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## Message from Colonel W. K. Early, Chief of Police

The mission of our police department is straight-forward. We strive to prevent crime, detect and apprehend criminals, protect life and property, keep our highways safe, address quality of life issues, and to serve our community with compassion, honor, distinction and pride. The basic building blocks of our policing philosophy include partnering with our community, proactive policing, and problem solving.

This report highlights some of the many accomplishments, programs and initiatives that are the product of our dedicated workforce and the community partnerships we cherish. Also contained in this report are statistical data related to crime, traffic incidents, calls for service, Animal Services and our Emergency Communications Center.

At a glance:

- Comparing calendar year 2022 to the calendar year 2021, violent crime increased by 8%. Property crime increased by an overall 29%. We recorded 2,226 incidents of total crime compared to 1932 incidents in 2021 (15% increase).
- Incoming, police related calls for service increased from 19,774 in calendar year 2021 to 22,612 in calendar year 2022 (14% increase).
- Regarding highway safety, during calendar year 2022, there were 1053 reported vehicular crashes throughout the County. During calendar year 2021, there were 1012 reported crashes (4% increase). In 2022, Prince George County Police investigated 11 crashes that resulted in 12 fatalities. During calendar year 2021, Prince George officers investigated 4 fatal crashes (increase of 175%). Highway safety initiatives continue to be a priority for our agency.

As always, we thank our Board of Supervisors; County Administrator, Mr. Jeffrey D. Stoke; our entire Prince George County Government Team; and most of all, our citizens for the trust, confidence and support that are vested in us. Your PGPD Team values the relationships and partnerships we enjoy with the diverse community we serve. Our motto is, and will remain, "In Partnership with the Community."

I, along with all of the men and women of PGPD, remain humbled and honored to serve our cherished Prince George County community. We hope you enjoy our 2022 Annual Report.

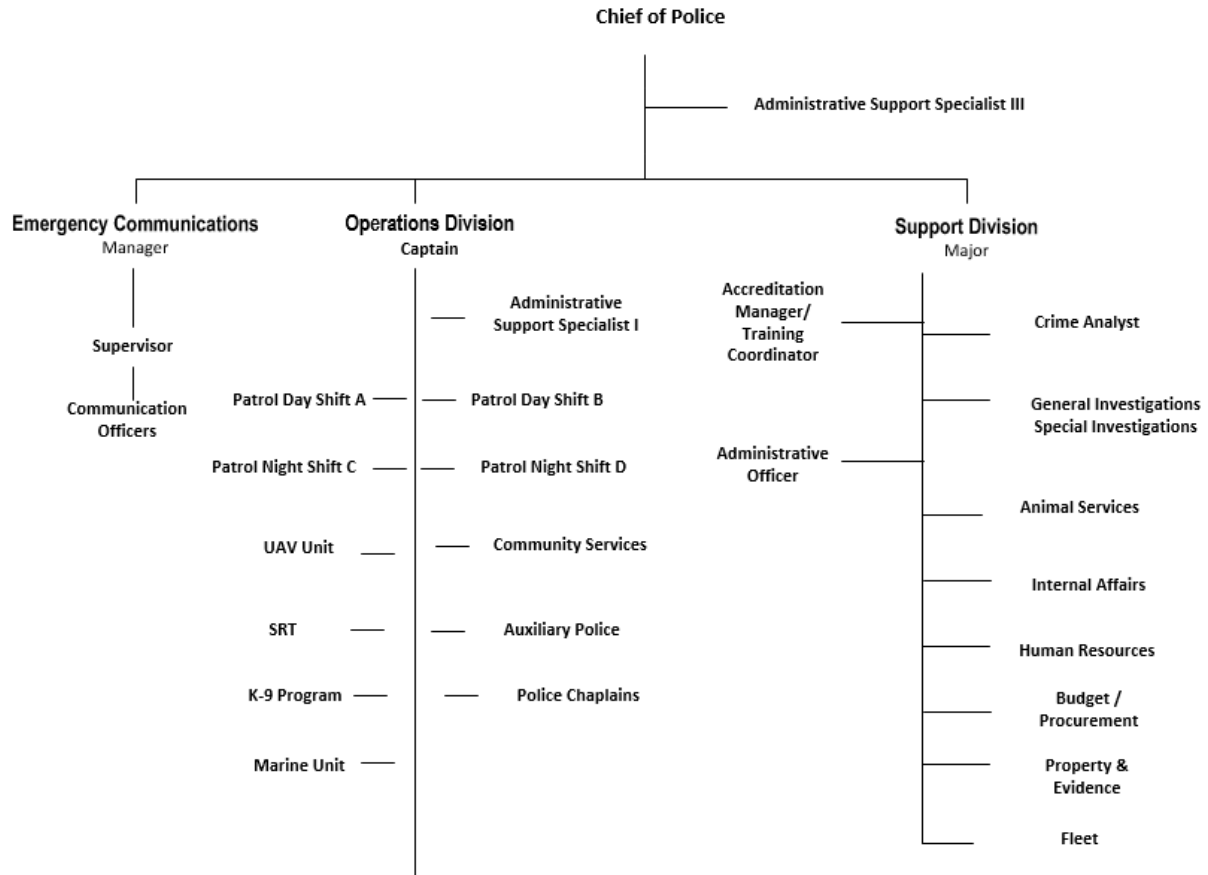

# CRIME STATISTICS

The FBI's Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program is a nationwide, cooperative statistical effort of more than 18,000 city, university and college, county, state, tribal, and federal law enforcement agencies reporting data on offenses. The National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) was enacted with requirements for all Law Enforcement Agencies to be in compliance as of January 1, 2019, reporting data in concord.

The program's primary objective is to generate reliable information for use in administration, operation, and management. However, over the years, UCR data has become one of the country's leading social indicators. Criminologists, sociologists, legislators, municipal planners, the media, and other students of criminal justice use the data for varied research and planning purposes, along with assessment of the nation's crime.

Offenses are listed by type with comparisons from previous years in Prince George County illustrated. As this program is continuously growing, more offenses are being added and there are new additions, such as Driving Under the Influence – Marijuana.

## Crime Stats Summary:

### "A" Offenses

Violent Crimes: Increase of 8% compared to 2021.

*Includes Homicides, Assaults, Abductions, Robberies, and Sex Offenses.*

Property Crimes: Increase of 29% compared to 2021.

*Includes Arson, Burglary, Frauds, Larcenies, and Destruction of Property.*

Crimes Against Society: Decrease of 1% compared to 2021.

*Includes Animal Cruelty, Narcotic Violations, and Weapons Law Violations.*

### "B" Offenses

Crimes within this category increased 24% compared to 2021. Examples of "B"

*Includes Disorderly Conduct, Driving Under The Influence, Trespassing, etc.*

## Total Crime

Overall, there were 2,226 reported incidents of crime in calendar year 2022. During calendar year 2022, 1,932 incidents of crime were reported; total crime in Prince George County shows a reported increase of 15% compared to 2021.

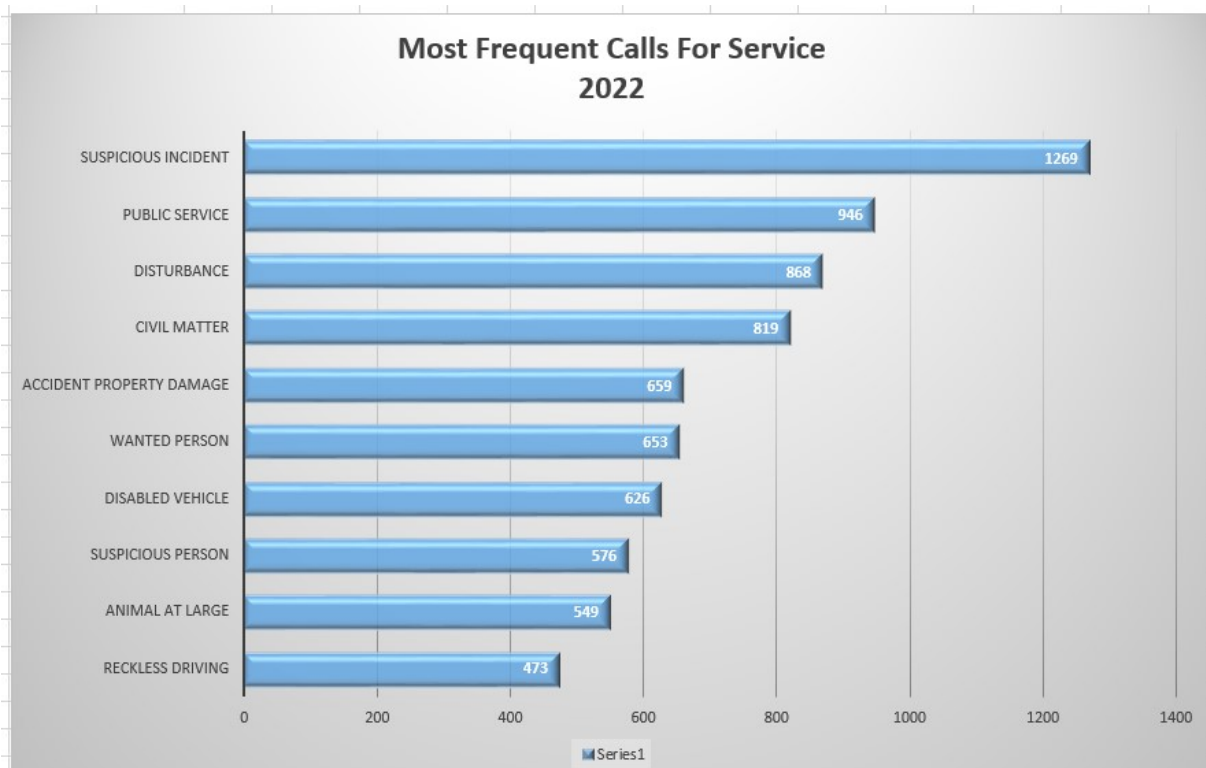

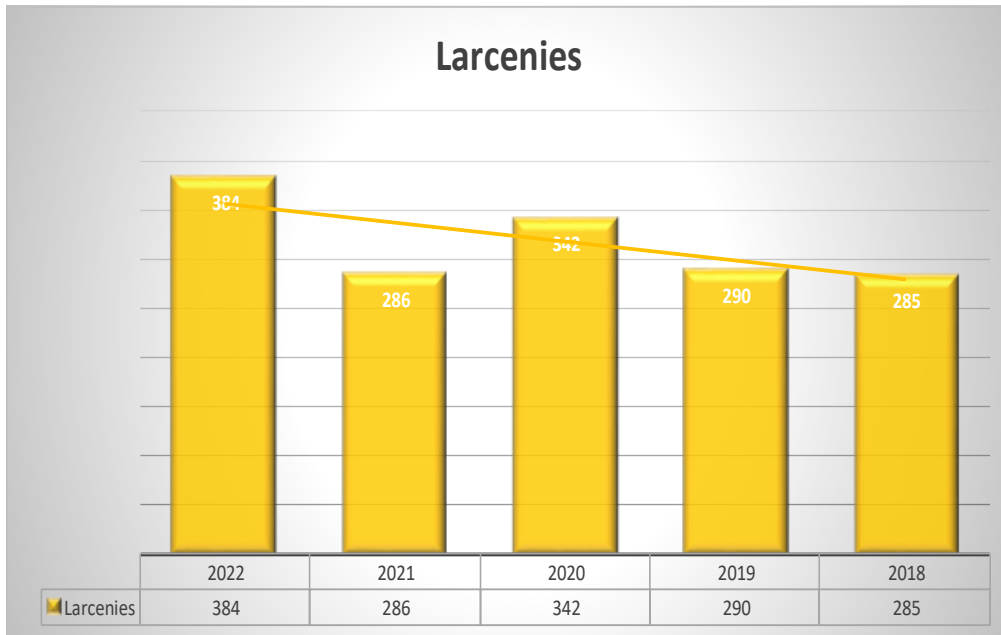


# MENTAL HEALTH



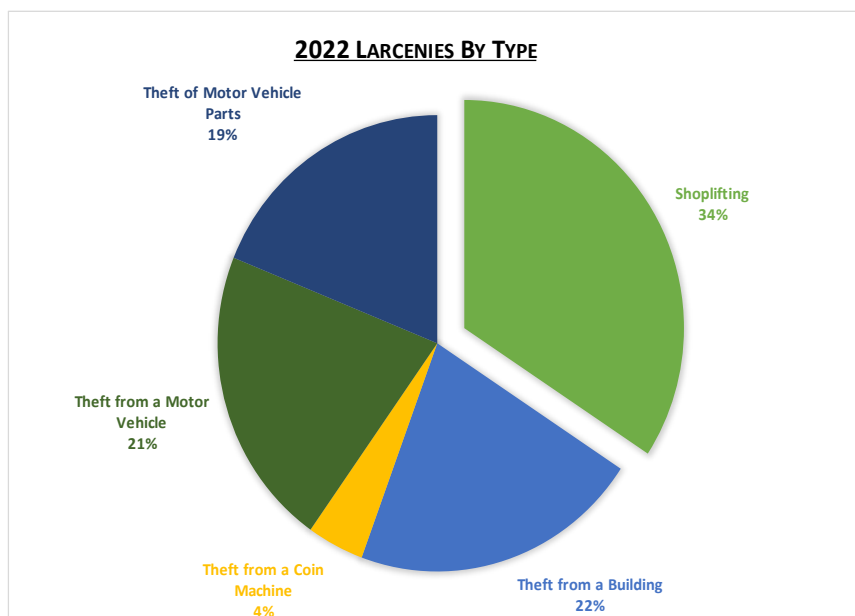
Mental Health continues to affect law enforcement, becoming increasingly more prevalent since the COVID pandemic. Prince George County Police received and served 68 Emergency Custody Orders and Temporary Detention Orders in 2022. These can be lengthy processes, depending upon mental health facility availabilities and transportation times. In 2022, over an estimated 800 hours were spent on mental health calls for service.

# CRIME STATISTICS - LARCENY

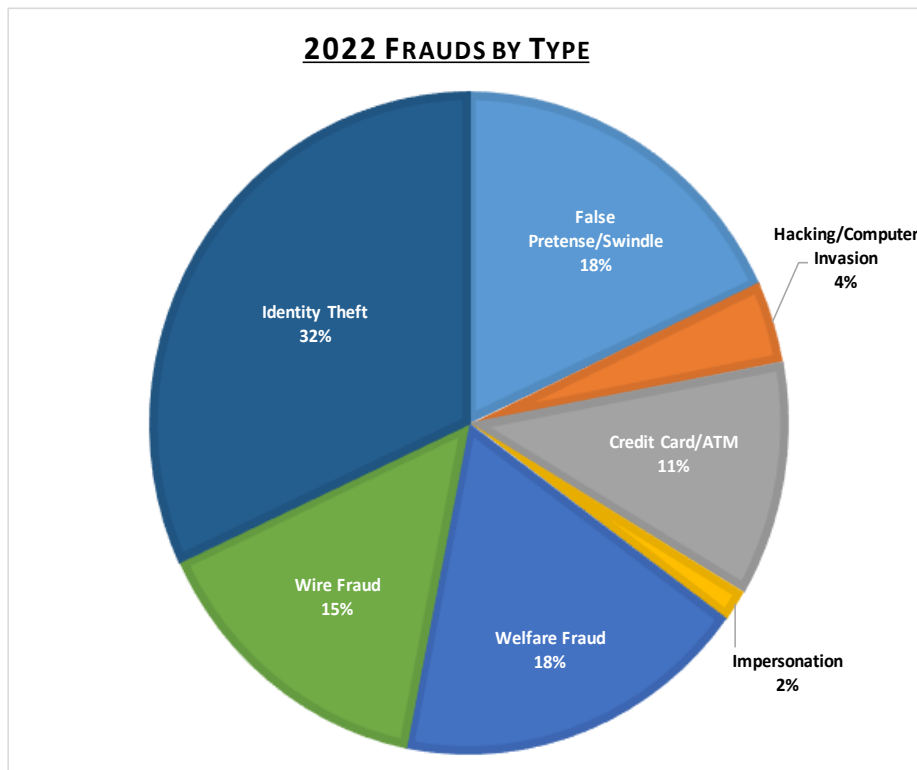


Larcenies are categorized by the FBI into seven groups: pocket-picking, purse-snatching, shoplifting, theft from building, theft from coin operated machine or device, theft from motor vehicle, theft of motor vehicle parts/accessories, and all other larcenies not otherwise specified.

For 2022, compared to calendar year 2021, Prince George Police documented an increase of 34.3% of all larcenies combined. The most reported property stolen for 2022 was money. The second highest reported stolen property was firearms and the third highest as power tools and equipment.



## CRIME STATISTICS - FRAUD BY TYPE



Fraud is defined by the FBI's Uniformed Crime Reporting Program as "the intentional perversion of the truth for the purpose of inducing another person or other entity in reliance upon it to part with something of value or to surrender a legal right". This is further broken down into seven groups: false pretenses/swindle/confidence game, credit card/automated teller machine fraud, impersonation, welfare fraud, wire fraud, identity theft, and hacking/computer invasion.

In 2022, Prince George County Police continued to see an increase of welfare fraud and identity theft cases where victims' information was being utilized to file for benefits with the Virginia Employment Commission to receive COVID related relief. Businesses also fell victim to new fraudulent activity when scammers would call impersonating owners or employers and demanding money be wired. Impersonators would threaten to fire the employee if they did not comply.

Scammers often use fear as a motivation to get what they want. Prevention continues to be the key to outsmarting them. Never provide personal information over the phone. Enroll in an identity theft program that will notify you if your social security is used. If the demands made by the caller are threatening in nature, it is likely fraudulent. If you ever question the legitimacy of a suspicious call, disconnect the line and contact Prince George County Police to report it.

There are programs offered, such as The Crime Prevention Program, which provide additional information on crime prevention tips, including fraud and identity theft, offered by the Prince George County Police Department. Programs offered are detailed further in this annual report.

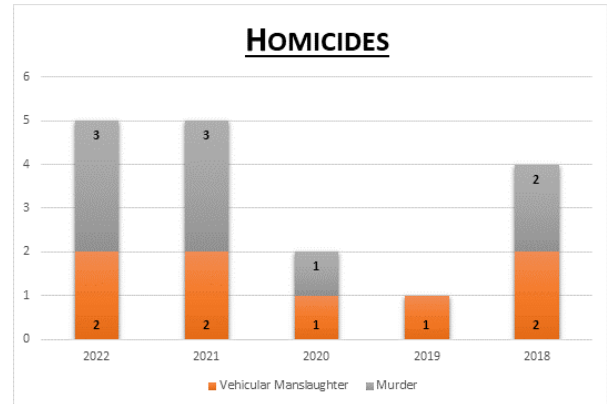
# CRIME STATISTICS

## HOMICIDE, ASSAULT, BURGLARY

### Homicide

Homicide is defined by the FBI's Uniformed Crime Reporting Program as "the killing of one human by another". Homicides can be classified into the subcategories of murder, negligent manslaughter, and justifiable homicide.

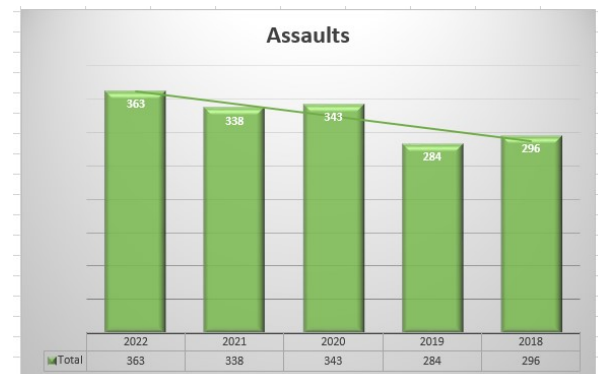
In 2022, Prince George County Police investigated two vehicular manslaughters and three murders. Homicide case clearance is 60%, as one case occurred a few days before the New Year and is still an active, on-going investigation.



### Assault

Assaults are categorized by severity and law as aggravated, simple, and intimidation. This is further determined due to weapons involved and bodily injury sustained.

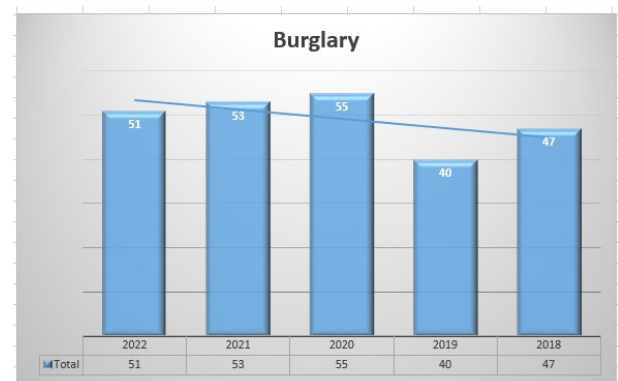
In 2022, Prince George County Police responded to a collective 369 assaults, with 195 of the reports being domestic in nature. It is our goal, through a combined effort of proactive policing and community education, to provide safe facilities and awareness to the victims.



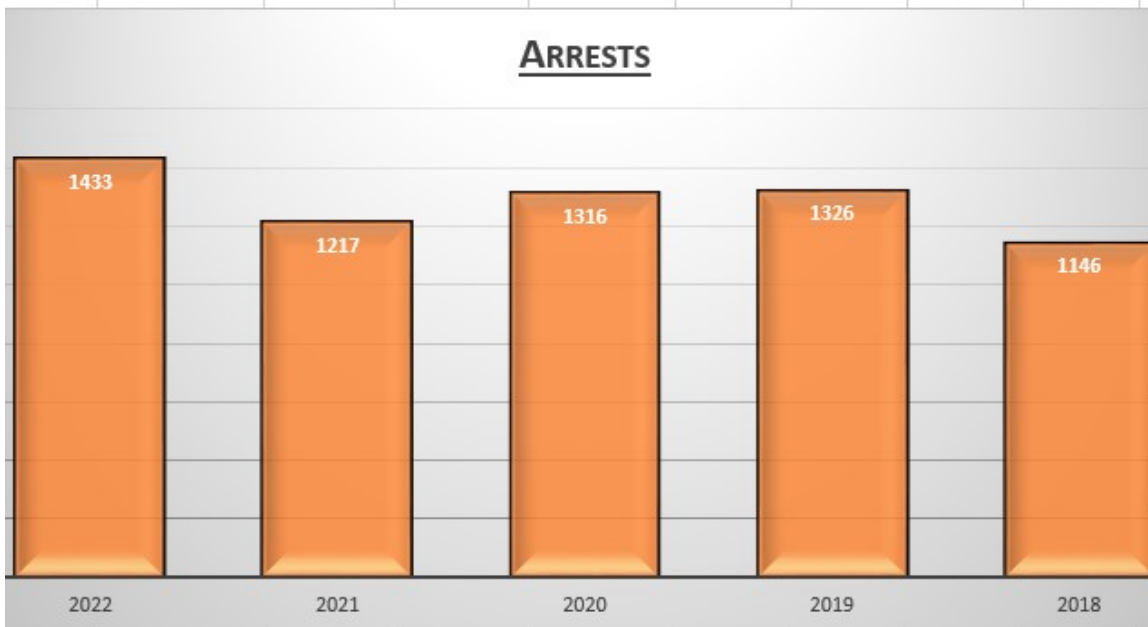
### Burglary

Burglary, also known as breaking and entering, is defined by the FBI's Uniformed Crime Reporting Program as "the unlawful entry into a building or other structure with the intent to commit a felony or a theft". This includes any structure with walls, a roof, and a door to include sheds, barns, and garages.

In 2022, there was a 4% decrease from 2021.



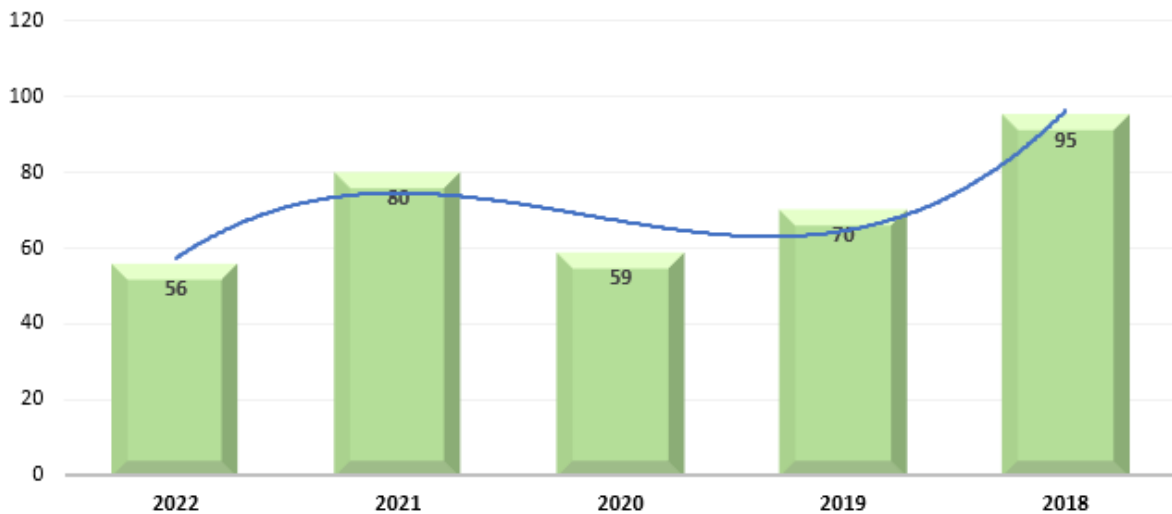

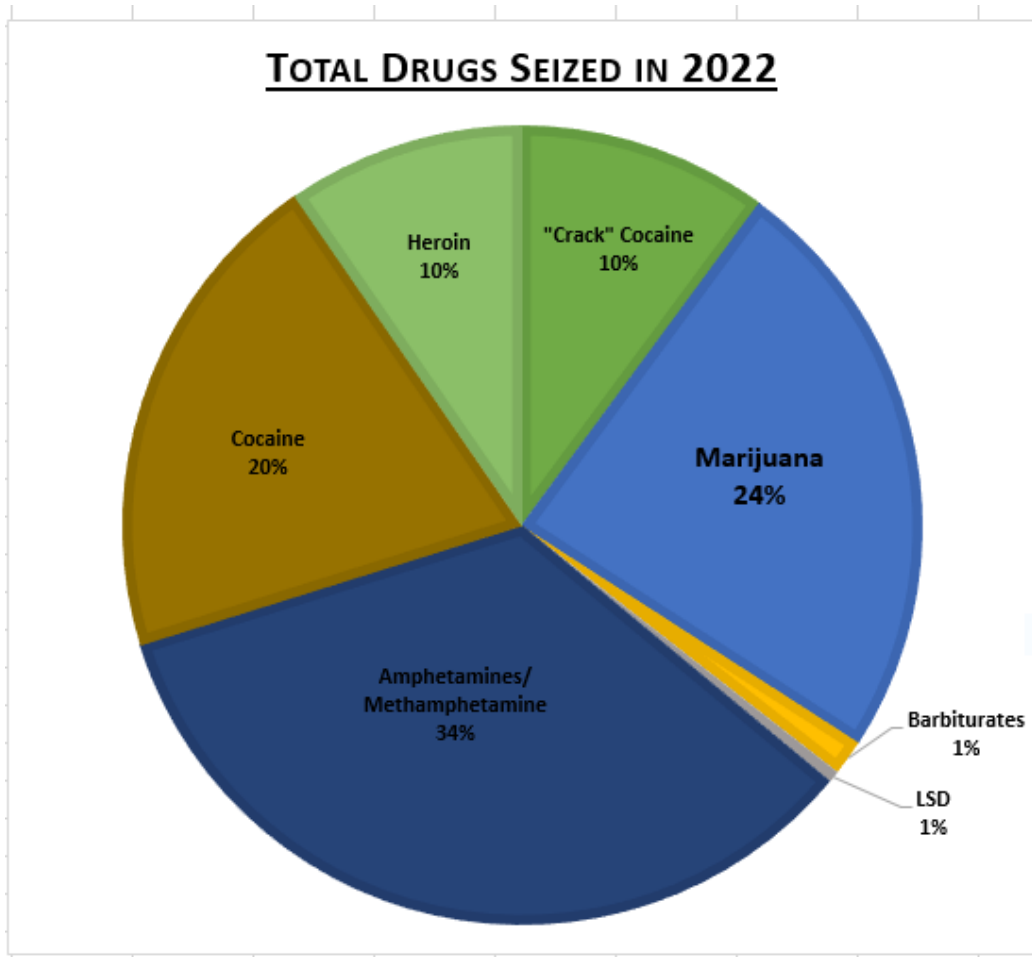
## Arrests

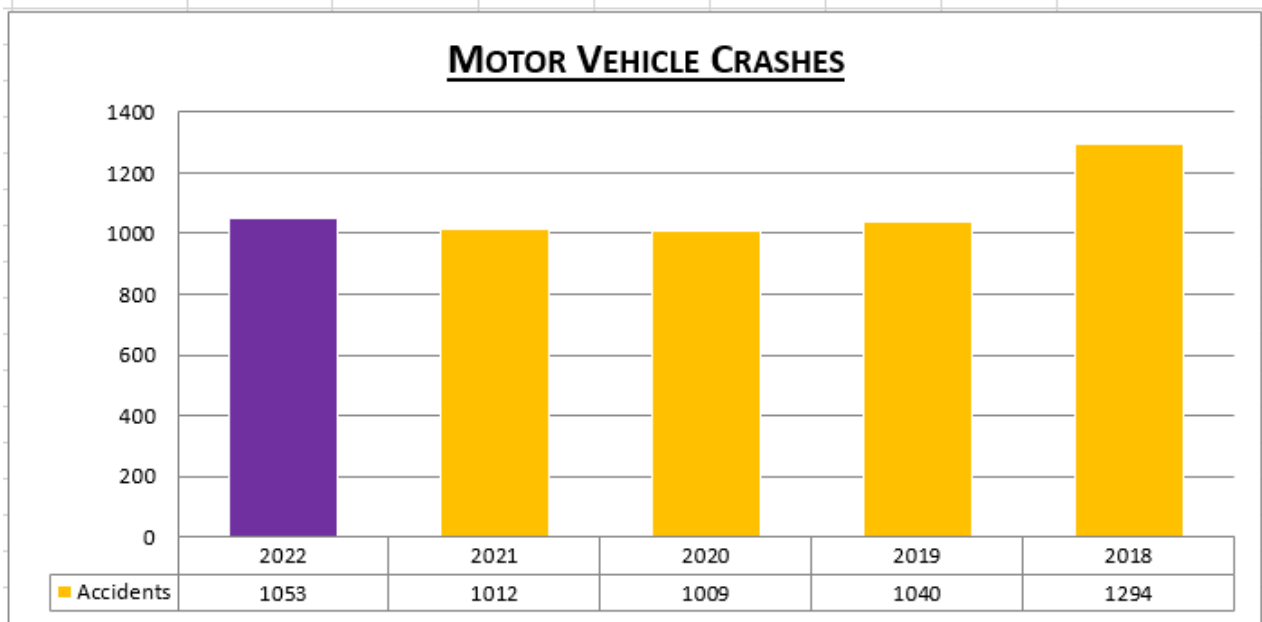
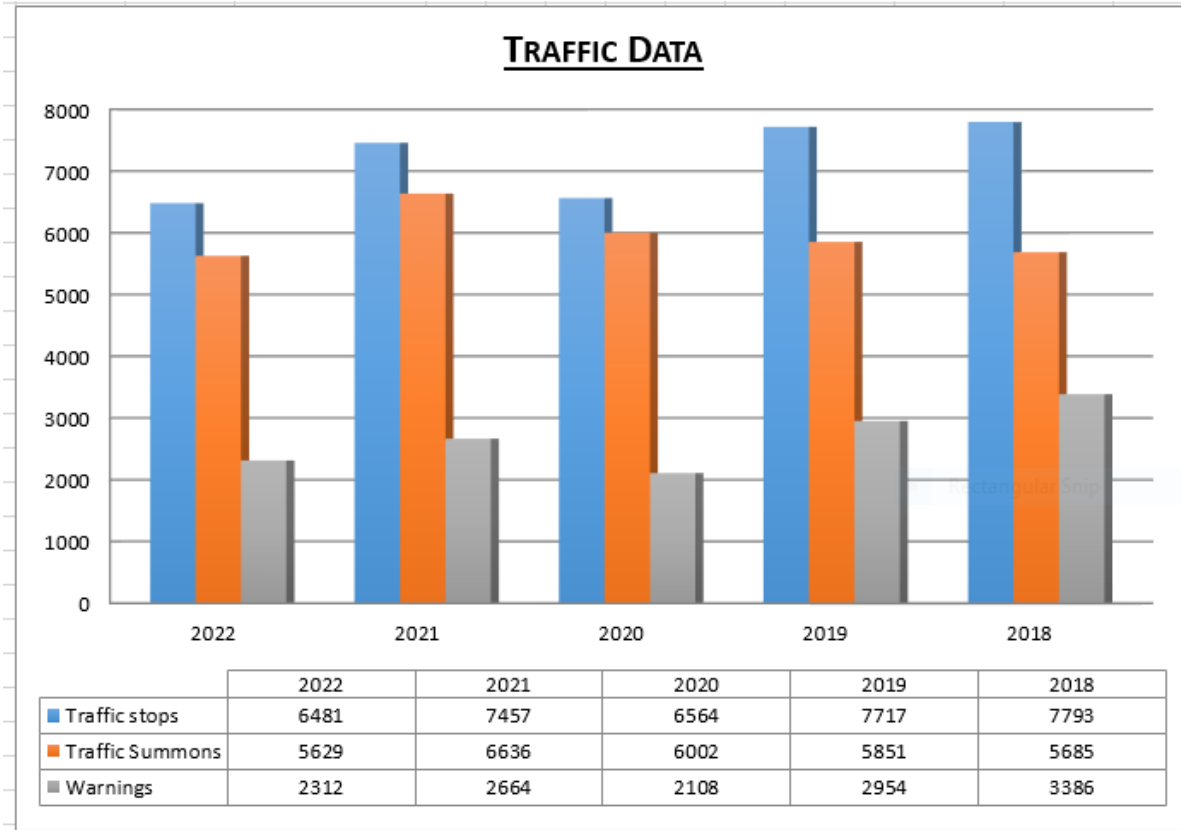
## Drugs Seized

Throughout 2022, Prince George County Police officers eradicated approximately 280 various quantities of illegal narcotics from our community. Marijuana was reported as the most confiscated drug in 2021. Since the recent legislative changes related to marijuana, it has now become second while amphetamines and methamphetamines are now the most confiscated drug reported in Prince George County for 2022.

Other drugs seized includes cocaine, heroin, LSD, and barbiturates.

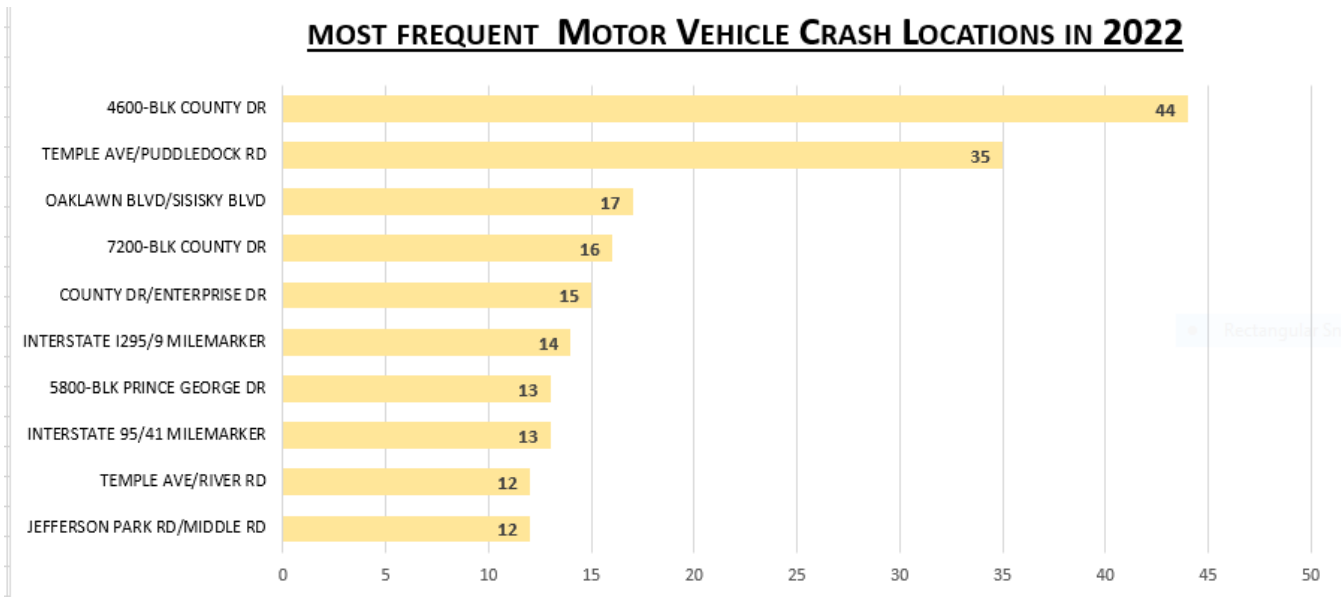

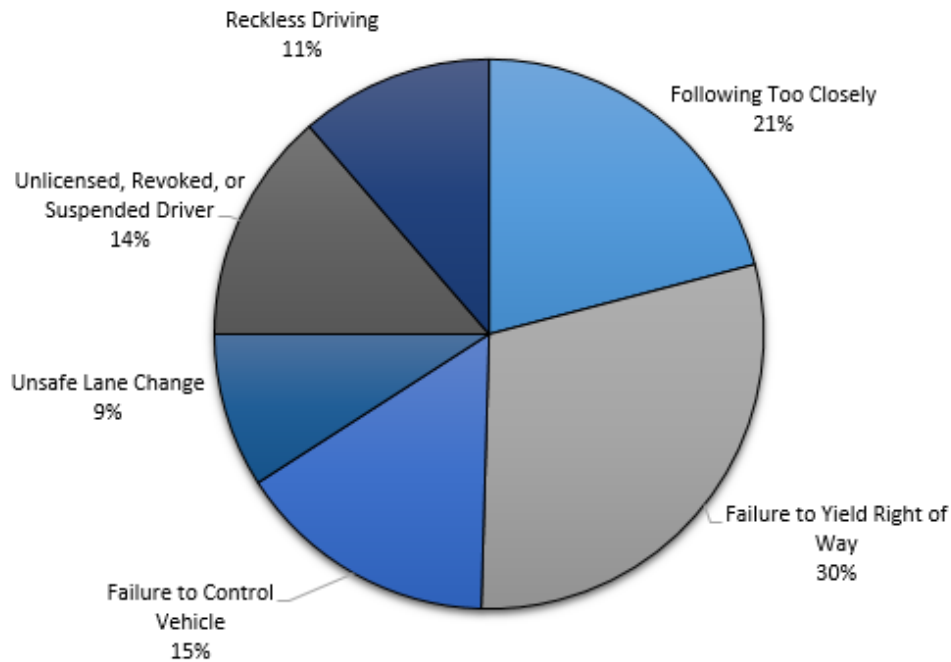
In 2022, Prince George County had 11 vehicle crashes resulting in 12 fatalities. This is an increase from the 4 fatal vehicle crashes in 2021.

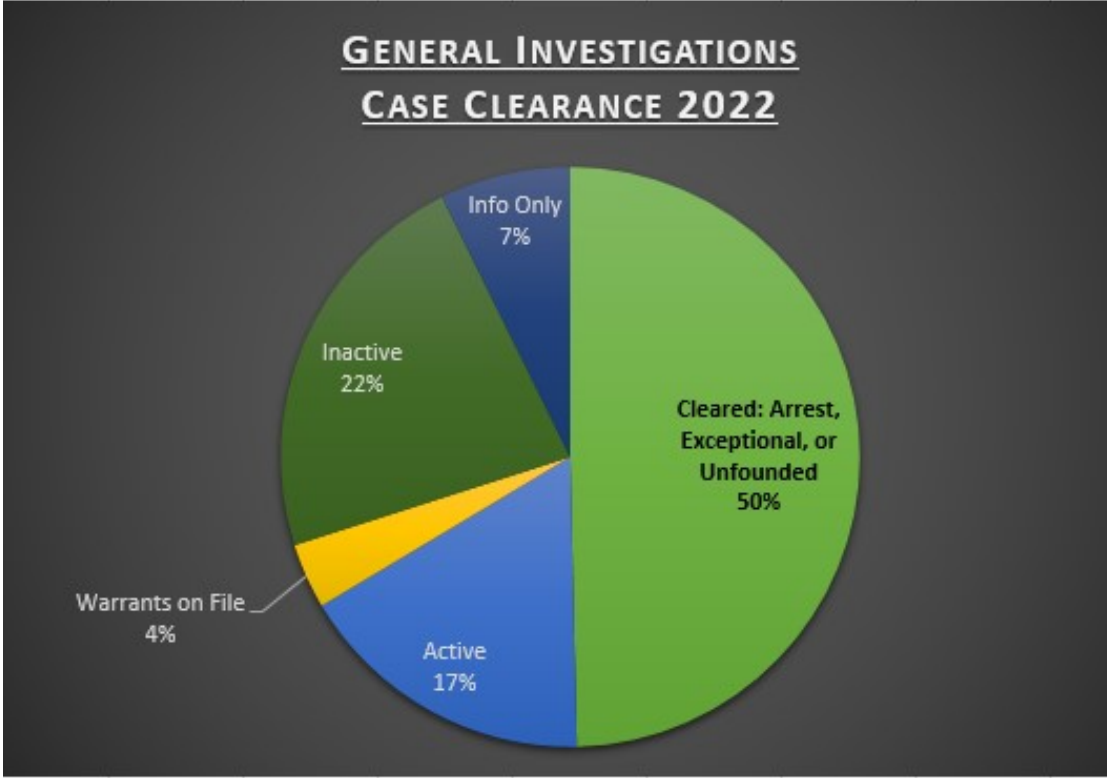
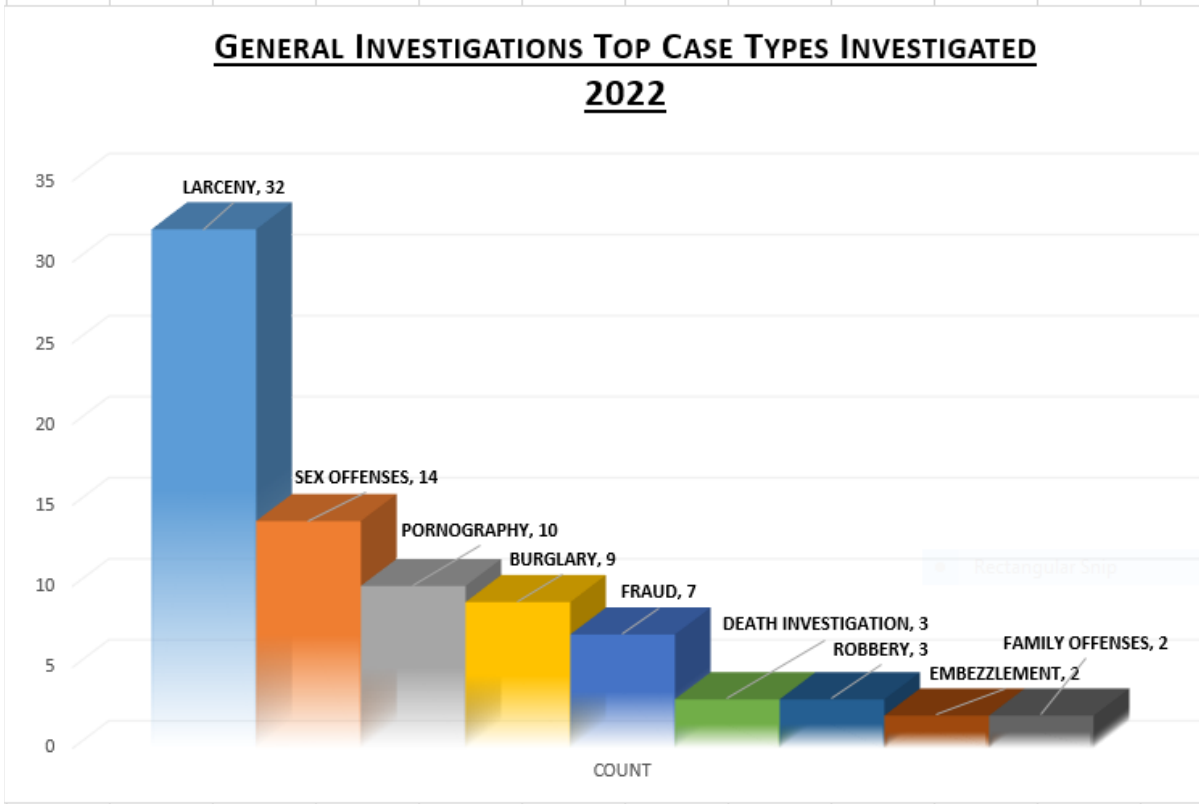
## MOST FREQUENT MOTOR VEHICLE CRASH LOCATIONS IN 2022



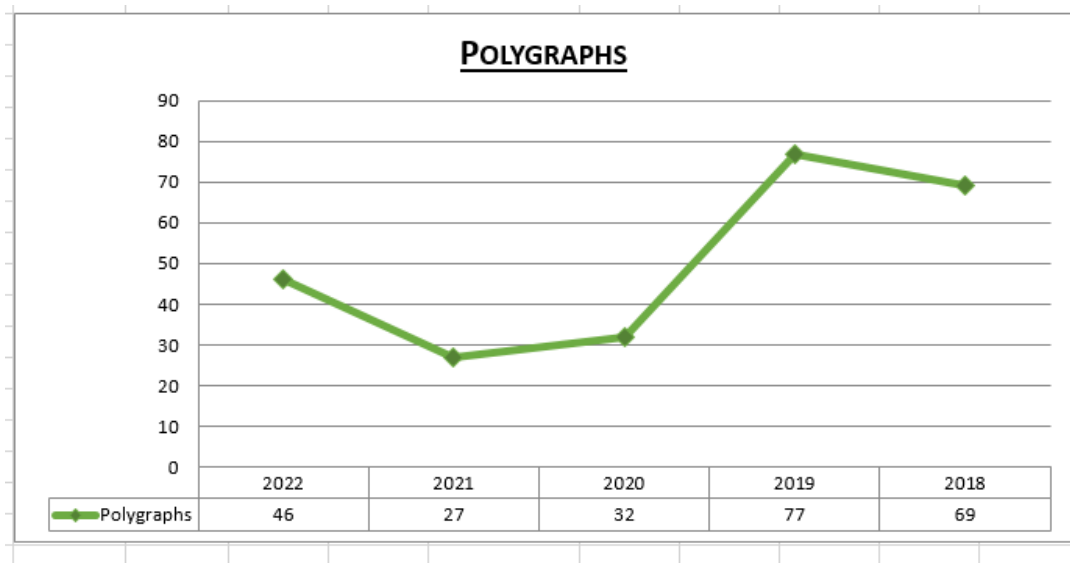
## MOST COMMON SUMMONSED OFFENSES RESULTING IN VEHICLE CRASHES 2022



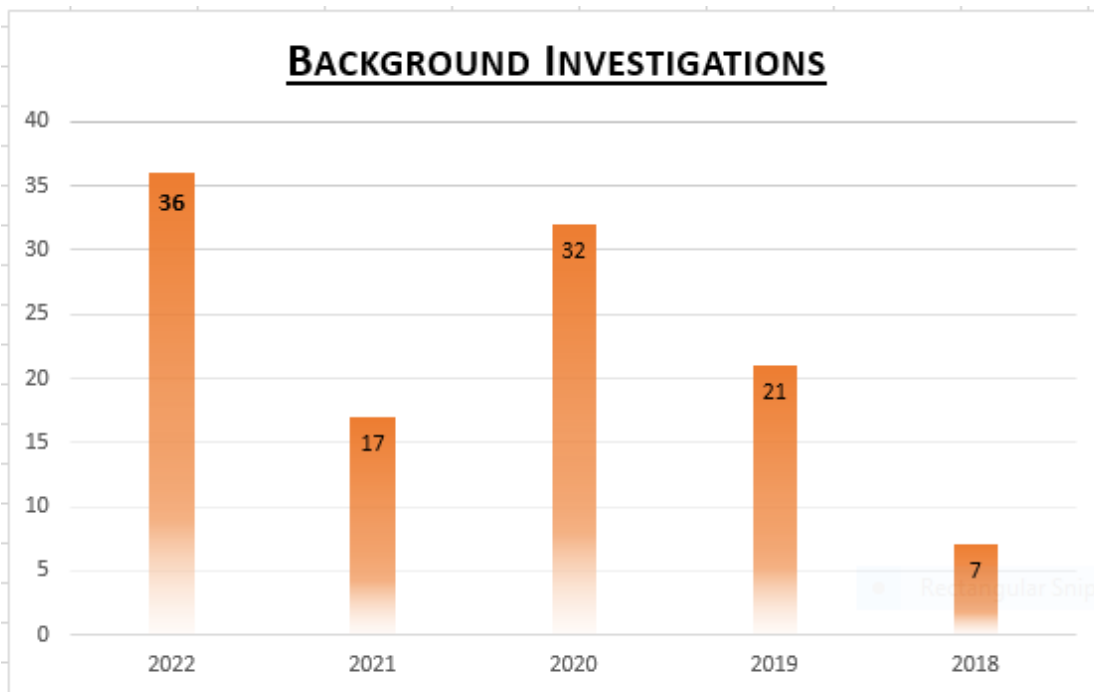

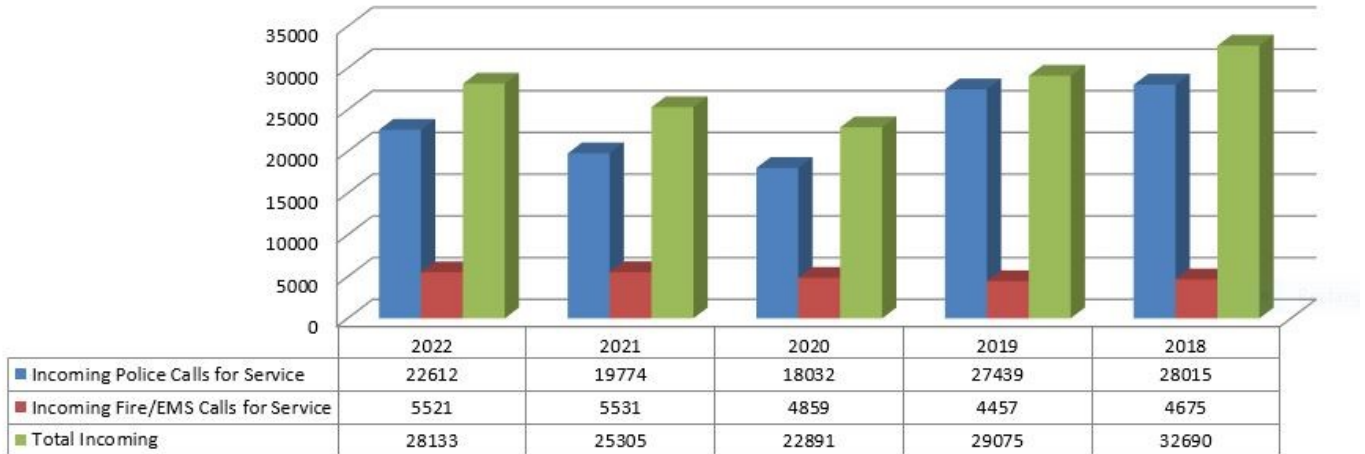

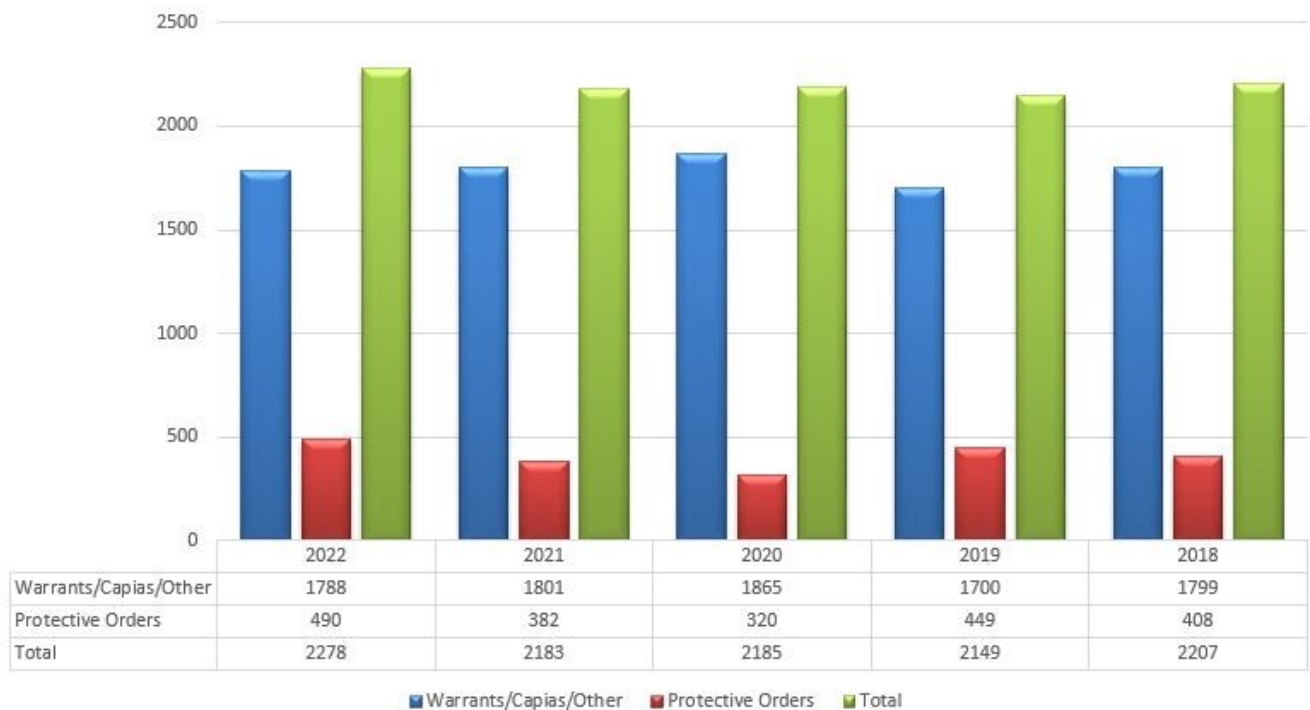

## 2018- 2022 INCOMING CALLS FOR SERVICE

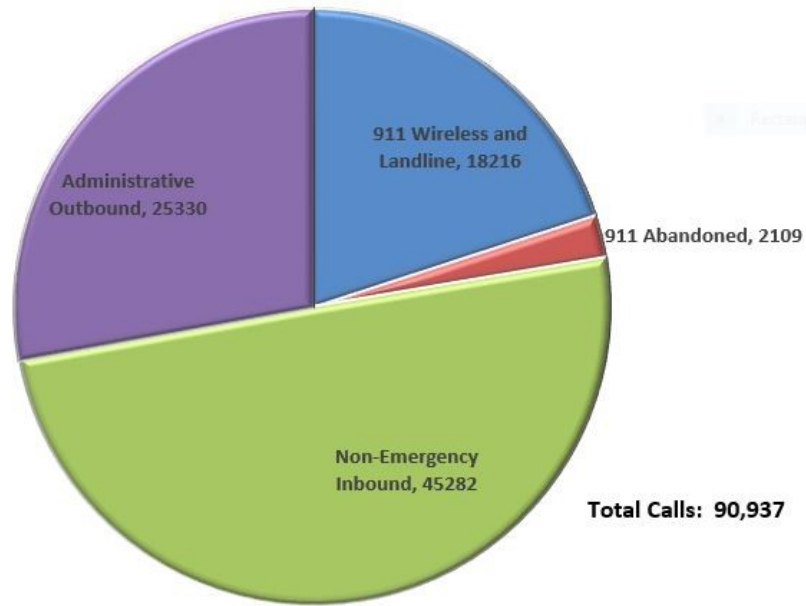


## Warrants/Capias/Other and Protective Orders Processed 2018 - 2022

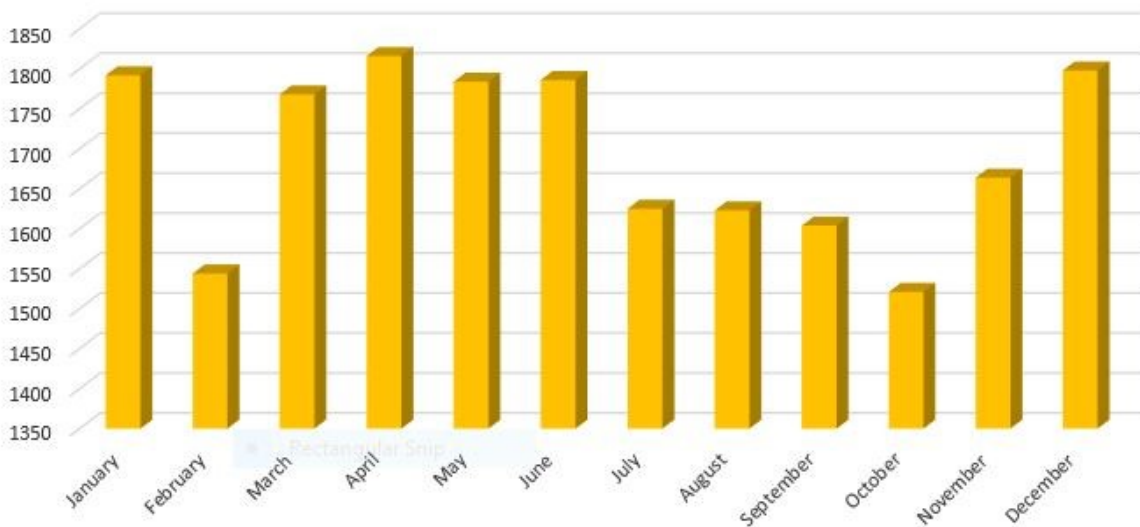

### 2022 Inbound/Outbound Calls

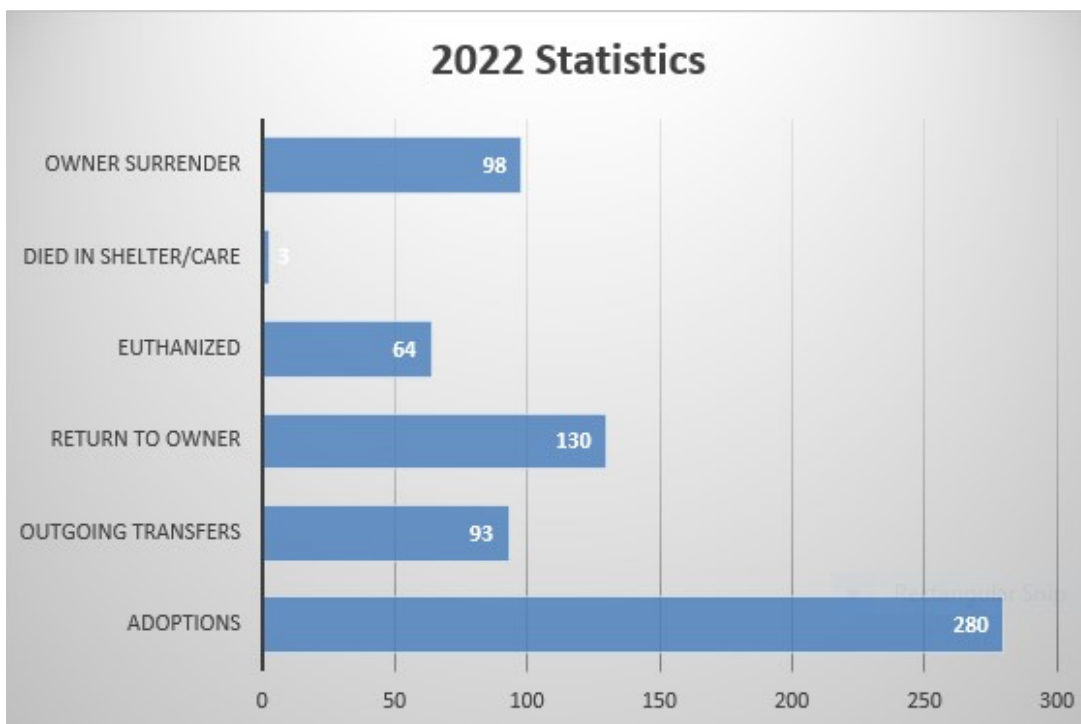


### 9-1-1 Calls per Month 2022

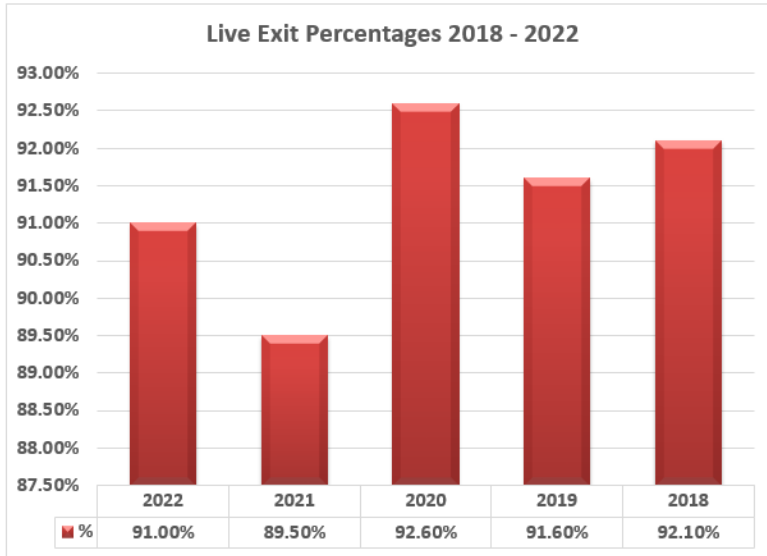

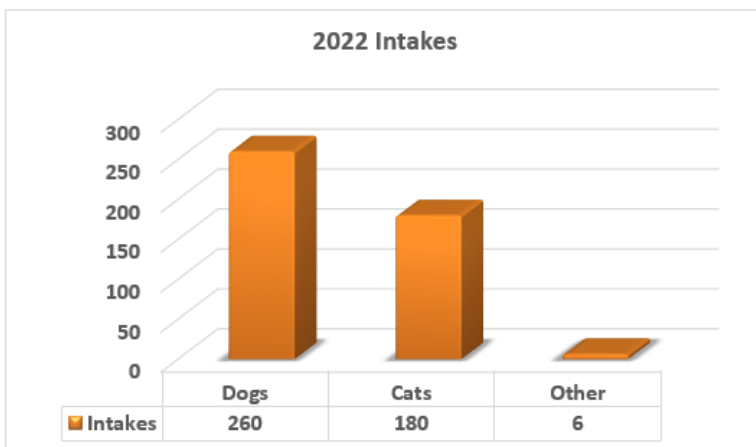
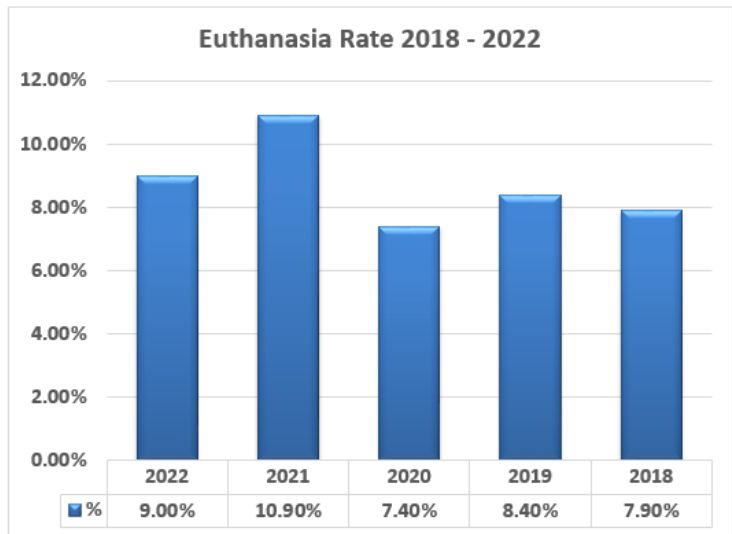

The Field Operations Division is comprised of Uniform Patrol and the Community Services Unit. The Patrol Section is responsible for all initial criminal and vehicular crash investigations, requests for services from citizens, traffic control and proactive policing efforts. Officers are assigned to four different shifts to ensure coverage throughout the County.

# UNITS

## CRASH INVESTIGATION UNIT

**The Crash Investigation Team** consists of nine (9) sworn officers. The team investigates motor vehicle crashes involving multiple vehicles with severe or potentially life threatening injuries, fatalities, and/or complicated crashes with an unknown chain of events. Crash Investigation Team members receive training in basic and advanced fundamentals of crash investigation and reconstruction. Additionally, officers assist the Detective Unit with the reconstruction of major crime scenes.

In 2022 the Crash Team investigated eleven (11) crashes resulting in twelve (12) fatalities and three (3) mutual aid response to surrounding jurisdictions.



## UAV UNIT



**The UAV (unmanned aerial vehicle) Unit** is a joint unit comprised of 3 pilots from the Prince George Fire Department and 2 pilots from the Prince George Police Department.

Pilots are certified with the FAA to operate UAVs. The UAV Unit assists in incidents of search and rescues, missing persons, large structural or brush fires, search warrants, over watch for large events and missions with the Marine Unit.

In 2022, the UAV Unit responded to 10 incidents.

## K-9 UNIT

**The K-9 Unit** consists of one canine and his handler.

K-9 Valor is an 4 year-old, male Belgian Malinois. Valor joined the department in May of 2019. His initial law enforcement evaluation also took place in Holland. He serves the department within the Uniform Patrol Division.

To maintain a high level of skill and proficiency, monthly training is required of each canine team. Canines and their handlers maintain certification through the Virginia Police Work Dog Association.

The Unit provides specialized resources to assist the department with safeguarding Prince George County. This team also provides support to surrounding law-enforcement agencies with apprehensions and searches.

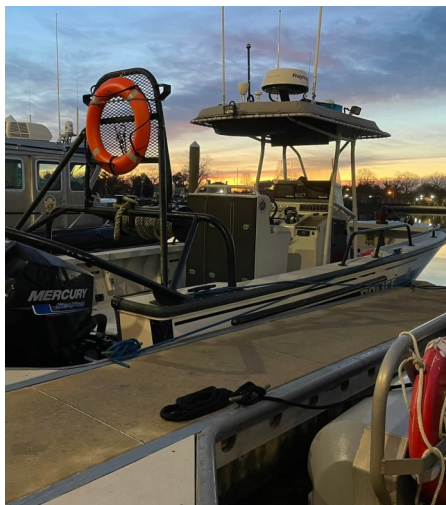
## THE MARINE UNIT

**The Marine Unit**, a 24' Commercial Grade Boston Whaler Justice, is operational 365 days a year. The vessel is deployed out of Jordan Point Yacht Haven on the James River. The year 2022 marked the 16th anniversary of operation for the Marine Unit. In 2021, our Marine Unit was repowered with two new twin Mercury 200XL Sea Pro DT 4-stroke outboard motors. Prince George County has jurisdiction on approximately 24 miles of the James River and roughly 6 miles of the Appomattox River. The James River & the Appomattox River encompass multiple ancillary creeks and serve as direct water access to several large industries, various bridges, and marinas.

The Unit is staffed by eleven (11) police officers and one (1) auxiliary police officers. Prince George Fire/ EMS have four (4) active members who participate in routine and emergency operations. The purpose of the Unit is to promote public safety, respond to emergencies, and enforce the laws on the waterways of Prince George County. Also, the Unit coordinates with surrounding jurisdictions to assist in their marine patrols and activities. The Marine Unit works and trains with the U.S. Coast Guard in local and regional waters to provide security, enforcement, and rescue services.

A critical portion of the Unit's training is the Annual Search and Rescue Training Forum (SAR) in Hampton, Virginia, held by the Virginia Port Authority and the U.S. Coast Guard. In addition to the routine scheduled patrols, the Unit responds to calls for service, which includes requests for assistance from USCG and other localities to help search for vessels/ persons in distress.

Since 2019, the Department has been engaged in a Memorandum of Understanding to participate in the Port of Virginia's Maritime Incident Response Team (POV MIRT). This team shares resources and provides regional support during times of need. The partnerships developed with local, state, and federal agencies have helped enhance Public Safety resources available to our waterways.



## AUXILIARY POLICE UNIT

**The Mission of the Auxiliary Police Unit** is to augment the Prince George County Police Department by providing well-trained and equipped volunteer personnel. Auxiliary police officers are assigned to perform a variety of police functions, and these volunteers may also be called upon to assist with emergencies, special activities, and county events. In 2022 auxiliary police officers volunteered 634 hours of service. Prince George County auxiliary officers have full police powers.

## COMMUNITY SERVICES UNIT

**The Community Services Unit**, supervised by Lieutenant Paul Burroughs, encompasses the Community Services Program, Crime Prevention Program and School Resource Officer Program. Personnel included in this Unit are community services officers, police explorers, and police chaplains. Programs such as neighborhood watch, business watch, child passenger safety seat, bicycle rodeo and highway safety are administered.



## SPECIAL RESPONSE TEAM



**The Special Response Team** is a specialized unit consisting of two team leaders and ten members from within the Department. The team leaders organize the monthly training and plan the various operations for the team.

The Field Operations Commander oversees the planning of this team. The primary responsibilities of the team are the execution of search warrants and arrest warrants.

The Unit performed 18 operations during 2022.



## GENERAL INVESTIGATIONS UNIT

The General Investigations Unit is supervised by Lieutenant John Leach and Sergeant James Nicholas. Investigators specialize in resolving felony crimes, crimes that require specialized skills, the utilization of specialized equipment, and crimes that involve complicated events.

In addition, investigators collaborate with the Virginia State Police, U.S. Marshals Service, ATF, and other Federal, State, and regional partners. These ongoing partnerships allow investigators to continue to engage in a high operational tempo.

In 2022, the Unit was assigned 235 cases. Of the cases assigned, 67 cases are active; 106 cases have been cleared by arrest, exceptionally cleared or unfounded; and seven of the cases have warrants on file, pending arrests.

Investigations receives cases from the Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force (ICAC) and the FBI. In 2022, Prince George Detectives received 11 ICAC investigations and assisted the ICAC task force with 6 investigations.

The collaborative teamwork between Investigations and the Department of Social Services resulted in over 30 cases for criminal review.

A total of 46 polygraphs were administered by Investigations. During 2022, the internship for two examiners were conducted. These internships last for 6 months each, as is required by Virginia law.

## SPECIAL INVESTIGATIONS UNIT

The Special Investigations Unit focuses on real time needs within Prince George County & proactive investigations within neighboring jurisdictions that effect Prince George County.

Vice and narcotics operations continue to be an essential function of SIU. Additional responsibilities include surveillance, undercover operations, proactive enforcement in high crime areas, and reconnaissance of repeat offenders, rash/pattern crimes, assisting general investigations & uniformed patrol, and other initiatives that target violent crime.

SIU investigated a multitude of crimes throughout 2022. These investigations resulted in over 100 arrests, and the seizure of illegal narcotics, U.S. currency, illegally possessed firearms, and other personal property assets. Most of these incidents are associated with drug trafficking and violent crime.

In addition, SIU works in conjunction with the Virginia State Police, the US Marshals Service, the ATF, and other Federal, State, and Regional partners. These partnerships have developed investigations which have led to the arrests of numerous dangerous offenders and fugitives.

## ANIMAL SERVICES UNIT

**The Animal Services Unit** enforces the County's Animal Ordinance and Virginia state law relating to animals. Animal Services provides animal adoptions; locates and shelters strays, sick or injured animals; investigates animal cruelty and neglect; and quarantines animals within specified guidelines. Animal Services promotes responsible pet ownership and pet adoptions within Prince George County.

There are one supervisor, three Animal Control Officers, two support personnel and part-time staff members who work from the Animal Services and Adoption center located at 8391 County Drive. Animal Control Officers are available to respond to animal related emergencies 24-hours a day 365-days a year.



## CERTIFIED K-9 THERAPY PROGRAM

Lady Sansa was born September 3, 2017. She is a purebred AKC black colored German Shepherd. Sansa completed her national certification in the spring of 2019. She scored the highest in her class on the rigorous 13-part test.

Whether Sansa is visiting victims of crime, helping young children learn to read, or just visiting throughout the community, her straight forward mission is to provide comfort. Sansa's handler is Animal Control Officer S.L. Santilli.

In 2022, Lady Sansa and her handler attended fundraisers, adoption events, Little Feet Special Olympics, demonstrations, visits at Prince George schools, along with visits to county businesses and county work places.

**The Prince George County Communications Center** is staffed by professional communications personnel charged with providing 24/7/365 service to the citizens of Prince George County. Their duties include, but are not limited to, receiving emergency 911 and non-emergency requests for Police, Animal Services and Fire/EMS. The communications officer must be able to determine the nature and urgency of incoming calls, prioritize the calls, and dispatch the appropriate resources.

**The mission of the Prince George Communications Center** is to serve and protect the public by effectively receiving and processing 9-1-1 emergency calls and non-emergency calls; promptly dispatching public safety resources; and providing for the exchange of accurate, pertinent information.

**The function of the Prince George County Emergency Communications Center** is to serve as the liaison between the public and the Police Department, Fire Department, Emergency Medical Services and various other federal, state and local resources. The speed and accuracy with which information flows through each system component are measures of the agency's effectiveness with responding to needs of the community. The Emergency Communications Center monitors radio, telephone, teletype, CAD and NCIC/VCIN.

The Emergency Communications Center operates 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. The Center operates on a twelve (12) hour shift schedule. Communication Officers are assigned to permanent shifts.

All Communications Officers are currently certified through the Department of Criminal Justice Services. All personnel are additionally certified in the following: Emergency Medical Dispatch, ASHI CPR/AED, OSSI One-Solution CAD User and OSSI RMS. Many Communications Officers have acquired specialized training to include: general instructor, active shooter, suicide prevention, weapons of mass destruction, CIT for communications officers, ethics, the evolution of terrorism, sovereign citizen, liability, dealing with difficult callers, homeland security, hazardous materials, and FEMA.

# TRAINING



In 2022 members of the Prince George County Police Department attended over 1300 hours online, 1000 hours on the range, and 3120 hours of training at Crater Criminal Justice Academy. The academy is located on County Drive in Prince George County.

## OVERVIEW:

The Prince George Police Department encourages employees to seek opportunities to develop their knowledge, skills, and abilities. Although every officer must attend a basic academy and periodic in-service training, the department strives to provide opportunities for specialized and advanced training for officers.

Training has often been cited as one of the most important responsibilities for any law enforcement agency. Training serves three broad purposes:

1. Well-trained officers are generally better prepared to act decisively and correctly in a broad spectrum of situations.
2. Training results in greater productivity and effectiveness.
3. It fosters cooperation and unity of purpose.

Additionally, the Prince George County Police Department recognizes its importance, and is committed to providing the best training available to all personnel.

## IN SERVICE TRAINING:

All sworn personnel of the department as required by law, biennially, attend a 40-hour in service school.

Additionally, all police and communications officers are required to complete CIT Training and Virginia Association of Chiefs of Police & Foundation Implicit Bias training.

CIT (Crisis Intervention Team) is a well-documented and highly successful "pre-booking" diversion program that provides law enforcement officers training to assist individuals with a mental illness. The goals of CIT are:

- To reduce injury to officers and family members and individuals in crisis.
- Improve interactions between law enforcement and persons with mental illness.
- Prevent the inappropriate restraint, incarceration and stigmatization of persons with brain disorders.
- Link individuals in a mental health crisis to appropriate treatment and resources in the community.

VACP Implicit Bias Training is designed to be taken by each officer individually, not simply a webinar or video to be played during roll-call. Officers will be required to complete each section (a mix of training videos, readings, and knowledge check games), pass the 25-question competency test, and complete the course evaluation in order to generate the Course Completion Certificate and receive DCJS training credit.

# PROGRAMS

**THE COMMUNITY SERVICES PROGRAM** is staffed by one Community Services Officer who, in partnership with citizens, business owners, and other stakeholders, strive to address citizen concerns and improve quality of life through open communication, dignified service and interactive problem-solving. They coordinate police activities for major community events.

Additionally, the Community Services officer provide service support to the Patrol and Detective Divisions as well as other County Departments.

**THE CRIME PREVENTION PROGRAM** educates citizens and business owners by providing crime prevention tips and informational resources on a wide-range of topics including identity theft, fraud, personal, senior, and internet safety.

In 2022, several Crime Prevention Programs and training seminars were scheduled. Three "Civilian Response to Active Shooter Events" (C.R.A.S.E.) classes were taught to citizens and employees of Prince George County through several safety training seminars hosted by Prince George County. Planning has already began for additional C.R.A.S.E. classes to be taught in 2023. Prince George County continues to partner with the Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) to conduct a C.R.A.S.E. seminar during the Emergency Preparedness Workshop, which is open to any citizen from the county and surrounding localities.

The Community Services Officer also work with the Community Development Department to address code compliance and property maintenance issues. The Community Services Officers provide crime prevention tips and services to neighborhoods throughout Prince George County.

**THE POLICE EXPLORERS**, a division of the Boy Scouts of America, is a program open to males and females ages 14-20 years old who are interested in pursuing a career in law enforcement or other criminal justice related fields by offering a personal awareness of the criminal justice system through training, practical experiences, and other activities. In addition to meeting twice a month, the Prince George Explorer Post assists the Police Department at various functions and events.

## PROGRAMS CONTINUED

**SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS** in Prince George County and all across the Commonwealth of Virginia work as a liaison between their agency and the school system to ensure the safety of the children and the staff. The safety of all involved is crucial so that students and faculty have a safe environment conducive for learning. In addition, the program provides an excellent platform for positive relationship building between police, students, faculty and community.

The School Resource Officer Program is comprised of 7 School Resource Officers. An "SRO" is assigned at the following schools: Prince George High School, N.B. Clements Junior High School, J.E.J. Moore Middle School, North Elementary, South Elementary, L. L. Beazley Elementary and William A. Walton Elementary.



**THE CHILD PASSENGER SAFETY SEAT PROGRAM** focuses on community outreach and educates caregivers about child passenger safety. The cooperative goal of the Child Passenger Safety Program is to train caregivers how to transport their children safely using car seats, booster seats, and even seat belts. It is a proven fact that car seats and booster seats save lives. These devices offer the best protection for children in the event of a crash. Unfortunately, approximately 3 out of 4 child seats are not used correctly.

Currently the County of Prince George has two police officers and one deputy sheriff specially trained as child safety seat technicians. This group of technicians conducted 6 "in-person" child safety seat inspections and/or installations during 2022. These technicians are also available to provide assistance to citizens both over the phone or virtually as a resource to answer questions or concerns dealing with the safety of their children.

## PROGRAMS CONTINUED

### **P.A.C.T. - POLICE AND COMMUNITY TOGETHER PROGRAM**

In 2013, the Prince George County Police Department developed and implemented an exciting and innovative program for our autistic residents - the Police and Community Together program, also known as P.A.C.T. The Police Department recognizes the need to partner with the families of a special segment of our community in order to provide the highest level of service possible.

The P.A.C.T. program introduces public safety resources from Prince George County to our autistic residents and their families. We want to identify this special segment of our community that has family members under the age of 18 who have been diagnosed with autism. The Police Department would like to obtain vital information about your loved ones that can be used to locate them if they become lost or inadvertently walk away.

The Prince George County Police Department has partnered with the Prince George County Schools, Department of Social Services, District 19 Community Services Board, Prince George Special Olympics, and the Ft. Lee Exceptional Family Member Program to assist with the P.A.C.T. program.

These Pastors are available 24 hours a day to assist the officers whenever and wherever they are needed. Chaplains provided counseling and comfort during several incidents in 2022. They provide support and guidance for victims of crisis situations and aid in the delivery of death notifications. In addition, they are ready and willing to assist any police officer, communications officer, other department member and/or their families during times of need.

In 2022, our Chaplains provided service for our Department by responding to several suicides, fatal crash investigations and death investigations. Their commitment to our Department and to the community is much appreciated.

**THE NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH PROGRAM** is organized by concerned citizens, with law enforcement assistance, in an effort to reduce crime in their communities. Working with the Prince George County Police, these citizens can learn when and how to report suspicious activities as well as implement home security measures and precautions. The program helps to address the concerns of the citizens ranging from domestic violence, drugs and gang activity to abandoned cars and vacant lots filled with trash.

No matter where you live, you can still beat the risk of becoming the victim of crime. However, addressing small problems early is often the best way to prevent larger problems from occurring down the road. Any resident of any community located in the County of Prince George can join the Prince George Neighborhood Watch Program. Currently, there are three (3) active Neighborhood Watch Groups within Prince George County.

**THE BUSINESS WATCH PROGRAM** was started in 2013 for Prince George County businesses with the focus on crime prevention and business security. The program's goal is to reduce crime, or the fear of crime, while promoting communication between the area businesses and the Police Department. The "Business Watch" program is a form of Neighborhood Watch and will allow "neighbors" to have an avenue for sharing information as well as understanding/ promoting basic crime prevention.

This program was started in the area of the Crossings Shopping Center . Since then, the program continues to be a vital part of crime prevention with currently more than 250 businesses involved. The "Business Watch" program continues to provide open lines of communication between the area businesses and the Prince George County Police Department.

## SAFE EXCHANGE ZONE

Your Prince George County Police Department offers a "Safe Exchange Zone" on the parking lot directly beside the Bland Building located at 6600 Courthouse Road, Prince George VA 23875. The Prince George Police Department is one of several law enforcement agencies now offering an exchange zone as a safer alternative to other meeting locations, such as a private residence or retail center parking lot.

The "Safe Exchange Zone" is a designated, signed area on our parking lot that may be used for custody transfers, private party exchanges from online purchases, or other private party transfers of property where safety may be a concern. The area is video recorded 24-hours a day. As a matter of routine business, police officers will not be present during transactions, and the video will not always be monitored in real time.

We believe that arranging to meet in these designated areas will potentially deter individuals wanting to engage in criminal activity. These designated areas also allow citizens to maintain a level of privacy by not disclosing the location of their residence. If someone is not willing to come to the Prince George Police Department to complete an exchange, it could be a scam and possibly not worth pursuing.

Our parking lot has been quietly used for years and we are now publicly inviting and encouraging our community to utilize the new "Safe Exchange Zone." The optimal transaction time of Monday - Friday, between 6 a.m. – 6 p.m. is recommended.

## THE PRINCE GEORGE COUNTY YOUTH PUBLIC SAFETY ACADEMY

Prince George YPSA is a one week-long camp designed to expose our young citizens to role models in public safety – namely their local police, fire, emergency medical services (EMS) personnel, as well as to teach them valuable life and safety lessons. The academy is limited to twenty five students in each class, with a minimum of 10 students for the class to run.
