Here's how it works in Elections:

Ballots

- Colorado issues paper ballots
- Voters can track their ballot at ballottrax.net or govotecolorado.gov
- Ballot and other election materials are kept for 25 months after an election

Ballot Drop Box

- 24/7 video surveillance
- Ballots transported by bipartisan teams (opposite parties) of election workers
- Accountability logs and seals verified by bipartisan teams

Verifying voter ID

- Valid ID required for in-person voting
- Valid ID required for first-time voters who didn't show ID when registering
- Mail ballots require signature
- All signatures verified by trained bipartisan teams of election workers
- Voters with rejected signatures have 8 days after the election to cure, so that their ballot can be counted

Voting equipment

- Voting-tabulating equipment is never connected to the internet
- Multi-factor authentication to access voter registration database
- All equipment stored securely and tested by bipartisan teams

Secure access

- Badge access required to enter processing areas
- Election equipment areas under 24/7 video surveillance

Election workers

- CBI background checks
- Security training
- Work in bipartisan teams
- Visible IDs required

Testing and certification

- Pre-election testing: machines are tested by bipartisan team of election workers
- Post-election audit conducted by bipartisan team election workers
- Canvass Board is a bipartisan team of election workers to review data and certify election
