Chickens in the City

City Council recently passed an ordinance that allows City residents to keep domesticated hens within City limits. The raising of chickens at home has become a popular hobby nationwide, but City ordinance previously prevented the keeping of chickens in Morristown. This new ordinance allows residents up to 6 hens


within certain guidelines, including a proper sized fence and coop. No roosters will be allowed. Those wanting to keep chickens will be required to submit a permit application.

A New Christmas Tradition

The annual City Christmas tree is something that City staff and citizens look forward to every year. In past years, the Christmas tree was donated by a citizen, cut from their yard and moved to the City Center plaza. A new tradition is being started this year with the planting of Morristown's own tree. Last spring, City Horticulturalist Mike Cupp carefully chose a tree farm, Cumberland Mountain Conifers in Palmer, TN. In October, he, along with Assistant City Administrator Larry Clark, went to the farm and chose the perfect tree to be the new City Christmas landmark. The Norway Spruce tree was dug up and transported to its new location by the Farmers Market

earlier this month. It

currently sits around 15 feet tall but will grow from 40 to 60 feet tall.



The tree will stay in its location at the Farmers Market for decades to come. Proper irrigation was installed around the Farmers market to

keep the tree watered and thriving. Mike Cupp and horticulture staff will trim and care for the tree as it grows. We hope this tree is something that our community can enjoy this Christmas and for many Christmases to come.
