Code Compliance Division begins investigating the complaint. Part of an investigation involves researching property ownership, title, occupants, past or current permits, prior Code Enforcement actions, etc. A significant portion of Code Enforcement investigations are performed "behind the scenes" by exchanging correspondence with the violator, sending legal notices, etc. If the violator fails or refuses to correct the violation, the Code Compliance Division initiates a formal legal process

How to Prevent Frozen Pipes When liquids freeze, they expand. When water freezes in a pipe, it can cause extensive damage.
