COMMISSIONER REPORTS

CHAIRMAN MILLS: Commissioners' reports on meetings, conferences, and seminars attend.

Judie?

COMMISSIONER ALLAN: So I attended a -- a LEPC meeting Tuesday night. And really not a whole lot of importance. We're talking about doing a tabletop exercise possibly the November meeting, which is the second Tuesday of the month.

And this will be just mock scenario of a hazardous incident. And I guess the reason I mention that is if anyone would like to attend that, that it's 5:30, Tuesday -- second Tuesday of November, whatever day that is. And anybody's welcome to attend any of the LEPC meetings.

But it's -- it's kind of inter- -- interesting because you do, like I say, have mock hazardous incidences and how we react, how we -- you know, the procedures that -- that you need to follow. So --

So that's kind of all we have -- all I have for that.

CHAIRMAN MILLS: Okay. I don't have anything.

COMMISSIONER BAKKER: I don't --

CHAIRMAN MILLS: Sean?

COMMISSIONER BAKKER: -- have anything.

CHAIRMAN MILLS: Patsy?

COMMISSIONER WAITS: I do. Thank you.

On the 28th of September, I did have the NACO meeting. And there are a couple things I'd like to share with you on that.

We actually had representatives from both of our coalitions on $-\!\!-$ on our ballot Question Number 3 on the energy choice in- $-\!\!-$ initiative. Very interesting. Of course we'll be discussing that as it comes up.

But NACO did not take any action at all. We had mixed --mixed feelings, of course, even after it was over. Although I think some decisions were made. But we did not want to take that on as a NACO since it was -- it was too many one way and another on that one.

Actually, our Supreme Court Justice Hardesty was there. And

he was filling us in on the supreme court's committee to study evidence-based pretrial release.

And for those of you that aren't familiar with that, they did put a committee together and developed a pretrial risk assessment tool for our judges. And using that, they actually will give them an idea of whether they can be released on their own recognizance instead of those that should have been released that we're still holding in jail.

So the tool has been tried out in three different counties right now as pilot programs. But they're real excited about it.

NACO was in full support. However, we wanted the court to provide the leniency to the different counties regarding the implementation and how they're gathering the additional information because it -- de- -- depending on each county and -- and what their workload is, it could mean another person if they have to go into that much detail.

But it's on the supreme court website if you want to check that.

They very well could make it mandatory for all counties if it becomes that successful because of the -- they think that the offset with the cost is still okay because we're not keeping them in our jails and it's costing us all that money.

So that was -- that was a very interesting one.

On the Austin Airport board meeting we had on October 8th, I -- I look at this similar to our veterans statue.

Do you remember when we ordered that and we couldn't find it? It was lost somewhere. And -- and -- and we -- we waited for months to find the statute.

Well, I feel the same way about our jet fuel tank. But -- but we found it. Actually, it's in Idaho.

KEITH WESTENGARD: Do you want --

COMMISSIONER WAITS: And now we're -- we're just told that -- that they are doing all the -- their work on it. And they're welding everything. And that should be released to us hopefully in a week or so. Because they have a lot of the others on. But that did delay it a little bit more than what they expected to.

Chris Baird, who is the program manager for REACH Air Medical Services, was also there with us and was bringing some information on the type of service that we're using and the frequency of

service and the possibility of perhaps putting some kind of an airplane in Austin, not necessarily for just the Austin group, but to service Tonopah and White Pine and whatever. Although they do have one in White Pine right now, but Eureka and maybe some that aren't being serviced. So --

And, of course, we're looking at hangars, naturally. So that's -- that's online too.

So that was nice to have him on board and just kind of get general information on what they're looking for.

We also voted on the new advisory person on the board. And that's on our agenda as we're forwarding that to you.

I also attended the school board meeting here on the 9th. And we have not had representation in the south for a bit. And we found a lady who said she would love to do it, a retired school teacher, actually has been in Kingston for a few years. And she stepped up and -- and put her résumé in and her application. And looks like they will be voting on that next month.

They do have to advertise it if anybody else in southern Lander County wants to apply.

But we've been -- we've been trying to recruit for people for months and months and months. So the good news is at least we will have it filled.

And that's all I have. Thank you.

COMMISSIONER CLARK: I had a PLUAC meeting on October 1st.

Ken Brown called in. He's our representative for Western Counties Alliance.

There are two important things that Ken apprised us of.

Number one, we'll get \$1,240,000 in PILT money this year. We got an increase.

And we -- we -- we kind of knew this, but Ken confirmed it, that the Cortez area is the number one area of interest in gold exploration in the world. So that's looking pretty good over there.

October 21st, at the Cookhouse, they're having a celebration for the railroad.

That's all I have.

I'd like to elaborate a little bit more on the fuel situation in Austin.

My understanding is it'll be here next week. And -- and I missed it. You said that -- is that what they told you, Commissioner?

Okay. So --

Yeah. There was a little hold up. But it is -- it is being completed.

So both those projects are moving along. They were delayed slightly.

Taxiway C's still on track here in Battle Mountain to be completed. I believe they were out painting this m- -- or -- this week. So that's close to being done.

What we're -- what I've been working on with J-U-B and the FAA, the federal government put out an additional \$1 billion for airports -- small airports.

Being one -- our -- our airport's qualified. So we're looking at several -- several projects for Battle Mountain and -- as well as Austin. And the hangar was one of them for the air med helicopter or air transport service.

This is a 100 percent grant. It's no matching. So if they -- we do get the grants -- we put in for three of them -- if we do get them, they will be 100 percent. We're not going to put any -- the county has to put no money out for those.

The sage grouse report is finally getting close to being published, the final sage grouse report. As soon as I get it, I'll -- I'll forward it to each of you.

Our new ambulance was pushed back about two weeks. So we're looking at the first week in November to get the -- our first new ambulance.

There was -- it had something to do with lighting. And they

wanted to make sure they -- that they got it right.

We ran into a little hiccup with the R.S. 2477 roads. And we continue to work on that. I've talked with Ted about it. And we're working with DOT and Kyla. And we're -- we're going to try to get those -- that process in place and finalized here very shortly.

Winnepenninkx and Gary Sweeney. They went and looked at the roof

at the youth center.

They did -- this statement came on September 21st of '18.

It says, I inspected the roof on the youth center with general contractor Gary Sweeney.

The roof is 79 feet long and about 20 feet -- 28 feet wide with a bell tower and a bell at the west end of the building, adjoining the west end parapet wall.

The roof is made up of 2 \times 6 rafters at the east end of the building and log rafter beams at the west end.

The rafters are spaced approximately 4 feet apart. The rafters are covered with one-inch board that are spaced about 4 inches apart. These boards are covered with wood shingles, which are covered with a very old 2-foot wide, rusted metal panels.

The metal panels are then covered with -- which are covered -- I'm sorry -- with a layer of plywood, which is covered by three-tab asphalt shingles on the north slope and rolled asphalt on the south slope.

The roof assembly is setting on top of a rock wall about 12 to 16 inches thick on the south slope. The roof assembly is setting on top of a rock -- sorry -- on the west end and the north side of the building, there is another wall inside of the outer wall. The length of the interior wall is not known.

There is an -- sorry -- there is an old doorway on the north side where the wall juts out another 8 inches from the other end. This feature makes the building wider on the east end.

The roof assembly is setting on top of 1 \times 8-inch plank setting on top of a rock wall. The wall slopes inside toward the outside of the building.

It appears that the roof assembly is not anchored to the 1 \times 8 rock wall. The roof is merely sitting on the wall.

The east end, which is 2 X 6 rafters, was, in the distant past, subject to a building fire. The rafters and all support members are charred significantly.

The majority of the rock wall is in fact made of flat rock cemented together. The top of the wall is eroded and very jagged and is out of the level about 5 inches from one end of the building to the other.

Part of the south side roof is sloped toward and attached

to the other building. There is a very -- a valley constructed between the two buildings to prevent rain from running off of the youth center in a -- and the adjoining building.

There is a dirt bank on the south side of the youth center that slopes toward the building. Any runoff of rain or snow flows to the wall of the youth center.

The youth center building has been modified many times in the past with modern materials added onto it or replacing the original construction material.

In order to keep the roof assembly leak-free, the entire roof structure would need to be removed. A cement cap would need to be poured on top of the wall and new trusses anchored to the wall. However, there is no cost-effective way to do this. The process would be feasible if the walls were made out of concrete or wood.

Trying to drill into the rock would cause shattering of the rock, making the walls even weaker than they currently are.

In its current condition any attempt to set trusses on the wall would result in a custom fitting each truss.

The only historic value of the building is the bell tower and the bell. The building has been modified so many times in its history that the original structure no longer exists.

My recommendation would be $\--$ would be to remove the bell tower and the bell for preservation.

Demolition of the existing building thus preserving the adjoining building to the south.

I would also recommend that the new building be constructed on-site. The building should be built with materials not significantly different from the surrounding buildings.

The cost of trying to preserve the existing building would be cost-prohibitive and not real historic value -- or of real historic value.

FRANK WHITMAN: Well, several items that come to my mind. One is, you know, I -- you know I wrote that history book of Austin. And my -- my indication is that building is pre-1864.

I think you may have some stuff saying it's much later, like 1878. It's one of the very early original buildings.

And that -- and that comes to it.

It has historical significance. And any -- any old building like that that you just tear down on Main Street, again, you know, leaves a blank spot in our Main Street as well as a blank spot in our history.

I realize it is expensive to repair something like that or to bring it to code. But I don't think it's in--- insurmountable to do so.

I say that because all the old buildings here, you know -- nothing -- nothing every quite fits right. But we can make it work and make it work right. It just won't be modern code.

That's -- there's just no way you can do that with -- as Mr. Winnepenninkx stated in his -- you know, in the rock wall is to -- to anchor the roof that way.

I am also concerned, though, if you do tear it down or if you want to -- where -- where would the new youth center go?

Would you -- you know, the property on either side would be -- it wouldn't work. You'd have to have a -- for example, a -- under the current code you'd have to have it 10 foot between the buildings. That puts it out into the Marshall's parking lot. And so -- so that location is gone. That's for sure.

I'm concerned about what's going to happen to the tower and the bell tower. The bell is significant. On New Year's Eve, it's still a common practice for all three of Austin's original bells to get rang. That is the Episcopal Church, the Catholic Church, and the bell tower for the old fire station there.

I hate to see that tradition somehow circumvented. It's -- it's just part of the fun of living here.

1 And that's all I have at the moment. 2 I'm -- I probably will interject a little later some more 3 ideas. 4 So, Dessie, do you have something to say? Or --5 DESSIE SKEATH: Not really. I'd just like to -- to see 6 whoever made up that letter there to meet other people from 7 Austin in the building instead of just coming up here and 8 walking through the building and making up their own 9 recommendations. 10 That guy read there for an hour of problems that's wrong 11 with the building. I don't really see a lot of those problems 12 wrong with the building. 13 But the number one is it's an old firehouse. It never caught 14 fire. 15 Those shingles have been on there 36 years. And I don't know 16 what -- how long that building has been sitting on that wall. 17 That was an old firehouse, probably back in the '30s, still 18 sitting on the wall, never faltered yet. 19 So I'm just curious how do they come up with all these 20 recommendations, other than they have 200,000 sitting there in 21 their hip pocket just eating a hole. That's it. 22 FRANK WHITMAN: I would also like to add is have we got the 23 state in here to take a look for any solutions besides having to 24 tear it down? 25 You know, there may be a solution besides default means tear 26 it down. And, again, I think the state preservation folks, you know, when I've talked to them, are -- will tell you don't -- if 27 28 -- if -- if at all possible, don't tear down these old buildings. 29 Rehab them. In the long run it does better for the community. 30 And in the long run it also comes out cheaper. I say cheaper, 31 because what it can bring, you know, on a -- in, you know, in a 32 neighborhood like that for Austin. And Austin doesn't have a lot 33 going for it except its history. 34 And that's it for now. Thank you. 35 COMMISSIONER BAKKER: Okav. 36 Well, that really cleared everything up, Frank. CHAIRMAN MILLS: Is that -- is that building on the 37 38 historical registry at all? Or is it even considered --39 ANNA PENOLA: Do you know, --40 CHAIRMAN MILLS: -- for that?

Well, if we try to move forward and say, okay, no, you have more than a year, however the cost is going to be, you find out it'll take you this long to pay for it, then we move forward instead of regressing. Because you have big businesses like McDonald's or a hotel come in and you have them in a dirt parking lot?

That -- that -- that's not very good for our economy because you have a dirt town, and it looks ridiculous.

So I would suggest not going backwards, going forward, but doing it in steps that it is fair to these businesses that it's going to impact.

COMMISSIONER BAKKER: And I agree. And I was thinking -- CHAIRMAN MILLS: Understood.

COMMISSIONER BAKKER: -- something long like a three- to five-year plan. You -- you get a cost of what it's going to cost you.

We -- first we got to get a tally of how many business and contact them.

So those are just some of my comments.

COMMISSIONER ALLAN: I think something else that these businesses have to consider is, you know, certainly if we follow the ordinance requires them to pave their parking lots.

And I don't see any change between the two. 16 KEITH WESTENGARD: That's important. 17 UNDERSHERIFF ROBERT QUICK: So what we're -- what we're 18 looking for for the sheriff's office after many discussion with 19 Casey and so forth was that it potentially could be cheaper if 20 we, as the county, purchased some of the equipment for this 21 project ourselves and it'd be a cost savings to the county. 22 And then Casey said that the United Construction would be 23 willing to, then, provide us a credit memo back to the county 24 for the costs that we paid for that equipment, which then saves 25 us money, you know, potentially thousands of dollars depending 26 on the equipment. 27 COMMISSIONER WAITS: Is this versus renting it? 28 UNDERSHERIFF ROBERT QUICK: No, versus their vendors --29 COMMISSIONER WAITS: Using theirs --30 UNDERSHERIFF ROBERT QUICK: -- purchasing --31 COMMISSIONER WAITS: -- and they're charging us. 32 UNDERSHERIFF ROBERT QUICK: No. Using their vendor to 33 purchase that piece of equipment and then upcharging it from 34 there. 35 COMMISSIONER ALLAN: Because they get a 5 percent profit --36 UNDERSHERIFF ROBERT QUICK: So --37 COMMISSIONER ALLAN: -- on --38 UNDERSHERIFF ROBERT QUICK: -- it's -- and -- and it's not 39 going to be all equipment used or -- not rather used, but not 40 all equipment purchased. It's just going to be several items

that Casey and I would agree upon and the -- their particular vendor agree upon. The first one being if we do this portion of a generator replacement for the sheriff's office would be the generator, saving quite a few thousands of dollars for the county to purchase it, because we have to maintain it and the warranty anyway.

But I was looking for some language in the contract that allows for that credit memo back to the county, because I still have to use the same line item to pay for it because I don't have that money to pay for it. So that's what I — the language I was looking for in the contract. And I didn't see it in the draft. And I still don't see it in this one.

COMMISSIONER WAITS: Okay. I have a couple questions on it. And I -- I know that the time is certainly of the essence on this one. It says they're going to begin work -- what? -- seven days after we sign the contract?

UNDERSHERIFF ROBERT QUICK: Well, it's -- it's to the point now that, if my understanding from Casey's correct, it's a little late to start stucco.

But the other portions of the $\--$ the repairs and so forth we can do over the winter months.

COMMISSIONER WAITS: Okay.

My name's Dave Chase. 8 I'm the campaign manager for Yes on Question 3. 9 If you guys haven't had a chance to -- to read the ballot --10 I should have rapidly sent around -- hopefully you get a chance to 11 take a look it. 12 But it's really quite simple. What it does is enshrine in 13 Nevada's constitution the right for every Nevadan to have 14 meaningful choice in their electric provider. And it requires the 15 legislature to enact by 2023 laws to enact that competitive energy 16 marketplace. 17 So just by way of background, the way our energy market is 18 structured right now is essentially the same way that our energy 19 market has been structured for the last hundred years. 20 NV Energy is a monopoly. They control not only the poles 21 and wires but the generation of electric power. 22 There are a few other providers in -- in a number of 23 counties, a number of rural co-ops who have sort of the same 24 authority. It's under the same statutes. But essentially you 25 have no choice for electric generation here in -- in Nevada. You 26 use whoever the service provide in your -- your area is. 27 What energy choice would do, it would maintain those same 28 service providers for the poles and wires so that the actual infrastructure of the grid wouldn't change. But the generation 29 30 of that power would be put into a competitive marketplace. 31 So retail providers would be able to attract customers by 32 offering better deals, better prices, better structures. 33 In virtually every state that has enacted energy choice, 34 we've seen prices go down. 35 In fact, if you look over the 2008 -- '07-'15 period,

It's basic economics. Competition will lower the prices. So that's the -- the gist of the -- the initiative.

percent while states with monopolies saw their prices go up 5

We think it's a -- a great thing. It's the right choice for Nevadans.

The (indiscernible) was 72 percent in 2016. Obviously that's passed again since this constitutional amendment. I guess that's sort of the overview.

Nilla said that you guys wanted to ask questions. I don't know if there's any specific topics you guys want -- want me to cover. Happy to -- happy to do that.

CHAIRMAN MILLS: Okay.

COMMISSIONER CLARK: Yeah. I -- I have a question.

I heard --

DAVE CHASE: (Indiscernible.)

COMMISSIONER CLARK: -- that -- that the reason this is coming forward is because the casinos in Las Vegas are pushing this issue because they can buy large quantities of cheap electricity. So therefore the casinos will get a break, but the other residents and small businesses are going to get two bills: one for transmission and one from electric services. So I don't see how this is a benefit for Nevada.

It's been working. It's been working fine. Why do you want to break it?

DAVE CHASE: Sure.

So there's -- there's a couple of pieces to that.

First, under Nevada law today, large energy users are able to already leave NV Energy and purchase electricity on the wholesale market. That -- that's essentially the large casinos, some of the mining operations, et cetera.

Eighty-five percent of those that are eligible to leave have either already left or filed to leave.

So the idea that energy choice is only benefiting the big customers is a little crazy since all the big customers have already left. There's that piece.

In terms of the two bills -- so the way it works, the poles and wires will stay with either NV Energy or the -- the co-op in your area. The price that they charge for -- let's call it a transmission fee -- transmission distribution fee, that's already built into your bill today. That's federally regulated. That price doesn't change. So you already pay that amount. Yes, it'll be a different line item under energy choice, but it's -- it's no more money. Right? Like that is -- that is federally regulated

based on the entire cost of the grid and the structure. So that really doesn't cost anything different.

The difference is, is you, as a consumer, can say, hey, I'm not happy with the -- the term of my bill. I'm not happy with the cost of my bill. Let me see if I can find a cheaper deal.

If you look at the state of Texas whose done this very successfully, they have a website that you can actually go to right now. It's powertochoose.org. Enter your zip code. Comes up with all of the different plans, you know, that you -- you might be -- might be eligible for.

And so those plans range from, you know, plans that will lock your price in for five years. They range from plans that let you do -- you know, if you're a nomad like me, you might want month-to-month. You might want a three-month lea- -- contract. You can do all of those things.

There's actually a plan out there that gives you free nights and weekends for your energy. So you sign up for that plan, do all your laundry, do, you know, any sort of large energy use on the nights and weekends, doesn't cost you anything at all.

That's the real power of this.

So where it's benefiting consumers is, is you get to choose a lower price. And that competition is going to -- going to be the -- the driver of that price.

But -- but, yeah, to answer your question, the large casinos have by and large already left NV Energy. So it's sort of a -- it's a -- it's a talking point NV Energy likes to put out there, but these guys have already left.

Energy choice is really benefiting the rest of us. And $\mbox{--}$ and I think $\mbox{--}$

CHAIRMAN MILLS: Okay.

DAVE CHASE: -- as customer, I -- we should all have the same opportunity to choose our energy -- energy providers out of large (indiscernible) providers.

I don't know understand why we would say it's okay for MGM and Caesars and these other companies to go save money in a competitive market, but the rest of us are locked into a monopoly who's been overcharging us, you know, for years.

They know where to call. And 16 I'll tell you another thing for seniors and people with 17 disabilities that will go away. We -- Nevada Energy has programs 18 that help seniors and people with disabilities for their costs. 19 These guys and all these other companies will not have those 20 programs. And that's why I'm against Question 3. 21 COMMISSIONER CLARK: And it's a great commercial that you 22 made, Madonna. 23 MADONNA LONG: Yeah. 24 COMMISSIONER BAKKER: Okay. 25 MADONNA LONG: Well, I mean it, you know. I'm serious 26 about this. 27 CHAIRMAN MILLS: Okay. 28 So, Madonna, we -- if -- if you want to have equal time, you 29 got about one more minute if there's anything else you want to --30 to bring up. 31 I -- I think -- I think I pretty much stated, you know, 32 basically, you know, like I said, that -- and also in Nevada the 33 Public Utilities Commission found on an average monthly electric bill would likely increase for at least the first ten years if 34 35 Question 3 were to pass. And that's why, you know, I'm against 36 also -- I'm against Question 3. 37 COMMISSIONER CLARK: Thanks, --38 COMMISSIONER BAKKER: Okay.

My name is Carolyn Barbash. I'm not a public speaker. I'm and engineer so I don't talk very fast. So I might not get through everything I want to say.

I do have 30 years of electric industry experience, though, in a wide variety of things. And I'm currently doing a lot of market design.

So I can go as deep as you want to on the Q&A.

Question 3, as Dave stated, is a statewide ballot initiative that would put utility deregulation in Nevada's bill of rights. It would be the first state to do that.

I'm going to make four points.

It would dismantle and deregulate our current efficient system we have in place and disrupt clean energy growth. It would cost Nevada consumers billions.

As Madonna just stated, it would lock it into the constitution, making it if something's wrong with it, making a -- taking at least four or five years to change. And it's going to reduce local control of electric services.

So the first point, dismantling and deregulating and disrupting clean energy. NV Energy would no longer be a choice.

The constitutional -- the ballot initiative language is very vague, but it is very explicit that it prohibits an inclusive franchise to serve. So NV Energy won't be a choice as when deregulation has occurred in other states, which is why energy prices went down because the utility was still there serving folks with natural gas prices behind or holding them stable as they went (Indiscernible) forces like that to not be in the energy business anymore, just a wires company.

It would also disrupt the plans that NV Energy recently announced to double renewables by 2023 without raising rates. that includes the Battle Mountain solar plant, which would have been, you know, provided some economic stability to the Battle

Mountain area as folks move there and work at that plant. It's a hundred megawatt solar plant with a hundred megawatts of -- with 25 megawatts battery storage on it.

Costing consumers millions of dollars. I think Madonna covered that. The PUC covered that report very well. And I -- you can ask me questions on that. I was there every day of that investigation.

You know, our rates are 30 percent lower, than the states that — on average than the states that have deregulated here in Nevada. As much as 120 percent lower in states like Massachusetts, Connecticut, and Rhode Island.

It hasn't worked in other states. No one's done this in 20 years. You know, the states that did do it -- you saw what happened in California before they called it off. Nevada tried it, but saw what was happening in California. And our governor at the time was able to stop the train wreck from happening because it wasn't a constitutional amendment.

The third point that locks it -- the third point, it locks it into the -- into the constitution. It's very vague language. It's going to be decided by the legislature and probably the Nevada courts. With over 2,000 statutes that have been identified to change, I don't think the legislature will have time to do anything else but deregulate the energy market.

And then the fourth point, reducing local control of electricity and supply. What Dave says is inaccurate. Currently the PUC states what NV Energy's customers pay for transmission. (Indiscernible) that the federal government sets for everybody except NV Energy customers. The federal government would now be deciding what NV Energy -- old customers would pay for transmission. All that would go to the federal government.

It's also much more likely that we would get challenges to our state policy. If we wanted to have domestic renewables and there was an out-of-state provider that wanted to bring in out-of-state renewables and we wanted -- and Nevada wanted to have domestic development, you know, that they would challenge that that is a violation of the commerce clause or the federal -- Federal Energy Regulatory Pricing Authority.

So that's kind of it in a nutshell.

(Indiscernible) would have been partisan. There's a wide, diverse group of folks coming out against Question 3. And I

So, again, just a -- just a mistruth there.

You know, I guess the -- the broad point I would -- I would make here is NV Energy is a remarkably profitable company. The way their -- their rates are structured, they're guaranteed a 9.8 percent profit margin, which is -- if any business was guaranteed a 9.8 percent profit, that would be a pretty good business.

On yet on top of that, since 2014 they've overcharged Nevadans by \$346 million. It's just a staggering amount of money.

They're now spending -- they said they were going to spend \$30 million to defeat energy choice. Our calculation has it at least at -- at 50 million, perhaps more. And that certainly doesn't include what NV Energy itself is spending obviously you have an -- an NV Energy representative on the phone. All of that is time and money that they're -- they're investing in this campaign.

And -- and I guess the -- the question I would throw out is why is this energy monopoly spending this much money to protect their monopoly? It's a cash cow --

COMMISSIONER WAITS: Just Carolyn.

DAVE CHASE: -- for them. That's why they're doing it.

And the idea that that -- that monopoly is --

COMMISSIONER WAITS: (Indiscernible.)

DAVE CHASE: -- somehow good or -- or better for Nevadans than a -- a competitive marketplace defies economics. It defies common sense. You know. And -- and it really is no surprise that they will say or do anything in order to -- to stop this, stop us from having choice and protect their monopoly.

exit fee. I mean, I'm thinking the guy that put this on there -this is just me -- doesn't want to pay the exit fee.

And I believe -- and Carolyn can maybe go into this a little
bit better -- is that the reason that we charge the exit fee for
those bigger companies -- because, you know, that -- that it -that it actually protects the rate that -- of all Nevadans. So in
those consumers -- and I'm going to tell you again, I know we're
talking about choice here. We're talking about choice.

But, like I said, I -- I experienced choice in

But, like I said, I -- I experienced choice in Pennsylvania. And for consumers and older Amer- -- older Nevadans and those people, it is crazy. You don't know who's telling you the truth, what kind of plan you're getting. And it is absolutely crazy.

Yes. That's -- that's not all the large customers have left. And when they do leave, they pay an exit fee so that they pay for facilities that were built in bulk for -- for -- for everybody.

And so it's the smaller customers that are still with the utilities now who don't -- their rates don't go up.

And California does -- they -- they called -- the choice didn't work so they stopped it. And -- and their customers are still paying for it, to Dave's point.

You know, the --

And -- and they -- they started these (indiscernible) and I was just listening to a hearing at the CPUC with everybody arguing about what the exit fees should be as customers exit (indiscernible) these customer choice programs.

And really what's happened is the low-income customers and -- and folks that want to stay with stable rates or regulated rates are paying the subsidy for the -- for the folks that are able to leave and choose.

And so that's what's going on now in California.

Reliability. We're not talking about the reliability of the

wires. NV Energy would be retain those and deliver the energy that -- that (indiscernible) secure for their customers.

You see this happening. You see this in California is when the responsibility for who's procuring what and for who gets so fragmented that nobody is securing enough energy. And that's why you see in the summertime these emergency requests for curtailment and rolling blackouts still this summer in California.

NV Energy's not guaranteed a profit. In fact, the portion that would be deregulated and no regulated -- no regulation of a price is the very portion of your bill that there is no profit on. It's passed through at-cost.

So the out-of-state retailers that come here to sell to Nevadans will need to make a profit in order to stay in business. So something that is being passed through today at cost will need to have a profit on it. And that's just on top of all the other costs of implementing this deregulated market.

CHAIRMAN MILLS: Okay.

CAROLYN BARBASH: Have I used my time? I could --

CHAIRMAN MILLS: Yep. That's -- that was two minutes.

CAROLYN BARBASH: Okay.

CHAIRMAN MILLS: So let me -- I'm going to open up for public comments and see if anybody in the public here has any questions for you guys.

And lastly, even with the lower rates, the lady did talk about rolling blackouts in California. So let's say I pick a

Position -- the -- the actual job description. Where is that job description? Where was it created? Where is it at? Because I don't even have a job description according to county records.

So where is the -- where is that at?

Yeah. I -- there -- there are issues that need to be addressed. And I don't think we should be making a decision today based on where it stands.

1 COMMISSIONER BAKKER: Okay. 2 3 Bert Ramos, for the record.
