Planning helps guide how a community grows and develops Planning considers all residents needs (seniors, children, workers, business owners) Planning looks at the "big picture" (current and future needs of the County)

Planning is comprehensive, community-focused, and enables greater choices for

residents Planners do not just focus on where to locate (or site) a building, but also consider how that decision impacts the safety of the community and the existing character of the community, how it **PLANNING** impacts the environmental balance, and if the decision encourages social and economic diversity.

Planning examines issues from all angles (social, environmental, hazard, physical)

The Virginia codes are based on the International Code Council's (ICC) series of I-codes (IBC, IRC, etc.). Once the ICC publishes a new edition of Icodes, Virginia begins reviewing the codes and considering any changes that should be made to the I-codes for adoption in Virginia. Once the changes are approved and adopted, the revised versions of I-codes become the Virginia codes.

There are three main reasons pipes freeze: Poorly Drastic changes insulated pipes set too low in temperature Everything from plastic to copper can freeze—and then burst. Pipes most at-risk of freezing: · Close to exterior walls Near swimming pools and water sprinkler supply pipes of water can discharge through a 1/8" crack · In unheated places like crawl spaces, attics and garages
