Springfield Township is currently working to update its [Master Plan](#) and we are looking for individuals to serve as facilitators to help lead small group discussions to collect important data on the community's future vision. **Would you be willing to do this?**

Not sure what a Master Plan even is or why it's important? Master plans lay a framework for future policy decisions in the community. It helps the Township determine where buildings should and shouldn't go, what type of housing we want, where pathway connections are needed, and how to enhance our parks and open spaces. Given that, input from community residents and stakeholders is very important to ensure we are all working toward the future we want.

Not sure you have time to do this? Discussions are only intended to last 60-75 minutes and can be done either at your home or a community space, such as a meeting room at the Civic Center or one of our fire stations. You have until November 23 to host your discussion and return the materials to the Township Offices, giving you several weeks to find time to bring some neighbors, friends, or strangers together to hear what they want to see done in the Township in the future.
