CHAIRMAN MILLS: Commissioners' reports on meetings, conferences, and seminars attended.

I guess we're excusing Judie at least for the -- part of the meeting today.

So I'll begin on that.

Last night we had our hospital board meeting. It was a good meeting. Lots of discussions about various items.

A lot of it is just going over the same old stuff: emergency health record, construction, and all those things that we've been talking about for quite some time and will continue to discuss for quite some time.

There was one item that came up that I would like to clarify. Apparently there's a rumor around town that we are taking two patient rooms and making it into a chapel at the hospital.

And people seem to be upset that we're taking patient care rooms and making a chapel out of it.

That's not what we're doing. The rooms that we're taking to build a chapel are not patient care. And if we didn't build a chapel out of it, they would just be two rooms that would not be really used for much of anything else. Because of the location in the hospital where they're at, they cannot be used for patient care.

So I just want to make that clear, get that on the public record --

The -- trying to squash some of the rumor stuff going around town.

And I think that's all I've got.

1 Sean? 2 COMMISSIONER BAKKER: Okay. I met with the -- the BLM at 3 the golf course yesterday. And they did their checklist and 4 survey of the land for purchase. And they started the process. 5 I gave Keith all the information. And we'll see where it 6 I mean -- but they are working on the process. goes from there. 7 And that's about all I got to report on. 8 CHAIRMAN MILLS: Patsy? 9 COMMISSIONER WAITS: Thank you. 10 On May 24th I did attend the Kingston board meeting. 11 Basically approved the budget. They're getting ready for 12 their big fundraiser in the first week in August, the first 13 Saturday, which, of course, is their big one for their fire 14 department. 15 And, actually, they did -- they did take in -- at the car 16 show in Austin, they had our new truck there and collected \$110, 17 which they gave to the Austin fire department because it was held 18 in Austin. So I thought that was kind of neat. 19 On 6/4 we had a chamber meeting. But there was no quorum, 20 so there was just discussion and taking a look at -- we do have 21 our new -- our new billboards for the trails. 22 highlighted a mountain bike rider for the trails on the 23 advertising. So there's three billboards, actually, that we did 24 through the convention and tourism authority on that. 25 that's kind of exciting to have those all done. 26 They were -- they were getting pretty old and -- and 27 getting pretty bad. 28 On 6/7 I had our national telephone conference that we do 29 monthly for the justice and public safety. Here we were so excited about it. 12 So we only have basically three board members with one gone most 13 of the time. 14 So that was very unfortunate. 15 But with that, happy flight day, everyone. 16 CHAIRMAN MILLS: Okay. 17 Art? 18 COMMISSIONER CLARK: Yeah. 19 June 1st I had a SLUAC meeting in -- in Ely. And we had a 20 lot of discussion about the R.S. 2477 roads. 21 A lot of counties are still struggling with this. 22 I checked with -- with our guys. And we're ready to get a 23 booklet together and send it in using the Nye County book as a 24 template, which seems to be the one that people are -- are 25 pushing. 26 We talked about county experiences with regulation of 27 marijuana dispensaries. It was pretty interesting conversation. 28 We had Sammy Real who is the pot guru out of Las Vegas. 29 I think -- I think the number was \$195 million worth of 30 marijuana sold in the first six months of legalization here. 31 lot, of tax money coming counties' ways. 32 But what they found out was that the marijuana dispensary 33 owners in -- in Las Vegas wanted a 24-hour -- be o- -- be able to 34 be open 24 hours a day because that cut down on crime. 35 Even the little bit of crime that was going on, having it 24 36 hours a day cut down on it. 37 We talked about the Department of Interior reorganization. 38 And it looks like very possibly that Zinke will be replaced by 39 Governor Sandoval. That's the conversation that -- that took

place.

STAFF REPORTS

 BLM's directive to streamline their -- their environmental impact and -- and their reports -- and it's a good rule because it cut down to 150 pages maximum on most. And then I think it's 250 pages on severe riparian areas.

There was discussion of -- and -- on the statewide military land withdrawal. That's something I never thought about, but if counties are dependent upon their PILT money and the government removes some of their public lands, that's going to cut their PILT money down.

So I don't think we're affected by that. I think it was Nye County that -- that had a problem with that and maybe Clark County because it -- it had to do with Nellis.

That -- that's what we talked about. CHAIRMAN MILLS: Okay. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN MILLS: Staff reports on meetings, conferences, and seminars attended.

KEITH WESTENGARD: Well, we -- we have -- most of the things are -- are on the agenda. But we do have our airport stuff on there for our fuel systems. That'll -- but that's on the agenda.

We've been -- I've been working with the weather people out of Elko to try to get the wind information set up for our -- the crosswind run- -- runway at the airport.

And it doesn't -- it's not looking real good to get that wind data in place. So we're probably going to have to go to the FAA and have a direct face-to-face meeting with them.

There's a real strong possibility we're going to lose that crosswind run- -- crosswind runway, 1230.

The data is just not there. We've gone back, actually, about 50 years. And it just -- they can't find it.

The other thing that's -- that's -- I think it's kind of big news is our HR starts Monday.

So with that, I think, like I say, everything else is on the agenda.

And it's finally been completed. 9 Kyla had Summit Engineering make a mylar map. 10 So it has a place for each of your signatures. 11 signed, we'll get it recorded, sent to the Department of 12 Transportation. 13 And we're on the road for our 2477 designations. 14 COMMISSIONER CLARK: Now, one thing that was talked about 15 at SLUAC concerning the 2477 roads was the five-year access. 16 If you can prove that a road has been active for five years, 17 that road must be opened. 18 Storey County took this to task up in the Virginia Highlands. 19 People moved up there. They were 2477 roads. They -- they deemed 20 it private property because they owned it. Storey County took it 21 on and they got a decision in federal court that if the 2477 goes 22 right through your property, it must be -- it must be open. 23 you have a fence, you need to take it down. 24 So this leads me to believe that North Fork being gated is 25 illegal. And, you know, we need to get that -- that fence down 26 and -- and the -- up at the top, the berm fixed. 27 KEITH WESTENGARD: Well, and we do have roads that come 28 into question of -- I'm sure Bert's pretty versed on the roads 29 or someone in his crew. So we'll be able to -- to show that if 30 needed. 31 So if -- if you will -- if you guys will approve this map --32 It's a big map. 33 But if you guys will approve it, we'll get the process 34 started for --35 CHAIRMAN MILLS: Set it up there. First of all, the pool. We appreciate your membership. There's 14 counties that are involved in the program. members are the center of what -- of what we do.

We have the liability programs as well as workers comp. We have the two different captives. We provide higher level of Because we're able to pool, we get more favorable coverage. Members are allowed to be involved in the claims management system. We have strict underwriting that maintains our financial stability and strength that we have. And we use, you know, actuarial studies to make sure that we're properly And the actuaries also assist in the rate -- the rate allocation:

But the main thing about our program is risk management We -- we have the backs -- we have the six different services that are provided to the members.

And -- and I'm very pleased that Lander County does take advantage of those.

We have loss control services, law enforcement, human resources, e-learning, health and wellness, and cybersecurity.

So we can end up being, if you will, helping assist being. your HR department and your training department and your safety department working with -- with the pool and our -- and our strategic partners, (indiscernible), to provide those services.

That program We have put a new emphasis on our e-learning. is available 24/7, 365. For those folks who are very busy, they can still get their training.

We brought in additional resources to -- to launch that And -- and four to five make it better than what it existing -- was currently existing.

You can make your own programs and have them customized for the individual counties.

Your HR representative is Mr. John Bates through POOL/PACT HR.

And we -- we ran a report in Lander County. And I'm -- I'm really pleased with this. Lander County has taken advantage -the financial value of the HR training and seminars and different things over the last of couple years, over \$77,000 of value if you were to pay for those trainings separately. is outstanding that you folks are involved in the program.

You know, by being more involved, taking advantage of these

programs, we mitigate the risk, which hopefully reduces the claims. You know, and if the claims continue to be reduced, then the premiums can be stable.

Included in your packets is an overview of the different levels of coverage that -- that is being provided. The cost, as the chair indicated, was 352,438.76.

There's an overview of the different types of programs and services that are being provided and a bunch of charts and graphs.

And I'd like to just quickly walk though some of those.

Your total program costs from 2002 to 2018, the average program costs have remained — had an increase over that period of time of less than 2 percent. So the pool has — in Lander County, specifically, has had a period of good rate stability.

All at the same time, your total insured values have went up significantly. Obviously, beautiful facilities like this. And those that you continue to build add to your insured value. And just like on your personal level, if you -- you buy a new car, you -- you get a new house, those add value to -- to your organization, your insurance rates associated with that go up.

But even in spite of that huge increase and total insured values, rate stability has been maintained.

There's a chart there that shows, you know, Lander County's payroll over that long period of time. And you can see that that's had an -- an upward movements.

And again, you know, your -- your premiums that you've paid have remained relatively flat.

As far as incurred claims in 2015, you had a -- had a large claims, but other than that, you know, your claims experience has been relatively healthy and that's due in part -- I would sug- -- suggest to being involved in the program and taking advantage of loss control services.

Your officer counts are down a little bit from the height of 2010. So that also affects the coverage.

And your autos and your vehicles that are scheduled, there was a slight increase in that.

We appreciate all the hard work of the folks out at the -- out at the county and those who take advantage of the programs.

We have a strategic planning retreat that's going to be held September 20th and 21st at Lake Tahoe. We would encourage you to send, you know, send a representative if you could, maybe send

TOM GRANSBERY: My name is Tom Gransbery, for the record. And I'm the owner of TFG Consulting.

I've been here at county part-time since about the middle of January. I was brought on to help Cindy with some training, some collection of revenue data in preparation for the FY '19 budget. And then I did some review of -- of the tentative and the final budget.

The data collection that I was looking at was primary revenue sources, property tax, net proceeds, CTX, and then motor vehicle fuel.

So I put together some historic data there. We reviewed it and looked at what the taxation was presented for this year and got those numbers in the budget.

And I want to say that Cin- --

FRANK WHITMAN: Austin here.

So I've been out to all 21 the mines in the state. 22 And I realize how important that property tax and net 23 proceeds is to the rural counties. I've seen the numbers and --24 and it's just what the -- the -- the rural counties need. 25 Then in 2001, I -- I went to local government finance. 26 And then the last 4 1/2 years, I was the supervisor of 27 local government finance. 28 And then I -- I went my own way in June of '13. 29 In 2014 I started working with different counties. 30 worked twice for Humboldt County. I have an ongoing contract with 31 Storey County. And then I was fortunate enough to have Lan- --32 Lander County pick me up for this spring and into the summer. 33 If we could step back a year ago when I was working for 34 Humboldt, they had some concerns on their declining general fund 35 ending fund balance. I think they were looking at three years of 36 decline and wanted to know what they could do. 37 So we've had -- I had discussions with the county manager, 38 the comptroller, on what -- you know, processes they could do 39 and -- and maybe to rectify that.

But when I look at their audit and looked at their ending

40

fund balance -- and last year, Humboldt County's ending fund balance was 17.3 -- I got to thinking, well, it has been on a decline, but that's still a pretty strong number. So this packet you have in front of you I actually did last year for Humboldt.

And when I went through it with Humboldt, at -- on one level, I think they felt a little bit better. That didn't, you know, rectify the declining ending fund balance. But they looked at how they were setting with other -- other counties.

So when I got here in January and started looking at your guys' audit, FY '17 audit, and seeing these huge numbers, I thought, you know, that I needed to do this again and present it to -- to you folks.

So on my first page here, I have it by alpha. And a little explanation on some of the counties that are missing. I didn't think it'd be a fair representation to include Clark and Washoe. They're major population places. Their economic bases are different from the rural counties.

On the bottom end, I removed Esmeralda, Lincoln, and Mineral. These are small populated counties. They're rural. They don't have a lot of mining. Esmeralda has the lithium pro- -- property, Mineral Ridge. But I -- I felt that they wouldn't be a good group to -- to include.

So what I have here is the 12 counties, a lot of them rural, but some of them semi-urban, if you will. And I thought that would be a -- a good idea for Humboldt last year and you folks this year to see how you sit with these, you know, urban kind of type counties.

So the first page there is the -- the 12 counties in alphabetical order.

So what I want to do with my analysis was look at common funds that -- that all these counties have. So there's the general, the road fund, and regional transportation funds. And then I picked three other funds that have common associations. You know, some of these counties have a -- a PILT fund. Some of them have a stabilization fund. So that was the reason I picked those other three, the in lieu of -- the PILT fund, reserve maintenance and replacement fund, and then the stabilization fund.

So if you go the second page of my presentation, I've started to sort these by largest to smallest.

So you can see, you -- Lander County's the top county there

with the 43.2 million.

And I could end my presentation right now and just say that most counties wish they were Lander County; right?

But there's some more information in these numbers that I'd like to go -- go through it.

You can see you're well ahead of the second county, Eureka. And then there's a -- kind of a cluster of three counties there, anywhere between 14 and 19. And then another one, you know, nine to twelve and then the bottom counties, if you will.

And, again, the -- the -- the general fund is driven by property tax; net proceeds for the rural mining counties; CTX, consolidated tax.

And so you can see how you sit with these twelve counties.

And in my tenure with taxation, I've never seen an ending fund balance like that in a rural county. So congratulations. And the numbers are just phenomenal.

If you go to the third page, it's the one I have sorted by road fund. And I thought that this would be an interesting one to look at.

Typically, the road fund gets four of the five motor vehicle fuel taxes. There's the one cent, the 1.25, the 1.75, and the 2.35.

But in my research, and as you guys know, I believe you put other revenue in there. It's just not the motor vehicle fuel that goes into the road fund.

So as you can see there, you're right up there with Eureka. Eureka, 7 million. You guys have 5.7.

And then when we go down below, we see some of those counties with, you know, not real strong ending fund balances. And I got to tell you, there — there — there could be several things happening there. For instance, like Carson with the 678,000, they could be spending all the money each year that comes in.

I think a -- a good analysis would to look -- to be -- looked into the spending patterns of these counties.

You know, some of these counties with millions of dollars could be saving up and then, you know, have a -- have a large project that would spend down that fund balance. So that could be the reason maybe for Churchill, Humboldt, and Pershing having those lower fund balances.

If you go, then, to the fourth sheet -- and I have it sorted by regional transportation -- again, couple things happening

Some counties are still levying the lower four cents. There's a range. You can either levy four to nine cent for that regional transportation. I believe you guys levy nine. two counties that are still at the four cents. That's Eureka and Storev.

But, again, there's other resources going into this fund too, similar to the road fund. So I think that there could be a -- a little analysis there and, again, the looking at the spending patterns. Is Churchill and Pershing with those lower ending fund balances, again, are they bringing in several millions of dollars each year, but they're spending it. And -- and -- and that could be a reason for their lower ending fund balance compared to the higher ones.

So I just kind of wanted to point that out.

So now I want -- I want to talk about the -- the remaining three: the PILT, the reserve replacement fund, and stabilization fund.

When I started doing this analysis, I thought most of the counties did have a PILT's fund. And I was kind of surprised to see that a lot of the counties that's get it and put it in the general fund or another fund.

But as you can see, there are three counties there that have a separate PILT fund.

And I know through my experience with Pershing, they put the money there, but there's a yearly transfer then into the general fund.

So they're -- they're tracking it in the separate fund. again, a -- a good piece of that money they get in each year goes back into the general fund.

Then the reserve and replacement fund, you're right up there I know Eureka, there's a -- a statute in 362 to kind with Eureka. of -- allows, then, for a reserve fund, if you will. So they put money in that fund. And then they can only get that out if there's been a decline of two years in succession with their net Then they could take money out of there.

So there's are -- there are some kind of limitations. But that isn't as -- the limitation in the stabilization fund -- as you can see, there are four counties there.

They can put that money in the stabilization fund, but getting it out is -- there's two ways to get it out. Natural disaster. Then the county could take money out of that stabilization fund. And then if they had a real down year and that their budgeted revenue for a general fund didn't match or didn't, you know, come to what was budgeted, then they would be allowed to take money out of that stabilization fund.

I believe you folks -- your 11 million in that reserve fund -- I think you had a reserve fund that has about a million point one. And then you have a replacement fund that has 10 million. And -- and if you compare that to the Eureka, again, I think your money is easie- -- easier accessed than that reserve fund that Eureka has.

Last year when I presented this to Humboldt, I also included capital projects. But I -- I didn't do it this year. But, again, if I did, you'd see your big numbers that you're well aware of. I think in that CCP fund you have over 35 million. So you guys are doing great.

You know, again, I've -- I've been doing this with the local governments going on 25 years now. And for a rural county, it's just amazing the money that you have accumulated.

My last page, then, there's these three blocks. And I thought this was interesting. This is a comparison of the ending fund balance for '16 compared to '17. You can see there's some increases, some decreases.

I sorted that, then, by the dollar increase. And I -- you guys were in the top there with an increase of 2.3 million.

Several other counties, though, Lyon and Storey, had nice dollar increase. And then the bottom box there, you can see that there -- I have it sorted by percentage.

And -- and at that point, Lyon and Storey had greater percentages of increasing net fund balance. But, again, you guys are -- an increase and just a real strong number.

So with that, if you have any questions, I'd sure like to try to answer them.

With discretionary -- would like to apply to the Building and Equipment Fund \$8 million and the CCP fund \$14,328,581.20 in the amounts of twenty-two thou- -- \$22,328,581.20 for a grand total of \$42,723,396.24.

Whereas the Lander County Board of Commissioners desires to use the discretionary net proceeds to fund Buildings and Equipment Fund 029 and Infrastructure Projects Fund 055.

And one of the big things that -- that this has to do with is the -- the distance between the three ball fields or the three areas where there's competitive sports going on, which as you can see in the first picture there, that those are the adult fields down there by the golf course. And then we have more ball fields on the next page up by the current recreational center. And then we have the area out by the skate park, which has ball fields in it.

So some of the concerns that -- that I've been hearing about go between -- people are going to all three fields to try to watch these different events going on with their kids.

And this has been a discussion that's been ongoing with -- with -- it -- it came through Lura. I've seen it here at the commission meeting with people coming forward about the condition of our fields and -- and some potential problems.

The next page sho- -- kind of shows if -- you can see the distances that some families are -- or some parents have to travel in order to get to these different ev- -- different sporting events.

So through a lot of discussion with Lura, discussion with some -- some members of the board -- Bert was part of it. It's -- it's been quite a big topic of discussion.

One of the things that -- and this is a big facility that I happened to find here on -- or helped bring up in your package.

This is a sports complex that's o- -- just off of I-5 in -- in southern Oregon. It's just an example for you to look at. But they've combined everything into one area. And the -- the aerial photograph there shows a series of ball fields. It shows a football field, which I know we don't need. And it -- it shows a soccer field.

The last page shows this one idea. And it's just an idea. It's just a suggestion of how we might build a sports complex.

And I'm talking about over by the --

COMMISSIONER CLARK: Junior high.

COMMISSIONER ALLAN: Lemaire school.

KEITH WESTENGARD: -- Lemaire school. Thank you. Over by the Lemaire school where the skate park is currently.

A suggestion or a thought or a topic of conversation was that we raze that and start from scratch with ball fields. It could be three, four. But we put everything in one place, the adult -- or the -- for the ball fields.

So softball, Little League, baseball, and so forth, with the concession stand in the middle.

We could put a soccer field out there with tennis courts out there.

And the thought would be to have artificial turf there so there's no maintenance or very little maintenance. There's no water usage.

The current fields we have by the rec center, we eliminate those. Maybe we put the ice skating rink there in -- in the future.

Ball fields at the -- in the south -- or, I mean, by the -- the golf course, we -- the top- -- topic of discussion was to maybe put a -- a -- a future water tank there.

And these are all just ideas to get thoughts and future input from this commission.

This is something that seems to be a topic within the community of how these families are having to go from here to there to here to there. And we get everything -- almost -- pretty close to having it in one place. Ball fields, soccer field, tennis courts in one place.

So now it's your discussion.

CHAIRMAN MILLS: I'll -- I'll start. First, I think it's a good idea to centralize all this stuff for the -- for the reasons you've stated.

And I also went on -- I went on Google Earth and started looking around in -- in different communities, just randomly looking around. And I'm surprised at how many places have something like this. And even pretty small communities have these -- these huge sports complexes. I was pretty surprised.

And I'm just -- I'm just randomly looking around on Google Earth at all -- different places across the U.S. And it's amazing. And there's some pretty -- I mean, everything from water parks to all kind -- it was amazing the stuff you could find.

Just looking down in Las Vegas, they have multiples of them.

So in a -- in a bigger -- bigger communities have a lot more capacity. I -- I certainly think it's a good -- it's a -- a good

But I do think it's something that -- that we definitely should investigate. And I'd love to have more of the Battle Mountain folks involved.

So I don't know whether we want to do an editorial or something to start getting some input and see if some people can at least meet a couple times and — and do some of the research or maybe even a survey with the school or something like that? Be — you know, it's little late this time of year. But we're not going to build it tomorrow anyway. So I think it's something that we definitely need more input in.

I love other people's visions.

PAULA TOMERA: Paula Tomera. Speaking from a parent who's had to run from ball field to ball field, it would be nice to have them all in one place.

My suggestion would be that maybe we have some public meetings at the civic center in the evenings over a course of however many months to get some input from the public. A lot of times people don't read *The Bugle*. And they don't get the agendas. And they don't really know what's going on. So maybe a couple of public meetings would be helpful.
