BACKGROUND / HISTORY: The Town Plan was recommended for approval by the Planning & Zoning Commission at the August 1, 2018, one of its sections regarded local schools.

On August 10, 2018 Commissioner Ortiz approached staff requesting revisions to the local schools section of the Town Plan. Staff informed the Commissioner that staff would be unable to make any change and recommended he bring his concerns to the Mayor, City Council and/or Chairman Janssen.

Later in August, Commissioner Ortiz sent a letter to Mayor Werner, Chairman Janssen and City staff asking the local schools section be revised to place less emphasis on the two schools adjacent to the City and to include others and specifically to include Hobby and Clark.

DISCUSSION: At the August 27, 2018 City Council meeting, staff presented to City Council the Planning & Zoning recommended Town Plan. A brief discussion occurred regarding the schools. Council consensus was to clarify in the Town Plan draft that Hobby Middle School and Clark H.S. were the two public schools that served Shavano Park.

Staff amended the local schools section for the 1st reading of the Comprehensive Plan and at the September 17, 2018 City Council meeting, the City Council approved the 1st reading of the Town Plan.

This action allows P&Z to finalize a recommendation for revision of the Town Plan prior to Council's final approval later in October. This revision to Local Schools section is provided within attachment 5a.



Local Schools

Shavano Park is entirely within the Northside Independent School District (NISD), an award-winning school system and one of South Texas' premier school districts. NISD is the state's fourth largest school district, covering 355 square miles, operating 117 public schools and enrolling 106,066 children in 2017-2018 school year. NISD provides excellence in education and is an accredited school district by the Texas Education Agency. The accreditation status is based on the academic accountability rating and financial ratings.



Blattman Elementary School, located in the northeastern part of Shavano Park, is part of NISD. Blattman Elementary received recognition as #7 on the list of best San Antonio Elementary Schools in 2017, as reported by the *San Antonio Express-News* in June 2017. The NISD middle school and high school serving Shavano Park's public school students are Hobby Middle School, located less than 3 miles from the City, and Tom C. Clark High

School, located less than 2 miles from the City.

Shavano Park is also surrounded by high quality private and charter schools. Cornerstone Christian School is a private religious school located north of Loop 1604 and is only about a mile and a half away from Shavano Park's City Center. Cornerstone Christian School includes grades K-12, is dedicated to teaching a "Christian Worldview Curriculum", and currently

boasts a 100% college acceptance rate.



As of 2018, Basis Curriculum School's location near Shavano Park on Lockhill Selma (see picture) is still under construction. Basis Curriculum is a charter school that is currently building a campus near the intersection of Lockhill Selma Road and Indian Woods. Basis Shavano Campus will include grades 6 through 12 and hope to provide their students with "the best possible educational foundation to be independent and resourceful problem solvers and to face future challenges."

BACKGROUND / HISTORY: After a presentation by staff in February, at the March 26, 2018 City Council Meeting the Council approved Ordinance O-2018-001. This Budget Amendment authorized \$564,188 from capital reserves to drainage projects in the City:

The Engineering Task Orders are as follows:

• Task Order 4 – Hydrologic Analysis, Survey and Design of culverts on Fawn & Chimney Rock

- Task Order 5 Hydrologic Analysis, Survey and Design of culverts on Bent Oak, Windmill and Cliffside
- **Task Order 6** Partial Survey and Preliminary Engineering Report on Turkey Creek area, Elm Spring area and Ripple Creek / Municipal Tract area.

In the past five months staff and KFW have made significant progress. As of October 3, 2018 progress achievements include:

- **Drainage Area 1:** Kinnan Way Berm constructed and drainage ditches cleaned out by Bitterblue (no cost to City)
- **Drainage Area 2:** Wagon Trail depression pump / electrical plans submitted to CPS awaiting final CPS approval (no cost to City except ongoing electrical usage costs)
- **KFW Task Order 4 & 5:** Surveying, hydrological studies and 40% plans completed for culverts on Bent Oak, Chimney Rock and Windmill progress underway on 95% plans; revisions completed on 40% plans after receiving concerns from residents (see attachments 7a 7c)
- **Drainage Area 5:** Natural drainage gulley running from Bent Oak to NW Military cleared of all brush and debris
- Significant communication with residents led to determination that culverts on Cliffside and Fawn were not necessary; close coordination with residents regarding proposed culverts on Bent Oak, Windmill and Fawn

Not all projects and engineering approved in the March Budget Amendment were complete at the end of the budget year. These included KFW Engineering Task Order 6 (preliminary engineering and partial survey for the three largest projects concerning Turkey Creek, Elm Spring / Bikeway and Munitract / Ripple Creek areas) and the construction of the culverts on Bent Oak, Chimney Rock and Windmill. It is anticipated that bidding for construction of culverts on Bent Oak, Windmill and Chimney Rock will begin in December 2018 timeframe. Actual expenses in FY18 are as follows:

In addition to the unspent monies for work not complete yet in FY18, staff have achieved significant savings from original approved scope by dropping costs associated with Cliffside & Fawn culverts as well as rigorous oversight of expenses. The total unspent monies for FY18 is \$504,318.66:

The completion of these projects require only an additional \$225,181.34 from reserves.

At the end of FY19, the plan if approved and executed the City will have completed three culvert projects and have preliminary engineering reports on the remaining three large projects (Turkey Creek, Elm Spring / Bikeway and Munitract / Ripple Creek areas). These reports will provide further vetting of the Master Drainage Plan to determine most appropriate solution for each area. The projected City drainage reserves to tackle these large projects after FY19 projects is as follows:

As the City nears fully developed, it is anticipated there are few projected development fee revenues. The Master Drainage Plan estimated costs to address the three largest projects to be in excess of eight million dollars.

DISCUSSION: For fiscal year 2018-19 staff proposes the completion of the three culverts on Bent Oak, Windmill and Chimney Rock (and associated engineering work in Task Order 10) as well as completion of KFW Task Order 6. The total cost of these projects is \$729,500 but with

the projected unspent monies from this budget year, only an additional \$284,288 would require being released from drainage reserves.

At the October 3, 2018 meeting staff will present pictures and videos showing flooding across the City during the Labor Day rain events.

COURSES OF ACTION: N/A

FINANCIAL IMPACT: \$729,500 for the FY2018-19 Budget (Approximately \$504,318 are funds budgeted in FY 2017-18 and not spent).




BENT OAK DR. LOW WATER CROSSING IMPROVEMENTS





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
