
Over the past months, you may have noticed a colorful structure taking shape at the corner of W. Morris Blvd. and S. Jackson Street. This is the site of Morristown's newest play area, Jolley Park. The Jolley Family and City of Morristown Parks & Recreation Department are thrilled to announce the opening of Jolley Park. This inclusive facility has long been a dream of the Jolley Family. They believed that special needs children and adults should have their own unique area outfitted with equipment capable of lifting them up above their confinements and/or boundaries. They want to give every child the opportunity to laugh, swing, play and enjoy the sun on their face. Jolley Park is a 13,000 square foot Special Needs Playground with various levels of skill areas for multiple age groups. Jolley Parks is gated, with a capacity of 600 people. On site are

four shelters and ADA restrooms with both youth and adult changing stations. The Jolley Family worked with local special needs teachers to develop the park and decide what amenities would best serve the community.

The park officially opened to the public on June 4th. It is open daily to the public from 9am until dusk. For more information about Jolley Park, please contact Morristown Parks & Recreation at (423)586-0260.

### Message from Mayor Gary Chesney

#### FY23 Budget

Yes, it's time for another budget and a reminder the years continue to move too quickly. City Administrator Tony Cox's new budget proposal was presented to City Council on May 13th and it promises a little something for everybody.

The spending plan is \$10 million higher than last year's, proposes a 5% employee pay raise, and no new property taxes or fee increases. Capital spending will focus on public safety. Fire equipment, a new training tower, and preparations for a new fire hall #3 are part of the mix, as is a 10% bump up for entry level police officers, eliminating the "apprentice" level.

Neighborhood street paving will see twice as much spent as last year with 5.5 miles being paved and another 13.25 miles getting rejuvenation treatments to prolong life before a re-pave is needed. Jolley Park will become part of the park system as that department heads in a new direction.

The budget reflects a year of continuing growth of sales tax dollars, and improved property tax returns - a penny on the tax rate generates over \$96,000; \$12,000 more than it did six years ago.

Morristown's growth is moving forward as planned and I'm proud of the team of City employees we have who handle their tasks so professionally in service to our citizens.
