

WAUPACA COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE 2004 ANNUAL REPORT

In 2004 we had some "changing of the Guards" in the Sheriff's office. In June Officer Gary Schmies retired after 26 years with the department. In addition Sergeant Gerald Jorgenson retired in July after 29 years. Both these men will be missed. They dedicated a good portion of their lives to this department and the citizens of Waupaca County.

In May of 2004 the 6th annual Law Enforcement awards Ceremonies were held. Two of our officers were recognized. Receiving an award for **Distinguished Service** were Detective Sergeant Carl Artz and Patrol Sergeant Gerald Jorgenson. Sergeant Artz for his part as the hostage negotiator in a SWAT call from 2003. Detective Sergeant Artz corresponded with the perpetrator for (2hours) before successfully convincing him to surrender. Sergeant Gerald Jorgenson received his award for extricating an individual from a burning vehicle at an accident scene. I am very proud of the unending effort put forth by these two officers.

In March we transitioned to a new and greatly improved computerized management system for the Department. This system fully integrates the Jail, Patrol, Records and Communications division. This new system not only incorporates all of the different management systems within our department, it is also capable of tying together outside departments. This will assist not only us but also the local Police Departments by allowing us access to each other's records, thus expediting the information for investigations.

In a joint venture with Andrew Carlin, Emergency Management Director we purchased a new mobile command center and a Chevrolet pickup in 2004. This is a self-contained trailer unit, which is totally self-sufficient. These items were obtained through a Homeland Security grant at no expense to the County. The trailer was built locally at Hawk trailers in Manawa. We have used it on several different occasions in 2004, for a lost child, the Iola Car Show, a hazardous material exercise and in the aftermath of a tornado in the southwest portion of the county. It has proven extremely valuable in these situations.

In November, the County Board acknowledged the need for more department staff and approved the first of my three-year plan. This plan allows us to start filling some shortages within certain divisions. Two telecommunicators and one patrolman will be hired in 2005. I wish to thank the County Board for seeing the need and allowing this to happen.

In 2006 I will be asking for a Detective Sergeant, a Patrol Sergeant and an additional Patrolman. In 2007 I will be asking for an additional Patrol Sergeant which will give us our much needed round the clock supervision in the patrol Division.

Traffic fatalities for 2004 remained the same as 2003 at 13. Department of Transportation Grants received for 2004 were for Speed, OWI and Seat belt enforcement. Several officers attended specialized training in the spring of 2004 for weight enforcement. These officers were assigned special detail to enforce the weight limits on County and Town roads. Citations were issued in the amount of \$16331.19. The overtime sustained for this detail was covered by the County Highway Department budget.

For 2004 the Detective division handled 411 complaints, an increase of 26% over last year. In addition sexual assaults showed a major increase. In 2004 the division investigated 73 sexual assaults, an increase of 35% over the prior year. Seventy-three may not seem like many however it takes on average 3-4 days to complete a sexual assault case. This is very time consuming for the 4 detectives considering that this is in addition to all of the other cases they must investigate. The addition of a new Detective Sergeant will help immensely.

Let me again say thank you to the members of the County Board for recognizing and acting on the need for new staff. I look forward to the new year with confidence that these additions will be beneficial.

ADMINISTRATIVE DIVISION 2004 ANNUAL REPORT

2004 was a year of advancement for certain employees in the Administrative Division. Officer Greg Kluck left the Department to pursue a different career. Officer Kevin Studzinski was promoted to Patrol Officer in June. We wish Greg good luck in his endeavor and we know Kevin will do well in his duties with the Patrol Division. Jesse Cuff and Jason Claussen were hired to replace the two seasoned officers. I am confident that these new employees will benefit our department.

Revenues in 2004 were up from last year. Jail Assessment fees collected from traffic citations that were issued totaled \$48,994.00. Booking fees collected were at \$26,616.99 as compared to \$24,690.25 in 2003. Daily fees collected were up significantly from \$9,727.51 in 2003 to \$17,247.69, an increase of over 77 %. This was only the second year for the Electronic Monitoring Program. Revenues from this program were \$8115.00, up from \$3207.00 in 2003.

In November the County Board of Supervisors approved the hiring of two new telecommunicators. These additional staff will help with the ever-increasing workload. Thanks to the County Board for realizing the need and acting on it. Once the new employees are trained, this should help reduce overtime in the Communications Center thus helping with the Departments budget.

In addition to the new employees, the County Board passed the new budget, which contained a plan for beginning work on our communications system. This includes the patrol car radios and the radio towers and equipment. Sergeant Gary Heschke, Emergency Management Director Andrew Carlin, and myself attended several meetings and joined a group called North East Wisconsin Communications. This group (NEWCOM) is made up of 17 northeastern Wisconsin counties all facing similar communications problems. In an attempt to abide by FCC mandates requiring counties to have interoperability plan for communications. We have applied for engineering grants, which would enable us to contract with a firm to conduct a study on our situation. As of the end of 2004, the grant was submitted but no announcement had been received. Another grant associated with this one that we are investigating is one that will allow partial reimbursement for 911 equipment we have already installed in our communications system. These grants would be a welcome relief in regards to any mandates that we fall under.

In March, the whole department received a new computerized management system. This system from Spillman, not only integrates all of the various data used in the records, jail and communications division, it also added some features to the jail. The addition of a picture link system is an extremely useful tool. This allows for the picture of the inmate

to appear on the booking screen thus confirming the identity of the inmate. This could prove invaluable in a case of mistaken identity when it comes to releasing the wrong inmate. It also provides us the ability to automatically provide a picture "line-up" when requested by a detective. This feature alone saves on many hours of manually sorting through pictures to look for individuals who resemble a suspect. As we continue to build a larger data base we look forward to an increase of savings on staff hours for the tasks that were accomplished by hand in the past.

Detective Division 2004 Annual Report

In 2004 the Waupaca County Sheriff's Department investigated more than 80 drug related complaints.

Of the complaints investigated misdemeanor charges were brought on 65 different defendants. Sixteen individuals were charged with criminal drug related felonies.

In 2004 the Waupaca County Sheriff's Department had the largest number of reported marijuana grow seizures reported for the Central Wisconsin Drug Task Force, nine total. The next largest seizure was two. One grow in the Township of Harrison, Waupaca County, netted over nine pounds of processed marijuana. Detectives seized another 56 growing marijuana plants at another grow in the Township of Dayton, Waupaca County.

Paperwork has been filed for the seizure of a rural farmhouse south of Waupaca because it has been used to support drug activity. Several vehicles have also been seized or forfeited per court order. We are awaiting a cash settlement for the sheriff's department. Moneys recovered from these forfeitures are used to further drug investigations through the purchase of equipment and for training. This money allows us to purchase drug related equipment which aids in the investigation of drug cases.

The number of complaints investigated by the Detective Sergeants has increased each year over the last several years. 2001 to 2002 showed a 10% increase for them. 2002 to 2003 showed a 3% increase. 2003 to 2004 showed a 25% increase. These are only the complaints investigated by the Detective Sergeants. The numbers of Department of Human Services child protection complaints have notably increased over the last several years. Those being sexual assaults of children, child abuse, and child neglect complaints, which consume a large amount of time.

Major cases of interest in 2004. Detectives in January assisted the Winnebago County Sheriff's Department and The Department of Justice in pursuing information, which lead to the arrest of a young man from Weyauwega for a homicide that occurred in Winnebago County in the summer of 2003. The Weyauwega Police Department received the original tip. Detectives along with Weyauwega Fire Department Officials also investigated a house intentionally set on fire by a rural Weyauwega man in July during a domestic disturbance. The man's wife was inside the house when he lit several different fires inside the residence. She escaped unharmed but damage was in the range of \$86,000. The man was sentenced to prison for three years. Detectives and traffic officers have spent a considerable amount of time investigating the suspicious circumstances surrounding the body of a twenty-year-old young man found in a ditch along a rural road west of Waupaca in October of 2004. Detectives were able to locate a vehicle that had struck the deceased. The investigation into the death is continuing.

RECORDS DIVISION 2004 ANNUAL REPORT

2004 continued to be a 'work in progress' with mastering our new software system, Spillman. The users became more proficient as they continued to learn the capabilities of the program.

Beginning April 1, 2004, the Records Division has the capability of renewing license plates and issuing hard and temporary plates for vehicles, light-weight trucks and motorcycles. Training was provided by the State of Wisconsin Department of Transportation and CVR (Computerized Vehicle Registration). This service has been well received by the public, as well as another source of revenue for the Sheriff's Office.


Crime Stoppers 2004 Annual Report

The year 2004 was a successful year for the Waupaca County Crime Stoppers. Crime Stoppers received 26 anonymous tips, which led to at least 4 crimes being solved and numerous arrests.

Crime Stoppers paid in excess of \$400.00 in cash rewards to anonymous callers.

Detective Sergeant James Gorman will be the new Law Enforcement Liaison to the Waupaca County Crime Stoppers. Also new this year will be an investigative network that will link all Law Enforcement agencies in Waupaca County with crime alerts and the sharing of information.



Annual Report for 2004

During the year 2004, the Chaplaincy Unit of the Waupaca County Sheriff's Department continued to serve and assist the personnel of the Sheriff's Department on a 24 hour a day, 7 days a week basis.

As Chaplains, we accompanied officers on numerous ride-alongs during the year in an attempt to further foster the trust between the officers and the Chaplains, and to keep the Chaplains up to date of current changes within the department and the lives of department officers.

We have assisted with death notifications and the families of accident victims on more than 10 occasions, and assisted officers and emergency personnel with counseling, care and communications with family members who often feel confused and lost during these tragic crises. The assistance with death notifications continue to be one of the most appreciated uses of the Chaplaincy Unit as it frees up officers to continue with their duties while the Chaplains give family members much needed attention and direction.

In conjunction with the Clintonville Police Department, the Chaplains again hosted a Memorial Service for all Waupaca County law enforcement officers in May of 2004 at the Clintonville High School.

Helping to represent the Sheriff's Department on the Waupaca County Coordinated Community Response Team, Pastor Barry has been active in seeking to help the county deal with domestic violence and elderly abuse issues, and helped in coordinating an agreement between the Waupaca County Department of Health and Human Services, county law enforcement agencies, the medical agencies and the financial institutions of Waupaca County in dealing with elder abuse crimes and complaints.

While we officially supplemented our Chaplaincy Unit with the addition of Rev. Janis Callihan (United Methodist Churches of Manawa and Iola) in the beginning of 2004, we were sorry to accept her early resignation as she accepted another call in Manitowoc at the end of 2004.

We continue to remain ready to serve at all times, and deeply appreciate the growing relationship we have come to experience with the Sheriff's Office, and the other law enforcement areas of the county.

PATROL DIVISION 2004 ANNUAL REPORT By: Captain Harlan Deitz

The Patrol Division saw significant changes in personnel in 2004. Gary Schmies retired after serving the County of Waupaca for 26 years in the capacity of Juvenile Officer, Detective Sergeant and Patrolman. Gary retired in June. In July, Gerald Jorgenson retired. Gerald was hired by the Waupaca County Traffic Patrol in 1975 as a Patrolman and retired as a Patrol Sergeant for the Sheriff's Department. Gerald served the County for 29 years and was instrumental in the Firearms Program and the annual firearms and ammunition turn in. Gerald worked tirelessly with the Traffic Captain with the daily administrative functions within the Patrol Division. Both men will be greatly missed and we wish them and their families, happy retirements.

As a result of these retirements, Gene Goode was promoted to Patrol Sergeant to replace Gerald Jorgenson. Kevin Studzinski was promoted from the jail to Patrol Officer to replace Gary Schmies. Ben Barrington was hired from Manawa Police Department to replace Gene Goode as a Patrol Officer.

Our Officers have written 1711 citations, responded to 13,473 complaints and held tight with last years total of 13 fatalities.

As a direct result of traffic enforcement, Waupaca County received \$48,964.06 for Jail Assessment, \$75,571.50 for Traffic Fines, \$76,065.04 for Driver Improvement Program and Court Costs, for a total of \$200,600.60.

For the year of 2004 we applied for Traffic Grants through the Department of Transportation and the County of Waupaca Highway Shop. The Grants we received were for the following:

- 0 Alcohol Saturation: Aggressive enforcement for impaired drivers.
- O Speed Waves: Program that we could target problematic areas within the county for aggressive enforcement.
- Weight Restriction: Target specific roadways within Waupaca County where there were habitual weight restriction violations.

We are pleased to report a major increase in arrest of our most dangerous traffic offenders. Alcohol related arrest in all areas; OWI, PAC and Juvenile Alcohol have nearly doubled from 2003. We have also seen a drop in the volume of traffic crashes this past year in every statistic except the number of injured had a slight increase.

We remain seeing an increase in the numbers of complaints and seriousness of offenses that our Deputies are dealing with.

We again, graciously have had a safe year.

With the retirement of Sergeant Jorgenson, Sergeant Wilz took over as Lead Instructor / Armorer for the Sheriff's Department. Deputy Bill Zeamer successfully completed Firearms Instructor and is certified with the State as a Firearms Instructor.

Our training program continues to mirror the guidelines of the State of Wisconsin. We believe the 100% accuracy and 100% accountability will vastly improve our officers' survivability when faced with deadly force issues.

All of the Departments Unified Tactical Instructors have been trained in and certified with the practice of scenario-based training and we look forward to bringing this new training technique to our Deputies.

Scott Lewis and the other armorers are doing a terrific job with our weapons maintenance program. We haven't had any major maintenance issues with any of our weapons.

All Smith & Wesson armorers were re-certified by Smith & Wesson with an eight-hour course held at the Sheriff's Office. We have implemented the use of less lethal shotguns, which utilize beanbag rounds as an option for less than deadly force.

The Waupaca County Emergency Response Unit was blessed this year with no call outs. Our training program remained consistent with events we would most likely encounter, including terrorist response in a rural setting.

We incorporated scenario based training, utilizing real people with real guns to heighten the realism of the training. The Zaboj family of Weyauwega is allowing our team to utilize one of their houses for training. Neenah Police Department, utilizing this style of training, trained with us on two occasions this last year.

With the assistance of our Emergency Government director, we received nearly fifty thousand dollars worth of equipment, through Homeland Security. We have equipped the team with night vision, a wand style camera, throw-phone with multiple covert cameras, trailer, gas masks and hydration packs.

There were also several subjects arrested for drug related violations and outstanding warrants on both the Chain and River which are not included in the above numbers.

Officer Wagner responded to a report of a near drowning on the Chain and found two people in the water and in trouble. Both were rescued and taken to the hospital for treatment and release.

There were no reportable boat accidents on the Chain however there were several on the Wolf River with three of the accidents resulting in serious injuries. Two of the accidents resulted in OWI arrests.

Three officers attended 3 day training for Marine Patrol Officers at Gateway Technical College in Kenosha.

Officers Poltrock and Gorchals spoke to Veterans and Staff at the King Veterans Home regarding boating regulations.

We experienced considerable down time and expense for repairs on the Sunbird I/O patrol boat on the Chain. This boat is expected to be replaced prior to the 2005 season.

Our department administered 3 Boater Safety Classes during the year.

Along with normal operating equipment and expenses we also purchased 4 res-q-discs for the patrol boats and purchased several float jackets for officers.

WAUPACA COUNTY DEPUTY ASSOCIATION (Part-time Reserve Deputies) 2004 ANNUAL REPORT







TOTAL BOARDING COSTS












