To pay your water bill online:

Go to the Village website at villageofsouthrockwoodmi.com

- Click on, "Please click on this link here to pay by credit card"
- When a new page opens, Click on, "Make a Quick Payment" at the bottom of the page.
- On the first line of the next page, Input your ACCOUNT NUMBER as your FULL HOUSE NUMBER & STREET NAME (Otherwise, your payment could be accounted to someone else's account.)
- Follow the remaining directions to enter credit card information



SNOW EMERGENCIES

If there are <u>four or more inches of snow, it is considered a</u> <u>snow emergency</u> and cars are not allowed to park in the road right-of-way. **Vehicles parked in the right-of-way during a snow emergency** <u>will be towed</u>.


To confirm that a snow emergency is in effect, listen to WJR or WWJ.



We ask that property owners use caution when plowing or removing snow from your driveways.

PUSHING SNOW INTO THE STREET IS A VIOLATION OF LAW.

Section 257.677A (4) of the Michigan Penal Code and Motor Vehicle Law states " A person shall not deposit, or cause to be deposited, snow, ice, or slush on any roadway or highway."



SNOW REMOVAL SERVICE

Seniors and/or disabled residents may be eligible for snow removal services IF you meet the following requirements:

- · You must be 65 years and/or disabled,
- And have no additional persons residing with you that are able to shovel snow.
- You must provide a doctor's slip confirming your disability.

**If you have been on the snow removal list in the past, applications have gone out.

Please make sure that you fill out **BOTH forms** in the application packet- the application and the waiver and return them to the Village Hall as soon as possible.

If you have any questions or would like to be added to the snow removal list, please feel free to contact the Village Hall.



PLEASE REMEMBER

Driveway cleaning services is a courtesy and not a mandatory service the Village provides.

The purpose of this service is to enable Senior Citizens and disabled residents to get out of their driveway in case of an emergency situation.

The DPW will only plow driveways AFTER ALL the Village roadways and other responsibilities are complete. Only one driveway per residence will be plowed and they do not plow driveways after our regular business hours.

The Village Council would like to continue this service.

However, after every snow storm the office gets numerous calls wanting to know when the driveways will be plowed. Many residents even become hostile and rude when they are told that the DPW clears the main roads and performs their other necessary duties prior.

This is not a guaranteed service after every snowfall due to other responsibilities that need to be taken care of in the Village.

Therefore, if this is a service that you REQUIRE IMMEDIATELY and as a NECESSITY you may want to contact a snow removal company to meet your needs.

DO NOT Call the office unless you have an emergency situation. The driveways will be cleared as soon as possible.

It has been noted that citizens have recently become dependent on contacting the Police Department via the general office phone.

Although it is ok to contact us using the office phone, if there is something happening that needs attention by an officer, the best and quickest way to get in contact with someone from the Police Department is through Central Dispatch.

In the case of an emergency always dial 911.

The Monroe County Central Dispatch center is always in constant radio contact with our on duty officer. 734-243-7070 is the number you should call if you need a police officer sent to your house for non-emergency services.

Please make note of this number so that you may better activate and utilize the services that your Police Department provides.

Police Department News:

Here are a few Basic Crime Prevention Tips:

Extend the Life of your Holiday Gifts:

Get yourself an engraving tool kit. With this tool you can engrave special markings or numbers to identify your property. If stolen and recovered the engraved markings will allow investigators to get the property back to you. The engraved number might even deter a thief, since the number makes it harder for criminals to dispose of valuables in the underworld channels. Do not limit yourself to engraving your holiday gifts, you can engrave all of your precious possessions and valuables.

Your Garage Door Opener:

Always treat your garage door opener the same way you treat keys to your home. Keep it out of sight and away from strangers A thief can use a garage door opener to get into your house.

Thieves break into cars all too easily and if the garage door opener is out in the open, on the front seat or on the dash, they can use it to open the garage. It allows them to rifle through your garage, and worse yet, they may be able to get into your home. So keep your garage door opener out of sight.

Turn your Lights on:

It can cost a lot of money to replace stolen items if you are burglarized. It will cost much less to keep a light burning all night long. Thieves do not like bright places. So if one house is brightly lit, and another has no lights, criminals general head to the darker house. So deny a burglar the opportunity to rip you off. Turn on exterior lights around your house throughout the night.

Cold Weather Safety Tips

When you're outside, frostbite and hyperthermia are possible so you need to protect yourself.

- 1. Wear layers of loose fitting lightweight, clothing.
- 2. Wear a hat. Try to stay dry and out of the wind..
- 3. Cover your mouth to protect your lungs from extreme cold.
- 4. Mittens, snug at wrist, are better than gloves.

Ice Safety

Our weather has lead to unsafe ice conditions on ponds, lakes and rivers. Brief arctic freezes will not increase ice thickness much, thus it is advised to stay off the ice.

To keep pipes from freezing on an outside wall:

- 1. Let hot and cold water trickle at night from a faucet.
- 2. Open cabinet doors to allow more heat to get to the pipes.
- 3. Make sure your heat is left on and no lower than 55 degrees.
- 4. If you plan to be away, have someone check on your house daily to make sure heat is on to prevent freezing and that no water pipes have burst.

If pipes freeze:

- 1. Make sure you or someone in your family know how to shut off the water in case pipes burst.
- 2. Never try to thaw a pipe with an open flame or torch. Use a hair dryer instead.
- 3. Always be careful of the potential for electric shock in and around standing water.

Carbon Monoxide poisoning:


- 1. Install a carbon monoxide detector.
- 2. Never run generators indoors.
- 3. Open windows slightly when using a kerosene heater.
- 4. Never use a gas oven to heat your home.
- 5. If your heat goes out, you can close off rooms you do not need to use and dress in layers and wear a cap.

Wood-burning stoves, fireplaces and heaters:

- 1. Always keep a screen around an open flame.
- 2. Never use gasoline to start your fireplace.
- 3. Never burn charcoal indoors.
- 4. Do not close the damper when ashes are hot.

Avoid the "Second Shovel"

People can play a part in ensuring the ends of their driveways remain clear of snow even after their local snowplow comes through. Shoveling a "corner" of the right-of-way free of snow in the area several feet before the driveway will help keep that same snow from being pushed into the driveway in an icy, heavy pile. Clearing an area large enough to hold the snow coming off the plow may help reduce the "second shovel."




Salt Less

Help keep rivers healthy in the winter.
Shovel snow and ice early and often to limit your use of sand, salt and de-icing chemicals.
When safety requires it, try an alternative to salt.
Deicers, such as magnesium chloride, have fewer adverse environmental impacts and are not as corrosive.
Check labels to choose a deicer that fits your conditions and apply it early and sparingly.

PEPPERMINT BARK RECIPE:

Ingredients:

1 (6 ounce) package white chocolate, chopped

3 peppermint candy canes

Directions:

- Line a baking sheet with waxed paper.
- Place white chocolate in a microwave safe bowl
- Heat in the microwave until melted, 60-90 seconds. Stir until smooth.
- Place one gallon-sized, resalable bag inside a second gallon-sized bag, creating a double layered bag.
- Place candy canes inside the inner bag and seal.
- Crush the candy canes inside the bag with a rolling pin.
- Stir crushed candy canes into the melted white chocolate.
- Pour the white chocolate onto the prepared baking sheet.
- Chill in the refrigerator until hardened. 1 hour.

Prep Time: 15 minutes
Cook Time: 1 minute
Additional Time: 1 hour

Total Time: 1 hour, 16 minutes
