
C. Project Information:

1. <u>Project Background and Description</u>: (see attached GUIDE for what to cover in this section.)

Existing situation:

- · Although sidewalks exist along Main Street, they do not extend along roads leading to the residential areas of the community.
- · Virginia Street is used quite a bit by locals as it connects Austin's residential areas with town services (youth center, library, court house, rural clinic, sheriff's office) along Main Street.
- · Virginia Street is also a heavily-used tourist route, as it leads up to St. Augustine's Cultural Center, a former Catholic church built in 1866, and listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The former church is finishing a restoration primarily funded by the State of Nevada Commission for Cultural Affairs and will re-open to the public in the summer of 2013 as community and regional events venue.
- There is no pedestrian path along Virginia Street, people must walk in the roadway. This is a hazardous mix of vehicles and pedestrians, made even more dangerous due to the steep grade which makes walking difficult and contributes to limited visibility.





Project description:

The project will begin at the existing sidewalk on Main Street and the east right of way boundary of Virginia Street. There is ample County owned right of way in which to construct the sidewalk/stairs. The project would continue up Virginia Street, terminating at Court Street, for a length of approximately 110 feet. It will be a standard 4 feet in width, with appropriate railings. As shown in the preceding photos, the project is one block in length.

Dube Group Architects of Reno, the designer of the Austin Visitor Center, will design this project. The firm has also been involved in the restoration of St. Augustine's Cultural Center (a 6-year restoration project funded by the Nevada Commission for Cultural Affairs, and the National Park Service's Save America's Treasure Grant program), and is very familiar with this site. The survey related work will most likely be completed by Summit Engineering (Reno) which has worked with Lander County on other Austin projects, including a recent revision of FEMA flood maps for Austin.

The project will be administered by St. Augustine's Cultural Center, in cooperation with Lander County.

Upon awarding of this grant, all remaining survey and design work for the project would be completed within 30 days. Construction would commence thereafter, with a completion date by the end of summer, 2013.

This project will result in safe pedestrian access between commercial and residential areas of Austin. It will also result in increased accessibility to St. Augustine's Cultural Center for community and tourism programs. It will finally separate pedestrian and vehicular traffic on that portion of Virginia Street.

Many Austin residents have limited or no access to cars and must walk to places along Main Street (library, court house, rural clinic, sheriff's office, youth center, mini-marts, etc). This is particularly true of our LMI and elderly population. They need safer access to services and this project will greatly aid them.

Without CDBG funding, this project would only be possible if sidewalks were somehow funded and constructed for the entire town. The likelihood of that occurring is pretty much nil.

There is a large amount of survey data in the area already available. Main Street, the Austin Visitor Center, and St. Augustine's Cultural Center have all had survey and topo work done in the past few years. This data will be of great help in the survey and engineering work for this project.

This project is feasible because it is a small project in scale and cost, yet will yield a large return to the community, aiding locals with safe access to the commercial area, and providing both locals and visitors with convenient, safe access to the new community/cultural center.

No persons will be displaced as a result of this project.

Positive impacts generated by this project are significant:

- · It will visually clean up a currently neglected area along the new Austin Visitor Center
- · It will provide safe pedestrian travel for locals and visitors
- · It will remove hazardous obstacles (people) from vehicular travel
- · It will encourage usage and attendance at events for two community venues: the Visitor Center Plaza and St. Augustine's Cultural Center

Negative impacts: None

After construction, maintenance and repair will be provided by Lander County.

The total number of beneficiaries could <u>easily top 200 for a particular event</u> at the cultural center or visitor's center. 100 was used to be conservative, though multiple events per year are anticipated. Many event attendees will also be LMI, but we did not project that number into line 2 in order to show the impact to local LMI residents. Therefore, 30 was a number used to reflect local LMI residents who regularly use Virginia Street for access to Main Street. A number of 5 for LMI jobs would reflect construction workers, with the balance of the jobs being non-LMI (architect, surveyor).

- all activities such as engineering, construction, acquisition, administration, etc.;
- how the money in the total budget and, in particular, CDBG funds will be spent. The narrative should provide details as per the line items in the budget – see Section F;
- the timelines required for each aspect of the project/expenditure;
- the expected outcomes or results from the proposed project. What will be accomplished that could not be accomplished without the CDBG funds?
- how the project will meet the concerns and problems outlined above;

- in the case of limited clientele projects, explain how the beneficiaries will be counted:
- in the case of housing rehabilitation projects, indicate the number of houses to be rehabilitated;

BLM RESOURCE MANAGEMENT PLAN OVERSIGHT AGREEMENT

This BLM Resource Management Plan Oversight Agreement, hereinafter referred to as "Agreement" is made by and between Lander County, a political subdivision of the State of Nevada, hereinafter referred to as ("Lander County"), and Research and Consulting Services, Inc., hereinafter referred to as ("RCS").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, RCS desires to provide professional services, professional consultation and advice, for a professional fee (as set forth in Exhibit A, Scope of Work, attached) in connection with the implementation of the Bureau of Land Management Resource Management Plan Update; and

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants, conditions and other good and valuable consideration contained herein, the parties hereby agree as follows:

TERMS AND CONDITIONS

- 1. <u>Purpose</u>: RCS shall, subject to all terms, conditions, and limitations specified hereinafter, perform the professional services as described in Exhibit A, Scope of Work, attached.
- 2. Obligations of Lander County: Lander County shall provide the following to RCS:
 - A. All criteria and full information as to Lander County's requirements and designate a person with authority to act on Lander County's behalf on all matters concerning the Agreement.
 - B. Furnish to RCS relevant studies and reports; and RCS shall be entitled to rely upon all such information and services in performing services hereunder.
 - C. Arrange for access to and make all provisions for RCS to enter upon public and private property as required for RCS to perform services hereunder.
- 3. <u>Term</u>: This Agreement shall remain in effect from the date it is approved by both parties to the 15th day of December 2012. This term shall be subject to earlier termination as hereafter provided. This Agreement shall automatically renew each year, for a one year term unless terminated as hereafter provided or replaced by another agreement.
- 4. <u>Effective Date</u>: This Agreement shall not become effective until and unless approved by appropriate official action of the governing body/official of each of the parties.
- 5. Payment: Lander County shall reimburse RCS a sum not to exceed twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000.00) for satisfactory work with regard to the Scope of Work outlined in Exhibit A.

All direct expenses shall generally be incurred at cost. RCS shall submit monthly statements of services rendered and reimbursable expenses, and Lander County shall provide prompt payment to RCS, not to exceed sixty (60) days of receipt of monthly statement.

- 6. <u>Liability and Hold Harmless</u>: To the extent authorized by law, RCS agrees to indemnify and hold harmless Lander County from any loss, damage, liability, cost or expense to the person or property of another, which is caused by the intentional or negligent acts of RCS, its officers, employees or agents. Moreover, RCS agrees to indemnify and hold harmless Lander County from any claim or potential claim from RCS, its officers, employees, agents or guests resulting from any loss, damage, liability, cost or expense caused by any reason.
- 7. Amendment or Modification: Both parties acknowledge and agree that they have not relied upon any statements, representations, agreements, or warranties, in entering into this Agreement, except as are stated herein, and no amendment or modification of this Agreement shall be valid or binding unless expressed in writing and executed by both the parties.
- 8. <u>Termination</u>: This Agreement may be Terminated prior to the expiration of the term as follows:
 - A. Lander County or RCS may terminate this Agreement with or without cause upon thirty (30) days written notice served upon the other party as provided in this Agreement.
 - B. Lander County and RCS may agree in writing to terminate this Agreement at any time.
 - C. Upon termination, RCS shall be compensated for time and materials at the agreed upon rates, plus costs, for work performed prior to the termination, including reasonable expenses incurred.
- 9. <u>Notices</u>: All notices or other communications required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been duly given if delivered personally in hand or mailed certified mail, return receipt requested, postage prepaid on the date posted, and addressed to the other party at the address set forth below:

- 10. <u>Waiver</u>: Any waiver by either party of any breach of any kind or character whatsoever by the other, whether such be direct or implied, shall not be construed as a continuing waiver of, or consent to, any subsequent breach of this Agreement.
- 11. Assignment: The rights granted and responsibilities incurred under this Agreement may not be assigned without the written consent of Lander County.

- 12. Third Party Beneficiaries: The enforcement of the terms and conditions of this Agreement and all rights of action relating to such enforcement shall be strictly reserved to the parties of the Agreement. There are no third party beneficiaries to this Agreement, and nothing contained in or implied by this Agreement shall give or allow any such claim or right of action by any other or third person.
- 13. Governing Law: This Agreement shall be construed and governed by the laws of the State of Nevada. Any action arising from this Agreement must be filed in the Sixth Judicial District Court in and for the County of Lander.
- 14. Attorney's Fees: Should either party be required to pursue legal action to enforce the terms and conditions of this agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled reasonable attorney fees and court costs.
- 15. Governmental Immunity: Nothing contained herein waives or is intended to waive any protections that may be applicable to Lander County or any of its elected or appointed officials, employees, or agents under any applicable statutes, rules or regulations providing governmental immunity, or any other rights, protections, immunities, defenses or limitations on liability to Lander County or such related parties that are provided by law.
- 16. <u>Captions</u>: The headings used in this Agreement are inserted for reference purposes only and shall not be deemed to define, limit, extend, describe, or affect in any way the meaning, scope or interpretation of any of the terms or provisions of this Agreement or the intent hereof.
- 17. <u>Integration</u>: This Agreement, including Exhibit A, Scope of Work, shall constitute the entire agreement between the parties; all prior agreements between the parties, whether written or oral, are merged into this Agreement and shall be of no force or effect.
- 18. <u>Relationship</u>: This Agreement shall not be deemed to create a partnership between the parties in their respective endeavors or otherwise, nor cause them to be considered joint ventures or members of any joint enterprise.
- 19. <u>Force Majeure</u>: Neither party shall be responsible for any failure or delay in its performance under this Agreement due to causes beyond its reasonable control, including but not limited to, labor disputes, strikes, lockouts, shortages of or inability to obtain labor, energy, raw materials or supplies, war, riot, acts of God or governmental action.
- 20. Severability: If any covenant, phrase, clause, paragraph, section, condition or provision contained within this Agreement is invalidated by a court of competent jurisdiction, then the invalidity shall in no way affect any other covenant, phrase, clause, paragraph, section, condition, or provision contained in this Agreement.
- 21. Construction: This Agreement shall be construed without to the identity of the party who drafted various provisions of the Agreement. Moreover, each and every provision of this Agreement shall be construed as though all parties to this Agreement participated equally in the drafting of this Agreement. As a result of the foregoing, any rule or construction that a

document is to be construed against the drafting party shall not apply.

- 22. <u>Confidentiality</u>: Each party shall keep confidential all information, in whatever form, produced, prepared, observed or received by that party to the extent that such information is confidential by law or otherwise required by this Agreement.
- 23. <u>Proper Authority</u>: The parties hereto represent and warrant that the person executing this Agreement on behalf of each party has full power and authority to enter into this Agreement and that the parties are authorized by law to perform the services set forth in this Agreement.




Call Volume Report

Call Volume By Time and Day From: 7/1/2012 To: 9/30/2012



Re: July - September 2012 Quarterly EMS Report

Attached is the first quarterly report on the progress of LCEMS during the first three months of operations – July to September, 2012. The BMGH Board of Trustees is very pleased with the success of this important community service and looks forward to strengthening the collaborative relationship with the Board of Commissioners that addressing EMS has created.

The positive impact of the first three months of LCEMS is reflected in several factors:

- In eight cases paramedic services were very important to the outcome for the patient. In a number of these cases the Emergency Department physician on duty indicated that it is unlikely that the patient would have survived.
- Requests for service and billed/documented runs were 90% more than the same quarter last year (Page 1).
- The Lander County Sheriff and Road Deputies are extremely pleased with the level of support they are receiving from LCEMS.
- The progress of LCEMS through BMGH is being watched by rural counties throughout Nevada and other states.
- The feedback of individuals receiving services has been uniformly excellent.

Since the cash flow from collections has not been established, the projected collection rate for the financial summary (Page 3) is sixty-six percent (66%). The collection rate will be updated each quarter as BMGH has more experience with what the payment rate will be for each payer category.

BMGH withheld an additional thirty percent (30%) from the County financial obligation (Page 3) based on the projected recovery rate through the cost report process. This is the uncompensated expense recovery that designated Critical Access Hospitals, like BMGH, are eligible to collect. This cost report recovery will be projected until we submit our next cost reports in 2013.

BMGH incurred \$58,189 in EMS capital asset acquisitions (Page 3) that is being charged to the County based on a useful life depreciation schedule. The amount being charged is \$935 per month.

The items that had the greatest unanticipated impact on the expense budget (Page 2) were overtime costs, supplies and minor equipment. The overtime costs were influenced by unanticipated Wage and Hour requirements. The supplies and equipment costs were due to the fact that items BMGH anticipated that could be used were formally outdated and needed replaced.

Progress on a sustainable EMS response solution for Southern Lander has been elusive. However, a training program sponsored by LCEMS has started and BMGH is working with the State EMS Commission to participate in another training program that will start in the first quarter of 2013. The squad in Battle Mountain has responded to EMS needs in Southern Lander County when requested. The Community Paramedicine Program that can provide more needed healthcare resources is being explored by BMGH for all of Lander County.

The BMGH Board of Trustees has made a significant financial commitment to address the healthcare needs of southern Lander County. At the November meeting the BMGH Board of Trustees voted to purchase property in Kingston, NV to establish a Rural Health Clinic (RHC) for the area in 2013. The potential partnership between the RHC, LCEMS and a Community Paramedicine Program are both exciting and certainly within our grasp.

Another benefit of the collaborative EMS relationship established between LCEMS and HGHEMS has been realized. BMGH has received a \$125,000 computerized training mannequin from the Northern Nevada EMS Consortium at no cost that can be used by EMS, nursing and medical staff personnel in Lander County. The Consortium is also the organization that is being used in an effort to secure grant funding for Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) for Lander County.

INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT FOR EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES

This INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT FOR EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES, hereinafter referred to as "Agreement" is made by and between Lander County, a political subdivision of the State of Nevada, hereinafter referred to as ("Lander County"), and the Lander County Hospital District., hereinafter referred to as ("LCHD").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, LCHD owns and operates a medical facility known as the Battle Mountain General Hospital, hereinafter referred to as ("BMGH"), located at 535 South Humboldt Street, Battle Mountain, Nevada 89820, which provides inpatient, outpatient, long term care, and emergency services; and

WHEREAS, Lander County and LCHD propose to define an ongoing collaborative relationship to provide Emergency Medical Services, hereinafter referred to as ("EMS") in Lander County; and

WHEREAS, Nevada Revised Statutes ("NRS") 277.180 authorizes one or more governments to enter into a contractual agreement to provide governmental services;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants, conditions and other good and valuable consideration contained herein, the parties hereby agree as follows:

TERMS AND CONDITIONS

- 1. <u>Purpose</u>: Lander County and LCHD shall, subject to all terms, conditions, and limitations specified hereinafter, perform the professional services as described in Exhibit A, Scope of Work, attached.
- 2. <u>Term</u>: This Agreement shall remain in effect from the date it is approved by both parties to the 30th day of June 2013. This term shall be subject to earlier termination as hereafter provided, or this Agreement shall automatically renew each year, for a one year term unless terminated as hereafter provided or replaced by another agreement.
- 3. <u>Effective Date</u>: This Agreement shall not become effective until and unless approved by appropriate official action of the governing body/official of each of the parties.
- 4. <u>Payment</u>: Lander County shall pay LCHD a sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00) per month, and LCHD and Lander County shall abide by the terms, conditions and limitations as set forth in this Agreement and in Exhibit A, attached.

- 5. <u>Liability and Hold Harmless</u>: Each party shall defend any third party claim against the other party arising from the death of or physical injury to any person or damage to the indemnified party's property to the extent proximately caused by the negligence of the indemnifying party or its agents or employees, and indemnify and hold harmless the other party and its respective officers, directors and employees from and against damages, liabilities and reasonable costs and expenses, including reasonable legal fees incurred in connection therewith.
- 6. <u>Amendment or Modification</u>: Both parties acknowledge and agree that they have not relied upon any statements, representations, agreements, or warranties, in entering into this Agreement, except as are stated herein, and no amendment or modification of this Agreement shall be valid or binding unless expressed in writing and executed by both the parties.
- 7. <u>Termination</u>: This Agreement may be Terminated prior to the expiration of the term as follows:
 - A. Lander County or LCHD may terminate this Agreement with or without cause upon ninety (90) days written notice served upon the other party as provided in this Agreement.
 - B. Lander County or LCHD may terminate this Agreement in the event of a material breach of the terms and conditions of the Agreement. The non-breaching party shall have the right to terminate this Agreement after providing thirty (30) days written notice to the breaching party, unless such breach is cured to the satisfaction of the non-breaching party within the said thirty (30) days.
 - C. Lander County and LCHD may agree in writing to terminate this Agreement at any time.
 - D. If this Agreement is terminated by either party, equipment purchased by Lander County shall be returned to Lander County.
- 8. <u>Notices</u>: All notices or other communications required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been duly given if delivered personally in hand or mailed certified mail, return receipt requested, postage prepaid on

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the date posted, and addressed to the other party at the address set forth below:

- 9. <u>Waiver</u>: Any waiver by either party of any breach of any kind or character whatsoever by the other, whether such be direct or implied, shall not be construed as a continuing waiver of, or consent to, any subsequent breach of this Agreement.
- 10. <u>Assignment</u>: The rights granted and responsibilities incurred under this Agreement may not be assigned without the written consent of Lander County and LCHD.
- 11. Third Party Beneficiaries: The enforcement of the terms and conditions of this Agreement and all rights of action relating to such enforcement shall be strictly reserved to the parties of the Agreement. There are no third party beneficiaries to this Agreement, and nothing contained in or implied by this Agreement shall give or allow any such claim or right of action by any other or third person.
- 12. Governing Law: This Agreement shall be construed and governed by the laws of the State of Nevada. Any action arising from this Agreement must be filed in the Sixth Judicial District Court in and for the County of Lander.
- 13. <u>Attorney's Fees</u>: Should either party be required to pursue legal action to enforce the terms and conditions of this agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled reasonable attorney fees and court costs.
- 14. Governmental Immunity: Nothing contained herein waives or is intended to waive any protections that may be applicable to Lander County and/or LCHD or any of its elected or appointed officials, employees, or agents under any applicable statutes, rules or regulations providing governmental immunity, or any other rights, protections, immunities, defenses or limitations on liability to Lander County and or LCHD or such related parties that are provided by law.
- 15. <u>Captions</u>: The headings used in this Agreement are inserted for reference purposes only and shall not be deemed to define, limit, extend, describe, or affect in any way the meaning, scope or interpretation of any of the terms or provisions of this Agreement or the intent hereof.

- 16. <u>Integration</u>: This Agreement, including Exhibit A, Scope of Work, shall constitute the entire agreement between the parties; all prior agreements between the parties, whether written or oral, are merged into this Agreement and shall be of no force or effect.
- 17. <u>Relationship</u>: This Agreement shall not be deemed to create a partnership between the parties in their respective endeavors or otherwise, nor cause them to be considered joint venturers or members of any joint enterprise.
- 18. <u>Force Majeure</u>: Neither party shall be responsible for any failure or delay in its performance under this Agreement due to causes beyond its reasonable control, including but not limited to, labor disputes, strikes, lockouts, shortages of or inability to obtain labor, energy, raw materials or supplies, war, riot, acts of God or governmental action.
- 19. <u>Severability</u>: If any covenant, phrase, clause, paragraph, section, condition or provision contained within this Agreement is invalidated by a court of competent jurisdiction, then the invalidity shall in no way affect any other covenant, phrase, clause, paragraph, section, condition, or provision contained in this Agreement.
- 20. <u>Construction</u>: This Agreement shall be construed without to the identity of the party who drafted various provisions of the Agreement. Moreover, each and every provision of this Agreement shall be construed as though all parties to this Agreement participated equally in the drafting of this Agreement. As a result of the foregoing, any rule or construction that a document is to be construed against the drafting party shall not apply.
- 21. <u>Confidentiality</u>: Each party shall keep confidential all information, in whatever form, produced, prepared, observed or received by that party to the extent that such information is confidential by law or otherwise required by this Agreement.
- 22. <u>Proper Authority</u>: The parties hereto represent and warrant that the person executing this Agreement on behalf of each party has full power and authority to enter into this Agreement and that the parties are authorized by law to perform the services set forth in this Agreement.
- 23. <u>Compliance with Law</u>: The parties hereto represent and warrant that they will comply with all relevant local, state, and federal laws and regulations and further represent and warrant that any failure to comply with such laws is a material breach of contract and that the breaching party will indemnify the other party from any and all claims or damages arising out of such breach.

Exhibit A Scope of Work EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES

RESPONSIBILITES OF LCHD AND LANDER COUNTY

Both parties agree that the service levels for both Battle Mountain Ambulance Service and Austin Ambulance Service, as currently licensed by the State of Nevada, shall not be upgraded or reduced without the written, signed agreement of LCHD and LANDER COUNTY. The parties further acknowledge that the ownership of the vehicles and all major equipment currently used in providing EMS services within Lander County shall remain vested with LANDER COUNTY.

A major consideration in the placement of this Agreement is to establish and evaluate the feasibility of LCHD assuming the function of providing EMS services within Lander County in entirety and in perpetuity. To that end, the feasibility will be established during the budget development process for the Fiscal Year 2013-2014 for LANDER COUNTY and LCHD's Budgets. Unless it is determined at that time that it is NOT feasible and sustainable for LCHD to assume the function of providing EMS services within Lander County in entirety and in perpetuity, THE LANDER COUNTY EMS FUNCTION SHALL BE ASSUMED, IN ENTIRETY, BY LCHD ON JULY 1, 2013, with LANDER COUNTY still providing a monthly payment to LCHD.

RESPONSIBILITES OF LCHD

LCHD shall assume full responsibility for the following day-to-day operations of the Lander County Emergency Medical Services ("EMS"):

- These operations shall not influence decisions made by EMS Providers, Medical Control or the patient regarding the medical facility to which the patient shall be transported. The patient shall not, however, be transported past the nearest medical facility that can provide appropriate diagnostic and stabilization care unless on-scene EMS Personnel and Medical Control concur that said transport is in the patient's best interest.
- All regular full and part time personnel shall be employees of Battle Mountain General Hospital ("BMGH") and shall be subject to all rules, regulations and policies of BMGH. BMGH shall provide all liability insurance coverage as required by the Nevada Revised Statutes ("NRS") or other organizations that have insurance relationships with BMGH and Lander County; i.e., Liability Cooperative of Nevada and Nevada Public Agency Insurance Pool.
- All volunteers of the EMS Service shall be subject to the rules, regulations and policies approved by BMGH for the volunteer's participation on the EMS Service. BMGH shall-provide all liability coverage for the EMS Service volunteers as required by the NRS or other organizations that have insurance relationships with BMGH and Lander County; i.e., Liability Cooperative of Nevada and Nevada Public Agency Insurance Pool.

- BMGH shall ensure that all licensing required for the Lander County EMS System by NRS, Nevada Administrative Code ("NAC") or the Nevada EMS Commission is current. BMGH shall assure that all necessary reports for said licensing are submitted to the appropriate parties as required.

- BMGH shall ensure that all required initial training, certification and continuing medical education courses are reasonable available to EMS personnel. BMGH shall ensure that all personnel scheduled to provide EMS Services shall meet NRS, NAC and Nevada EMS Commission training requirements.
- BMGH shall ensure that all reporting requirements for EMS Services in Lander County not already noted in this AGREEMENT are met as required. BMGH personnel shall collect and tabulate information required to fulfill said reporting requirements.
- BMGH shall ensure that all business office support required by the EMS Service is provided. This shall include, but not be limited to, charging, coding, billing and collection services.
- BMGH shall ensure that the EMS Service is incorporated into the BMGH Risk Management/ Quality Assurance System (also known as an Enterprise Risk Management System) and that all required reporting requirements are met.
- General administration of the Lander County EMS Service shall be under the direction of the BMGH Chief Executive Officer.
- BMGH shall ensure that the vehicles used for EMS Services to fulfill this AGREEMENT are regularly inspected to meet licensure requirements and fitness for use as established by the Nevada State EMS Commission.
- LCHD shall make every reasonable effort to obtain grant funding for all vehicle and equipment replacement and additions
- A projected Lander County EMS Service budget for each fiscal year shall be developed, reviewed and approved in a collaborative process between LCHD and the LANDER COUNTY.
- A final accounting shall be made at the end of the fiscal year and the appropriate cost reports have been settled and financial records audited. Quarterly payments, interim settlements, cost report adjustments, grant funds, designated contributions and other revenue specific to EMS shall be used to offset Lander County EMS Service expenses. If there is an operating surplus from EMS operations, the surplus shall be divided equally between the LCHD and LANDER COUNTY.
- LCHD shall report to LANDER COUNTY on a quarterly basis about the operations and financial performance of Lander County EMS Services in a format to be determined by the LCHD and LANDER COUNTY.
- BMGH shall use the approved budget as an operating guide for the Lander County EMS Service. Exact expense items will be presented to LANDER COUNTY each quarter. At the end of each calendar quarter an interim cost settlement shall be made between LCHD and LANDER COUNTY. The interim cost settlement shall consider expenses, revenues and projected cost report funds. As a result of the interim cost settlement, an operating surplus shall be divided equally between the LCHD and LANDER COUNTY, minus

what is to be reimbursed to LANDER COUNTY in excess of the amounts its paid monthly.

RESPONSIBILITES OF LANDER COUNTY

LANDER COUNTY shall assume full responsibility of the following:

- LANDER COUNTY shall ensure that the vehicles used for EMS Services are licensed, registered, insured, maintained and repaired.
- LANDER COUNTY shall maintain ownership of the vehicles and all major (capital) equipment used in the provision of EMS Services.
- The value of the vehicle inventory and major (capital) equipment used in Lander County EMS Services shall be carried on the books of LANDER COUNTY, subject to straight-line depreciation over the established accounting useful life of the vehicles and/or equipment.
- The value of the vehicles and major equipment currently used in providing EMS services within Lander County shall be determined by taking the AICPA established useful asset life depreciated on a straight-line basis over the period of "in-service" use of each particular asset.
- LANDER COUNTY shall remain responsible for the purchase of new vehicles, and the regular and routine maintenance of the vehicles and all major equipment currently used in providing EMS services within Lander County.



Background:

Currently the Lander County Sheriff's Office has a single Full Time Food Services worker position. As a result of an employee injury, the position duties have been completed for approximately 18 month, by a temporary part time food services worker and another permanent part time employee, temporarily reassigned. Historically, food services employee(s) have been assisted by Inmate Workers with meal preparation and cleaning of the work area. The Sheriff's Office has experience a lack of workers and therefore all cleaning and meal preparation has been completed by employees. Most recently, sworn staff has been used on an overtime basis to allow for additional flexibility in meal preparation and cleaning.

The single full time position was recently vacated and is now available for filling. This however, poses a problem that without the flexibility of inmate labor, the security and safety of the inmates, staff and community may be jeopardized as a result of the lack of food services manpower.

Operating Engineers Local 3 has been contacted regarding the possibility of temporarily reducing the single full time position and to allow for the temporary creation of a partially benefited part time position and a non-benefited part time position to allow for full staffing flexibility.

Based on Operating Engineers Local #3 response (not yet received), we are requesting the authority to commit to one of the recommended actions. Either action would be temporary until the budgeting and negotiation process and funded throughout the remainder of the FY 2012-2013 budget cycle with existing budgeted funds of the Sheriff.

Recommended Action:

PREFERRED OPTION: Allow for the Sheriff to fill one (1) temporary partially benefited part-time food services position AND one (1) non-benefited part-time food services position for the remainder of FY 2012-2013. This to be funded through existing budgeted funds of the Sheriff's FY 2012-2013 budget.

SECOND OPTION: Allow the Sheriff to maintain one (1) temporary non-benefited food services position due to expire December 31, 2012 for the remainder of FY 2012-2013. This to be funded through existing budgeted funds of the Sheriff's FY 2012-2013 budget.

Letter of Promulgation

To the Citizens of Lander County,

Forces of nature or manmade accidents may create emergency conditions where our friends and neighbors must band together to respond and mitigate the effects of an unforceeable natural disaster, accident, hazardous material release, or act of terrorism. Planning and preparedness are necessary elements to protect the health and safety of our citizens, public and private property, and surrounding environment. Regardless of the size and complexity of the incident, Lander County will initiate quick response and decisive action to mitigate the effects of the event.

Depending upon the magnitude of the natural disaster, the complexity of the response will require extensive planning to ensure unity of effort with the various response activities. Processes and procedures must be established for a more decisive and coordinated response.

Materials containing hazardous constituents, when properly controlled, are important in everyday life. Uncontrolled, they may cause injury, death, destruction, and lingering effects that may last for many years. To meet the risk, a concerted effort must be made to identify, locate, quantify, and possess knowledge of the hazardous materials within Lander County. The routes and modes of transportation of these chemicals must also be known in order to assess the overall possible danger posed by these materials and prepare for a focused response.

Lastly, our world has significantly changed over the past 35 years. Terrorism has become the weapon of choice by domestic and international enemies of freedom and liberty. Attacks may be in form of chemical, biological, or high explosive detonations. Even though Lander County is not a likely target, we must be prepared nonetheless.

The results of this local planning effort are set forth in this <u>Lander County Emergency Operations Plan</u>. The plan includes the study of the problem itself, the resources available to handle the problem and the emergency procedures that would be used in the case of a potential incident. The plan contains Records of Reviews/Changes, Table of Contents, and four sections which include the Basic Plan and Organizational Overview, twelve annexes specifying incident types, resource management and communications.

DRAFT 2012 POPULATION ESTIMATES FOR REVIEW

Attached are the DRAFT population estimates for your county and communities for your review. These estimates are DRAFT estimates intended for review by local governments and are not meant for circulation to either the media or the general public. This packet includes the applicable worksheets for counties, cities, and towns and a draft of the complete estimates for Counties, Cities, and Towns that show the estimates going forward from the 2000 estimates and their rates of change. I have also included a table with the range of data that was used in the Nevada Regression Model for your information.

Nevada Administrative Code gives local governments the right to appeal these estimates. Nevada Administrative Code 360.390 4 states, "An appeal must be filed on or before **December 14** and will be heard and ruled upon by a hearing officer of the department. The appeal is subject to the applicable provisions of this chapter and chapter 360 of NRS relating to practice and procedures before the commission." The complete regulations for population estimates are available at http://nvdemography.org/data-and-publications/estimates/. As you may know, the regulations are in the process of being revised and those changes are available at http://nvdemography.org/data-and-publications/estimates/. The hearing on them is scheduled for December 10, 2012.

Regarding the worksheets:

- The persons per household, group quarters' population and for the tribal populations are from 2010 Census. Group Quarters information was updated to reflect the state prison population or other large changes.
- For the most part occupancy information from the Census was updated using data derived from Nevada Energy and Valley Electric Association information. Last year, the rates were calculated for some communities with the seasonal vacant units removed from that calculation. With a better understanding of Census procedures and data those units were added back in for the calculation of vacant units. If you have more specific information for your community that you want to be considered please let me know. Please keep in mind that it needs to also include information going back to July 2010.

Regarding the economic estimate:

- The data for total employment is based on Bureau of Economic Analysis Regional Economic Information System (REIS) data which reports total employment including farm employment and proprietors. The REIS data usually lags the current estimate year by about two years. The remaining years of the data (the current estimate year less the latest REIS year) are modeled using the Regional Economic Models Inc. (REMI) model. School enrollment data includes charter schools. The Residential Adjusted Employment reflects were people live who are employed compared to where they work and is modeled information from REMI.
- These full range of data is provided for your information about your community over time. The specific model for your county does not necessarily include all the information shown.
- If you are interested in more detailed information for your respective counties please contact me and I will be happy to forward that to you.





Enclosed you will find the Record of Decision, Plan of Operations Approval, and Approval of Issuance of Right-of-Way Grants for the Mount Hope Project, prepared by the Bureau of Land Management (BLM), Battle Mountain District's Mount Lewis Field Office (MLFO).

The BLM's selection of a Preferred Alternative was based on the BLM's National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) analysis of the Plan of Operations (NVN-082096) and two right-of-way applications (NVN-084632 and NVN-091272), including public comments received throughout the NEPA process. The decision of the Mount Lewis Field Manager, BLM Battle Mountain District, is to select the Proposed Action inclusive of applicant committed practices and the mitigation measures specified in Chapter 3 of the Final Environmental Impact Statement, as the BLM's Preferred Alternative. The Preferred Alternative is the alternative that best fulfills the agency's statutory mission and responsibilities, considering economic, environmental, technical, and other factors. The BLM has determined that implementation of this decision with the identified monitoring and mitigation measures will not cause unnecessary or undue degradation of the public lands. The decision authorizes the development of molybdenum mining and processing operations within the Mount Hope Project Area located in central Nevada approximately 23 miles northwest of Eureka, Nevada.

Transfer of Grazing Preference for the Fish Creek Ranch Allotment (Antelope Valley Use Areas)

INTRODUCTION

Borba Land and Cattle, LLC has purchased the base property associated with the Fish Creek Ranch Allotment, which is located approximately 15 miles south of Eureka, Nevada. Borba Land and Cattle, LLC has submitted the required paperwork to transfer the grazing preference along with an application for a ten-year term grazing permit for the Fish Creek Ranch Allotment Antelope Valley Use Areas (see attached Map).

BACKGROUND

In order to offer the term grazing permits for this allotment, the BLM must consult and issue a decision document(s) prior to authorizing a term grazing permit. After review of the available data, the interdisciplinary team recommended that the permits be issued with no changes to the Terms and Conditions associated with the current permit. The Antelope Valley Use Area of the Fish Creek Ranch Allotment would be transferred with no changes to the existing preference and Terms & Conditions that were analyzed in the 2004 Fish Creek Complex Evaluation and Rangeland Health Assessment Environmental Assessment NV062-EA04-69. This document analyzed impacts of the grazing management systems that were later implemented by the Fish Creek Complex Final Multiple Use Decision (FMUD) for the Fish Creek Ranch Allotment (a copy of these final decisions can be requested at the above address).

Borba Land and Cattle, LLC has accepted the current Terms and Conditions associated with the term grazing permit for the Antelope Valley Use Area of the Fish Creek Ranch Allotment. A Documentation of Land Use Plan Conformance and NEPA Adequacy (DNA) has been

completed for the issuance of the new ten-year term permit. The DNA is tiered to the 2004 Fish Creek Complex Evaluation and Rangeland Health Assessment Environmental Assessment NV062-EA04-69. The Fish Creek Complex EA analyzed impacts of grazing management that were implemented in 2004 for the Fish Creek Ranch Allotment. A consultation, cooperation and coordination (CCC) letter was issued on October 30, 2012 to inform the interested public on the proposal to issue a ten-year term grazing permit to Borba Land and Cattle, LLC. The public was provided 15 days from the date of the letter to submit written comment to the BLM. The Mount Lewis Field Office (MLFO) received two comments that requested that BLM fully examine the adverse impacts of livestock grazing on sage grouse and other wildlife. Impacts to sage grouse and other wildlife were analyzed in the 2004 Fish Creek Complex Evaluation and Rangeland Health Assessment Environment Assessment NV062-EA04-69 (EA). As a result, the season of use for the Fish Creek Ranch Allotment, Antelope Valley Use Area was modified and implemented by the FMUD. The authorized season of use for the Fish Creek Ranch Allotment, Antelope Valley Use Area is 11/01 - 03/31 which coincides with the dormant season of the vegetation occurring on the allotment. Restricting livestock grazing to the dormant season is considered to benefit and improve wildlife habitat conditions. The season of use and terms and conditions will remain the same as analyzed in the EA and implemented by the FMUD.

PROPOSED DECISION

Therefore, it is my proposed decision to:

- 1. Transfer the grazing preference for the Antelope Use Area of the Fish Creek Ranch Allotment from VW Land and Cattle, LLC to Borba Land and Cattle, LLC.
- 2. Issue a new ten-year term grazing permit to Borba Land and Cattle, LLC.

This permit will be issued consistent with the authorized use, grazing schedule and Terms & Conditions which became administratively final through the Fish Creek Complex Final Multiple Use Decision (FMUD) dated September 27, 2004 and will not be modified through this decision.

RATIONALE

In accordance with 43 CFR 4110.2-3(a)(3), Borba Land and Cattle, LLC have accepted the Terms and Conditions associated with the preference and term grazing permit once held by VW Land and Cattle, LLC. After review of the transfer applications and base property offered, it has been determined that they are qualified applicants as specified in 43 CFR 4110. The grazing preference and permit Terms and Conditions that will be specified on the grazing permit is in accordance with the aforementioned FMUD and Final Grazing Decisions, Shoshone Eureka Resource Management Plan (RMP), allotment specific objectives, along with the Northeastern Great Basin Area Resource Advisory Council (RAC).

AUTHORITY

§43 CFR 4110.2-3(a)(3): The transferee shall accept the terms and conditions of the terminating grazing permit or lease (see §4130.2) with such modifications as he may request which are

approved by the authorized officer or with such modification as may be required by the authorized officer.

§43 CFR 4110.1(b): Applicants for the renewal or issuance of new permits and leases and any affiliates must be determined by the authorized officer to have a satisfactory record of performance.

§43 CFR 4110.1(b)(2): New permit or lease. Applicants for new permits or leases, and any affiliates, shall be deemed not to have a record of satisfactory performance when: (i) The applicant or affiliate has had any Federal grazing permit or lease cancelled for violation of the permit or lease within the 36 calendar months immediately preceding the date of application; or (ii) The applicant or affiliate has had any State grazing permit or lease, for lands within the grazing allotment for which a Federal permit or lease is sought, cancelled for violation of the permit or lease within the 36 calendar months immediately preceding the date of application; or (iii) The applicant or affiliate is barred from holding a Federal grazing permit or lease by order of a court of competent jurisdiction.

§43 CFR 4130.2(d): The term of grazing permits or leases authorizing livestock grazing on the public lands and other lands under the administration of the Bureau of Land Management shall be 10 years unless—(1) The land is being considered for disposal; (2) The land will be devoted to a public purpose which precludes grazing prior to the end of 10 years; (3) The term of the base property lease is less than 10 years, in which case the term of the Federal permit or lease shall coincide with the term of the base property lease; or (4) The authorized officer determines that a permit or lease for less than 10 years is in the best interest of sound land management.

§4130.3: Livestock grazing permits and leases shall contain terms and conditions determined by the authorized officer to be appropriate to achieve management and resource condition objectives for the public lands and other lands administered by the Bureau of Land Management, and to ensure conformance with the provisions of subpart 4180 of this part.

§4130.2(b): The authorized officer shall consult, cooperate and coordinate with affected permittees or lessees, the State having lands or responsible for managing resources within the area, and the interested public prior to the issuance or renewal of grazing permits and leases.

§4160.1(a): Proposed decisions shall be served on any affected applicant, permittee or lessee, and any agent and lien holder of record, who is affected by the proposed actions, terms or conditions, or modifications relating to applications, permits and agreements (including range improvement permits) or leases, by certified mail or personal delivery. Copies of proposed decisions shall also be sent to the interested public.

PROTEST AND APPEAL PROVISIONS

Protest:

In accordance with 43 CFR 4160.2, any applicant, permittee, lessee or other interested public may protest the proposed decision under 43 CFR 4160.1 of this title, in person or in writing to

the authorized officer (Christopher J. Cook, authorized officer, Mount Lewis Field Office, 50 Bastian Road, Battle Mountain, NV 89820) within 15 days after receipt of such decision. The protest, if filed, must clearly and concisely state the reason(s) why the protestant thinks the proposed decision is in error.

In accordance with 43 CFR 4160.3 (a), in the absence of a protest, the proposed decision will become the final decision of the authorized officer without further notice.

In accordance with 43 CFR 4160.3 (b), should a timely protest be filed with the authorized officer, the authorized officer will reconsider the proposed decision and shall serve the final decision on the protestant and the interested public.

Appeal:

In accordance with 43 CFR 4160.4, any person whose interest is adversely affected by a final decision of the authorize officer may appeal the decision for the purpose of a hearing before an administrative law judge. The appeal must be filed within 30 days after receipt of the final decision. Appeals and petitions for a stay of the decision shall be filed at the office of the authorized officer (Christopher J. Cook, authorized officer, Mount Lewis Field Office, 50 Bastian Road, Battle Mountain, NV 89820). Additionally the person appealing must serve a copy on any person named in the decision as listed at the end of this decision and the Office of the Solicitor, Pacific Southwest Region, U.S. Department of the Interior, 2800 Cottage Way, Room E-2753, Sacramento, CA 95825-1890 within 15 days of filing the appeal and petition for stay.

In accordance with 43 CFR 4.470, the appeal shall state the reason, clearly and concisely, why the appellant thinks the final decision of the authorized officer is in error.

A petition for stay, if filed, must show sufficient justification based on the following standards (43 CFR 4.471(c)):

- (1) The relative harm to the parties if the stay is granted or denied;
- (2) The likelihood of the appellant's success on the merits;
- (3) The likelihood of immediate and irreparable harm if the stay is not granted; and,
- (4) Whether the public interest favors granting the stay.

The appellant requesting a stay bears the burden of proof to demonstrate that a stay should be granted.

Any person named in the decision from which an appeal is taken (other than the appellant) who wishes to file a response to the petition for a stay may file with the Hearings Division a motion to intervene in the appeal, together with the response, within 10 days after receiving the petition. Within 15 days after filing the motion to intervene and response, the person must serve copies on the appellant, the Office of the Solicitor and any other person named in the decision (43 CFR 4.472(b)).

At the conclusion of any document that a party must serve, the party or its' representative must sign a written statement certifying that service has been or will be made in accordance with the applicable rules and specifying the date and manner of such service (43 CFR 4.422(c)(2).

Transfer of Grazing Preference for the JD and Grass Valley Allotments

INTRODUCTION

Barrick Cortez, Inc. has purchased the base property associated with the JD Allotment, which is located approximately 30 miles north of Eureka, Nevada. Barrick Cortez, Inc. submitted the required paperwork to transfer the grazing preference along with an application for a ten-year term grazing permit for the JD Allotment.

BACKGROUND

In order to offer the term grazing permits for this allotment, the BLM must consult and issue a decision document(s) prior to authorizing a term grazing permit. After review of the available data, the interdisciplinary team recommended that the permits be issued with changes to the Terms and Conditions associated with the current permit. In accordance with §43 CFR 4110.2-3(a)(3), the authorized officer may require modifications to the Terms and Conditions of the terminating grazing permit, which must be accepted by the transferee in order to complete the grazing preference transfer and issuance of a new ten-year term grazing permit.

Livestock drift from the JD Allotment into the adjacent Grass Valley Allotment has been a continual problem. To help alleviate this issue, the season of use for the Rocky Hills Pasture will be changed from summer use to fall use to coincide with use in the Trail Canyon Pasture. To accommodate this change, the number of livestock and season of use for the other pastures within the allotment will be modified but would maintain similar stocking rates.

At the time the FMUD was signed, two streams (Birch Creek and Pete Hanson Creek) within the Roberts Mountain Pasture were identified as having populations of federally threatened and endangered Lahontan Cutthroat Trout (LCT), which are listed under the Endangered Species Act. Populations of LCT were recently discovered in Willow Creek. In accordance with the JD

Allotment Final Multiple Use Decision (FMUD), livestock grazing use is not authorized within LCT habitat; therefore, the existing Terms and Conditions would be modified to include Willow Creek.

The grazing preference for the JD Allotment would be transferred with modifications to the Terms and Conditions that were analyzed in the JD Allotment Evaluation Environmental Assessment NV062-EA04-07. This document analyzed impacts of the grazing management systems that were later implemented by the JD Allotment Final Multiple Use Decision (FMUD) dated September 24, 2004 (a copy of the final decision can be requested at the above address).

Barrick Cortez, Inc. has accepted the modified Terms and Conditions associated with the term-grazing permit for the JD Allotment. A Documentation of Land Use Plan Conformance and NEPA Adequacy (DNA) has been completed for the issuance of the new ten-year term permit. The DNA is tiered to the 2004 the JD Allotment Evaluation Environmental Assessment NV062-EA04-07; which analyzed the impacts of the grazing management system implemented in 2004 for the JD Allotment. The aforementioned modifications to the Terms and Conditions are considered to be within the scope of the original EA and therefore existing NEPA is considered adequate.

A consultation, cooperation and coordination (CCC) letter was issued on October 25, 2012 to inform the interested public on the proposal to issue ten-year term grazing permits to Barrick Cortez, Inc.. The public was provided 15 days from the date of the letter to submit written comment to the BLM. One written comment was received and considered, however, was found to be outside the scope of this decision.

PROPOSED DECISION

Therefore, it is my proposed decision to:

- 1. Transfer the grazing preference for the JD Allotment from Kenneth Buckingham to Barrick Cortez, Inc.
- 2. Issue a new ten-year term grazing permit to Barrick Cortez, Inc.

This permit will be issued consistent with the authorized use, grazing schedule and Terms & Conditions which became final through the JD Final Multiple Use Decision dated September 24, 2004 with the exception of the following modifications to the grazing schedule and changes to Terms and Conditions numbered 1, 4, and 18; which address concerns with livestock drift and Lahontan Cutthroat Trout.

Terms and Conditions:

1. The permittee shall be required to continue to haul water to the Trail Canyon Pasture and JD Pasture at authorized water haul sites. The majority of use in the Grass Valley Allotment will occur in the vicinity of the Bauman well. Livestock drift will occur on the ridgeline boundary separating the JD and Grass Valley Allotments (Pat, Fye and Coal

Canyons north to the flat to Bauman well) in areas where fencing does not exist. The permittee shall be required to utilize water hauls and herd livestock in the Trail Canyon Pasture to minimize livestock drift that occurs in the Grass Valley Allotment specifically the Pat, Fye and Coal Canyon areas. Additionally, salt/supplement will not be on placed on the ridgelines separating the JD and Grass Valley Allotments, further reducing livestock drift that may occur in Pat, Fye and Coal Canyons. Grazing use would not be authorized in upper McCluskey Canyon in the Grass Valley Allotment. Grazing use in the Grass Valley Allotment use area will not exceed designated AUMs. Grazing use will not be authorized in these pastures unless water is being hauled by the permittee.

- 2. The permittee shall be allowed to move cattle from the Roberts Mountain Pasture at any time prior to June 30th to alleviate livestock poisoning due to tall larkspur. The permittee will be allowed to move cattle to the Gable Seeding or Pete Hanson Pasture. Additional use in these areas will not exceed designated AUMs for the pastures. Changes must be applied for in advance and must be approved in writing by the authorized officer.
- 3. The permittee shall be allowed five days flexibility prior to and following the scheduled use dates to completely move livestock from pasture to pasture with the exception of the Roberts Mountain Pasture.
- 4. The period of use in the Roberts Mountain Pasture with the exception of Birch Creek, Pete Hanson Creek, and Willow Creek may be authorized to include late fall/early winter, after October 15th, livestock use. Authorization of late fall/early winter livestock use within the Roberts Mountain Pasture will be dependent on meeting riparian objectives, and an evaluation of annual climatic conditions that will influence the use of riparian zones by livestock. The permittee must apply for fall/winter use 30 days prior to scheduled grazing use. Due to the variance of the hot season within the JD Allotment, the authorization of late fall/early winter use will be dependent on temperature, moisture, etc. on a year-to-year basis. The authorized officer will make this determination annually. If it is determined that grazing use is granted grazing use will be authorized in writing by the authorized officer. Annual use in the Roberts Mountain Pasture will not exceed the authorized estimated carrying capacity.
- 5. Birch Creek shall be closed to livestock grazing to protect Lahontan Cutthroat Trout (LCT) habitat.
- 6. If Horse Seeding or JD Seeding (located in the JD Pasture) is used before June 15th it will not be used until after June 15th the next year.
- 7. Utilization of "Key Forage Species" will not exceed 40% by seed dissemination and 50% by the end of the grazing year.
- 8. Utilization of Crested wheatgrass seedings will not exceed 60% by the end of the grazing year.

- 9. Utilization of "Key Browse Species" will not exceed 25% during the critical growth period, and no more than 50% following the end of the growing season. Key Browse Species include but are not limited to willow, aspen, cottonwood, current, red-osier dogwood, water birch and other facultative-wetland or facultative-woody/browse species.
- 10. Utilization of key woody species will not exceed 30% by the end of the grazing year Key Woody Species include but are not limited to aspen, elderberry, serviceberry, etc.
- 11. Stream bank shearing and trampling shall be limited to 10% (10 linear feet in 100 foot transect).
- 12. Utilization of "Riparian Habitat Key Forage Species" will not exceed 40% by the end of the grazing year. The objective is to obtain a minimum of 4 inches with an optimum of 6 inches of stubble height by the end of the growing season. Key species include, but are not limited to sedge, rush, bluegrass, hairgrass, cattail, clovers, dandelions, false dandelion, watercress, monkey flowers, and other obligate, facultative-wetland or facultative grass, forb or grass like species.
- 13. Management actions and objectives will conform, to the extent possible, to the Management Guidelines for Sage Grouse and Sagebrush Ecosystems In Nevada (BLM 2000) and to Guidelines to Manage Sage Grouse Populations and Their Habitats (Connelly et. al. 2000) also known as the Western Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies (WAFAWA) Guidelines for Sage Grouse Management, until augmented or superseded by the State of Nevada's South Central Nevada Sage Grouse Conservation Plan, which is now under development.
- 14. If utilization objectives reach specified objectives in any use area where measurable standards have been set, the permittee will be required to remove livestock from that area. The permittee will have 3-5 days upon notification to remove livestock.
- 15. The permittee shall be required to meet with BLM prior to each grazing year in order to determine an annual grazing plan that will ensure appropriate use throughout the allotment.
- 16. The season of use in each pasture may be temporarily modified from the proposed grazing management system, at the discretion of the authorized officer on an annual basis, if monitoring data indicates that changes are necessary to meet multiple use objectives for Standards for Rangeland Health. Temporary changes in period of use may be authorized on an annual basis if monitoring indicates these changes are necessary to meet allotment specific objectives.
- 17. In accordance with 43 CFR 4130.3-3: The authorized officer may modify terms and conditions of the permit or lease when the active use or related management practices are not meeting the land use plan, allotment management plan or other activity plan, or management objectives, or is not in conformance with the provision of subpart 4180 RAC Standards and Guidelines.

- 18. Authorized active grazing use will be in accordance with the Final Multiple Use Decision for the JD Allotment dated September 24, 2004; with the exception of the modifications to the Terms and Conditions as outlined in the Acceptance of Terms and Conditions document.
- 19. Historic suspended use for the JD Allotment will remain at 9,856 AUMs.
- 20. Historic suspended use for the Grass Valley Allotment will remain at 1,432 AUMs.

Mandatory U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Terms and Conditions

- 1. BLM shall initiate measures to ensure that livestock riparian herbaceous utilization provides for a 4-inch minimum stubble height when livestock are removed and a 6-inch minimum stubble height at the end of the grazing season; and/or riparian woody utilization shall not exceed 30 percent on willow species greater than 5 feet tall and/or 20 percent on willow species less than 5 feet tall, and/or 10 percent on aspen species of any height; and/or streambank alteration shall not exceed 10 percent. If utilization reaches specified objectives in any given area, the permittee will be required to remove livestock from that area within 3-5 days of notification.
- 2. BLM shall annually evaluate the monitoring data collected from Birch and Pete Hanson Creeks located within the Roberts Mountain Pasture to determine if the applicable riparian herbaceous and/or woody vegetation utilization and/or bank alteration criteria as outlined under Reasonable and Prudent Measure Number 1, Term and Condition Number 1 have been exceeded. If any of these criteria are exceeded, BLM shall initiate the following actions:
 - a. BLM in conjunction and cooperation with the Service, lessee(s), and interested publics shall determine which actions are necessary within the affected use area (reduction in season of use, reduction in numbers of livestock, closure, or a combination of strategies) to ensure that the proposed conditions are met. If BLM and the lessee(s) cannot reach an agreement as to what action should be taken to achieve utilization standards to protect and promote LCT Recovery, BLM shall issue a decision regarding the proposed change in grazing management in the affected use area. BLM shall repeat this process until all applicable criteria for riparian herbaceous and/or woody vegetation utilization and/or bank alteration are met.

RATIONALE

In accordance with 43 CFR 4110.2-3(a)(3), Barrick Cortez, Inc. have accepted the terms and conditions associated with the preference and permit for the JD Allotment. After review of the transfer applications and base property offered, it has been determined that they are qualified applicants as specified in 43 CFR 4110. The grazing preference and permit terms and conditions that will be specified on the grazing permit is in accordance with the aforementioned FMUD and Final Grazing Decisions, Shoshone Eureka Resource Management Plan (RMP), allotment

specific objectives, along with the Northeastern Great Basin Area Resource Advisory Council (RAC).

AUTHORITY

3.

§43 CFR 4110.2-3(a)(3): The transferee shall accept the terms and conditions of the terminating grazing permit or lease (see §4130.2) with such modifications as he may request which are approved by the authorized officer or with such modification as may be required by the authorized officer.

§43 CFR 4110.1(b): Applicants for the renewal or issuance of new permits and leases and any affiliates must be determined by the authorized officer to have a satisfactory record of performance.

§43 CFR 4110.1(b)(2): New permit or lease. Applicants for new permits or leases, and any affiliates, shall be deemed not to have a record of satisfactory performance when: (i) The applicant or affiliate has had any Federal grazing permit or lease cancelled for violation of the permit or lease within the 36 calendar months immediately preceding the date of application; or (ii) The applicant or affiliate has had any State grazing permit or lease, for lands within the grazing allotment for which a Federal permit or lease is sought, cancelled for violation of the permit or lease within the 36 calendar months immediately preceding the date of application; or (iii) The applicant or affiliate is barred from holding a Federal grazing permit or lease by order of a court of competent jurisdiction.

§43 CFR 4130.2(d): The term of grazing permits or leases authorizing livestock grazing on the public lands and other lands under the administration of the Bureau of Land Management shall be 10 years unless—(1) The land is being considered for disposal; (2) The land will be devoted to a public purpose which precludes grazing prior to the end of 10 years; (3) The term of the base property lease is less than 10 years, in which case the term of the Federal permit or lease shall coincide with the term of the base property lease; or (4) The authorized officer determines that a permit or lease for less than 10 years is in the best interest of sound land management.

§4130.3: Livestock grazing permits and leases shall contain terms and conditions determined by the authorized officer to be appropriate to achieve management and resource condition objectives for the public lands and other lands administered by the Bureau of Land Management, and to ensure conformance with the provisions of subpart 4180 of this part.

§4130.2(b): The authorized officer shall consult, cooperate and coordinate with affected permittees or lessees, the State having lands or responsible for managing resources within the area, and the interested public prior to the issuance or renewal of grazing permits and leases.

§4160.1(a): Proposed decisions shall be served on any affected applicant, permittee or lessee, and any agent and lien holder of record, who is affected by the proposed actions, terms or conditions, or modifications relating to applications, permits and agreements (including range improvement permits) or leases, by certified mail or personal delivery. Copies of proposed decisions shall also be sent to the interested public.

PROTEST AND APPEAL PROVISIONS

Protest:

In accordance with 43 CFR 4160.2, any applicant, permittee, lessee or other interested public may protest the proposed decision under 43 CFR 4160.1 of this title, in person or in writing to the authorized officer (Christopher J. Cook, authorized officer, Mount Lewis Field Office, 50 Bastian Road, Battle Mountain, NV 89820) within 15 days after receipt of such decision. The protest, if filed, must clearly and concisely state the reason(s) why the protestant thinks the proposed decision is in error.

In accordance with 43 CFR 4160.3 (a), in the absence of a protest, the proposed decision will become the final decision of the authorized officer without further notice.

In accordance with 43 CFR 4160.3 (b), should a timely protest be filed with the authorized officer, the authorized officer will reconsider the proposed decision and shall serve the final decision on the protestant and the interested public.

Appeal:

In accordance with 43 CFR 4160.4, any person whose interest is adversely affected by a final decision of the authorize officer may appeal the decision for the purpose of a hearing before an administrative law judge. The appeal must be filed within 30 days after receipt of the final decision. Appeals and petitions for a stay of the decision shall be filed at the office of the authorized officer (Christopher J. Cook, authorized officer, Mount Lewis Field Office, 50 Bastian Road, Battle Mountain, NV 89820). Additionally the person appealing must serve a copy on any person named in the decision as listed at the end of this decision and the Office of the Solicitor, Pacific Southwest Region, U.S. Department of the Interior, 2800 Cottage Way, Room E-2753, Sacramento, CA 95825-1890 within 15 days of filing the appeal and petition for stay.

In accordance with 43 CFR 4.470, the appeal shall state the reason, clearly and concisely, why the appellant thinks the final decision of the authorized officer is in error.

A petition for stay, if filed, must show sufficient justification based on the following standards (43 CFR 4.471(c)):

- (1) The relative harm to the parties if the stay is granted or denied;
- (2) The likelihood of the appellant's success on the merits;
- (3) The likelihood of immediate and irreparable harm if the stay is not granted; and,
- (4) Whether the public interest favors granting the stay.

The appellant requesting a stay bears the burden of proof to demonstrate that a stay should be granted.

Any person named in the decision from which an appeal is taken (other than the appellant) who wishes to file a response to the petition for a stay may file with the Hearings Division a motion to intervene in the appeal, together with the response, within 10 days after receiving the petition. Within 15 days after filing the motion to intervene and response, the person must serve copies on the appellant, the Office of the Solicitor and any other person named in the decision (43 CFR 4.472(b)).

At the conclusion of any document that a party must serve, the party or its' representative must sign a written statement certifying that service has been or will be made in accordance with the applicable rules and specifying the date and manner of such service (43 CFR 4.422(c)(2).

The Nevada Division of Environmental Protection (NDEP) has received your Additional Characterization and Groundwater Monitoring Report-Third Quarter 2012, dated November 9, 2012 prepared on your behalf by Broadbent & Associates.

Two offsite wells were installed on September 25, 2012 (MW-8 and MW-9) to delineate the extent of down-gradient contamination. The chemistry from sampling indicated no contamination above the MCL's were present in either of these wells.

Nine site monitoring wells (MW-1 through MW-9) were sampled on September 25 & 26, 2012 for the 3rd quarter monitoring. All of the wells were non-detect for MTBE. Well MW-1 and MW-6 contained detectable levels benzene above the 5 micrograms per liter (ug/l) maximum contaminant level. The report indicates that Benzene concentrations increased in MW-1 and MW-6 for the 3rd qtr. 2012. MW-1 increased from 340 to 710 ug/l and MW-6 increased slightly from <0.1 to 5.8 ug/l. All other wells were below the action level for all constituents of concern.

The depth to ground water ranged from 7.88 to 8.79 feet below the top of well casing for the 3rd Quarter 2012. Groundwater elevations decreased an average of 0.54 feet and the flow direction is north to northeasterly at 0.001 foot/foot.

Broadbent & Associates Recommendations:

- Quarterly sampling for BTEX continue for the 4th Quarter 2012 and 1st Quarter 2013 at which time an evaluation of remediation exemption criteria be conducted.
- Discontinue MTBE sampling which has not been detected on the Site.
- Biodegradation indicator parameter sampling in the 1st Quarter 2013.
- Conduct a detailed evaluation of remediation exemption criteria in the 1st Quarter 2013.

NDEP concurs with your *Groundwater Monitoring Report 3rd Quarter 2012* recommendations. In addition please investigate the possibility of batch extraction of fluids or excavation of soils at MW-1 to reduce the levels of concerns for this area.



The report also indicates missing bolts on monitoring wells 1, 2, 3, 6 & 7. Please insure those are replaced to prevent unauthorized access.

Please provide the Fourth Quarter 2012 report to this office for review no later than January 31, 2013.

The Bureau of Land Management (BLM), Winnemucca District (WD), Humboldt River Field Office has prepared the Brady Hot Springs Well 15-12 Hydro-Stimulation Preliminary Environmental Assessment (EA). This EA analyzes the environmental effects of developing and testing a geothermal reservoir by using enhanced geothermal system (EGS) technologies, as proposed by Brady Power Partners, a subsidiary of Ormat Nevada, Inc. (Ormat). The proposed project is located north of the Hot Springs Mountains, approximately 50 miles northeast of Reno, in Churchill County, Nevada, Township 22 North, Range 26 East, section 12.

The EGS technology Ormat proposes to implement is a hydro-stimulation program to increase energy production by enhancing natural hydraulic connections within the existing hydrothermal system. The project would be located in an existing production well and on the associated drill pad (Well 15-12) located on federal geothermal lease NVN 065558 held by Ormat. Hydro-stimulation involves creating better hydraulic connections by injecting cool geothermal water to further open the existing network of minute cracks in the rocks deep underground, where natural fractures already occur. During the process, geothermal water produced from the geothermal production wells and processed at the geothermal plant would be injected at wellhead pressures less than 1,400 pounds per square inch at depths ranging from approximately 4,245 to 5,096 feet below ground surface. The resulting enhanced fracture network would enable increased production of hot geothermal water, thus increasing the power output of the Brady Hot Springs Power Plant up to the plant's designed capacity.

You are invited to submit substantive comments on the preliminary EA within 30 days of the date of this letter. In compliance with the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969, as amended (NEPA), and the Federal Land Policy and Management Act of 1976, as amended, the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) Mount Lewis Field Office, Battle Mountain, Nevada, has begun the process of preparing an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) to analyze and disclose impacts associated with the Buffalo Valley Mine Project, a proposed open pit gold mine, milling, and associated facilities, located on public and private lands in Lander and Humboldt counties, Nevada. Newmont Mining Corporation, in cooperation with the Mount Lewis Field Office, has selected AECOM to prepare the EIS.

In the spirit of cooperative consultation and collaborative public involvement, the MLFO is inviting Lander County to become a Cooperating Agency for the duration of the EIS process. The Council on Environmental Quality's regulations (40 CFR 1501.6 and 1508.5) implementing the NEPA allow federal agencies (as lead agencies) to invite tribal, state, and local governments, as well as other federal agencies, to serve as Cooperating Agencies in the preparation of environmental impact statements. Cooperating Agency status provides the opportunity for us to work together and to enhance the BLM's planning efforts.

Local and tribal governments, other agencies, and the public have participation opportunities such as attending public meetings, and reviewing and commenting on EIS documents. Being a Cooperating Agency provides the opportunity for interested agencies to take on additional roles and responsibilities beyond basic participation opportunities. Cooperating Agencies have obligations to contribute staff to the EIS team, assist with analysis of a discipline in which they have special expertise or jurisdiction by law, and fund their own participation.

Any Cooperating Agency would be expected to provide a person to attend meetings to accomplish the tasks set forth in a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) that will be provided

by the BLM, as well as to accommodate other time involvement. The BLM anticipates that the Cooperating Agency may be involved in three or four meetings over the course of the project as well as being invited to participate in biweekly conference calls. There will also be specified timelines and deadlines to review and provide comment on documents.

If you become a Cooperating Agency, you will work closely with BLM and other agencies throughout the EIS process. While Cooperating Agency status does not eliminate rights to protest or appeal the EIS Record of Decision, it is expected that your agency would have had sufficient opportunity to work with BLM and others during the planning process so that a protest or appeal would not be necessary.

The BLM requests that agencies declining to accept Cooperating Agency status also respond to this invitation. Should you choose not to become a Cooperating Agency, be assured that we will still provide your agency with ample opportunity to participate in the planning process.

Please respond, in writing, to Andrea Dolbear at the above address within 15 days of receipt of this letter. The MLFO will need to sign a MOU that describes the roles and responsibilities of the BLM and your agency. Subsequent to your acceptance as a Cooperating Agency, you will receive a draft MOU for review. The MLFO will need a point of contact to finalize the MOU and the name of the person who will represent your agency for the planning process.





The Nevada Division of Environmental Protection (NDEP) has reviewed your *Third Quarter 2012 Monitoring Report*, dated October 29, 2012, prepared on your behalf by Jeremy Boucher, Certified Environmental Manager for Broadbent & Associates, Inc. (BAI).

Fifteen site wells (MW-2, MW-3, MW-5 through MW-13, and MW-15 through MW-18) were monitored and sampled on August 13 and 14, 2012 this quarter for MTBE and BTEX compounds along with analysis for bio-parameters. LNAPL was present in two wells MW-4 (0.03ft) and MW-14 (0.02 ft.) and were not sampled. Less than 0.01 gal. of LNAPL was removed from MW-4 and an absorbent sock was installed in MW-14. Two wells contained benzene above the 5 microgram per liter (ug/l) maximum contaminant level at 8.2 ug/l (MW-12) and 27 ug/l (MW-15). Slight variations in benzene concentrations continue with minor changes estimated due to water table fluctuations. None of the other analytes exceeded their respective MCL's including MTBE. BAI also noted that the indicators of biodegradation parameters measured in wells MW-11 and MW-15 indicate that intrinsic biodegradation of petroleum hydrocarbon constituents in groundwater is on-going at the site.

Depth to groundwater ranged between 5.39 (MW-8) to 8.34 (MW-14) feet to water and the gradient direction was north-northwest or northwest at 0.001ft/ft. Average groundwater elevation change for this quarter decreased 0.25 feet.

MW-9 was located and Site survey activities were conducted of all wells except MW-1 which could not be located. MW-2 through MW-18 were located horizontally (NAD83) and vertically (NAVD88) and the Site base map was updated.

Recommendations by Broadbent for the fourth quarter include; ...

- Preparation and submittal of a mobile DPE work plan.
- Fourth Quarter monitoring/sampling; if groundwater analytical results remain below laboratory detection limits and/or state action levels in wells MW-3, MW-6, MW-7 and MW-11, it is recommended that these wells be monitored annually beginning the First Quarter 2013.





Measure depth to groundwater in all wells.

The NDEP concurs with the *Third Quarter 2012 Monitoring Report* except NDEP does not agree with limiting groundwater sampling if the analytical results remain below laboratory detection limits. NDEP does concur with annual sampling if wells MW-3, MW-6, MW-7 and MW-11detection limits remain below the State action level.

INTRODUCTION

The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) has prepared Environmental Assessment (EA) DOI-BLM-NV-B010-2012-0047-EA that analyzes the affected environment and environmental impacts associated with the Ruby Hill Pit Expansion Project (Project), BLM case file number NVN-067782 (11-1A). The Project is located approximately 0.7 mile northwest of the town of Eureka, Nevada, at an elevation ranging between 6,200 feet to 6,500 feet above mean sea level (amsl). The Project Area includes approximately 8,411 acres that consist of approximately 3,015 acres of private land owned by Barrick Gold Corporation (Barrick) and operated by Homestake Mining Company of California (Homestake), a wholly owned subsidiary of Barrick, and approximately 5,396 acres of public land administered by BLM Battle Mountain District, Mount Lewis Field Office (MLFO). The Project boundary encompasses all or portions of Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 14, 15, 16, 17, 20, 21, 22, and 23 of Township 19 North, Range 53 East (T19N, R53E), and portions of Sections 31, 32, 33, and 34 of T20N, R53E, Mount Diablo Base and Meridian (MDB&M), Eureka County, Nevada (Project Area). Figure 1.1.1 of the Plan of Operations shows the Project Area, access roads, and land status.

Homestake submitted to the BLM and the Nevada Division of Environmental Protection (NDEP) Bureau of Mining Regulation and Reclamation (BMRR) an Amendment to the Plan of Operation and Nevada Reclamation Permit (Record Number NVN-067782/Reclamation Permit No. 0107) (Plan) to expand an existing open pit gold and silver mining and processing operation. The proposed expansion, which has been analyzed in the EA as the Proposed Action, would utilize the existing primary and secondary crushers, solution processing plant, and ancillary support facilities. The Plan includes the following activities: expansion of the existing open pit and pit activity area (PAA); lowering of the final pit bottom by 240 feet to 5,100 feet amsl; inclusion of a conceptual process pond for future fluid management of the heap drain down flows during closure; realignment of portions of the existing perimeter fence associated with the open pit expansion; increasing the authorized acreage of surface exploration related disturbance; expansion of the Class III landfill; and the establishment of a flexible mining and ore hauling timeline based on mining rates and economic conditions.

Expansion activities would disturb approximately 34.3 acres of additional BLM-administered public land and approximately 72.3 acres of additional private land for a proposed surface disturbance total of 106.6 acres. The total of the existing and proposed surface disturbance for the Project would be 1,742.4 acres within the existing Project Area.

The Proposed Action is consistent with Federal law, BLM regulations and policy, and the BLM Shoshone-Eureka Resource Management Plan (1986), as amended. The U.S. Department of the Interior's Surface Management regulations, Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) 43 Subpart 3809 (43 CFR 3809), and current BLM policy permit mineral development on public lands, if such activities do not cause unnecessary or undue degradation of the public resources. In addition, the Proposed Action is consistent with the plans and policies of applicable state, tribal, and federal agencies and governments. Although Eureka County, through coordination with the BLM and the project proponent, has determined that the proposed project is substantially consistent with the policies in Eureka County's Master Plan, some of the components of the proposed project could prove inconsistent with these plans and policies as described in Section 1.5.2 of the EA. The Proposed Action, with the applicant-committed environmental protection measures and the mitigation measures stipulated by the BLM, in the Record of Decision (ROD) for the original Ruby Hill Project Final Environmental Impact Statement (NV64-EIS96-33 and the Ruby Hill Mine Expansion-East Archimedes Project Final Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement (NV063-EIS04-34), will not cause unnecessary or undue degradation of public lands.

BACKGROUND

An internal scoping meeting for the BLM was initiated at a meeting on February 23, 2012. During the scoping meeting, BLM resource specialists identified the supplemental authorities and other resources and uses to be analyzed in the EA. The following specific issues related to the Proposed Action were identified as present/potentially affected: Air Quality; Bald and Golden Eagles; Cultural Resources; Geology and Mineral Resources; Migratory Birds; Native American Traditional Values; Noxious Weeds, Invasive and Nonnative Species; Socioeconomic Values; Soils; Special Status Species; Vegetation; Wastes, Hazardous or Solid; Water Resources; and Wildlife.

In addition to the supplemental authorities of the human environment, other resources that have been considered in this EA include: Fire Management, Grazing Management, Land Use, Access,

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Public Safety, Recreation, Geology and Minerals, Paleontological Resources, Socioeconomic Values, Soils, Special Status Species (Plants and Wildlife), Transportation, Vegetation, Visual Resources, Wild Horse and Burros, and Wildlife, Chapter 3 of the EA describes these impacts in details.

The following resources are unlikely to be affected because they do not exist in the Project Area: Area of Critical Environmental Concern (ACEC), Environmental Justice, Farmlands (Prime or Unique), Fish Habitat, Floodplain, Forest and Rangelands, Human Health and Safety, Threatened or Endangered Species, Wetlands and Riparian Zones, Wild and Scenic rivers, and Wildness/Wilderness Study Areas (WSA)/Land with Wildness Characteristics.

The BLM initiated Native American Coordination (NAC) via initiation/invitation letters on March 14, 2012. NAC letters were mailed to the following tribes: Ely Shoshone Tribe; Te-Moak Tribe of Western Shoshone; Duckwater Shoshone Tribe; and Yomba Shoshone Tribe. The BLM conducted a Native American site visit on July 18, 2012; representatives from the Duckwater and Yomba Tribes were in attendance.

The EA was made available for a 30-day public comments period, which concluded on September 10, 2012. Copies of the EA were sent out to those on the BLM "interested parties" mailing list and posted on the BLM website. A total of three comment letters were received with substantive comments from the United States Fish and Wildlife Service and the Eureka County Board of Commissioners. The individual comments and responses to each of these comments can be found in Appendix A of the final EA. A Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI) has also been enclosed as Attachment A to this Decision.

All correspondence relative to this planning process is part of the public record and is available for review at the MLFO.

DECISION

As a result of the analysis presented in the EA, and after carefully considering the comments and input received from the public, it is my decision to:

- 1. Approve the Ruby Hill Project Amendment to the Plan of Operations with the conditions of approval listed below. This management decision for the Ruby Hill Project is issued pursuant to 43 CFR 3809.803, effective immediately, and will remain in effect while appeals are pending before the Office of Hearings and Appeals (OHA) unless OHA grants a stay under §4.21(b) of his title. The Plan for the Ruby Hill Project is hereby approved subject to the conditions of approval required in order to prevent unnecessary or undue degradation. Homestake must conduct operations as described in the Plan and in accordance with the conditions of approval contained in this Decision.
- 2. Based on Homestake reclamation cost estimate, the BLM review of the cost estimate, NDEP-BMRR concurrence dated October 2, 2012, and consideration of the conditions of approval, the required financial guarantee amount is hereby set at \$22,641,556 for reclamation of the Ruby Hill Project. This amount is subject to change pending further review by the BLM and the NDEP BMRR. Homestake must provide a financial guarantee in this

amount using one or more of the acceptable financial guarantee instruments listed in 43 CFR 3809.555.

Within 60 days of receipt of this Decision, a financial guarantee in the amount of \$22,641,556 must be filed and accepted by the BLM, Nevada State Office, Branch of Minerals Adjudication, 1340 Financial Boulevard, Reno, NV 89502-7147. Failure to do so may result in enforcement action being taken against Homestake. That office will issue a decision as to the acceptability of the financial guarantee. You must <u>not</u> begin surface disturbing activities under the Plan until you receive notification from the BLM State Office that the financial guarantee has been accepted.

Approval of a Plan by the BLM does not constitute a determination regarding the validity or ownership of any unpatented mining claims involved in mineral exploration and development operations. Homestake is responsible for obtaining any use rights or local, state or federal permits, licenses or reviews that may be required before operations begin.

This decision also constitutes concurrence with Homestake use and occupancy of public lands as described in the approved Project. Homestake must maintain compliance with the Use and Occupancy regulations at 43 CFR 3715.2, 3715.2-1 and 3715.5 throughout the duration of the approved Project. Concurrence by BLM on Homestake proposed use and occupancy is not subject to State Director review, but may be appealed by adversely affected parties directly to the Interior Board of Land Appeals (IBLA) as outlined in enclosed BLM form 1842-1.

The rationale in the attached FONSI supports this Decision. The Proposed Action, coupled with operating, applicant-committed environmental protection measures and reclamation measures detailed in the EA and mitigation measures listed in this document have led to my decision that all practicable means to avoid or minimize environmental harm have been adopted and that unnecessary or undue degradation of the public lands will not result. This decision is consistent with the Shoshone-Eureka Resource Management Plan (1986) and ROD.

The BLM approval of the Plan will be subject to operating, reclamation and monitoring measures proposed by Homestake in the Plan of Operations, the performance standards set forth in §3809.420 and additional BLM mitigation measures set forth in the Record of Decisions (ROD) for the original Ruby Hill Project Final Environmental Impact Statement (NV64-EIS-33) and the Ruby Hill Mine Expansion-East Archimedes Project Final Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement (NV063-EIS04-34) and restated in this Decision.

3. Conditions of Approval

Air Quality

AQ-1: Emissions of fugitive dust from disturbed surfaces would be minimized by utilizing appropriate control measures. Surface application of water from a water truck and reduced speed limits on dirt access roads is the current method of dust control during high wind conditions.

Cultural Resources

- CR-1: Pursuant to 43 CFR 10.4(g), Homestake would notify the BLM authorized officer, by telephone, and with written confirmation, immediately upon the discovery of human remains, funerary objects, sacred objects, or objects of cultural patrimony (as defined in 43 CFR 10.2). Further pursuant to 43 CFR 10.4 (c) and (d), the operator would immediately stop all activities in the vicinity of the discovery and not commence again for a maximum of 30 days or when notified to proceed by the BLM authorized officer.
- CR-2: Homestake would not knowingly disturb, alter, injure, or destroy any historical or archaeological site, structure, building, or object. If Homestake discovers any cultural resource that might be altered or destroyed by operations, the discovery would be left intact and reported to the authorized BLM officer.
- CR-3: In order to prevent impacts to cultural resources, Homestake would avoid eligible or unevaluated cultural sites within the Project Area. In order to avoid eligible or unevaluated cultural sites, Homestake would submit an annual work plan to the BLM. Homestake would ensure that eligible or unevaluated cultural sites within the area of proposed phase surface disturbance are mapped by a qualified cultural resource specialist with a global positioning system (GPS) unit prior to surface disturbance, and a summary report of that mapping would be provided to the BLM by the cultural resource specialist. The BLM would review the proposed locations of the surface disturbance and notify Homestake if the locations overlap with an eligible or unevaluated cultural site. If an eligible or unevaluated cultural site is located within the area of proposed surface disturbance, the identified cultural site(s) would be avoided.

Erosion and Sediment Control

- EC-1: Final reclamation of the surface mine, constructed roads, sumps, and drill pads would consist of, if applicable, fully recontouring disturbances to their original grade and reseeding in the fall season immediately following completion of exploration and mining activities. Overland travel routes would be scarified, if compacted, and then seeded.
- EC-2: Reseeding would be consistent with all BLM recommendations for mix constituents, application rate, and seeding methods.
- EC-3 Mine reclamation would be implemented to create a safe and stable topographic feature. The in-pit bench and highwalls would be left in place upon completion of mining. A chain-link fence would be installed around the open pit. Safety berms would be constructed inside of the fence and revegetated. After dewatering activities cease, a pit lake is anticipated to form in the bottom of the open pit. Reclamation activities would be scheduled as soon as possible after mining activities in a particular area are completed and to take advantage of optimal climatic conditions.
- EC-4: Drill pads and sumps would be reclaimed as soon as practicable after completion of logging and sampling.

Fire Management

- FM-1: All applicable state and federal fire laws and regulations would be complied with and all reasonable measures would be taken to prevent and suppress fires in the Project Area.
- FM-2: In the event the Project should start a fire, Homestake would be responsible for all the costs associated with suppression. The following precautionary measures would be taken to prevent and report wildland fires:
- FM-2a: All vehicles should carry fire extinguishers, and a minimum of 10 gallons of water.
- FM-2b: Adequate firefighting equipment i.e. shovel, pulaski, extinguisher(s), and a minimum 10 gallons of water should be kept at the drill site(s).
- FM-2c: Vehicle catalytic converters would be inspected often and cleaned of all brush and grass debris.
- FM-2d: Homestake would conduct welding operations in an area free from or mostly free from vegetation. A minimum of 10 gallons water and a shovel should be on hand to extinguish any fires created from the sparks. Extra personnel should be at the welding site to watch for fires created by welding sparks.
- FM-2e: Homestake would report wildland fires immediately to the BLM Central Nevada Interagency Dispatch Center (CNIDC) at (775) 623-3444. Helpful information to be reported is location (latitude and longitude if possible), what is burning, time started, who/what is near the fire, and direction of fire spread.
- FM-2f: When conducting operations during the months of May through September, Homestake would contact the BLM MLFO, Division of Fire and Aviation at (775) 635-4000 to inquire about any fire restrictions in place for the area of operation and to advise this office of approximate beginning and ending dates for your activities.
- FM-3: A defensible space around fire-sensitive equipment utilized in the Project Area would be created. The defensible space would be 2.5 times the height of the vegetation in the area.

Hazardous or Solid Wastes

- HSW-1: Pursuant to 43 CFR 8365.1-1(b)(3), no sewage, petroleum products, or refuse would be dumped from any trailer or vehicle.
- HSW-2: Only nontoxic fluids would be used in the drilling process.
- HSW-3: Regulated wastes would be removed from the Project Area and disposed of in a state, federal, or local designated area.
- HSW-4: If a spill of a petroleum constituent is considered to meet the reportable quantity per the NDEP's guidelines (greater than 25 gallons or greater than 3 cubic yards of impacted material) or a reportable quantity for hazardous waste is released based on the Federal EPA guidelines

established under Title III (40 C.F.R. Part 302), the NDEP would be notified within 24 hours and the appropriate remedial actions and confirmation sampling would be conducted under direction of the NDEP.

Noxious Weeds, Invasive and Non-native Species

NW-1: Noxious weeds would be controlled through implementation of preventive Best Management Practices (BMPs) and eradication measures if noxious weeds were found.

NW-2: To eliminate the transport of vehicle-borne noxious weed seeds, roots, or rhizomes all vehicles and heavy equipment used for the completion, maintenance, inspection, or monitoring of ground disturbing activities, for emergency fire suppression, or for authorized off-road driving within the Project Area would be free of soil and debris capable of transporting weed. Vehicles used for emergency fire suppression would be cleaned as part of check-in and demobilization procedures. Cleaning efforts would concentrate on tracks, feet and tires, and on the undercarriage. Special emphasis would be applied to the axles, frames, cross members, motor mounts, on and underneath the steps, running boards, and front bumper/brush guard assemblies. Vehicle cabs would be swept out and refuse would be disposed of in waste receptacles. Cleaning sites would be recorded using GPS and provided to the MLFO weed coordinator or designated contact person.

MW-3: Homestake would coordinate the eradication of the known population of musk thistle with the BLM prior to surface disturbing activities in the vicinity of this population.

NW-4: The strategy for noxious weed management is to "prevent and control the spread of noxious weeds through local and regional cooperative efforts to ensure maintenance and restoration of healthy ecosystems in BLM managed lands." Noxious weed and invasive species control would be based on a program of "prevention, education, detection, and rapid response and control of small infestations." New surface disturbance from the Proposed Action would increase the potential for and promote the spread and establishment of noxious weeds and invasive and nonnative species. These impacts would be temporary and minimal based on implementation of the Applicant-Committed Environmental Protection Measures outlined in Section 2.1.12, as well as the continued implementation of the Project's Noxious Weed Management Plan (SRK 2010).

Migratory Birds

MB-1: In order to avoid potential impacts to breeding migratory birds (including golden eagles [Aquila chrysaetos]), a nest survey would be conducted by a BLM approved biologist prior to any surface disturbance associated with exploration activities during the avian breeding season (March 1 through August 31 for raptors and April 1 through August 1 for other avian species). Pre-disturbance surveys for migratory birds are only valid for 14 days. If the disturbance for the specific location does not occur within 14 days of the survey another survey would be needed. If nests are located, or if other evidence of nesting (i.e., mated pairs, territorial defense, carrying nest material, transporting food) is observed, a protective buffer (the size depending on the habitat requirements of the species) would be delineated after consultation with the BLM resource specialist and the buffer area avoided to prevent destruction or disturbance to nests or birds until they are no longer actively breeding or rearing young. The site characteristics to be

used to determine the size of the buffer area are as follows: a) topographic screening; b) distance from disturbance to nest; c) the size and quality of foraging habitat surrounding the nest; d) sensitivity of the species to nest disturbances; and e) the protection status of the species.

Native American Concerns

NA-1: Tribal representatives and/or lineal descendants, along with BLM cultural resources specialists, may periodically monitor identified sites (previously identified or inadvertent discovery of any new site). This monitoring may continue throughout the life of the Project.

NA-2: With the implementation of the protection, avoidance, and monitoring measures previously described above, no additional mitigation measures are necessary at this time (pending continued consultation). However, as the Project Area continues to be utilized or new disturbance is proposed, consultation can be reinitiated for the same activity at any time. Depending on observed impacts, monitoring, identified mitigation measures, unforeseen impacts, growth of the Project, and continued tribal participation, consultation can occur throughout the life of this Project.

Paleontological Resources

PR-1: Homestake would not knowingly disturb, alter, injure, or destroy any scientifically important paleontological deposits. If Homestake discovers any paleontological resource that might be altered or destroyed by operations, the discovery would be left intact and reported to the authorized BLM officer.

Public Safety

- PS-1: Public safety would be maintained throughout the life of the Project. All equipment and other facilities would be maintained in a safe and orderly manner.
- PS-2: All trenches, sumps, and other small excavations that pose a hazard or nuisance to the public, wildlife, or livestock would be adequately fenced to preclude access.
- PS-3: Activities would be restricted to frozen or dry ground conditions where feasible. Operations would be curtailed when saturated and soft soil conditions exist.
- PS-4: In the event that any existing roads are severely damaged as a result of Homestake activities, Homestake would return them to their original condition.

Survey Monuments

SM-1: As directed in 43 CFR 3809.420 – Surface Management – (b) (9) Protection of survey monuments, it is your responsibility to bear the cost of any necessary restoration or reestablishment activity of the affected monument(s). Correspondingly, in the course of any accepted surface disturbance activity when Public Survey System Monuments/Cadastral corners or accessories that may or have been subject to obliteration, destruction, or damage, it will be your responsibility to protect and preserve the monumentation. Further clarification can be found in Nevada BLM's Instruction Memorandum No. NV-2007-003 www.nv.blm.gov.

Water Quality

WQ-1: In order to avoid potential impacts to water resources within the Project Area, Homestake would avoid direct impacts to the riparian areas within the Project Area.

WQ-2: All springs and seeps within three miles of the Project Area are located above the ground water table and are upgradient of the proposed expansion. Impacts to seeps and springs are not anticipated from the Project. Intermittent drainages may be impacted by the Proposed Action as a result of removal of intermittent stream segments within the Project Area. However, intermittent streams located in the Project Area are not considered to be jurisdictional waters of the United States (BLM 2005). Also, there are no receiving surface water bodies within the Project Area or immediate vicinity other than intermittent or ephemeral drainages. Runoff and sedimentation within the Project Area would be minimized by Applicant-Committed. Environmental Protection Measures outlined in Section 2.1.12, including the use of BMPs, and those measures established in prior authorizations within the Project Area. Consequently, impact to surface water quality through sedimentation would be minimal.

WQ-3: As permitted in the Water Pollution Control Permit (WPCP), the conceptual process pond and associated facilities proposed by the Project would be equipped with a liner system to prevent leaching into the groundwater system. Therefore, contamination of groundwater by leach solution is not anticipated. No major differences would exist in the amount of Potentially Acid Generating (PAG) material present in the mined material above the proposed pit bottom elevation, as the additional ore would essentially be the same material as mined under the current authorization. PAG would continue to be managed per the requirement of the ROD for the 2004 SEIS and requirements of WPCP. Therefore, no additional PAG issues are anticipated. The water quality associated with the pit lake is expected to meet all current Nevada groundwater standards, and varies little when compared to the predicted water quality of the pit lake assessment under existing conditions (Schafer 2004 and Schafer 2010).

WQ-4: Surface disturbance associated with proposed drill site locations adjacent to drainages would be set back 20 feet from the banks of this water course to avoid accelerated sedimentation and impacts to water quality. Further, BMPs including the installation of straw waddles or bales would be implemented on the downslope side of the disturbance footprint to further protect this water course from sedimentation. No drill sites would be located within the bed of this water course.

WQ-5: All but three drill holes would be surveyed and plugged as an operational procedure immediately after completion of drilling in accordance with NAC 534.421 and 534.425. Three drill holes would be collared with a reverse circulation drill rig and completed using a core rig. Once the core rig has completed drilling, the hole would be plugged. Remaining drill holes would be plugged by placing drill cuttings or inorganic fill material into the total depth of the hole, or if ground water is encountered, plugged as a well pursuant to NAC 534.420.

WQ-6: Drill cuttings would be contained and fluids managed on site utilizing appropriate control measures. Sediment traps would be used as necessary and filled at the end of the drill program.

WQ-7: Homestake would follow the Spill Contingency Plan for the Project as outlined in the Plan.

WQ-8: If artesian water is encountered in any well or borehole, it will be controlled as required in the NRS § 534.060(3).

Wilderness Study Area

WSA-1: Homestake will survey and flag the boundary of the Diamond Mountains and Diamond Valley Wilderness Study Area (WSA) where it bounds the Project Area to ensure that surface disturbing activity is minimized within the WSA.

RATIONALE

The Proposed Action analyzed in DOI-BLM-NV-B010-2012-0047-EA and the attached FONSI show that all practicable means to avoid or minimize environmental harm have been adopted and that unnecessary or undue degradation of the public lands will not occur as a result of the activities at the Ruby Hill Project.

The Proposed Action is in conformance with the Shoshone-Eureka Resource Management Plan Record of Decision (ROD) which states: 1) "Make available and encourage development of mineral resources to meet national, regional, and local needs consistent with national objectives for an adequate supply of minerals (page 29)," 2) the ROD also states "All public lands in the planning area will be open for mining and prospecting unless withdrawn from mineral entry (page 29)," and 3) final reclamation will ensure public safety and the return of the exploration disturbance to its pre-exploration land uses of grazing, wildlife habitat, and mineral exploration. Final reclamation will also reduce visual contrast created during the mining operation.

The Proposed Action is in conformance with the President's National Energy Policy Act of 2005 as per Instruction Memorandum (IM-2002-053), as put forth in Executive Order 13212 and will not have an adverse impact on energy development, production, supply, and/or distribution. The EA and FONSI support this decision.

AUTHORITY

This Decision is in conformance with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) of 1969 (P.L. 91-190) as amended (72 USC 4321 et.seq.); General and Title V of the Federal Land Management Policy Act of 1976 (FLPMA); 43 CFR Part 3800 Subpart 3809- Surface Management (16 USC et.seq.); and 43 CFR Part 3710 Subpart 3715 – Use and Occupancy Under the Mining Laws.

APPEAL PROVISIONS

If you are adversely affected by this decision, you may request that the Nevada BLM State Director review this decision. If you request a State Director Review, the request must be received in the BLM Nevada State Office at:

no later than 30 calendar days after you receive or have been notified of this decision. The request for State Director Review must be filed in accordance with the provisions in 43 CFR 3809.805. This decision will remain in effect while the State Director Review is pending, unless a stay is granted by the State Director. If you request a stay, you have the burden of proof to demonstrate that a stay should be granted.

If the State Director does not make a decision on your request for review of this decision within 21 days of receipt of the request, you should consider the request declined and you may appeal this decision to the Interior Board of Land Appeals (IBLA). You may contact the BLM Nevada State Office to determine when the BLM received the request for State Director Review. You have 30 days from the end of the 21-day period in which to file your Notice of Appeal with this office at 50 Bastian Road, Battle Mountain, NV 89820, which we will forward to IBLA.

If you wish to bypass a State Director Review, this decision may be appealed directly to the IBLA in accordance with the regulations at 43 CFR 3809.801(a)(1). Your Notice of Appeal must be filed in this office at 50 Bastian Road, Battle Mountain, NV 89820, within 30 days from receipt of this decision. As the appellant, you have the burden of showing that the decision appealed from is in error. Enclosed is BLM Form 1842-1 that contains information on taking appeals to the IBLA.

This decision will remain in effect while the IBLA reviews the case, unless a stay is granted by the IBLA. If you request a stay, you have the burden of proof to demonstrate that a stay should be granted.

Request for a Stay

If you wish to file a petition pursuant to regulations 43 CFR 4.21 for a stay of the effectiveness of this decision during the time that your appeal is being reviewed by IBLA, the petition for a stay must accompany your notice of appeal. A petition for a stay is required to show sufficient justification based on the standards listed below. Copies of this notice of appeal and petition for a stay must also be submitted to each party named in the decision and to the IBLA and to the appropriate Office of the Solicitor (see 43 CFR 4.413) at the same time the original documents are filed with this office. If you request a stay, you have the burden of proof to demonstrate that a stay should be granted.

Standards for Obtaining a Stay

Except as otherwise provided by law or other pertinent regulation, a petition for a stay of a decision pending appeal must show sufficient justification based on the following standards:

- 1. The relative harm to parties if the stay is granted or denied.
- 2. The likelihood of the appellant's success on the merits.
- 3. The likelihood of immediate and irreparable harm if the stay is not granted.

4. Whether the public interest favors granting the stay.

FINDING OF NO SIGNIFICANT IMPACT

Environmental Assessment (EA) DOI-BLM-NV-B010-2012-0047-EA, dated October 2012, has been reviewed by the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and the public for a 30-day comment period. After consideration of the environmental effects as described in the EA, the Records of Decision (ROD) for the original Ruby Hill Project Final Environmental Impact Statement (NV64-EIS96-33) and the Ruby Hill Mine Expansion- East Archimedes Project Final Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement (NV063-EIS04-34), the Proposed Action is not a major Federal Action and will not significantly affect the quality of human environment; individually or cumulatively with other actions in the general area. No environmental effects meet the definition of significance in context or intensity as described in 40 CFR 1508.27. Therefore, preparation of an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) is not required as per Section 102(2)(c) of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA).

LAND USE PLAN CONFORMANCE

The BLM-managed public lands within the Project Area are administered through the Mount Lewis Field Office (MLFO). The area is subject to the BLM Shoshone-Eureka Resource Management Plan (RMP), which was approved in 1986, and its amendments. It has been determined that the Proposed Action is in conformance with the approved Shoshone-Eureka Resource Management Plan and its amendments, and is consistent with the plans and policies of neighboring local, county, state, and federal agencies and governments. Although Eureka County, through coordination with the BLM and the project proponent, has determined that the proposed project is substantially consistent with the policies in Eureka County's Master Plan, some of the components of the proposed project could prove inconsistent with these plans and policies as described in Section 1.5.2 of the EA.

FINDING OF NO SIGNIFICANT IMPACT

I have reviewed Environmental Assessment DOI-BLM-NV-B010-2012-0047-EA, dated October 2012. After consideration of the environmental effects, as described in the EA and incorporated herein, I have determined that the Proposed Action, with the project design specifications including adopted environmental protection measures and required mitigation measures identified in the EA, will not significantly affect the quality of the human environment and that an Environmental Impact Statement is not required to be prepared.

This finding and conclusion are based on consideration of the Council on Environmental Quality's (CEQ) criteria for significance (40 CFR 1508.27), both with regard to the context and the intensity of impacts described in the EA and summarized below.

CONTEXT

Homestake Mining Company of California (Homestake), a wholly owned subsidiary of Barrick Gold Corporation (Barrick) submitted to the BLM and the Nevada Division of Environmental Protection (NDEP) Bureau of Mining Regulation and Reclamation (BMRR) an Amendment to the Plan of Operation and Nevada Reclamation Permit (Record Number NVN-067762/Reclamation Permit No. 0107) (Plan) to expand an existing open pit gold and silver mining and processing operation. The proposed expansion, which has been analyzed in the EA as the Proposed Action, would utilize the existing primary and secondary crushers, solution processing plant, and ancillary support facilities. The Plan includes the following activities: expansion of the existing open pit and pit activity area (PAA); lowering of the final pit bottom by 240 feet to 5,100 feet amsl; inclusion of a conceptual process pond for future fluid management of the heap drain down flows during closure; realignment of portions of the existing perimeter fence associated with the open pit expansion; increasing the authorized acreage of surface exploration related disturbance; expansion of the Class III landfill; and the establishment of a flexible mining and ore hauling timeline based on mining rates and economic conditions.

Expansion activities would disturb approximately 34.3 acres of additional BLM-administered public land and approximately 72.3 acres of additional private land for a proposed surface disturbance total of 106.6 acres. The total of the existing and proposed surface disturbance for the Project would be 1,742.4 acres within the existing Project Area.

Pursuant to the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) and the Council on Environmental Quality (CEQ) regulations on implementing NEPA, the EA identifies, describes, and evaluates resource protection measures that would mitigate the possible impacts of the proposed project. The short and long-term impacts as disclosed in the EA are not considered to be significant to the human environment. The short-term impacts from implementation of the Proposed Action are local; they are not regional or national in nature. The long-term impacts resulting from the Proposed Action will be mitigated by ongoing reclamation during the life of the project and final reclamation upon completion of the project.

INTENSITY

1. Impacts that may be both beneficial and adverse.

The EA considered impacts that may be both beneficial and adverse through the analysis of direct, indirect, and cumulative impacts of the Proposed Action. The impacts are described in detail in Chapter 3 and Chapter 4 of the EA.

Beneficial impacts include the socioeconomic effects to the local and national economy resulting from the extraction of economically recoverable gold and other minerals. Homestake would maintain the current workforce of approximately 147 employees for mining and processing operations and concurrent reclamation through approximately 2016.

Adverse Impacts would be avoided or minimized by operations and reclamation measures committed to by Homestake, which are presented as part of the Proposed Action in Chapter 2. Additionally, reclamation and revegetation of the project disturbance would gradually reestablish soils, vegetation cover and wildlife habitat.

None of the environmental impacts discussed in detail in Chapter 3 or 4 of the EA are considered significant.

2. The degree to which the proposed action affects public health and safety. The effects of the Proposed Action on both employees and public health and safety are considered to be positive. Compliance by Homestake with both BLM and NDEP mining regulations, along with compliance with the Mine Safety and Health Administrations' regulations will ensure employee and public safety.

Through adherence to applicant-committed environmental protection measures, and Best Management Practices (BMPs), the Proposed Action will not result in potentially substantial or adverse impacts to public health and safety. Public safety would be maintained throughout the life of the project. Homestake would commit to the following environmental protection measures to ensure public health and safety.

- All equipment and other facilities would be maintained in a safe and orderly manner.
- Personnel working at the site will keep the occasional public out of operational areas by maintaining posted signs and ensuring all visitors check-in at the office trailer upon arrival on-site.
- All trenches, sumps, and other small excavations that pose a hazard or nuisance to the public, wildlife, or livestock will be adequately fenced to preclude access to them.
- The Project will not use pesticides or herbicides, therefore would not pose a health or human safety risk.
- Existing roads within the project boundary that are disturbed during the proposed action will be reclaimed to their pre-disturbance condition in order to provide continued public access through the area. Unpaved roads are well maintained and accommodate two-lane traffic to and from the project area.
- Unpaved roads are well maintained and accommodate two-lane traffic to and from the project area.
- Trash will be contained and hauled to an approved landfill.
- Only nontoxic fluids would be used in the drilling process.
- Emissions of fugitive dust from disturbed surfaces would be minimized by utilizing appropriate control measures.
 - 3. Unique characteristics of the geographic area such as proximity of historic or cultural resources, park lands, prime farmlands, wetlands, wild and scenic rivers, or ecologically critical areas.

The Ruby Hill Project (Project) is an existing mining operation located approximately 0.7 mile northwest of the town of Eureka, Nevada. Access to the Project Area is provided by an existing road off U.S. Highway 50. There are no park lands, prime farmlands, wild and scenic rivers, or ecologically critical areas in the vicinity.

The Project Area includes approximately 8,411 acres that consist of approximately 3,015 acres of private land owned by Barrick and operated by Homestake, and approximately 5,396 acres of public land administered by the Bureau of Land management (BLM) Battle Mountain District, Mount Lewis Field Office (MLFO).

There are known cultural resources located within the Project Area. All known National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) eligible and unevaluated cultural resource sites will be avoided. In order to avoid known cultural sites, Homestake will submit an annual work plan to the BLM. Homestake will ensure that known cultural sites within the area of proposed phase surface disturbance are mapped by a qualified cultural resource specialist with a GPS unit prior to surface disturbance, and a summary report of that mapping will be provided to the BLM by the cultural resource specialist. The BLM will review the proposed locations of the surface disturbance and notify Homestake if the locations overlap with any cultural sites. If a cultural site is located within the area of proposed disturbance, the identified cultural site(s) will be avoided or re-evaluated.

The entire Project Area falls within greater sage-grouse summer and nesting habitat and the western half of the Project Area is considered suitable winter habitat for greater sage-grouse (NDOW 2011a). However, the existing disturbance and active mining are likely to preclude the use by greater sage-grouse in the Project Area. Additionally, there is no preliminary priority habitat located within the Project Area and approximately 2,402 acres of preliminary general habitat (PGH) located within the Project Area. None of the areas identified as PGH within the Project Area is subject to proposed disturbance from the expansion of the mine facilities; however, exploration drilling may occur in these areas as approved through previous decisions.

There are no park lands, prime farmlands, wetlands, wild and scenic rivers, or ecologically critical areas in the vicinity of the Project.

4. The degree to which the effects on the quality of the human environment are likely to be highly controversial.

The Proposed Action is not expected to have highly controversial effects on the quality of the human environment. The parameters of the exploration activities, along with associated reclamation of the drill holes, drill pads and sumps, roads, and ancillary facilities are well established. The Project Area is isolated from human habitations. Except for mineral exploration and mining, the Project Area is typically uninhabited. Eureka, the nearest town, is 0.7 mile from the Project Area. Reclamation is intended to return the land to its pre-exploration uses of livestock grazing, mineral exploration, dispersed recreation, and wildlife habitat.

The EA was released for a 30-day public comment period, ending September 10, 2012 and the BLM received 3 comments letters totaling 34 individual comments. The comments and the BLM's responses to comments were incorporated into the EA as Appendix A. A consultation, initiation, and notification letter for the Proposed Action was mailed from the MLFO to four Native American tribes on March 14, 2012. No comments specific to the Proposed Action were received as a result of the tribal coordination.

5. The degree to which the possible effects on the human environment are highly uncertain or involve unique or unknown risks.

There are no known effects of the Proposed Action identified in the EA that are considered highly uncertain or involve unique or unknown risks. This is demonstrated through the effects analysis in Chapters 3 and 4 of the EA.

6. The degree to which the action may establish a precedent for future actions with significant effects or represents a decision in principle about a future consideration.

The Proposed Action will not establish a precedent for future actions with significant effects or represent a decision about a future consideration. Completion of the EA does not establish a precedent for other assessments or authorization of other exploration or development projects including additional actions at the Ruby Hill Project site. Any future projects within the area or in surrounding areas will be analyzed on their own merits, independent of the actions currently selected.

7. Whether the action is related to other actions with individually insignificant but cumulatively significant impacts.

Direct and indirect impacts of the Proposed Action were analyzed in Chapter 3 of the EA. None of the environmental impacts analyzed in detail in Chapter 3 of the EA are considered significant. Past, present and reasonably foreseeable future actions have been considered in combination with the Proposed Action in the cumulative impacts analysis within Chapter 4 of the EA. The cumulative impacts analysis examined all of the other appropriate actions and determined that the Proposed Action would not incrementally contribute to significant impacts. In addition, for any actions that might be proposed in the future, further environmental analysis, including assessment of cumulative impacts, would be required.

8. The degree to which the action may adversely affect districts, sites, highways, structures, or objects listed in or eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places or may cause loss or destruction of significant scientific, cultural, or historic resources.

In 2011, Kautz Environmental Consultants, Inc (Kautz) conducted a Class III cultural resource inventory within a 3,437-acre block entirely contained within the boundary of the Baseline Study Area (Kautz 2012), as defined in the Ruby Hill Mine Expansion – East Archimede Project Final SEIS (BLM 2005), which incorporated several previous surveys within the Project Area. A total of 252 archaeological sites, both historic and prehistoric, were identified and recorded during this inventory, including 171 newly identified sites and 81 previously recorded sites (50 previously recorded sites were not relocated). The entire block was identified as being located within the Eureka Historic District. All of these sites are currently unevaluated.

Two of the unevaluated sites are within the currently proposed expansion area. Only one of the sites is recommended as eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) under criteria A (sites that are associated with events that have made a significant contribution to the broad patterns of our history) and D (sites that have yielded or may be likely to yield, information important in history or prehistory) (NPS 1990). The BLM has reviewed these recommendations and has referred them to the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) for concurrence. Once concurrence has been made by SHPO, the BLM can make a formal determination of NRHP eligibility for the site and determine project effects per Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 (NHPA). It is not critical that this formal determination is made prior to a decision on the Proposed Action as all eligible and unevaluated sites would be avoided as described in Section 2.1.12 of the EA.

Homestake entered into a Programmatic Agreement (PA)in 1995 with the BLM, SHPO, and the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP) regarding the management of cultural resources during mineral development and exploration activities at Ruby Hill. The PA identified

measures on how to implement Section 106 of the NHPA for sites eligible for listing in the NRHP and unevaluated sites that may be eligible for listing. Stipulations are included in the PA for the following: identification; resolving eligibility; treatment; discovery situations; other considerations; reporting and monitoring; notices to proceed; time frames; surety bonds; dispute resolution; amendment; termination; and execution.

Homestake has committed to avoid, or mitigate impacts to, all known eligible and potentially eligible sites, as described in the Plan. In order to avoid all known cultural sites, Homestake would submit an annual work plan to the BLM. Homestake would ensure that known cultural sites within the area of proposed phase surface disturbance are mapped by a qualified cultural resource specialist with a GPS unit prior to surface disturbance, and a summary report of that mapping would be provided to the BLM by the cultural resource specialist. There are no other districts, sites, highways, structures, or objects listed in or eligible for listing in the NRHP within the Project Area. There are no significant scientific, cultural, or historical resources that will be lost or destroyed by the exploration and mining project. If Homestake discovers any cultural or paleontological resource during project activities that might be altered or destroyed by operations, the discovery would be left intact and reported to the authorized BLM officer.

9. The degree to which the action may adversely affect an endangered or threatened species or its habitat that has been determined to be critical under the Endangered Species Act (ESA) of 1973.

No federally-listed, threatened, or endangered species would be impacted because none of these species are known to occur within the Project Area. No Threatened and Endangered Species were observed during baseline surveys.

The Nevada Natural Heritage Program (NNHP) response letter, dated September 1, 2011, reported in a five kilometer radius search surrounding the townships and ranges of the Project Area, there were no at risk or federally listed species occurrences recorded. The Nevada Department of Wildlife (NDOW) response letter, dated September 12, 2011, reported there were no federally listed species that are known to occur in the Project Area (NDOW 2011a). The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) response letter, dated September 8, 2011, reported there were no known listed species that occur in the Project Area (USFWS 2011).

SRK Consulting (SRK), the NDOW, NNHP, and BLM have identified that various BLM sensitive mammal, raptor, bird, and bat species have the potential to occur within the Project Area. The NNHP has identified habitat for the Lahontan beardtongue (*Penstemon palmeri var. macranthus*), a BLM special status plant species. In addition, the NNHP identified that habitat exists for the western yellow-billed cuckoo (*Coccyzux americanus occidentalis*), a candidate species (NNHP 2011) and BLM sensitive species.

Potential habitat for Special Status Species is known to occur in the Project Area including Greater sage-grouse, pygmy rabbits, and migratory bird species. None of the species of concern were observed during baseline surveys. According to the NDOW, ferruginous hawk (buteo regalis), golden eagle, Swainson's hawk (Buteo swainsoni), golden eagle (Aquila chrysacetos), peregrine falcon (Falco peregrinus), big-eared bat (Corynorhinus townsendii) may be present in the Project Area. According to NDOW, greater sage grouse may occur within the project area. American pika (Ochotona princeps) are found in the foothills and mountains. They eat a variety

of plants, mainly grasses and sedges. This species has the potential to occur within the foothills of the Project Area (SRK 2011a).

The NDOW and BLM have noted that several sensitive raptor species may utilize habitat within the Project Area and include ferruginous hawk, northern goshawk (Accipiter gentilis), peregrine falcon, and golden eagle (Aquila chrysacetos). The NDOW also indicated that habitat exists within the Project Area for the western burrowing owl (Athene cunicularia hypugaea) (NDOW 2011a). Other BLM sensitive birds species that have potential habitat may occur within the Project Area for the Townsend's big-eared bat (Corynorhinus toewnsendii) western small-footed myotis (Myotis ciliolabrum) (NNHP 2011). Additional bat species that are known to exist based on previous surveys within the Project Area include big brown bats (Eptesicus fuscus) and long-legged myotis (Myotis volans). The NNHP (September 1, 2011) stated that habitat for Lahontan beardtongue, a BLM sensitive plant species, may also exist within the Project Area.

Impacts to special status species or their habitats from the Proposed Action would be minimal, based on implementation of the applicant committed environmental protection measures outlined in Section 2.1.14 of the EA and mitigation outlined in the ROD for the original Ruby Hill Project Final Environmental Impact Statement (NV64 EIS96.33) and the Ruby Hill Mine Expansion-East Archimedes Project Final Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement (NV063-EIS04-34). The Proposed Action compiles with the EA, in that potential effects of this decision on listed species have been analyzed and documented. The Proposed Action will not adversely affect any endangered or threatened species or its habitat that has been determined to be critical under the ESA of 1973, as amended.

10. Whether the action threatens a violation of Federal, State, or Local law or requirements imposed for the protection of the environment.

The Proposed Action will not violate or threatens to violate any federal, state, or local law or requirement imposed for the protection of the environment.

This estimate is based on data from the U.S. Census Bureau County Business Patterns and includes industrial sectors that, at least in part, provide goods and services to visitors, the local economy, and the local population. It includes both full- and part-time jobs. Most of these jobs are concentrated in the "accommodation and food services" sector. In 2010, the Socioeconomic Study Area's proportion of travel and tourism-related jobs was 9.5 percentage points higher than the national average of 15.1 percent. Jobs related to travel and tourism are more likely to be seasonal and/or part-time and more likely to have lower average annual earnings than jobs in non-travel and tourism-related sectors. The average annual wage per travel or tourism related job was \$20,823 (2010 dollars) in the Socioeconomic Study Area in 2011, compared to \$48,787 for jobs not related to travel and tourism (Headwaters Economics, 2012).

Although much of the recreation use on BLM lands is dispersed and far from counting devices (e.g., trail registers, fee stations, or vehicle traffic counters), approximations of the number of visitors to BLM-administered lands can be obtained from the BLM Recreation Management Information System (RMIS) database, in which BLM recreation specialists provide estimated total visits and visitor days to various sites within their field office boundaries. Table 8 summarizes BLM visitation data in each field office for fiscal year (FY) 2011 (i.e., the year ending September 30, 2011) and USFS visitation data from Round 2 of the National Visitor Use Monitoring program (NVUM).

Visitor expenditures can be approximated by using the RMIS data in conjunction with data from USFS, which has constructed recreation visitor spending profiles based on years of survey data gathered through the USFS NVUM. Although the data are collected from National Forest visitors, the analysis that follows is

With respect to personal earnings, the services related sector accounted for the largest share (61.2 percent) of labor income in the Socioeconomic Study Area in 2010, followed by the government sector (20.9 percent) and the non-services related sector (19.7 percent). In 2010, the individual industries that generated the largest shares of personal earnings were the local government industry (9.9 percent); the healthcare and social services industry (9.8 percent); and the mining trade industry (7.2 percent). The management of companies and enterprises industry, the farming industry, and the mining industry showed strong growth since 2001 (a percent change of 55.4 percent, 47.7 percent, and 46.3 percent, respectively); these were the three highest growth rates between 2001 and 2010. During the same time period, the information industry and the forestry, fishing, and related activities industry experienced declines of 32.0 percent and 27.8 percent, respectively, the greatest declines of all the industry sectors.

The largest industry sector in the Socioeconomic Study Area is the services related sector, which comprised 71.5 percent of total employment in the Socioeconomic Study Area in 2010. This reflects a growth rate of 12.8 percent since 2001 (compared to an overall employment growth rate of 9.4 percent since 2001). Compared to the services related sector, the government sector and the non-services related sector represented much lower levels of employment, 14.4 percent and 13.8 percent, respectively. Within the services related sector, the accommodation and food services industry (11.2 percent) and retail trade industry (10.1 percent) accounted for the largest share of employment in 2010, followed by the health care and social assistance industry (8.2 percent). The industries that demonstrated the largest growth between 2001 and 2010 were the management of companies and enterprises industry, with an increase of 103.9 percent; the educational services industry, with an increase of 90.8 percent; and the real estate and rental and leasing industry, with an increase of 72.6 percent. Eight industries declined in employment levels from 2001 to 2010, including the accommodation and food services industry (16.1 percent decline) and farm industry (5.6 percent decline).

Appendix X provides county-level employment figures for 2010. The greatest difference in industry proportion between counties in 2010 was in the mining industry, which contributed just 0.6 percent of total employment in Washoe County, Nevada but contributed a much higher share (79.6 percent) in Eureka County, Nevada. Note that the data source does not release employment data in three of the counties to protect business confidentiality. The percentage of employment generated by the accommodation and food services industry also varied across the counties in the Socioeconomic Study Area, from 1.3 percent in Eureka County, Nevada to 21.6 percent in Elko County, Nevada. The retail trade industry, which is another recreation-related industry like accommodation and food services, also varied in importance across counties, contributing a low 1.1 percent of employment in Eureka County, Nevada and higher shares in Lincoln

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example, recreation opportunities, flood protection, waste assimilation, and carbon sequestration. Note, in addition, that the section above on "Interest Groups and Communities of Place" provides key concerns cited by the public during scoping and the BLM's Economic Strategies Workshop in June 2012.

Researchers at ERS have developed a natural amenities scale based on the premise that people are drawn to areas with certain characteristics: varied topography; lakes, ponds, or oceanfront; warm, sunny winters; and temperate, low-humidity summers. The natural amenities scale is a measure of the physical characteristics of a county area that enhance the location as a place to live. The scale was constructed by combining six measures of climate, topography, and water area that reflect environmental qualities most people prefer. These measures are warm winter, winter sun, temperate summer, low summer humidity, topographic variation, and water area. The data are available for counties in the lower 48 States. Because the amenity measures had different scales, ERS normalized each measure so each had a mean of zero and a standard deviation of one. The combined scale was created by summing those normalized measures for each county, Finally, ERS ranked all the counties in the U.S. and constructed a "Natural Amenity Rank" ranging from a low of 1 to a high of 7 based on the deviation of a particular county's score from the mean score for the entire country: a rank of I for a county score that was over two standard deviations below the national mean, up to a rank of 7 for a county score that was more than 3 standard deviations above the national mean. A rank of 4, 5, 6, or 7 indicates a county score greater than the national mean; a rank of 1, 2, or 3 indicates a county score less than the mean (McGranahan, 1999).

Table 4 presents the natural amenities scale data for the counties in the Socioeconomic Study Area. The natural amenity rank, which ranges from a low of 1 to a high of 7, is based on the deviation of a particular county's score from the mean score for the entire United States. According to the natural amenity scale, most (11 out of 12) of the affected counties have a high level of natural amenities, indicated by scores higher than 2. Eureka County had the lowest natural amenity rating at 1.92, and Washoe County had the highest rating at 6.77.

Human beings also can use EG&S indirectly. Indirect use occurs when the good or service is an input to something else people directly use. One example of indirect use is the provision of habitat for plants and animal species then used by people, either consumptively or non-consumptively. Other examples of indirect use include flood protection, waste assimilation, and carbon sequestration.

In addition to current use of EG&S, people can benefit from (and therefore place a value on) the knowledge that they can use a good or service in the future. This component of value is called option value. One example of option value is the value an individual might place on a wilderness area they hope to visit in the future, or the value they place on a species of bird they hope to someday view.

Non-use Values

Another way society values EG&S is through non-use values, which do not involve any actual use of EG&S (either direct or indirect). One type of non-use value is existence value, which is the value people place on the knowledge that a particular good exists, even if they have no plans to personally use it. For example, individuals might place a value on the protection of endangered species, natural areas such as old-growth forests, or unique natural areas such as Great Basin or Yosemite National Parks. Similarly, bequest value refers to the value individuals might place on knowing that a good or service would be available for use by future generations.

Total Economic Value

Figure I summarizes the components of value described above. "Total economic value" is the sum of these use and non-use values of EG&S.

 ranches. The Plan maintains that, if grazing allotments were no longer available or rendered uneconomical due to unreasonable grazing fees, extensive management requirements, or excessively reduced capacity, the home ranches that depend on public land grazing allotments would lose their economic viability (Lassen County, 2000). This could cause or contribute to the failure of small ranching operations that, in addition to the tragic consequences for the families involved, contribute to the trend to convert valuable agricultural land to other, non-productive — but more lucrative — non-agricultural uses. The Lassen County Board of Supervisors firmly believes that such losses to the agricultural base erode basic values and lifestyles cherished by most county residents (Lassen County, 2000; BLM, 2007a).

The federal government owns 66 percent of Modoc County, CA. Of the remaining land, 99 percent is dedicated to agriculture or timber production. Accordingly, only one percent of all land in Modoc County is currently used for urban-style development. Key themes from the Modoc County General Plan center on preservation of agriculture, specifically the protection of water resources and limitations on rural land subdivisions. According to Modoc County planning staff, a commonly held public opinion in Modoc County is that the presence of government should be limited as much as possible. This dynamic seems to contradict to some extent the abundance of federal ownership in the state (TMRPA, 2010).

Comments received in response to the Scoping Report and the June 2012 Economic Strategies Workshop for this planning effort reflected many of the themes discussed above (BLM and USFS, 2012; BLM, 2012d). Residents expressed strong support for multi-use management strategies that would maintain or expand access to public lands for grazing, mining, and renewable energy development. Many expressed concern that placing constraints on these existing activities, as well as activities that may occur in the reasonably foreseeable future, might create economic hardship within their communities and alter traditional cultural values and lifestyles. Some voiced broader concerns about the effects of restricted access to public lands on domestic energy production and the prices of minerals and materials.

Participants in the Economic Strategies Workshop also requested that the BLM address a variety of specific concerns in its analysis of the Nevada-Northeast California sub-region, including potential non-anthropogenic impacts to sage-grouse habitat, major development projects likely to occur within the Socioeconomic Study Area in the reasonably foreseeable future, and potential economic impacts on the hunting and fishing industries.

County Land Use Plans

Federal land administered by the BLM, USFS, and other agencies in the Socioeconomic Study Area is intermingled with State and private lands. County governments have land use planning responsibility for the private lands located

County, 2010). A Community Needs Survey was completed in 2004. Fifty-two percent of the respondents indicated that parks and recreation were very important, while 38 percent ranked parks and recreation as important. Additionally, in 1994, the Lahontan Valley Environmental Alliance commissioned a quality of life study to assess the attitudes of Churchill County residents with respect to their view of future development within the County. Telephone interviews were completed with 397 residents, asking for their opinions on issues such as whether or not the county should take steps to retain agriculture, if there is an adequate water supply, and whether or not there are adequate recreation facilities. The conclusions drawn from those interviews were: (1) There is strong support for the retention and protection of agriculture; (2) There are strong concerns about the availability and quality of water; (3) There is a need for economic diversification (Churchill County, 2010).

The Pershing County economy is dominated by mining. The long-term goals of Pershing County, as indicated in the 2002 Master Plan, focus on maintaining a rural character while supporting the existing agricultural and mining industries. The plan advocates concentrating growth in existing developed areas and balancing growth with the desire to protect agricultural and open space land uses. Overall, Pershing County is in a similar position as surrounding rural Nevada and California counties in its desire to preserve a rural quality of life while promoting reasonable increases in population and economic diversity. Counties like Pershing County are highly susceptible to industry-specific fluctuations due to their less diverse economies. Local mines and the state prison account for nearly half of the county's total employment base. A change in mining regulations could impact the county financially (TMRPA, 2010).

Within Eureka, Lander, and Nye Counties, specific groups to whom management of public lands is of particular interest include private livestock grazing lessees and area ranchers, mineral estate owners, oil and gas leaseholders, and renewable energy leaseholders. Ranching and agriculture are an important part of Eureka, Lander, and Nye Counties' history, culture, and economy. Neighboring landowners adjacent to public lands are particularly concerned regarding the lack of private land available for commercial and residential development. In addition, local private landowners are concerned about how the development of public lands may impact the quality or quantity of local natural resources, particularly water. Additionally issues of importance to landowners include rural lifestyle preservation. Furthermore, special interest groups and individuals who represent resource conservation or resource use perspectives constitute another community with a specific interest in public land management. Various individuals and groups at the local, regional, and national levels are interested in how the BLM manages public lands. Many of their concerns regard wildlife, water quality, and visual quality. They value public lands for open space, wildlife, recreation, and scenic qualities among other aspects (BLM, 2011).

named Reno number one on its list of the "Best Places to Do Business in America," based on job growth figures from 274 metropolitan areas (City of Reno, 2012). With a population of 90,264, Sparks, Nevada is part of the Reno-Sparks Metropolitan Area. Sparks was reported as the fastest growing city in Nevada between 1999 and 2008. Two large suburbs, Sun Valley (population: 19,299) and Spanish Springs (population: 15,604), are to the north of Reno and are part of the Reno-Sparks Metropolitan area.

With a population of 17,947, the largest California city in the Socioeconomic Study area is Susanville. Susanville, the county seat of Lassen County, CA (NACO, 2012), is a former mining town. Susanville is also home to two California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation facilities: High Desert State Prison and California Correctional Center.

The "Communities of Place" section below provides more information about additional cities and towns in the Socioeconomic Study Area, as well as the character and history of the counties. Table 3 shows age and gender characteristics of the population in each county of the Socioeconomic Study Area.

3.1.1. Indicators

Many of the indicators used to characterize social and economic conditions are quantitative, including population, demographics (e.g., age and gender breakouts), local industry (e.g., recreation, mineral development), employment, personal income, and presence of minority and low-income populations. Other indicators, especially for social conditions, are qualitative.

3.1.2. Existing Conditions and Trends

Social Conditions

Social conditions concern human communities, including towns, cities, and rural areas, and the custom, culture, and history of the area as it relates to human settlement, as well as current social values.

Population and Demographics

Table 2 shows current and historic populations in the Socioeconomic Study Area.

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Bob Postorino covered the Distribution and Transmission

Jerry reinforced that while getting gas off at incidents is what most people are concerned about, leak spread is very important, so we let it blow while looking for the spread. He emphasized that it is not first nature to let it blow but explained why we do.

Bob added that, if the gas flow has already been squeezed off, when we show up, we are looking for migrating gas, even if it appears the emergency blow is controlled, the pipe has been pulled or stretched and could be leaking elsewhere.

A question was raised about the instruments SWGas uses and what capabilities they have. Bob explained ours are designed to detect and measure co and methane. The discussion involved whether the firemen could also purchase and use small personal sized gas detectors.

Jerry: Stop us anytime you have a question.

Bob: We use Bascom Turner, we have FI units, we have a few others. Those are the ones you'll see our guys with.

Craig Rogers: Asked how many structure fires occur in Battle Mountain involving the gas company. Bob: Less than 2 dozen.

Craig: You guys get called to all those?

Bob: Yeah. These guys (Battle Mountain emergency responders) are good, we're checking to make sure we don't have any gas anywhere else.

One of the BLM representatives and Jerry discussed the pipeline markers. The markers let you know the pipeline is there, but not the exact location. When running equipment, such as dozers, if you drop the blade, be careful. BLM guy talked about trying to keep a burm on one side of pipe when building a fire break.

They asked about the Ruby pipeline and the pressure (1440 lbs) in that pipeline. They talked about when BLM is fighting fires, not to blade the top of the pipeline off, how they have to be careful when tracking over the pipeline because in some places the pipe is not buried deep. BLM asked if they called SWGas with latitude and longitude of fire locations, could we find our pipeline. Jerry explained we could give them an idea and could verify if it is a good area to cross the pipeline. He also explained that SWGas has valves on the pipeline and do patrol every one.

BLM was advised they could call SWGas anytime, even if they didn't have any problems, if they just had questions.

The pipeline markers were discussed again, as to whether they are notated and able to be pinpointed on maps. Jerry explained that brass tags are starting to be attached to the markers, at test points, about every mile or so. Max asked if our marker gets knocked over by a cow, if SWGas replaces it. Bob advised that it is a good idea to do so but we have many miles of pipeline to patrol. Craig mentioned that it is a very rural

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Economics, 2012). This estimate is based on data from the U.S. Census Bureau County Business Patterns and includes industrial sectors that, at least in part, provide goods and services to visitors, the local economy, and the local population. It includes both full- and part-time jobs. Most of these jobs are concentrated in the "accommodation and food services" sector. In 2010, the Socioeconomic Study Area's proportion of travel and tourism-related jobs was 9.5 percentage points higher than the national average of 15.1 percent. Jobs related to travel and tourism are more likely to be seasonal and/or part-time and more likely to have lower average annual earnings than jobs in non-travel and tourism-related sectors. The average annual wage per travel or tourism related job was \$20,823 (2010 dollars) in the Socioeconomic Study Area in 2011, compared to \$48,787 for jobs not related to travel and tourism (Headwaters Economics, 2012).

Although much of the recreation use on BLM lands is dispersed and far from counting devices (e.g., trail registers, fee stations, or vehicle traffic counters), approximations of the number of visitors to BLM-administered lands can be obtained from the BLM Recreation Management Information System (RMIS) database, in which BLM recreation specialists provide estimated total visits and visitor days to various sites within their field office boundaries. Table 8 summarizes BLM visitation data in each field office for fiscal year (FY) 2011 (i.e., the year ending September 30, 2011) and USFS visitation data from Round 2 of the National Visitor Use Monitoring program (NVUM).

Visitor expenditures can be approximated by using the RMIS data in conjunction with data from USFS, which has constructed recreation visitor spending profiles based on years of survey data gathered through the USFS NVUM. Although the data are collected from National Forest visitors, the analysis that follows is

based on the NVUM profiles because the BLM has no analogous database. The profiles break down recreation spending by type of activity, day use versus overnight use, local versus non-local visitors, and "non-primary" visits (i.e., incidental visits where the primary purpose of the trip was other than visiting public lands). Table 9 summarizes individual and party visits and expenditures by trip type and estimated direct expenditure.

As Table 9 shows, the estimated total visitor spending on BLM and FS lands in the Socioeconomic Study Area was about \$403.5 million in FY 2011. It is important to note that this includes expenditures from local residents and from visitors whose use of public lands was incidental to some other primary purpose.

<u>Grazing</u>

Farming employed approximately 4,785 people in the Socioeconomic Study Area in 2010, accounting for 1.3 percent of total employment. The average annual wage for a farm job in the Socioeconomic Study Area was \$27,965 in 2010. This was lower than the average annual wage for a non-farm job (\$41,963) (Headwaters Economics, 2012).

Table 10 presents the proportion of personal income originating from farm earnings and the farm cash receipts from livestock received in 2010 throughout the Socioeconomic Study Area and Nevada and California as a whole.²

Table 10 shows that the relative contribution of farm earnings varies substantially across the counties in the Socioeconomic Study Area and that the share of farm earnings is greatest in Modoc County (22.1 percent), Pershing County (7.7 percent) and Lassen County (5.0 percent). Farm earnings in all other counties in Socioeconomic Study Area made up less than four percent of total earnings.

Table 11 provides information on active and billed Animal Unit Months (AUMs) on BLM and USFS land, for each of the BLM Field Offices and National Forest areas. The estimated gross receipts data in the table are calculated from data from the USDA Economic Research Service (ERS), which publishes annual gross receipts for cow-calf operations for different production regions across the country (USDA ERS, 2012). BLM calculated a ten-year inflation-adjusted average value per cow-calf operation from the ERS budgets, then converted that information to a per-AUM figure based on average forage requirements for a cow including other livestock (e.g., bulls and replacement heifers) that are needed to support the production from the cow (Workman, 1986). Based on these calculations, BLM estimates that ten-year average gross receipts in the Socioeconomic Study Area come to \$50.24 per AUM (2010 dollars), which is reflected in the table below.

The data in the table help to demonstrate the importance of livestock grazing throughout the Socioeconomic Study Area. It is important to remember, as well, that the data are only for forage values on BLM-administered land; forage on other public lands, and private lands, contribute additional values to the Socioeconomic Study Area. The economic analysis of the alternatives, presented in Chapter 4, addresses additional indirect contributions of livestock grazing (as well as other resource uses) to the regional economy, comparing the alternatives to one another.

Forestry and Wood Products

Timber-related industries in the Socioeconomic Study Area employed over 655 people in 2010, approximately 0.3 percent of total employment, according to the U.S. Census Bureau County Business Patterns. No county had more than 50 timber jobs, except for Washoe county, which had 597, making up 90 percent of the Socioeconomic Study Areas timber labor force. These estimates include both full- and part-time jobs and reflect three timber-related industries: "growing and harvesting," "sawmills and paper mills," and "wood products manufacturing." The share of timber-related jobs in the Socioeconomic Study Area (0.3 percent) was 0.5 percentage points lower than the national average of 0.7 percent (Headwaters Economics, 2012).

Average annual earnings for timber-related jobs tend to be higher than for nontimber jobs. However, the average annual wage per timber related job in the

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Socioeconomic Study Area in 2010 was \$39,532 (2010 dollars), compared to \$41,840 for non-timber jobs.

Renewable Energy Resources

There is one active solar energy project in the Battle Mountain Planning Area, in Nye County, with production of approximately 110 megawatts anticipated for 2013 (BLM, 2011). As of 2007, there were no applications for proposed projects in the Ely Planning Area (BLM, 2007b).

There are four wind projects in the monitoring stage in the Battle Mountain Planning Area. Meteorological towers are located in Nye County (two), Esmeralda County, and Lander County (BLM, 2011). Currently, wind energy monitoring is taking place in the Ely Planning Area, but no existing wind energy developments are present (BLM, 2007b). There has been some interest in developing wind energy within the Winnemucca Planning Area. Current activity includes placement of meteorological towers (BLM, 2010). Interest in wind energy in the Surprise Planning Area is currently focused in the southern Warner Mountains. As of 2007, one application for wind energy assessment was on file awaiting response by the applicant. Other potential wind energy applicants have initiated discussions and may be preparing plans of operation. Wind energy right-of-way concerns are focused on visual degradation and disruption of wildlife migration (BLM, 2007c).

As of 2007, the Battle Mountain Planning Area had 86 authorized geothermal leases covering 97,005 acres, two pending geothermal applications covering 12,137 acres, one recently permitted plan of development for geothermal leasing, and one existing geothermal plant. About 20 percent of the lands within the Battle Mountain District are potentially valuable geothermal resource areas, located mainly in the Esmeralda and Lander Counties. Pending lease application sites cover less than one percent of the potentially valuable lands and are located in Nye County and Lander Counties (BLM, 2011).

There are no known geothermal resource areas in the Ely Planning Area and only one active geothermal lease (BLM, 2007b). In the Ely Planning Area, warm springs are used for pools, spas, and space heating (BLM, 2007b).

Geothermal energy resource exploration and development has increased in the Winnemucca Planning Area. As of 2006, there were 109 geothermal leases, five pending geothermal applications, and six Known Geothermal Resource Areas (KGRAs) within the planning area. Two large and one small geothermal exploration projects were permitted in 2006 and 2007. In addition, there were three power plants and two vegetable dehydration plants in operation within the planning area, ranging in generation capacity from 5.8 to 30 megawatts (BLM, 2010). In the Eagle Lake Planning Area, Honey Lake Power is currently using geothermal sources in the Wendel-Amadee KGRA to generate electrical power. In the near future, at least one other geothermal facility will likely be developed in the KGRA (BLM, 2007a). Although geothermal leasing is

 encouraged, activity is sporadic to nonexistent in the Surprise Planning Area (BLM, 2007c).

Biomass technology is currently being used in the Ely Planning Area for heating one of the White Pine County schools (BLM, 2007b). Biomass energy production has not been discussed by potential producers in the Surprise Field Office Planning Area, but may be considered in the near future (BLM, 2007c).

Mining and Minerals

The overall value of mineral and energy production in Nevada was \$7.72 billion – an all-time high – in 2010. Nevada led the nation in the production of gold, barite, and gypsum, and was the only state that produced magnesite, lithium, and two types of specialty clays, sepiolite and saponite (Nevada Bureau of Mines and Geology, 2010).

In 2010, Nevada's production of gold, valued at \$6.5 billion, was 73 percent of the total gold production in the United States, helping make the United States the third largest gold producer in the world. Nevada alone accounted for 7 percent of world production of gold. Gold mining is heavily located in the northern part of the state, particularly Elko, Eureka, and Lander Counties. In 2010, Nevada's largest gold operations included Barrick Gold Corporation's mines (1.2 million ounces) and Newmont Mining Corporation's mines (0.9 million ounces) on the Carlin trend in Eureka and Elko Counties; Barrick Gold Corporation's Pipeline and Cortez Hills mines (1.1 million ounces) in Lander and Eureka Counties; Newmont's Twin Creeks mine (0.45 million ounces) in Humboldt County; and the Kinross-Barrick Smoky Valley joint venture Round Mountain mine (0.4 million ounces) in Nye County. Combined, Barrick and Newmont accounted for 81 percent of Nevada gold production in 2010 (Nevada Bureau of Mines and Geology, 2010).

Nevada's silver production in 2010, which totaled 7.36 million ounces, was generally a co-product or byproduct of gold mining and was produced at a value of \$149 million. Nevada's silver production in 2010 accounted for 18 percent of the U.S. total and 1 percent of the world total. With a ratio of value (i.e., average price of gold to average price of silver) of 61:1 in 2010, only those deposits with more than 61 times as much silver as gold can be considered primary silver deposits. Only one such deposit was being mined in Nevada in 2010—the Coeur Rochester Mine in Pershing County (with a silver-to-gold production ratio of 210:1 and total silver production of 2.0 million ounces). The Coeur Rochester Mine produced 27 percent of Nevada's silver in 2010 (Nevada Bureau of Mines and Geology, 2010).

Other mineral production values in Nevada in 2010 include the following: copper - \$438 million, barite - \$49 million, gypsum - \$12 million, and petroleum - \$27 million (Natural Resource Industry Institute, 2011; Nevada Bureau of Mines and Geology, 2010).

In 2010, Nevada's copper production was dominated by the Robinson coppergold-silver-molybdenum mine, operated by Quadra Mining Ltd. near Ely in White Pine County. Byproduct copper was also produced at Newmont's Phoenix project near Battle Mountain in Lander County. One major contributor

 to the production of molybdenum in Nevada in 2010 was the Golden Phoenix's Ashdown Mine in northwestern Humboldt County, producing approximately 350 thousand pounds valued at \$5.6 million (Nevada Bureau of Mines and Geology, 2010).

Table 12 provides sales volume and sales value for geothermal and oil resources managed by the BLM, underscoring the importance of geothermal resources in Churchill County and oil resources in Nye County, in particular.

Mineral production in the Socioeconomic Study Area employed approximately 9,620 people in 2010, making up 4.5 percent of total employment, which is 4 percentage points higher than the national average of 0.5 percent (Headwaters Economics, 2012). This estimate is based on data from the U.S. Census Bureau County Business Patterns and a selection of industrial sectors that includes oil and gas extraction, coal mining, metals mining, nonmetallic minerals mining, and other mining related industries. The estimate includes both full- and part-time jobs. Though the proportion of employment associated with mining industries varied by county, every county had some percentage of employment coming from a mining industry. The lowest percentages of mining employment were found in Lassen County (0.1 percent) and Washoe County (0.2 percent), and the highest percentages of mining employment in Eureka County (76.9 percent), White Pine County (35.1 percent), and Humboldt County (31.7 percent).

In 2010 in Nevada, the average annual earnings per mining-related job were substantially higher than the average annual earnings per non-mining job: \$83,377 (2010 dollars) compared to \$39,369 (Headwaters Economics, 2012).

FISCAL

Nevada has no corporate or personal income taxes, and is a right-to-work state. Sales and use taxes, imposed at a rate of two percent, make up 70 percent of Nevada's tax revenues (U.S. Census Bureau, 2010d). The next biggest source of revenue is the Modified Business Tax, followed by the net proceeds of minerals tax. The tax proceeds of each mining operation is taxed at a maximum rate of five percent, and gold and silver accounted for almost 90 percent of total gross tax proceeds in FY 2011 (Nevada Department of Taxation, 2012).

California receives approximately 85 percent of its own-source revenue from four sources: personal income tax, sales and use tax, corporate tax, and major motor vehicle-related levies (California Legislative Analyst's Office, 2007). Though California does not impose a statewide severance tax, there is a small statewide assessment on oil and gas produced in California. The assessment rate is established each year and is imposed on each barrel of oil and each 10,000 cubic feet of natural gas produced. The assessment rate for FY 2010 was \$0.0880312 (California Department of Conservation, 2010).

The primary government revenues in the Socioeconomic Study Area that are directly linked to BLM lands are Payments in Lieu of Taxes (PILT), which are federal government payments based on the presence of all federal lands (not just BLM lands) within each county. Table 14 shows the PILT payments each county received in 2010. The non-taxable status of federal lands is of interest to local governments, which must provide public safety and other services to county residents. BLM revenue-sharing programs provide resources to local governments in lieu of property taxes because local governments cannot tax federally owned lands the way they would if the land were privately owned.

BLM Expenditures and Employment

BLM offices provide a direct contribution to the economy of the local and surrounding area. BLM operations and management make direct contributions to area economic activity by employing people who reside within the area and by spending on project related goods and services. Contracts for facilities maintenance, shuttling vehicles, and projects contribute directly to the area economy and social stability. Table 15 provides available information on the BLM expenditures from each field office, including both labor and non-labor expenditures.

Environmental Justice

Environmental justice pertains to the fair treatment and meaningful involvement of all people regardless of race, color, national origin, or income with respect to the development, implementation, and enforcement of environmental laws, regulations, and policies. Fair treatment means that no group of people, including racial, ethnic, or socioeconomic groups, should bear a disproportionate share of the adverse environmental consequences resulting from industrial, municipal, and commercial operations or the execution of federal, state, local, and Tribal programs and policies (BLM, 2005). BLM incorporates environmental justice into its planning process, both as a consideration in the environmental effects analysis and by ensuring a meaningful role in the decision-making process for minority and low-income populations.

Executive Order 12898 requires federal agencies to "identify and address the disproportionately high and adverse human health or environmental effects of its programs, policies, and activities on minority populations and low-income populations." The BLM Land Use Planning Handbook (BLM, 2005) reiterates BLM's commitment to environmental justice — both in providing meaningful opportunities for low-income, minority, and Tribal populations to participate in decision-making, and to identify and minimize any disproportionately high or adverse impacts on these populations.

According to the Council on Environmental Quality (CEQ) Environmental Justice Guidance Under the National Environmental Policy Act (CEQ, 1997), "minority populations should be identified where either: (a) the minority population of the affected region exceeds 50 percent or (b) the minority population percentage of the affected region is meaningfully greater than the minority population percentage in the general population or other appropriate unit of geographic analysis." The same document states that "In identifying low-income populations, agencies may consider as a community either a group of individuals living in geographic proximity to one another, or a set of individuals (such as migrant workers or Native Americans), where either type of group experiences common conditions of environmental exposure or effect."

Additionally, the same guidance (CEQ, 1997) advises that "In order to determine whether a proposed action is likely to have disproportionately high and adverse human health or environmental effects on low-income populations, minority populations, or Indian tribes, agencies should identify a geographic scale, obtain demographic information on the potential impact area, and determine if there is a disproportionately high and adverse effect to these populations. Agencies may use demographic data available from the Bureau of the Census to identify the composition of the potentially affected population. Geographic distribution by race, ethnicity, and income, as well as a delineation of tribal lands and resources, should be examined."

Minority Populations

Table 16 summarizes the percentage of the population made up of ethnic minority groups in each county of the Socioeconomic Study Area, as well as Nevada, California, and the United States as a whole.

Each county in the Socioeconomic Study Area has a lower minority population than California, Nevada, and the United States. All counties in the Socioeconomic Area have a higher Alaska Native or American Indian population than the United States as a whole. The minority population ranges from a low of 12.1 percent in Lincoln County, NV to a high of 33.9 in Washoe County, NV.

Low-income Populations

Table 17 summarizes the percentage of the population below poverty level in each county of the Socioeconomic Study Area, as well as California, Nevada, and the United States as a whole. Following the Office of Management and Budget's Directive 14, the Census Bureau uses a set of money income thresholds that vary by family size and composition to detect what part of the population is considered to be in poverty (U.S. Census Bureau, 2012).

In the Socioeconomic Study Area, the percentage of the population below the poverty line ranges from a low of 7.1 in Elko County, NV to a high of 18.4 in Modoc County, CA. Of the ten Nevada counties in the Socioeconomic Study Area, seven counties have a higher percentages of residents below the poverty line than Nevada overall (11.9 percent). Both California counties have a higher percentage of residents below the poverty line than California as a whole (13.7 percent). Both California and Nevada have a lower percentage of residents below the poverty line than the United States as a whole (13.8 percent).

To ascertain whether there are disproportionate effects of the alternatives on low-income populations, data on effects by each alternative will be reviewed and reported in Chapter 4.

Tribal Populations

In 2010, Nevada's Native American population was approximately 32,000, and Washoe County had the largest Native American population of all the counties in the Socioeconomic Study Area (approximately 7,000 people) (U.S. Census Bureau, 2010b). There are 32 reservations and colonies in Nevada, many of which are located within the Socioeconomic Study Area (Nevada Indian Territory, 2012). In California, Lassen County is home to the Susanville Indian Rancheria, and Modoc County is home to the Alturas Rancheria, Cedarville Rancheria, Fort Bidwell Reservation, and Pit River Tribe of California (BIA, 2012). Several Native American tribes and groups in Nevada and California have historically used sage-grouse as a food source, including at least the Achumawi, Western Shoshone, Northern Paiute, and Washoe (Heizer, 1978; D'Azevedo, 1986).

Philosophy

It is the philosophy of the Lander County Treasurer to invest with safety, liquidity and yield, in that priority order, to take advantage of safe investment opportunities. All investments made by this office are strictly governed by written policy and are in accordance with Nevada Revised Statutes 355.170 and 355.171.

Investment of funds is made with the judgment and care under current prevailing circumstances that persons of prudence, discretion, and intelligence would exercise in the management of their own affairs, not for speculation, but for investment, considering the probable safety of capital, as well as probable income to be derived, and optimum liquidity required for operation.

Lander County Treasurer's Office Investment Policies

Investment Planning

- A. Payment of County Obligations
 - 1. The foremost consideration of the investment plan is to ensure that adequate funds are available to meet the County's financial obligations as they become due.
- B. Term of Investment
 - 1. The length of investment is generally dictated by the number of the County's obligations and the time at which they will come due.
 - 2. Maximum maturity of investments is (5) 10 years (except for mortgages which will be bought with a maximum average life of 3 years)

Permitted Investments and Utilization

Lander County Treasurer Investment Policy Dated December 12, 2012 Dated April 2003

- A. Local Government Investment Pool managed by the office of the State Treasurer
- B. Fund Sweep/Controlled Disbursement Account/ Government Sponsored Money Market Mutual Funds
- C. Agency Discount Notes
- D. Government Agency Securities (final maturity of (5)10 years or less)
- E. AAA Rated Mortgage Backed Securities (through an investment advisor only)
- F. U.S. Treasuries- (final maturity of (5) 10 years or less)
- G. Time Certificate of Deposit
- H. Negotiable Certificates of Deposit

Utilization of Financial Institutions, Local Governments and Investment Advisors

- A. It is the policy of the Lander County Treasurer to utilize the services of instate financial institutions whenever possible; but is not limited to.
- B. Investment advisors are allowed by the discretion of the treasurer. An Investment advisor will be used if the Treasurer believes it will benefit the county.

Other Considerations

- A. Financial Institution Limitations and Restrictions
 - 1. It is the policy of the Lander County Treasurer to reserve the right to place a limit on the amount of investments placed with any one financial institution. Each situation must and will be considered individually.
- B. Delivery of Collateral
 - 1. In the interest of adequate protection of public funds, it is the policy of this office to require delivery of all securities on all deposits made by the County.
