COMMISSIONER REPORTS

CHAIRMAN MILLS: Commissioner reports on meetings, conferences, and seminars attended.

Judie?

COMMISSIONER ALLAN: I have nothing to report.

CHAIRMAN MILLS: Okay. Here we go.

So the hospital board did a hospital retreat. We've been threatening to do one for four years and we finally got it done. And it was really good.

There was -- we had a -- we had several speakers come and talk to us. One was Gerald Ackerman. One was Joan Hall. And then we had a -- a guy named Kim Crandall come and facilitate our planning session for us. And it all turned out really well.

One of the things that we kind of st--- a couple of things we kind of stressed.

One is that as a critical access hospital in order to receive the federal assistance that we receive, we are supposed to be admitting 8 percent of our patients to the hospital unless for some reason we can justify why we're not doing that. But we're not getting very close to that 8 percent. So that leaves us some -- some room for improvement, things we need to do at the hospital to -- to work on.

One of the other things we talked about -- and I think -- I believe it's on the agenda today -- is for the hospital to facilitate a community paramedicine program. So we're -- we're looking into doing that also. So that's -- that'll be another neat program that the hospital will be involved in.

Our planning was good. We set some good goals for the -- the coming year. I was kind of hoping to do a five-year plan, but we got -- we got one year done. And we've got some neat

things on -- on the horizon for the hospital.

And I think that's all I've got.

Sean?

COMMISSIONER BAKKER: I don't have anything to report at this time.

Patsy?

COMMISSIONER WAITS: Thank you.

On August 24th, I did have our NACO meeting in Carson City. There's a couple things I wanted to share with you on that.

First of all, a reminder that our annual conference is November 13th to 15th. And the registration for early registration, I believe, is over with tomorrow. So if you haven't registered, you need to do that.

A couple things on our meeting that I did want to share. One is a presentation that we had from Mike Wilden. He's the chief of staff of -- of Governor Sandoval. And it was regarding the proposed increase for the 2019 increase to Medicaid assessments for all the different counties.

And Nevada chose to go with the Medicaid enhancement. Not all the states did. But with that, we dropped our uninsured down to, like, 14 percent, which is really, really good. For some of the states that did not go with the Medicaid enhancement, it's tremendously higher. But that does affect us personally in the county. So Cindy's on top of that, and we'll talk more about what's going on on that part.

Every other year we have our legislative year, of course. And NACO submits five bills for BDRs. And I'd like to share with you the concepts of those BDRs and what they decided to bring forth this year.

One is an expansion of the use of the 911 surcharge to cover audits of the 911 fee collection system to enable counties with populations under a hundred thousand to appoint members to our small districts and our GID boards. And this is where we have vacancies and ongoing and people aren't stepping up, and they're saying they're terming out. So we're -- we're trying to enable the counties to be able to handle that part.

The third is to enable county commissioners to authorize a two-thirds vote for the diesel fuel tax up to 5 cents to pay for the different county road maintenance.

To enable counties to create a 501(c)(3) for the limited

purpose of accepting donations for and providing support to victims in the event of a mass casualty event or any other type of emergency.

And an update to the primary election system in Nevada so that the primary is filed -- the candidates that file from only one party that the top two vote getters will automatically go to the general election.

The other one was an update on federal legislation and proposals regarding what they call small cell technology. And as the telecom companies modernize their cell network to the new 5G technology that we're all hearing about, local jurisdictions will need to address permitting and regulatory issues for this new infrastructure.

Actually, the federal government has some different policies that they're looking at that would preempt the counties from making those decisions. So NACO is on top of that so that we can actually have a say-so. And they're representing us there.

The other one was on the EMS, which is already on the $\ensuremath{\text{--}}$ the agenda for today.

On September 6th, I did have the Justice and Public Safety conference call.

And the -- September 4th, the Austin Chamber of Commerce, they did have their annual wine walk, which was very well received.

And then on 9/10, the airport board meeting was canceled. And I actually came up here and we went on the fire tour.

On 9/18 I attended the Eleventh District Court bench and bar luncheon. And the judge informed us of the new e-filing that they have for attorneys to make it so much easier. And they did a lot of discussion on how to improve the service for the attorneys and such.

And then on 9/21 we had our annual meeting for the Austin Chamber of Commerce. And our speaker was actually from Round Mountain Gold in the community service area. And she spoke about their commitment to \$445 million projects.

Thank you. That's all I have.

COMMISSIONER CLARK: I had a state lands advisory committee meeting that lasted longer than usual. In fact, we had to cancel the tours. And I could talk about a bunch of different

topics, but there were just a couple that I think that need to be spoken to.

We go around the table and we talk about the different counties and -- and what is the current topic of the counties. We got to Washoe County, and it was announced that within two years Washoe area down to Carson City will have a minimum of one million new residents.

Nye County is still fighting over losing PILT money because Fallon and the -- and the test -- the test site want to incorporate more of Nye County land in their training. And they lose their PILT money when they take away acreage. So that's still a concern.

Let me see.

When we talked about water, everyone agreed -- generally -- a general consensus, even out of Clark County -- that we don't have water. In the beginning of the water year, Lake Mead was down enough to trigger some kind of intervention, but none of the states attached to that watershed wanted to do anything for political --

(Cell phone ringing.)

COMMISSIONER CLARK: -- reasons. So they were waiting for the federal authorities to kick in their -- their restrictions, but that hasn't happened yet. They don't know where they're going to get the water for the one million people in the West and however many hundreds of thousands come into Clark County.

At the PLUAC meeting and in informal conversation, there was discussion about a fire -- ex- -- extending the volunteer fire company to outlying regions similar to what they do in Pine Valley. I think it's in Eureka. So I think that's on the agenda today. We'll talk more about that.

That's all I have.

CHAIRMAN MILLS: Okay. Thank you.

2 Our new ambulance, our first new ambulance, will be here in 3 about two weeks. Just a second. 8 First week of October will be National Fire Prevention 9 Week. So if you guys would like to see that, I'll get that to 10 11 I'd like to report that the Public Works went up to the Sheep 12 Creek Fire incident and got the fire truck out of the accident 13 site. We need to have our insurance company look at it, and then 14 I'll get it back to you with some estimates for repair on that. 15 There's a wild horse and burro meeting coming up October the 16 8th, 9th, and 10th in Salt Lake City if anybody's interested in 17 going. 18 And then the big topic, the R.S. 2477 road- -- roads, there's 19 a meeting on October 29th in Carson City. That seems to be a -- a 20 big, big topic right now. 21 We have some more work we need to do on our R.S. 2477 roads. 22 We had a meeting day before yesterday to decide the path we're 23 going to take in order to declare those roads R.S. 2477. 24 We've got the first step out of the way, when this commission 25 approved the -- the road map that we put forth to you. 26 COMMISSIONER CLARK: Just --27 KEITH WESTENGARD: So now --28 COMMISSIONER CLARK: -- a --29 KEITH WESTENGARD: -- we have --30 COMMISSIONER CLARK: -- a comment on that. 31 KEITH WESTENGARD: Yeah. 32 COMMISSIONER CLARK: At the state lands, I found out that 33 we're way ahead of almost every county, except Nye County, with 34 our 2477 roads, thanks to Kyle. 35 DISTRICT ATTORNEY HERRERA: And Churchill. Okay. Do we have somebody that's representing this group, concerned citizens against 2-A zoning -- or A-2 zoning?

SHIRLEY SHEPHERD: My name is Shirley Shepherd. And we've lived on 1985 Thomas Jefferson for 33 years.

And I'm here today to vote my -- to voice my objection to a marijuana grow facility to be placed at the top of our road in A-2 zoning. I'm also representing the signatures that are on the petition that was attached to our agenda item.

COMMISSIONER WAITS: The 39? SHIRLEY SHEPHERD: Okay.

I -- I want to make it clear that we never came forward and protested marijuana in our county when they first started talking about it. We figured the people voted it in and probably going to get it.

What we were not prepared for was our commissioners to change our zoning codes to fit it in our backyard.

NRS Statute 453A.350 states the facility should be located in a commercial or industrial zone or overlay. Which we understand the overlay was used to change this, but I feel like it was more a spot-zoning, which is granting to a particular parcel of land a classification concerning its use that differs from the classification of other land in the immediate area.

We purchased A-2 zoning because it fit our needs for having livestock and an arena. And we purchased it because A-2 zoning stipulates commercial use is limited to livestock, sales yards, dairies, and kennels when at least 500 feet from any district subject to issuance of a special-use --

(Cell phone ringing.)

SHIRLEY SHEPHERD: -- permit.

So we felt we were protected against having a commercial business in our neighborhood.

I'm o-- I'm opposed to the new ordinance allowing it to be grown in our district and feel that the procedure to get it changed was done without proper notification of all those it was going to effect.

An issue this important that is going to affect so many

should have been done with a public hearing where we all knew what was going on. And I don't believe that the hearing at a commissioners' meeting is the right place to do that for the community.

Under County Code of Ordinances 17.14.020, it states the planning commission should also hold a public meeting — public hearing describing the conditions of the special-use permit, the lot, parcel, or properties and other pertinent information.

And I -- that could have been done, but I don't remember hearing about a public hearing for the planning commission when they were going to -- when they saw this was on their agenda.

At the May 10th, 2018, commissioners' meeting, it made it clear to me that some of the commissioners were even uncertain of the fact that it was a public hearing.

Commissioner Herrera assured them it was. And then also at that meeting there was a discussion of the mileage, which was brought up that it's going to now be one mile from town and not more than ten, which immediately put it in our backyard.

And Commissioner Bakker said it was -- it will be close to town, but not in town.

And Mr. Herrera replied, yeah, because of the smell and everything else.

So we feel like they didn't want the smell here, but it was okay out by us. We're not -- we're not that remote.

The -- the County Ordinance 2018-02 to include the 8.46.010 Marijuana. It authorizes the county commissioners the ability to regulate business zoning and land use, but to ensure public health, safety, and welfare of the inhabitants of the unincorporated areas of the county.

And Paragraph 6 states the purpose of this chapter is to license and regulate cultivation facilities within the incorporated areas of the county to protect public interest over those of the marijuana business.

And this would be our interest, our quality of life, and the devaluation of our properties that we have worked on for years.

A big concern is not knowing how this will impact us. You can say whatever you want about all the strict codes and stuff, but are they going to be enforced? Do you have the people to enforce them?

Okay.

 And -- and some of our concerns, fire protections, they're classified under the internal building code as an F-1 occupancy, which is factory, industrial, moderate hazard. And that's fire concerns.

We don't have any fire protection out there. I mean, you know, if we had a firehouse out there in Hill Top or something, it would be a little bit more safe, but we don't.

And -- and the plumbing. Some grow rooms are required to have floor drains to remove spilled water and nutrient solutions. And if they don't have black -- backflow preventers, then the domestic water wells can be contaminated.

And we understand that the people that wanted to put it up on our road, they can't — they found out they can't use the existing well, and they would have to transport this water in. This is a traffic issue on the same road that we walk on, ride our horses on, and have our children play on. And our road is a dead-end road.

Electrical lease facilities have a huge electrical demand. Overloading wiring can cause fires. High intensity grow lamps -- grow lamps can reach a surface temperature of 500 degrees. So that's another fire hazard.

And we all know marijuana is still illegal under federal law. And most banks won't handle marijuana-related money so it -- it forces a cash business. And this is a security risk, which puts the higher security risk in our neighborhood.

And these are all issues. I know it can be addressed by the pro-growers. And they're going to assure me that they've all been worked out. And that's fine. But I just don't feel that in any situation do these concerns belong in a residential area.

A commercial and industrial, perfect. Okay.

And -- and I just feel that maybe the approval of the marijuana growing and -- I -- I just -- I think that maybe they approved the marijuana and then the growing of it before they had a safe place to put it. And that's why you have the result.

And I -- I just don't think that's fair for us.

So we're here today with the hopes that you stand by your appointed planning commission board that listened to our concerns and agreed that it should not be put in A-2.

Most of them have jobs so they're not here to support it today. But -- but we did fill the planning commission meeting

The other thing is, how would you like it if it was in your backyard? Try it. It is -- it isn't usable.

I mean, you can't say it's all right for one person to have a business and the other ones not.

CHAIRMAN MILLS: Okay.

MARIAN PORTER: It's plain as day.

It's up to you to look at it and say, how many years did you refuse commercial out there? And then all of a sudden now this is all right.

Thank you.

CHAIRMAN MILLS: Thank you.

COMMISSIONER ALLAN: Thank you, --

COMMISSIONER WAITS: Thank you.

COMMISSIONER ALLAN: -- Mary.

However, the reason that we had to do the overlay I will let our counselor explain to you. And the comment was made, perhaps it should have done the location first before the commissioners. But, actually, it had to come before us to know if we were going to allow anything in the county. So we didn't really do it backwards. But we do understand how it got caught in the middle.

So I would like Ted to explain on why we had to do the overlay and the $\ensuremath{\mathsf{--}}$

COMMISSIONER WAITS: -- information.

DISTRICT ATTORNEY HERRERA: When -- when I started doing this, I was in contact with the Department of Taxation who -- who runs this on the state level.

And one of the things that I was informed that the administration department and -- and the county commissioners, they didn't necessarily want it right downtown. And that's why the one-mile to ten-mile buffer zone.

Now, we're not changing the characteristic of any zoning. What we're doing is when three parcels are picked and approved by the planning commission and/or the county commissioners, an overlay — commercial overlay would be put on those three parcels. So the only three parcels that would be affected would be the three overlay parcels. And we put A-2, A-3, and to put the overlay on. And that was the recommendation of the Department of Taxation.

If we -- because we are making it harder than the state law. Under the state laws, they could have gone into any of these empty warehouses downtown and -- and put it up. And we didn't want that.

We did not contemplate, we did not anticipate, and we -- we strongly recommended to all applicants that they do not put it near a residential area. Did not want that. We did not contemplate that.

And in my opinion the planning commission did their job. They turned it down in a residential area.

Now the -- the applicant at first was going to appeal it to this board. And I believe that's why the concerned citizens wanted to come and make sure that the county commissioners followed the recommendation of the planning commission and say, no, we don't want it near a residential area.

And that -- that appeal to -- it's my understanding that appeal is not taking place now.

So there are no A-2 parcels of land that is up for consideration.

Right now, there are -- one has been approved by the planning commission with no appeal. That's an A-3 zone by Allen Road.

One has been approved -- a -- a second one has been approved by the planning commission over there that may be appealed to --

to ask the county commissioners to put a setback.

The reason it's done originally by a special-use permit is that allows the planning commission and/or the county commissioners to set any -- any type of conditions they want on it, such as a setback from the nearest landowner, whatever condition they want. So that's why it's originally set as a special-use permit.

But right now A-2 is off the board as far as consideration for these three parcels. They're -- all three of them are over on A-3. And what will happen if they're approved, the overlay -- commercial overlay goes over that one piece of property.

And it'll say in the ordinance that -- that we have three overlays in -- in -- in Lander County that allow this to happen.

So I agree with the concerned citizens. It was not -- in that it was not contemplated to be put in a residential area. COMMISSIONER CLARK: Yes.

DISTRICT ATTORNEY HERRERA: I 100 percent agree with that.

And it shouldn't be. And the planning commission did their job.

Thi- --this is all good. The process is working. The one we put in place is working for the benefit of Lander County. If too many residences or people that live in a residential area have a problem with it, they went to the planning commission. The planning commission said, no, not here.

The only issue is location right now. And I can understand. And it's a process.

So it's working in my opinion.

I'm -- I'm sorry that the concerned citizens felt let down in any way by the county. That wasn't -- that wasn't what we wanted to do. It wasn't what we tried to do. And the process is working.

Thank you.

Our hydrologist feels he's on schedule as far as getting the CLOMR work complete to go into FEMA.

He's going to also have to make those adjustments based on our alignment changes. But that's basically our plan.

I believe we can still be under construction by next July if everything falls in place for us and we don't stub our toe with governmental reviews.

We're probably facing going to the Army Corps at least for a 408 permit because we're looking at crossing the existing levee.

We'll probably also have a flood wall that's going to encroach into it when we have to get underneath the railroad and also the freeway. So both of those items may be jurisdictional still.

With our current alignment, we're hoping to avoid a individual 40- -- 404 permit for wetlands and hoping we can go nationwide. But that will all depend upon if this latest al- -- alignment works.

Our last alignment, we're about 4 1/2 acres of wetlands we were hitting with the levee, which would have required an individual permit. So --

Anyway.

With the map here -- woops -- upside down.

COMMISSIONER WAITS: That helps.

CLINT THIESSE: So on the map here, the orange is the existing levee that the Army Corps built.

If you look at the magenta line, which is dashed with our blue there, because we aren't changing anything so- -- south of Interstate 80, that magenta line was the last alignment you saw that we had been -- preceding.

We did the wetlands. Here's the large area of wetland area that that would be touching.

We also had some areas up by Front Street and at the railroad. So our current -- and I've already discussed this with NDOT -- will be to come down, avoid this wetland and some power poles in this area and actually use a piece of Front Street as a -- as the levee system.

And NDOT is amenable to that so -- at least District -- District 3 office was. So -- we haven't made it to headquarters yet.

And then we cross the railroad where currently the culverts

1 are. 2 And when we get down to Muleshoe, that's where our major 3 wetland issue starts. So we look at utilizing a small piece of 4 Muleshoe, crossing the existing levee, and then continuing the new 5 levee on the current dry side of the levee so we can avoid all 6 those wetland areas. 7 So, you know, our -- our flood walls will be at Interstate 80 8 in order to get that western-most culvert and then also at the 9 railroad so we utilize all the existing facilities because those 10 two facilities we don't want to have to touch. 11 So --12 So question, when you -- when the levee CHAIRMAN MILLS: 13 runs alongside the existing levee, is that actually going to 14 be -- they're going to side by side or are they going to be 15 intermingled in the wood? 16 CLINT THIESSE: They'll -- they'll be side by side. 17 CHAIRMAN MILLS: So --18 CLINT THIESSE: We want --19 CHAIRMAN MILLS: -- so there's going to be, like, a culvert 20 between them? 21 CLINT THIESSE: Yep. JON SHERVE: Good morning, commissioners. My name is John Sherve. I'm the field manager for the Mount Lewis Field Office for the Battle Mountain District.

I believe in your package you have a copy of the Mill Creek Campground enhancement plan.

So I'm just going to touch on a -- a few key points on that, a little background on what we're done, and then any questions you might have.

I think overall, though, we've provided this to the commissioners to get some public input on any- -- anything that they'd like to add or maybe not be part -- have part of this campground.

So back -- a brief background. There was -- June of 2017 was the Mill Creek Fire. It burned over 400 acres, about half public, half private land. It's in the -- the checkerboard.

Since that time, we've gone through an envir- -- an emergency stabilization, rehabilitation plan for the campground.

We've done about 160 acres of seeding. And a lot of this is only -- we can only spend federal funds on public land.

We've seeded about 160 acres. We've gone through a -- a couple efforts of hazardous tree removal. We've put a fence around the campground. There's been some stream bank stabilization. There have been about a thousand seedlings, both sagebrush and bitterbrush planted. And we continue to spray for noxious weeds. And we've done some minor road regrade and realignment. That's what we've done about the last year.

There's still a little more ES&R work to do, but we want to transition into a -- rebuilding the site and expanding it as well.

Some of the key points that we want to do with the expansion are -- if you go to your -- in your handout there, the, the very last page is a map. And there's a pink line and a pink polygon. About half of that is the north -- northeastern part of that polygon would be the existing campground and then the southwestern portion is the part that we want to expand. And that very southern part is a private boundary. So we will expand as far as we can up to there.

And part -- also part of the expansion, we want to work in some trails to tie into the existing OH- -- Shoshone OHV trail system. So on that same map or the -- the map, the page before, you can see the -- the smaller, the -- and the newer expanding campground up on the top in Section 26. And then it's got three trails leading to the blue route there. Those would be all new trails originating in the campground area. Then both going up to the -- meet that one blue route. And then that blue route will tie into existing OHV trail systems. So I think that'll be a good enhancement, nice feature to the -- to the campground.

We're also looking at expanding in that newer area. We're not proposing any new campsites, but that new expanded area to use for like a walking trail -- interpretive walking trail.

And then -- and those are -- those are the main features. We've got, you know, some more plantings that we -- plantings that we've got planned. But, overall, this is a brief proposal to the county, get your input on -- on the direction.

We will need to go through a NEPA effort. So there'll be additional opportunity for public comments when that environmental assessment is issued to the public.

Discussion and possible action regarding the formation of a rural fire -- a rural fire company for the purpose of strategically placing fire equipment on local ranches within Lander County and whether to include this in the Lander County Code Chapter 9.28, County Fire Department ordinance, and all other matters properly related thereto.

COMMISSIONER CLARK: I asked this for this to be put on the agenda because of an informal conversation that took place, after the last PLUAC meeting, with Dan. And I think it's a pretty darn good idea.

So do you want to explain to the board how -- how it works over there?

DAN TOMERA: Sure. Dan Tomera, for the record.

I want to start out by saying that I'm not in - suggesting another department or something.

I don't want to take away from what the volunteers are doing, what the BLM's doing, and what NDF is doing. This would be a supplement to that, to them.

Just -- like Art said -- just kind of in real casual conversation, we've been kicking around the idea of if there could be a fire engine, brush truck stationed, say, like at our ranch, which is south of town about eight miles, possibly, like, Filippini's place, maybe somewhere out in the valley wi- -- with one of the farmers, maybe somebody up towards Austin.

There would be the potential that an engine would be closer to the fire if -- if one did arise on -- be it brush fire, wildland fire, or structure, hay stack fires, whatever it was.

And it's -- I'm -- this is very preliminary. I have no information to share with you guys, not really much knowledge.

But I thought it would be something that would be valuable for the -- for the community.

You know, I'm sure there's going to be expenses involved. But, you know, the tax base for not only agriculture, ranching and farming, but also wildlife habitat, you know, when -- when these fires come through and they're a hundred thousand acres, your -- your native grass species are -- are burned out and cheatgrass comes in.

You know, so your wildlife habitat, your recreation, whether it's four-wheeling or -- or hunting. You know, when there's no habitat for wildlife, there's no wildlife. So --

CHAIRMAN MILLS: I heard something about this, it's possibly a state-funded program? Is that correct?

DAN TOMERA: I don't know.

CHAIRMAN MILLS: Okay.

DAN TOMERA: Like I said, I don't -- I don't really -- I have not really looked into this on -- at a formal capacity. This is very preliminary.

You're -- basically you're hired 26 equipment is what it is, but provided with a piece of fire 27 equipment. 28 And the state will come in or -- or BLM.
