Increase in Shavano Park System Water Rates

On May 13th, City Council approved an increase to the Shavano Park water debt service fee portion of your bill to provide for full funding of the Water Utility's annual debt service. The increase will become effective on July 1, 2019. This increase does not apply to residents that receive their water service from San Antonio Water System (SAWS).

The rate structure in use by the City's water utility was last adjusted in 2009. In comparison, over the last ten years, the San Antonio Water System (SAWS) has increased their residential rates every year except 2010. The complete water rate structure for your water bill is a combination of fixed rates for the debt service and water service fees, variable rates for water consumption and EAA management fees.

Previously, the water utility debt payment was primarily made from the operating revenue. The average water utility debt service paid annually by the City is \$185,899. With 686 customers in the system, the monthly debt service per customer calculates to \$22.58, an increase of \$16.18 a month (the previous fee was \$6.40 a month). This fee will provide an additional \$133,000 of annual revenues utilized to fund the yearly debt payment. No other changes to the rates were approved.

The Water Advisory Committee (WAC) was created in 2007 and meets monthly with City staff to consider numerous areas affecting our water system and to advise City Council on the City Water System. The WAC along with City Staff has been closely monitoring our budget, our reserves and a need for a rate increase for several years. In February 2019, the WAC formed a committee to review and recommend rate change options. After several months of detailed analysis, the WAC considered and presented a number of different options to City Council, who approved the change as described above.

The need for increased revenue is driven by several factors:

- 1. Inflation.** Example. If the Water Utility Fund increased rates to equal the prior year's inflation rate, approximately \$160,000

SHAVANO PARK GETS NEW FIRE TRUCK

On Friday May 10th, the Fire Department took delivery of the city’s newest fire truck, a Pierce 100’ Heavy-Duty Aerial Platform. The new truck or “Platform 139” is the first of its kind to be placed in service in our city. Platform 139 will replace Engine 2 (139B), which has served the city for the last 20 years.

Some of Platform 139’s features include a 100’ aerial platform, capable of reaching the top floor or roof of any of the buildings located throughout the city. Additionally Platform 139 carries a full complement of ground ladders, thermal imaging camera, ventilation fans, forcible entry tools, as well as ropes and rigging for low to high angle rescues. Platform 139 has the capability of pumping up to 2000 gallons per minute at the scene of a fire.

Fire crews began training on Platform 139 on May 13th, and the department plans to have the truck in service by mid-June. Crews will continue to train with Platform 139 throughout the city in the coming weeks, laddering buildings and getting a feel for this incredible new resource.

The department will hold a ceremonial “push-in” ceremony on Saturday, June 29th prior to the city’s Independence Day Celebration. The tradition of pushing a new truck into the station dates back to the time of horse drawn engines. It was necessary to un-hook the horses

from the engine, and push it back into the firehouse after responding to an alarm. Today it has become tradition to push the new truck into the station, and make it available for service. If you are in the area, please stop in, we would love to show you the newest addition to the fleet, and we hope to see all of you on the morning of the 29th.

Since there was only one item on the ballot this year and the current council members were unopposed, we thought it would be nice to continue the tradition of meeting the candidates in front of city hall. Going Green offered free hotdogs and sausages to the residents. Thanks to the cooks Mayor Bob Werner, David Ross and Alderman Mike Colemere. Special thanks to Gwen Mitchell who donated her fabulous “Edible Gems” cookies for the children who came with their parents to participate in the democratic process. Mayor Pro -Tem Ross served about 100 hotdogs, chips and sodas. Going Green gave out the remaining tree and plants from Arbor Day. We are happy to report all the trees found new homes. Public Works will be planting some of the crepe myrtles on our municipal properties. So in a few years some lovely crepe myrtles will be seen throughout Shavano Park.



If you are interested in growing a butterfly and pollinator garden, we have copies of the latest National Wildlife Federation magazine at city hall. They are free for you to pick up and learn all about planting for pollinators. It doesn't require a lot of space in your yard and many of the plants will do quite well in pots.

If you haven't signed up your yard as Backyard Habitat, the magazines also have a checklist for you to see how easy it is. It only requires food, water and shelter for wildlife. That can be as simple as a bird house, bird feeders and a bird bath. As Mayor Werner says “if you live in Shavano Park. - Your yard will qualify “. If you do sign up - please let me know so we can include you in this year's celebration as Community Wildlife Habitat that Going Green will be hosting later this year. Code Compliance Corner

Trimming your trees that overhang Streets

We are approaching the time when Oak trees may again be trimmed, July, August and September.



Did you know our ordinances require property owners to maintain a 14-foot clearance above our right-a-ways (roads)? Specifically, “Protrusion or overhang is prohibited over other easements and rights-of-way adjacent to streets to a height under 14 feet”.

This is a common ordinance shared by most cities. By maintaining 14-foot clearance, we protect vehicles such as delivery trucks and our fire trucks from damage by preventing the trees from striking them.

Working in conjunction with our authorized tree trimming periods, our Code Compliance Office and Fire Inspectors inspect our roads and send notices of violations to the property owners. If you receive one these, you are not being singled out, as we routinely find over 200 homes in violation.

Nevertheless, I know from personal experience that receiving a notice of violation can be frustrating – especially if you seem to be getting a notice of tree protrusions or overhang year after year. One of the things I've noticed in my yard is if I trim my trees to only 14 feet, within a year they will soon grow downwards and I'll be in violation again. What I have personally done at my home is to trim the overhangs to create 16 feet of clearance. This buys me a couple years before they must be trimmed again.

We ask your assistance in having your tree trimmers to cut the limbs, both high enough and away from the roadway sides, so that our fire vehicles and your UPS, FedEx, Lowes and other delivery trucks can safely travel the streets and get to your home.

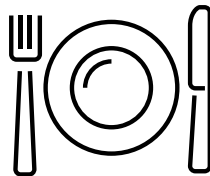

Adopted Ordinances Not Yet Codified

The listing below includes all legislation received by Municipal Code since the last update (printed or electronic) to the Code of Ordinances. This legislation has been enacted, but has not yet been codified.

ORDINANCE NO. O-2019-004

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CITY OF SHAVANO PARK CODE OF ORDINANCES TO INCREASE THE WATER DEBT SERVICE FEE BEGINNING JULY 1, 2019; PROVIDING A CUMULATIVE & CONFLICTS CLAUSE, PROVIDING FOR A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SHAVANO PARK, TEXAS:

I CODE AMENDMENT

APPENDIX A – CITY OF SHAVANO PARK FEE SCHEDULE, Shavano Park Water System Fees of the City of Shavano Park Code of Ordinances hereby amended to read as follows. This section will become effective beginning July 1, 2019:

of additional revenue would have been received for the FY 2014-2018 time frame.

2. Reduction in Reserves. Over the last 8 years, the Water Utility Fund has made the following improvements to the water system; which have been funded with reserves.

- Replaced the SCADA (Control System) - \$253,000
- Refurbished / Painted the Elevated Storage Tank - \$178,000
- Repainted the Ground Storage Tank - \$147,000
- Constructed PW/Water Office Building- \$91,000
- Rebuilt Wells #5 and #6 - \$68,000
- Operating losses in fiscal years 2014, 2015, 2016, and 2017 which were funded with reserves

3. Water Conservation. Historical records indicated that Shavano Park residents have used on average 20% less water (conserving water) from 2012 - 2018 when compared to water usage from 1995 - 2011. On the one hand, water conservation is a good thing for many reasons - on the other hand it has the effect of decreasing water revenues needed to operate the system.

Waste & Recycling Service Guide

Frequently Asked Questions:

How does my waste collection work?

Roll your container to the curb by 7 a.m. on your collection day. The container is emptied mechanically from inside a Republic Services vehicle cab. The driver uses a joy-stick, much like those used in video games, to operate the automated arm that picks up the container and empties the garbage into the truck. The container is set back in place, and the Republic Services truck moves on to the next stop.

When should I set out my waste?

Be sure your container is at the curb by 7:00 a.m. on your collection day to ensure collection. Or, you may set your container out the night before if you wish.

Where do I place my container for service?

Proper placement is extremely important. On your collection day, please place your container within 2 feet from the edge of the street by 7:00 a.m. Make sure the handles are facing toward your house, so that when the container is lifted, the lid opens toward the street. Please check to see that the container is not obstructed by parked cars, boats, etc. The postmaster requires that the containers be placed far enough away from the mailbox that the carrier can get to the mailbox without interference.

What can I put in my container?

The container is designed to hold a maximum weight of 175 lbs. All of your (bagged) household waste and (bagged) yard waste can be disposed of in your container. Please bag loose items to prevent littering. Since the container is mechanically emptied, the driver never leaves the truck. The container cannot be emptied if waste is on top of or next to the container - ALL waste must fit inside the container with the lid closed. You should NOT put concrete, large amounts of dirt, or heavy waste into your container. Please do not put hot ashes in your container, paint or any hazardous liquids or materials.

What if I have more than one container will hold?

If you wish to use additional containers, you may order them by calling your customer service number. There is a monthly charge for each additional container.

Please note that the U.S. EPA prohibits the disposal of white goods containing freon. These items will not be collected without a certification of removal by a licensed technician. This includes items such as refrigerators, freezers and air conditioners.

Who do I call for container repairs?

Call your Republic Services Customer Service Department for your repairs.

Recycling Information

Please recycle only the items below:

- ✓ **PLASTICS**
Recycle plastics #1 thru #7. Look on the bottom of containers for a number inside the recycling arrows.
- ✓ **METAL CANS, ALUMINUM FOIL, ALUMINUM FOIL PANS**
Recycle all food and beverage metal cans - steel, tin, bi-metal and aluminum.
- ✓ **CARDBOARD, NEWSPAPER AND MAGAZINES**
You can also include newspaper inserts, catalogs, paperback books, phone books and brochures.
- ✓ **PAPER FOOD CONTAINERS**
Recycle food boxes including: juice boxes, egg, ice cream and milk cartons, and cereal and pasta boxes.
- ✓ **PAPER**
Recycle envelopes, office paper, junk mail, greeting cards and file folders. Shredded paper should be put in a paper bag.
- ✓ **GLASS**
Clear and colored glass.

Recycling Made Easy

- Please be sure your recycling container is at the curb by 7 a.m. on your collection day.
- All recyclables can be placed together in the recycling container. Place your recycling container two feet away from the curb so it can be easily seen from the street.
- Additional recycling containers can be ordered at RepublicServices.com.

How To Recycle Properly

- All types of recyclables may be placed together in your recycling container.
- If it looks like rain, be sure to close the container lid. Wet paper products cannot be recycled.
- Flatten cardboard boxes and set them under your recycling container.
- Rinse plastic and glass bowls and remove lids.
- Rinse aluminum & metal cans.

Do you have a person in your life who may be a hoarder? Hoarding is a condition where a person has persistent difficulty discarding personal possessions. The large amount of possessions fill the home and prevent the normal use of the space. Living space becomes cluttered. It may be unusable. Hoarding brings distress and emotional health concerns.

WHY HOARDING INCREASES FIRE RISKS

- Cooking is unsafe if flammable items are close to the stove or oven.
- Heating units may be too close to things that can burn. They might also be placed on unstable surfaces. If a heater tips over into a pile, it can cause a fire.
- Electrical wiring may be old or worn from the weight of piles. Pests could chew on wires. Damaged wires can start fires.
- Open flames from smoking materials or candles in a home with excess clutter are very dangerous.
- Blocked pathways and exits may hinder escape from a fire.

HOW HOARDING IMPACTS FIRST RESPONDERS

- Hoarding puts first responders in harm's way.
- Firefighters cannot move swiftly through a home filled with clutter.
- Responders can be trapped in a home when exits are blocked. They can be injured by objects falling from piles.
- The weight of the stored items, especially if water is added to put out a fire, can lead to building collapse.
- Fighting fires is very risky in a hoarding home. It is hard to enter the home to provide medical care. The clutter impedes the search and rescue of people and pets.

How Can You Help Reduce the Risk of Fire Injury

- ✓ When talking a person who hoards, focus on safety rather than the clutter. Be empathetic. Match the person's language. If they call it hoarding, then you can call it hoarding.
- ✓ Help the residents make a home safety and escape plan. Stress the importance of clear pathways and exits. Practice the plan often. Exit routes may change as new items are brought into the home.
- ✓ Install working smoke alarms in the home. Test them at least once a month.
- ✓ Reach out to community resources. Talk to members of the fire department to alert them of your concerns. They may be able to connect you with members of a hoarding task force for additional help.
