Prince George Promise Awards Grant to Social Services

The Prince George Department of Social Services recently received a Prince George Promise Grant in the amount of \$955. The primary goal of the grant is to screen 25 children ages 0 to 5 for developmental delays. The ASQ-3 (Ages and Stages Questionnaire) and the ASQ-SE (Ages and Stages Social Emotional Questionnaire) is the primary screening tool that will be utilized. This screening tool was selected as it is already in use by Healthy Families, Smart Beginnings of Hopewell/Prince George, a local pediatric practice and the Prince George Department of Social Services. The tool is designed to screen young children for developmental delays and identify those children in need of a comprehensive evaluation. The Prince George Department of Social Services is partnering with Hopewell/Prince George

Prince George Social Services will host quarterly POSSESS **Meeting for the Eastern Region**



During the month of September, Prince George Social Services will host the POSSESS Eastern Region quarterly meeting. The Partnership of Office Services Support Employees in Social Services (POSSESS) has over 200 members spanning the five regions. It is the goal of POSSESS to have members representing each of the 120 agencies across the state of Virginia. This is an opportunity for office support staff to be a part of a wonderful organization where shared ideas and camaraderie among the local level employees can be developed to provide support and professional development.



ENERGY ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS

The Energy Assistance (EA) Program assists low-income households in meeting their immediate home energy needs. To be eligible, households must have a heating or cooling expense and gross monthly income may not exceed 130 percent of the federal poverty level. Applications for fuel, crisis, and cooling assistance are accepted at the local departments of social services. The EA Program consists of four components:

- Fuel Assistance: This program primarily provides assistance with purchasing home heating fuel and paying primary heat utility bills.
- Crisis Assistance: This program is intended to meet a household's emergency heating need. Assistance offered includes one-time only heat security deposit, portable heater for temporary use, purchase of home heating fuel, payment of heat utility bill, payment for emergency shelter, and/or heating equipment repair/purchase.
- Cooling Assistance: This program provides purchase or repair of cooling equipment and/or payment for electricity to operate cooling equipment.
- Weatherization Assistance: This program applies air infiltration measures to the housing structure. The Virginia Department of Housing and Community <u>Development (DHCD)</u> administers this component.

Fuel Assistance Program will be taking application beginning October 9th -November 10th

Placing babies on their backs to sleep saves lives.

- ♥ The safest place for your baby to sleep is in his or her own crib or bassinet and not in bed with you.
- ♥ Your baby's sleeping area should be free of stuffed animals and other toys as well as pillows and fluffy blankets.
- ♥ Bear in mind that not everyone knows that babies should always nap and sleep on their backs.
- ♥ Make sure you discuss safe sleep practices with anyone who will care for your infant. Here's why: one in five Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS) deaths happen while a baby is being cared for by someone other than a parent.
- ♥ Many of these deaths occur when babies are placed to sleep on their stomachs.
- ♥ Babies up to 1-year-old can die from SIDS, although it is most common among infants between one and four months of age.
- ♥ Some babies are at greater risk. African- American and Native-American babies die from SIDS at a higher rate compared to white babies.
- Another way to reduce your infant's risk is by using a firm mattress with a fitted sheet.
- ♥ Dress your child lightly for bed to keep him or her from getting too hot.
- ♥ Keep the crib in a smoke-free space.

♥ Don't place babies to sleep on adult beds, sofas, chairs, waterbeds, pillows, or cushions.

IT'S NOT WORTH IT

In 2013, 44 child fatalities in the U.S. resulted from leaving a child in a hot car. Temperatures can rise as much as 19 degrees in 10 minutes in an enclosed vehicle. Even when temperatures are only 70, car windows act like a greenhouse and temperatures can reach 125 degrees quickly. Take children with you when you leave the car, or don't make the stop; it's just not worth the risk.
