 28 COMMISSIONER CLARK: One of the -- one of the bigger 29 problems with the collection agency and the hospital trying to 30 collect money -- and I've experienced this myself -- is I got a phone call from the collection agency before I got anything from 31 the hospital or there was enough time for my insurance to be 32 33 billed. 34 JASON BLEAK: 35 COMMISSIONER CLARK: And that -- that has happened fairly 36 regular. 37 JASON BLEAK: Okay. COMMISSIONER CLARK: And not getting a notice from the 38 39 You know, people depend on that. So it's encouraging to hear that you've focused on this problem and hopefully we can 40

1 get it rectified. JASON BLEAK: It will. It will. 3 COMMISSIONER ALLAN: I think I agree with Art on that. 4 have to add that a lot of times you won't get a notice from the hospital or -- or it will be several -- several months and then 5 absolutely nothing. And then you get -- get another notice from 6 7 the outsourced collections. 8 JASON BLEAK: Uh-huh. 9 COMMISSIONER ALLAN: And I guess my biggest question is, is 10 I've also heard people comment on, you know, I've paid the hospital this, but it doesn't reflect to the -- the outsource --11 12 outsourced collections. 13 So a little more communication between the hospital and the 14 collection company. 15 And maybe, as Art mentioned, a more timely manner. 16 JASON BLEAK: Thank you. This feedback is very good. 17 COMMISSIONER BAKKER: Yeah. Not to put you on the spot or 18 anything. 19 JASON BLEAK: No, this -- this feedback --20 COMMISSIONER BAKKER: I know you're just --21 JASON BLEAK: -- is good. 22 COMMISSIONER BAKKER: -- starting. 23 MYRA WALL: Have to know. 24 JASON BLEAK: Well, like I said, I'm -- I'm trying to wrap 25 my arms around this tornado of information. And -- and I'll get my arms around one of these days. And this helps. 26 So thank 27 you. 28 CHAIRMAN MILLS: Okay. Other questions? comments? 29 COMMISSIONER CLARK: Thank you. 30 JASON BLEAK: Thank you very --31 COMMISSIONER WAITS: Thank you. 32 CHAIRMAN MILLS: Okay. 33 JASON BLEAK: -- much. 34 CHAIRMAN MILLS: Jason, Myra, --35 COMMISSIONER BAKKER: Thank you. 36 CHAIRMAN MILLS: -- thank you --37 COMMISSIONER ALLAN: Thank you, --38 CHAIRMAN MILLS: -- very much. 39 COMMISSIONER ALLAN: -- Jason. 40 CHAIRMAN MILLS: Appreciate it.

1 COMMISSIONER CLARK: And if you need anything, come back to 2 us. 3 JASON BLEAK: I will. Thank you so much. I appreciate 4 that. 5 COMMISSIONER WAITS: And thank you, Myra. 6 MYRA WALL: Thank you.

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Update from MedX AirOne regarding medical air transport 2) services in Lander County, and all other matters properly related thereto.

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CHAIRMAN MILLS: Okay. Item Number 2. Update from MedX AirOne regarding medical air transport service in Lander County, and all other -- all other matters properly related thereto.

Good --

JOEL HOCHHALTER: Good --

CHAIRMAN MILLS: -- morning.

JOEL HOCHHALTER: -- morning.

COMMISSIONER WAITS: Good morning.

JOEL HOCHHALTER: Joel Hochhalter. I'm the founder and owner of MedX AirOne.

Thank you for your time this morning. I just have come -been kind of making my rounds around the counties that have support us -- supported us over the -- you'll have to excuse my I'm aging -- supported us over the last three years. And I just kind of wanted to give an update of kind of where we are and where we're going and different things that -- that we're doing.

I want to start off with kind of just reminding -- putting out there again our model and, you know, why -- why we're a little bit different and we may look a little bit different than -- than other air medical transport services.

After 25 years in the air medical business and -- and a -a few years in the EMS billing. And I -- I feel -- I feel the pain of Mr. Bleak having been in that business for quite some time. It is very difficult and very challenging, especially on the ground side of things.

So -- but, you know, I've learned over my years in the -- in the EMS, both ground and air, that there's a better way to do -- a better way to do things without running people into the ground

financially.

And so we put together a -- a model that, you know, as you all know, we started off with, you know, offering -- I'm not a huge fan of -- of membership programs, although they do supply a, you know, a really good service. But they also generate tremendous amounts of free capital on behalf of, you know, larger entities, which is a business model. It's not wrong, by any stretch of the imagination. It's just how people choose to do business.

And I've learned over the years a different way to -- to come and do this. And we started off -- you guys supported us over the years with very small amounts, keeping in compliance under constant audit to make sure that we're, you know, in compliance with -- with CMS, which is very, very important. And we've -- we've managed to do that. We've managed to do that very successfully.

And our -- our membership program now has -- we have developed a consortium. It's called the Northern Nevada EMS Consortium. It's a 501(c)(3), completely separate from MedX. But we are now getting do- -- supporting the membership through donations and -- and not coming to individual entities asking for specific amounts of -- of funding.

And the reason that we did this was this is part -- was part of our plan of -- of putting this program together to -- to help -- to make sure that we're always have the patient in the center of everything that we do.

And the communities -- being involved in the communities in everything that we do.

You know, I've -- I've spoken to a lot of the casinos and a lot of the mines and a lot of the bigger employers in northern Nevada. And they all have the same message, was, you know, gosh, we're really happy that you're not going to send our employees a balance bill. We really appreciate that. But we're self-insured. School districts, county employees, whatever have you, all the mine employees, we're all self-insured. And you send us the bill and you still expect us to pay a hundred percent of the bill charges, which, shamefully, I will admit.

And after 25 years I have a lot of folks in the air medical industry that won't speak to me anymore because I think the air medical industry has gotten completely out of control with what

they think the value of -- or the cost of a -- of a -- of a transport is. I've seen, you know, poor folks in -- up in this part of the country with 80- and \$120,000 bills for a 45-minute ride in an airplane. And that's just absolutely ludicrous.

And so we -- we put this together. And -- and -- and I recognize when -- when I'm speaking with the -- the mines and we're talking about the membership program, they're very willing. They say, gosh, we -- you know, we'd really like to -- to participate. But what's in it for me? What's in it for me as the employer that you -- you know, I'm not -- I'm going to give you money for the membership program. Yet you still want me to pay the whole bill.

Well, that was the second part of our membership is we're the only air medical service that are -- that is in network with the -- the insurance carriers in northern Nevada: Blue Cross Blue Shield, Anthem, Hometown Health, Cigna.

And so not only are we not balance billing the -- the patient through the membership program, but we're also passing along significant discounts, up to 60 and 70 percent, to employers, which keeps their costs of their -- we're not going to be part of their insurance premiums going up. Let's just say that.

There — there may be other avenues that cause that. But — but we are not. And so the — we met with the — the insurance companies and explained to them how we're approaching the membership program. And they are very happy. And they are — are very thrilled that we've di— — that we have come on board as a network provider. So, in essence, we have a — now our membership is — is not only — it — it's twofold. It's for the patient, but it's also for the employer and also for, you know, the — the payer itself. If it — if it's not a self — self-insured, which affects people like me, who, you know, don't belong to a large organization, you know, that go out and buy insurance.

But, you know, hopefully we can be part of one of the reasons why we can keep insurance costs a little bit more under control when it comes to the air medical industry, because we are in network. And being in network also supplies some sort of a -- a membershiplike action. Because all of our in-network contracts state that, you know, we agree to accept X amount of dollars, you know, for a transport on behalf of Blue Cross Blue Shield. And we give up the right to balance bill the patient on behalf of that --

of that in-network contract, is pretty -- I mean, it's common, even with the hospitals. Once they get the, you know, the amount, then that -- that's it. There's no more billing of the patient.

And so we're pretty happy to -- to be able to -- to do that. I think we have about -- we have one more insurance company to go for me to feel comfortable to say that we're in network with a hundred percent. And we're -- we're currently -- currently working on that as we -- as we go.

Again -- and then the third part is, you know, that we place the patient, you know, and the community in the -- in the center of what we do. And when -- when I say "placing the patient," I think that's fairly self-explanatory.

One of the things that we also do is, you know, we're one of the only services that, I -- that -- that will transport mental health patients, psychiatric patients, when there is no other means to transport them to -- to Reno or to Las Vegas or to Twin Falls or wherever they can possibly get a -- get a bed.

I'm -- as far as I'm concerned, a psychiatric or a mental health patient is no different than a cardiac patient or any other kind of patient. It's a human being who has an issue, that has a problem. And they need a helping hand. And if we can't give it to them here, then it's our duty and our fiduciary responsibility to get that person to where they need to go. And so we -- we do do that, knowing that it's a nonreimbursable action. But it's part of our plan and part of our model that -- of -- of putting patient and -- and community in the forefront.

Another thing we do by -- with the community is we always join up with a local organization. I'm really big into supporting the -- the kids, the youth of our communities. So we're real huge supporters of the Boys and Girls Club in northern Nevada. We're one of their major sponsors. And so we do everything that we can to -- to assist them in raising their funds and making sure that these kids have a place to go.

We're in the process is of putting together a -- a program that actually introduces kids into the medical field and to EMS by allowing them to come out to the helicopter. We're also introducing them into aviation, both on the pilot side and on -- on the maintenance side and let- -- letting them kind of look and see what it feels like. They have -- the program will give them their opportunity to earn their wings or their Star of Life

if they choose to go down the EMS route. And this is all tied to our nonprofit consortium, is we want to get to the point where we're offering up some scholarships for kids who decide to go down one of those three paths, either into EMS, be it nursing or be it a paramedic or EMT or aviation mechanic or -- or a pilot. We hope that, you know, part of the donations that we raise for the consortium can go towards that.

Another part of the consortium of funding that — that we are now beginning this year as new is that, you know, there's opportunities for memberships with all the different flight companies. And that's great. I — I believe — I'm a firm believer that everybody should have one for everybody. Because there is absolutely no way on God's green earth that one company can cover everything. The stars just don't line up that way. That's not how the telephone rings. It either rings seven at a time — they're never spaced out evenly where everybody, you know, has sufficient aircraft or ground ambulances, for that matter, to make sure everybody's taken care of.

So we -- we spread the -- spread the wealth around. In fact, we're -- we're a -- the call center for the Elko hospital for NNRH. And we probably send off over 30 transports a month to either other ground services or other air services that -- that come through our center, for ones that we can't handle.

But part of the consortium is -- because every -- the -- the memberships that we offer here in northern Nevada, none of us have a specialty, like a -- for instance, a neonatal transport team. Neonatal transports for a premature birth is -- is a -- very much a specialty in and of itself. It's not like -- you know, adults are adults. They all pretty much act the same.

A premature birth baby is -- is -- is like living on Mars. It's -- they -- they don't play by the same rules as the rest of us do when they get sick. So we end up calling in a specialty neonate team either out of Reno or out of Salt Lake or even out of Boise now.

And so part of the consortium funding is we're working with these agencies to extend the membership, not so much the -- it's not the membership. But we're negotiating rates with these specialty teams that are forced to come out of state, for the consortium to pay the bill on behalf of the patient at the

Medicare-allowable rate. Because the majority of these folks usually either don't have insurance or they dang sure can't afford the \$100,000 bill they're about to get dropped.

So we're trying to negotiate with these entities. And the consortium wants to be able to step up and take care of that cost on behalf of the family.

So as -- as we grow -- as I'm sure you can -- you can see, that our goal with the consortium is to really, you know, include as many folks in the EMS community as -- as we possibly can.

The other part of the consortium is education. We are really in a huge education mode right now. We are opening up all of our specialty education that we provide to our flight crews.

We do the general education -- ACLS, PALS, TNCC -- that are, you know, pretty much required by -- you know, for hospital staff and EMS staff. But we also teach a class that's called S.T.A.B.L.E. That's -- that's specific to babies and to -- to neonates. Those are some of the education that is very hard to come by.

We have three instructors available to us now that teaches the S.T.A.B.L.E class. And it just gives rural communities a little bit extra tool when it comes to doing initial assessments, to be able to catch things before a child is -- is -- is a patient that is constantly standing on a cliff, if you will, and they're just seconds away from falling off. It doesn't take them very long to go from -- as you can see, you know, watching the news, you know, all these kids that are -- that have fallen to the flu this year. Because it just doesn't take a long time for a child to become ill and then extremely ill, and then, you know, succumb to -- to the disease.

So we want to be able to hand out the tools, provide education and classes that give people the tools to recognize things long before that child is ready to -- to -- to drop off the edge.

So just as an -- as an example, we're -- we're doing S.T.A.B.L.E. S.T.A.B.L.E. is an acronym for -- there -- there's a -- you know, in the adult world, we call it ABCs: airway, breathing, and circulation. And that's how you treat a patient. And those that they're not breathing, don't worry about the bleeding, you know, so on and so forth.

The first thing is that you have to maintain an airway.

With -- with kids it's a little bit different. S.T.A.B.L.E. stands for sugar, temperature, airway, blood pressure, lab work, and then finally, emotional support.

We know by evidence-based medicine that emotional support to a -- to a neonate, to a child is -- a touch is very -- very important. Very common to a -- to a neonate and -- and to a baby.

So, anyway, that's just some of the things that -- that we are doing.

And I want to just kind of give a little bit of rundown specific to Lander County for 2017. 2017. As you know, MedX has a helicopter in Winnemucca and a helicopter in Elko. We've now added a fixed-wing aircraft in Elko. So we now have three aircraft and looking at adding our -- our fourth.

We've just acquired a -- a hangar out here at the -- at the airport. So we're -- we're gearing up for that.

But 2017 we were requested 26 times in Lander County to respond to scene -- scene requests. We actually completed about 14 of those. We completed approximately 80 transports from the hospital. So a total of around 94 patients transported out of Lander County by either Elko or -- or Elko AirOne or HCH AirOne. Usually it's Humboldt that's coming this direction because they're a little bit closer.

And I'm happy to say that out of those 94 patients, not one of them paid one red cent and -- and never will.

Because of now -- especially the support that you guys provided with the membership program, but now the donations that are carrying the membership program through our 501(c)(3), making it possible. So we -- we now are solidly at membership through -- Pershing County, Humboldt County, Lander, Eureka, and Elko Counties are now all covered under the -- the membership through the -- the consortium.

COMMISSIONER BAKKER: Good job.

JOEL HOCHHALTER: Thank you.

You know, we really went into this with -- you know, it was kind of an accident that we even got this started in the first place. But I knew that, you know, if I did this again, that I definitely had a picture in my head how we were going to do this, and it wasn't going to be by, you know, repossessing 95,071 Chevys. There's just so many that you can do with. And that's

not how we treat people. And there's a way to do it.

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And I think we're seeing that across the country. You know, if you look in the news, Amazon and Berkshire Hathaway and the other company that is going to completely change the face of, you know. If what they're doing actually works out, they're going to rewrite the health care, the way things are done. Going to really throw a rock in the pond, if you will, to -- to health care.

So I'm not here — although you guys have supported — and, again, I — I thank you very much — have supported our — our membership program and supported the people of — of Lander County through this. You know, we're — we're past the point of saying that, you know, we're asking for dollars. If you so desire to provide a donation to the consortium to help us through, we have, you know, Barrick, Newmont, a lot of the support companies from the mining industry, a lot of just local businesses. You can go to nnemsc.org. Individuals can go on there and donate a dollar. It — it really doesn't matter because it's all — all staying here.

And I want to -- ma- -- also make sure that everybody understands, our consortium is set up -- we -- we have a board of directors. We have one open slot. And I've been twisting somebody's arm to be part of that.

But we -- we -- we pay no salaries out of this nonprofit organization. It's written into our bylaws. Nobody's allowed to -- there's no administrative fees that are allowed to be taken out of the bank account. One hundred percent of the donations that go into this, 100 percent of the donations will go out to fund the membership program for all five counties in northern Nevada, and then, secondly, will go to fund education.

For instance, we're in the process of purchasing a cadaver so we can have a cadaver lab for all the EMS and hospital folks and people who want to attend to learn, you know, hands-on ventilator management and actually get to see the -- you know, what happens.

So we're -- we're digging down to the grassroots level. So...

And that's all coming through the consortium. So 100 percent of the dollars that get donated come back to northern Nevada in one way or the other. They don't -- they don't leave.

1 So should you, like I say, should you feel so inclined to -to donate to the consortium, that'd be great. 2 Lander County residents continue to be covered and will 3 4 continue to be covered as long as I'm upright and able to take 5 in nourishment. 6 So, with that, thank you for your time. And I'll entertain 7 any questions. 8 CHAIRMAN MILLS: I have -- I have a question. 9 JOEL HOCHHALTER: Okay. 10 CHAIRMAN MILLS: I just want to be sure that our -- our helipad at the airport or at the hospital. And that our 11 12 airport, is there any -- is it adequate for your needs? Is there anything we need to do to fix or improve? 13 14 JOEL HOCHHALTER: No. The -- the -- the system at the 15 hospital, the helipad is phenomenal. The EMS staff is phenomenal. When we come in there's always someone there to 16 help. So -- and we have one or two of the hospital staff that 17 actually fly with us. So we probably cheat because they all 18 19 know each other anyway. 20 But, no, it's -- it's -- it's very -- it's a very nice setup. 21 CHAIRMAN MILLS: Okay. 22 JOEL HOCHHALTER: Absolutely no complaints whatsoever. 23 It's perfect. 24 COMMISSIONER WAITS: Well, thank you, --25 CHAIRMAN MILLS: Okay. 26 COMMISSIONER WAITS: -- Mr. Hochhalter, for giving us the 27 overview. We sincerely appreciate it. 28 JOEL HOCHHALTER: You got it. 29 CHAIRMAN MILLS: Yeah. Thank you. 30 COMMISSIONER BAKKER: Thank you. 31 CHAIRMAN MILLS: Appreciate --32 COMMISSIONER CLARK: I would --33 CHAIRMAN MILLS: -- it. COMMISSIONER CLARK: -- I would like to thank you 34 35 personally for your passion about this. 36 It was an airplane ride to Salt Lake City a few years back that saved my wife's life. And I think this is an indispensable 37 service that we can provide for our county. 38 39 Thank you. 40 JOEL HOCHHALTER: Absolutely.

Pat, if you'll come forward. 20 PAT IRWIN: Good morning. Pat Irwin, for the record. 21 I almost slipped out until I heard my name mentioned. 22 COMMISSIONER WAITS: I saw you going. 23 PAT IRWIN: Thank you, Patsy. I appreciate it. 24 COMMISSIONER BAKKER: Good morning. 25 PAT IRWIN: Not sure what -- what I can add to this morning, because I missed it. But we were out on a -- on a call 26 there for a minute and made it back as quick as we could. 27 28 COMMISSIONER WAITS: Just your background and you- -- and your temporary situation for us so it's --29 30 PAT IRWIN: So I --31 COMMISSIONER WAITS: -- on the record. 32 PAT IRWIN: I believe you -- you heard from earlier that Myra and I are co-interim directors running the EMS right now. 33 The position has been announced. So we'll keep you posted as to where 37 38 we're at. 39 We've been working real closely with Kim and working up in

Austin quite a bit as far as making sure that they're stocked.

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Just recently we made sure that the ambulance was at the ACLS level so that we can -- if we have a paramedic that wants to go 2 3 support up there, that they can just grab a bag and go. So that 4 was completed just last week right during the -- the board 5 meeting that we had. 6 CHAIRMAN MILLS: Okay. 7 PAT IRWIN: I guess it was two weeks now. It's starting 8 to -- to go pretty quick. 9 But my history and the reason why I -- I met Jody at -- at 10 the NACO conference, I believe. And Patsy introduced me to you. 11 But I've been a county commissioner for Pershing County for 12 eight years and was part of NACO and going to all the 13 conferences. I've been in EMS for 30 years and was just 14 recently came out of Washoe County working for Gerlach area and 15 came up here to help out and support. So --COMMISSIONER BAKKER: Awesome. Well, we appreciate it. 16 17 PAT IRWIN: All right. 18 CHAIRMAN MILLS: Yeah. 19 COMMISSIONER WAITS: Thank you. 20 CHAIRMAN MILLS: Thank you. 21 PAT IRWIN: You guys got a great system.      Dean himself. He, you know, he had spent some time up in
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     eastern Nevada recently. And, then, I think he really got an
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     earful on some WSA issues. And he came back. And he was just
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    like, why don't we do something about this? Right?
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         So what we're looking to do is -- is, you know -- and he
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talked to the Secretary of the Interior, who also told him that he would support Dean in wherever he does legislatively here.

So what Dean wants to do is -- is take these WSAs that have existed for some 30-odd years and -- and for the ones that were not found nonsuitable by the BLM, which that's questionable in itself right there, a little process. So the ones identified nonsuitable would be immediately released back into multiple-use status. So the ones that were found suitable for wilderness, there would be a two-year shot clock or a five-year shot clock to give Congress two years or five years to act. And if they don't act, they immediately go back into multiple-use status.

So that was kind of our game plan here. And we've got Nye County, Elko County, and Eureka County on board.

COMMISSIONER WAITS: Andy, I have a question.

ANDREW WILLIAMS: Sure.

 COMMISSIONER WAITS: And maybe it's just the way we put it on the agenda. Because, actually, it looks like we're asking for a letter or resolution or something. We did a resolution back in -- what? -- 1998 with -- with everything on it, saying, excuse me. In 1991, the Secretary of Interior said that we could release these. And -- and yet nothing has been done.

So has Senator Heller actually got the bill that we can support? Or --

ANDREW WILLIAMS: So the -- the -- the thing is, is, you know, we have to -- we can't write the bill until we get letters of support, if that makes sense. So --

But what the bill would look like is that it would say, you know --

Pershing County's been working on their bills -- ANDREW WILLIAMS: Yeah.

FRANK WHITMAN: -- for ten years.

ANDREW WILLIAMS: Oh, I know. Trust me. Well, I'm inclined, then, to think that, if you're going to work on a public lands legislation that would touch Augusta Mountain, that maybe if we include you in this bill, we don't touch the Augusta Mountain portion. What do you think?

The award notifications are this spring for a few of them, and we're kind of pressed for some time. In fact, one of the things that I really need from Ron -- and he's going to get that for me -- right? -- to -- back to Amy is some of the support from some of our elected officials is huge for one of their grants. In other words, like, we're not just making stuff up. We do have support from the community. And I thought that was interesting. But we will be turning in those letters next week.

Ted, I've -- I've -- is going to do one for us as well because he went to school there. And that type of stuff is neat for them to see.

And if you guys would like to send Amy any type of support letter as well, it's just helpful.

So we have that going on right now.

In fact, part of that application goes in next week. Again, the N- -- NPF is assisting with our application and nomination paperwork to be on the State National Register of Historical Places. And that's going through too.

So at this point, I'll also let you know, we haven't spent any money. So the money that you guys have gave, the -- the courthouse -- actually our official title of Lander County Citizens for Historic Preservation, it's still sitting there. But we are going to spend a little bit of funds in the next week or so because we have to pay for this first nomination to get it under the historical stuff. But it's not much. So we're really

watching that too because we know that's kind of the seed money. So -- so so far -- and I'll keep you updated on those each month as well of what we're doing.

And what's really neat is we've met folks like Heidi Swank, Jim Bertolini, Catherine Wines, and Rebecca Palmer. All of these folks are regional personnel that's starting to assist us.

Catherine Wines, for example, is the architect that kind of put together a really quick drawing of what this place will look like when -- you know, from the outside, doing some of the stuff that Mel Green talked about. And it looks really nice.

I mean, I think once we get to that point and start showing there's something happening, the community will get more excited as well.

Amy did attach the Lander County historic and conditional assessment report. It was Mel Green's report. You guys -- I think you had that last year, if I remember right. So she did reattach that.

And we will -- moving toward with the grant approval activities -- will go off that report to make sure we kind of follow along what he recommended for, you know, the building and that type of stuff.

CHAIRMAN MILLS: Item Number 5. Discussion for possible action to approve/disapprove access to the Administration Building for the Lander County Sheriff's Office, including key access, installation of weapons lock box located in the inmate transportation hallway, and video surveillance access, and all other matters properly related -- related thereto.

KEITH WESTENGARD: So this was brought up at our safety committee meeting. It was brought to the safety committee's attention by the —— by the undersheriff that they had some concerns about access during any type of a possible active shooter or any type of an incident where the Sheriff's Office will be involved as well as weapons lock boxes in the inmate transportation hallway where they —— where the inmates are brought in on the —— on the lower level and then transported up to the courtrooms. And then access to the surveillance cameras within the building.

So I -- Robert's here or -- or the sheriff or the undersheriff's here to speak to their -- to that if needed.

But that's how this came about, through the -- to the safety committee meeting at our last meeting.

CHAIRMAN MILLS: Any input?

SHERIFF RON UNGER: Sheriff Unger and Robert Quick. I'll let you --

UNDERSHERIFF ROBERT QUICK: So this was brought up -- and it comes from the original ideas and design of the building, from our understanding, when we originally designed the courtrooms and so forth -- was the holding cells up near the courtrooms -- in between the courtrooms have cameras built into them. And we were going to allow -- be allowed access or dispatch was going to be allowed access to those cameras to allow us -- to reduce the number of staffing it takes to

1 transport inmates to court. 2 And then that has not happened. So we have no access 3 to th- -- to those cameras or any cameras in this building. 4 So, needless so say, it takes four to six staff members to 5 transport inmates because we -- we cannot put them in those cells. 6 It's a safety issue where we cannot see the inmates. 7 therefore we cannot leave them in there without being observed. 8 The other things are if there's some sort of an incident in the courthouse, we have no access to the building. 9 10 We've had repeated alarms and so forth inside the building. We've had to call the judge to get access. 11 12 If there's some incidents that occur even when the building's open, and whether it be an active shooter or fights, any -- any 13 kind of a thing, we don't have access to this building. 14 15 So we are going to have to either break windows to get in, or we're going to -- there's going to be a huge delay potentially 16 17 before we come through the front door, because we don't know 18 what's going on. 19 So it was brought up to the safety committee a year or so ago, about this -- right after the building was opened. 20 21 I recently brought it up again. 22 And it's -- it's merely for the fact of what the commission wants. It's -- to us, we just bring the concerns to you of 23 24 what, you know, some potential issues that -- that have arisen or could arise. Hopefully, of course, it never occurs. 25 26 But we, you know, turn it over to you to what you want to 27 decide to do with it. And then we will work our plans around 28 that. 29 COMMISSIONER CLARK: Okay. I -- I have a question on the video surveillance. Can you -- can you hook it up to dispatch 30 so that you can see what's going on here if you have an issue? 31 32 UNDERSHERIFF ROBERT QUICK: The original design, I would say, that we talked about was that dispatch would be -- have 33 34 access to the video in this building. 35 COMMISSIONER CLARK: Okay. Because when I was on the

And one of the other things we talked about, which -- which I don't realize that -- I don't think we all realized until after. We were coming in before we started to go into the building. There was a big group of us -- Ron, Robert. There was, I don't know, maybe five or six from the sheriff's office that were there on -- on a safety thing and trying to figure out what we were going to do prior to opening up the -- the building.

During that meeting, it was probably when we realized that — that they didn't want to put the — not that the cells aren't able to be there and not that there shouldn't be a camera in the bailiff's station or wherever the law enforcement needs it to be able to see the person in the cells, but that the doors are solid. And we could fix that, probably, with cutting out the steel doors and placing in a window. That way they could utilize putting people in the cells and they can see them.

There is currently a visitor's -- an attorney/client or attorney/defendant place right now that already has glass that they don't utilize, to just sit somebody in that they could watch from the outside hallway through -- and it's -- probably be -- I don't know -- 4-feet-by-8-feet glass that's there that they could actually put somebody in if need be --

COMMISSIONER WAITS: Okay. Are you talking -- JUDGE MAX BUNCH: -- currently.

And then I would -- when I got through going through the building or through that office when law enforcement was with me, we'd go through that office. And when we got done, I'd call Ted and say, Ted, there was no issues in there. We had to re- -- we pulled the alarm. We reset it a couple of times.

And every counter has those and they're strategically placed throughout the building. One may even be close to one of the commissioners.

Dispatch has a -- a list of room numbers and doors and -- and what that goes to so they actually know. BERT RAMOS: Okay. This one I'm going to bounce all over the place. But $-\-$

So we -- last week we had our first official meeting with the CMAR for Well 9A, which is a golf course well.

And we have a couple well drillers we're -- that thing's coming together. Probably by the 15th of next month, we'll have that -- I'll be back in front of you with something on that as well as our Hill Top paving projects.

And then after that, the Austin park, we went up there and dug out a big chunk of the hill there for the stage that they've been requesting up in the -- in the park. And the guys, I believe, put some base in there yesterday. And we're getting the compaction on it. We'll start putting the wall up, probably mid next week, depending on when we get the concrete blocks in and pour the concrete following that. So it'll be -- it'll be nice little addition to the Austin park.

There are some -- some small ruts in the grass there from the heavy truck traffic both ways. We did put plywood and what we could down to try to -- try to keep that to a minimum, but

with the multiple loads and heavy hauling, it -- it did -- but 1 2 that'll be cut out and cleaned up as well. Just in case complaints come your guys' way, we will take care of it. 3 We're busy budgeting on some -- on some other projects 4 5 as -- as you guys just seen. This Hunewill bid just went out. And I think that the -- this Allen Road loop, we have some 6 other -- trying to think of the right word here -- developers 7 coming forward with additional money to supplement the county in 8 these projects. But they charge a thousand dollars. 29 Washoe County, (indiscernible), Carson City, their fees are usually 2,000, 2500.
