NOTE FROM THE MAYOR

Heros! Each summer, Hollywood rolls forth its latest in a seemingly endless string of “hero” films where superpowers abound and good crushes evil. What was once limited to Marvel/DC Comics series is now not only in theaters but streaming into our homes. In the transition, the genre encourages us to turn from the real heroes in our communities and nation to the made-up tinsel town versions. In our hearts, we know Hollywood offers a very poor substitute to real heroes – those at home, those in the moment, and those who step forward to preserve our God given rights.

As kids, so many of us, and perhaps most of us, grew up with a father figure who had none of the superpowers sold by Hollywood. Our heroes got up every morning, brushed their teeth, went out and came back every day to provide what it took to keep a family together. They checked for the boogie men, provided a calm exterior, delivered better advice than we were often prepared to receive, and so much more - and on their aging and passing, we knew the world was a better place for our having known them.

For some of us, our dads were real life heroes – mine (a child of a widow) was a veteran, highway patrolman, police chief, Texas Ranger Captain, and so much more. For my lovely bride Mary, her dad was also a veteran, parent to four adopted children, US attorney, cancer fighter, and the love of Mary’s life. And as you and I stroll down memory lane, we can bring to mind hundreds of the fathers of friends and relatives. On reflection, we appreciate the hero nature of so many of them, if not all.

In addition to our everyday heroes, we know of the people who stand out in the storms of life to provide what seems right, regardless of the consequences. No place was this more evident than during the July 4, 2025, flooding. Whether it was in the Camp Mystic owner rescuing young girls, the camp counselors saving those entrusted to them and sometimes losing their lives in the effort, the first responders braving the storm to tell the saved to leave now, the Coast Guard chopper crews moving the stranded to safety, or so many others, we recognize each of

CITY MANAGER’S MESSAGE

Republic Services wins Trash & Recycling Contract

Over the past few years, we have fielded several concerns and questions on our City’s trash and recycling service provider Republic Services. At the January 27, 2025 City Council meeting, Council directed City staff to re-compete the City’s trash and recycling contract. Before re-competing the contract, City staff created an online survey to gather citizen feedback. There was a total of 278 survey responses. The entire survey results can be viewed on the City’s website at (<https://www.shavanopark.org/CitySurveys>). However, the survey can be summarized by the results of overall satisfaction below. Residents also liked frequent pickup services and wanted more Hazardous Household Waste services.

Republic Services rated 4.5 out of 5 stars in overall satisfaction

- 63.18% = 5 STAR
- 26.82% = 4 STAR
- 8.18% = 3 STAR
- 1.36% = 2 STAR
- 0.45% = 1 STAR

them as a real hero. Again, no capes, no superpowers, and no Hollywood tinsel to make them heroes. But in our hearts, we know them to be the real thing – 100% genuine.

As to the third group, our community was graced just before Independence Day to recognize them at the Lynd Building with the unveiling of a statue dedicated to the “Grunt” soldiers of the Vietnam era. These heroes put it all on the line just as grunts before and after. In dedicating the statue, Major General Sim Trombitas spoke of young men serving in a strenuous and energy demanding arena, where he trudged with them throughout southeast Asia. He noted how the statue “exemplifies the infantryman who conducted operations in the always twilight of dense jungles, on steep hillsides, in flooded rice paddies, and even in cities in Vietnam.” The grunts knew that around the next bend might await the sheer terror of a booby trap or firefight where death or maiming awaited the grunt or a buddy. Together, they trudged onward.

At the dedication, we were also blessed with the presence of Lt General Lawson MacGruder. General MacGruder also commanded men in the field. He recalled the heroism that was called for in a difficult time, and in his closing, he shared his favorite quote from our war in Vietnam.



“If you are able, save them a place inside you, and save one backward glance when you are leaving for the places they can no longer go. Be not ashamed to say you loved them - though you may or may not always. Take what they have left and what they have taught you with their dying and keep it as your own. And in that time that when men decide and feel safe to call the war insane, take one moment to embrace these gentle heroes you left behind.”

Those words for remembrance were delivered by Major Michael Davis O’Donnell in January 1970 just months before a fatal March helicopter crash in Cambodia.

Our Declaration of Independence declares God has entitled us to certain unalienable rights. But for the last 250 years, it has been up to the heroes of our armed services (the grunts from Concord and Lexington to thousands of hills and valleys here and in distant lands) to preserve those unalienable rights. Heros without capes, superpowers, and tinsel.

Somedays, we complain. On others, we reflect. And less often, we are thankful. Perhaps today is a day when we can remember. Remember the real heroes – those at home, those in the moment, and those who step forward to preserve our God given rights.

The City released a Request for Proposal (bids) and 4 companies submitted bid proposals. The bottom line is that Republic Services’ bid was the lowest cost and provided the best services. The price per month (including franchise fees and taxes) for residents was reduced to \$34.95 from \$36.92, maintains all existing services, and now includes a new service offering to all residents – Monthly Curbside Pickup of Hazardous Household Waste removal beginning in October. Competing bids were higher by \$1-\$6 per month without all the services. More information on how to use this new service will be coming later this fall.

Yard / Landscape Waste

It has been suggested by a number of residents that we consider adding a third trash can that will only handle yard or landscape waste similar to the service the City of San Antonio provides (at an extra cost). Feedback from our survey indicated only 31% residents would use the service and only one of the four companies’ bids offered any separate yard waste pickup service (the company that did offer it proposed charging change to \$47 dollars per month to include once-a-week pickup!) Republic’s new contract will allow residents to place up to two (2) bags of yard waste alongside your trash for pickup by Republic Services. Remember you can always place bags of yard waste alongside your trash for pickup by Republic Services.

Please Pick up after your Dog...

Thankfully, most folks do pick up after their dog does its business. However, I get more calls than I should from Shavano Park residents who report that other Shavano Park residents do not pick up after their dogs during walks. Then there is the super annoying act where folks pick up the dog waste using the little baggies, but then think it is OK to drop it in their neighbor’s trash can. Often, trash cans have been emptied, but are still on the street and the bag of waste then sits in the bottom of the can for a week (if it doesn’t get stuck down on the bottom).

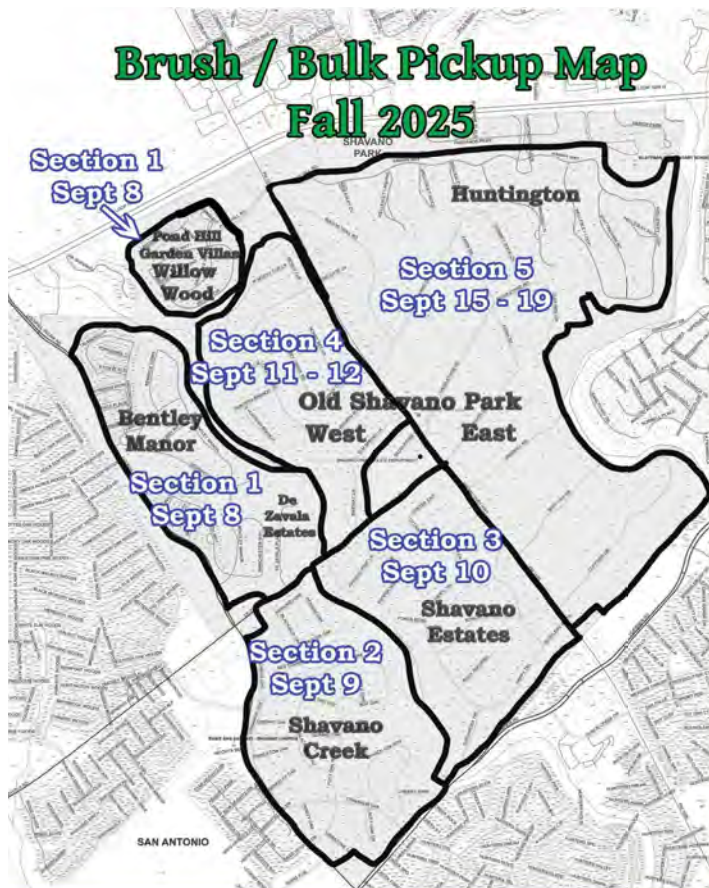

SHAVANO PARK RESIDENTIAL BRUSH and BULK ITEMS PICKUP

City of Shavano Park contracts with Republic Services to provide bi-annual brush / bulk pickup service. The next Brush / Bulk schedule begins September 8th! The City is divided into five sections, please refer to the map below or www.shavanopark.org to determine the date your area will be picked up. We ask residents to start putting brush at the curb in front of their home no more than one week before your scheduled pickup date.

There is a ten (10) cubic yard limit per household, any amount exceeding this limit may result in an additional fee from Republic Services. One (1) cubic yard is two (2) 95-gallon carts. Residents are provided one (1) 95-gallon cart.

Upon completion of our City's 4th of July celebration, we now move on to our next event, National Night Out. **In Texas, National Night Out is held the first Tuesday in October.** The City of Shavano Park will hold an event here at city hall on October 7th, from 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m., but there will also be several block parties within the community.

We are always looking for residents to host block parties; as hosting a block party for National Night Out offers numerous benefits, fosters community engagement, and enhances neighborhood safety. Here are some key advantages:

Overhanging Tree Limbs Overhanging Branches Can Delay Emergency Vehicles 14' High – Let Us By

Overhanging tree limbs can delay emergency vehicles when seconds make the difference between life and death. Obstructing limbs also cause damage to costly city and school district vehicles. Be "tree-responsible" and keep limbs trimmed away from traffic signs, signals, street name signs and other items related to public safety.



Tree Trimming Requirements

Trees, shrubs, vines and similar plants must be trimmed to 14 feet above the ground surface to allow for fire trucks, ambulances, school buses, garbage trucks, postal service and other public service vehicles to pass through safely.

Brush and limbs trimmed to 14 feet above the ground surface keep public roadways and alleys free and clear of obstructions.

Tree Pruning Tips

Property owners can safely trim lower branches. For large limbs and those that cannot be reached safely, please hire a professional arborist.

- Use the proper tools, and keep them clean and sharp.
- Remove any branches that interfere with streets, sidewalks or routine maintenance such as mowing.
- Try to maintain a trunk without branches for the first 10 to 15 feet off the ground. Trim competing limbs for greater control of the tree.
- Prune any broken or diseased branches.
- When making cuts to branches or limbs, the branch collar should not be damaged to protect the tree from internal rot.
- Remove any branch sprouts or suckers that are growing from the base of the tree in the late summer.
- Dressing the tree wound is recommended for oak trees which should be painted at all times of the year to help prevent oak wilt infestation.

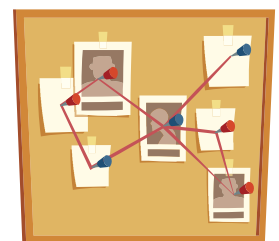

What Police Blotters Teach Us

Police blotters give us a snapshot of what’s happening in a community each day. They show patterns in crime, public safety concerns, and how often law enforcement responds to various incidents. From petty thefts to major arrests, these short summaries help people understand local issues.



Blotters also show how police spend their time—whether it’s traffic enforcement, domestic disputes, or drug-related activity. Over time, they can highlight trends, like an increase in vehicle break-ins or a drop in vandalism.

Most importantly, police blotters promote transparency. They help build trust between the public and law enforcement by making routine police activity more visible and accountable.

Public Works creative use of GIS Mapping technology

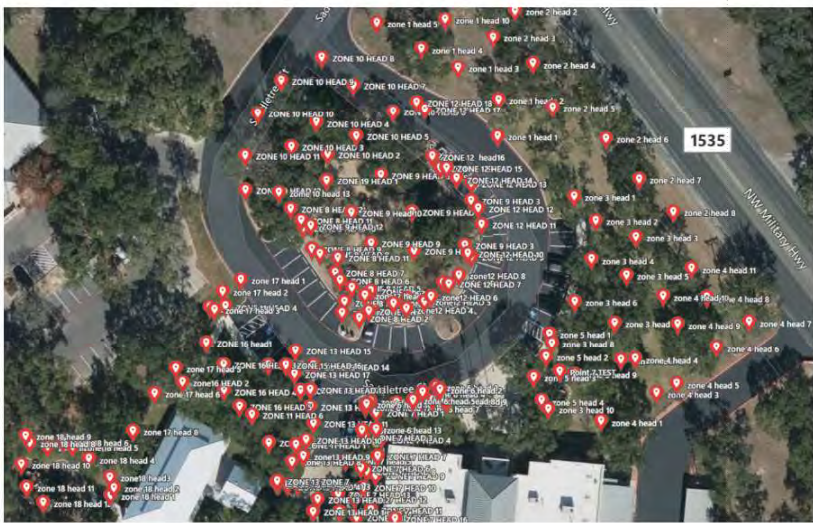
GIS (Geographic Information System) is a technology that allows people to capture, store, manipulate, analyze, manage, and visualize geographic data digitally. Before 2024 the city had a partially accurate GIS map of the water system that sat on our City Engineer’s network that was difficult to manage and update. In 2024, utilizing funding from Bexar County, the Water system was able to update the Water system GIS map to be far more detailed and accurate working with another engineering firm.

During the Water GIS update project, it quickly became apparent that city staff would have to do the field locates ourselves. City staff took on the challenge, quickly learning and deploying a cheap and effective GIS locating setup with accuracy up to 1

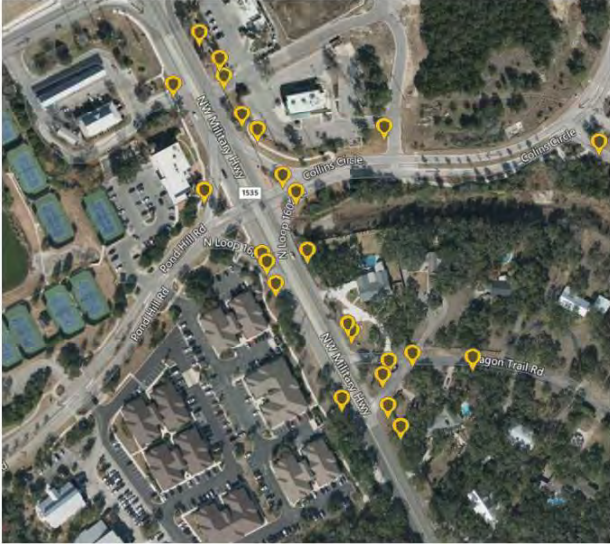
foot. Using a ruggedized tablet, a GIS antenna and an app for only \$3,320 the city was able to outfit its Public Works with the capability to accurately locate assets in the field and upload this field data (with pictures!) to a digital GIS map that sits on the cloud.

This setup was easy to learn and use for Public Works employees who since last year have been using the tool for a myriad of other projects beyond the Water System. Over the Winter the Public Works used the GIS locator to map 292 city street signs. This gave the city an accurate inventory of its street signs for the first time. This not only speeds up repair time (no time wasted hunting for signs – accurate location within 1 foot!) it also helps the city to better budget and plan for the replacement of worn-out street signs. This past spring, after struggling to maintain the Municipal Tract’s irrigation system for years, the Public Works mapped all 189 sprinkler heads, greatly simplifying figuring out irrigation problems and speeding up repairs. The Public Works Department continues to think creatively on how best to utilize the GIS mapping to improve customer service response and help maintain the city’s infrastructure.

Protecting Shavano Park’s Storm Drains and Natural Resources

Storm drains are a critical part of Shavano Park’s infrastructure, designed to manage rainwater and reduce the risk of flooding. However, when not properly maintained, these systems can also carry pollutants into our natural waterways. In Shavano Park, protecting our environment, local wildlife, and natural landscapes is a shared responsibility—and keeping storm drains clean plays a key role in that mission.

How Runoff Affects Our Local Wildlife and Ecosystem

When rain falls on rooftops, streets, and yards, the water picks up debris, chemicals, and other pollutants before flowing into storm drains. Unlike water that goes through a treatment plant, stormwater runoff often goes directly into our creeks and rivers without any filtration. Yard waste like leaves, grass clippings, and fertilizer can introduce excess nutrients into our waterways, promoting harmful algal blooms that deplete oxygen and endanger fish and other aquatic species.

Additionally, chemicals such as pesticides and herbicides can harm amphibians, birds, and other wildlife that depend on clean water sources for survival.

Simple Ways Shavano Park Residents Can Help

Everyone in the community can take small actions that make a big impact on water quality and the health of our ecosystems:

- **Dispose of Yard Waste Properly:** Compost grass clippings and leaves, or use them as mulch—don’t blow them into the street.
- **Limit Chemical Use:** Use eco-friendly lawn and garden products, and avoid applying them right before rain to reduce runoff.
- **Pick Up Pet Waste:** Pet waste contains bacteria and nutrients that can contaminate local waterways.
- **Sweep, Don’t Hose:** Use a broom to clean driveways and sidewalks instead of rinsing debris into storm drains.
- **Report Illegal Dumping:** If you witness anyone disposing of trash, chemicals, or oil into storm drains, contact city authorities immediately.

Shavano Park’s Ongoing Commitment to Clean Water

The City of Shavano Park is committed to preserving the beauty and integrity of our natural environment. Through regular maintenance of stormwater systems, we’re working to ensure that our waterways and wildlife habitats remain clean and vibrant. Residents are also encouraged to join community clean-up efforts and storm drain awareness programs.

Together, we can keep our storm drains clear, our creeks clean, and our city a healthy place to live, learn, and thrive—for generations to come.

From in the Garden Variegated Shell Ginger

A Tropical Vacation In Your Own Backyard

With its showy variegated leaves and funnel shaped white flowers with pink or orange throats, variegated shell ginger provides a tropical look for your garden and is readily available in South Texas nurseries. A herbaceous perennial, the variegated shell ginger (*Alpinia zerumbet variegata*) will usually die back to the crown each winter and will regrow from its base each spring. Native to Southeast Asia, it quickly became a favorite ornamental plant in other parts of the world.



Although most often grown for its tropical appearance and its flowers resembling seashells, it has multiple practical uses, as well. Its leaves are used to flavor noodles and rice cakes in Japan. Viewed as a natural preservative, the Chinese often use the leaves to wrap zongzi, a sticky rice dish, during the Dragon Boat Festival. Shell ginger tea is drunk in Okinawa where it is known for its antioxidant and anti-inflammatory properties. It is also often viewed in these countries as an insect repellent. Successfully grown in South Texas, in areas with partial to full shade; they complement other plants with similar light and moisture requirements such as ferns and hostas.

As shell ginger can grow rapidly to four feet in height and live for twenty years, it is important to take note of any companion plants nearby.

Preferring indirect light, variegated ginger thrives



with both morning sun and afternoon shade. With its preference for partial to full shade, well drained slightly acidic soil, and consistent moisture (especially during summer months), it grows easily here in your garden or container as an accent plant requiring minimal care.

Virtually pest free, the home gardener can look forward to up to two decades of their own tropical backyard vacation with shell ginger by protecting the gingers roots from winter by applying a thick layer of mulch to protect them.

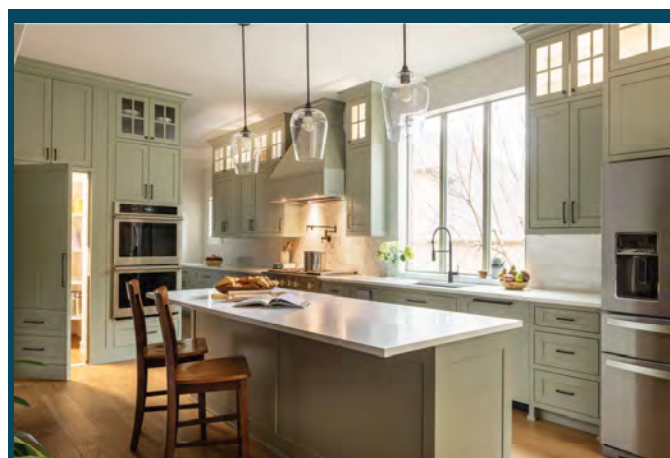

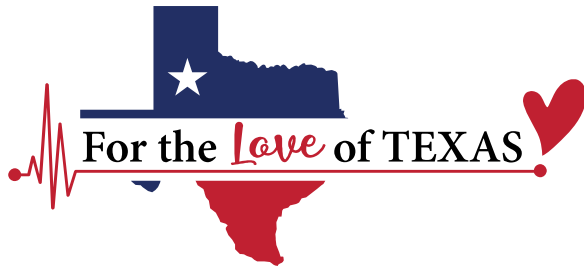
