

WAUPACA COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE 2005 ANNUAL REPORT

In 2005 traffic fatalities remained the same as in 2004 at 13. One accident, which resulted in 2 fatalities and 29 injured, occurred in May and made national news. It was a major accident on State Highway 54 west of Waupaca involving a car and a tour bus. This accident tested our resources and responses to a major crisis. It required the combined efforts of not only many law enforcement agencies, but also local hospitals, ambulance, fire, and helicopter rescue services. Despite the chaotic event, I believe all involved handled it efficiently, effectively and professionally.

The Traffic division received several grants in 2005. One was for the Click-it program focusing on the enforcement of seatbelts. The other was from the County Highway Department for enforcing the posted weight limits on County roads. In addition we received a State TraCs grant. This grant allows us to equip two patrol cars with laptop computers in 2006. These computers will enable the officer to issue citations and complete accident reports from the computer. They will also be able to connect to the Wisconsin Time system.

At the Law Enforcement Awards ceremonies in May, Telecommunicator Kim Polley received the Meritorious Service Award for assisting a Waupaca County family through the birth of their child. We are very proud of Kim as she maintained control of the call and showed extreme calm and confidence in a very tense and delicate situation.

2004 was a windfall year for Jail revenues in regards to the housing of safekeepers. Revenues amounted to \$279,191.00. We are hopeful this trend will continue.

After having served the citizens of Waupaca County for over 34 years, Captain Harlan Deitz retired in February. He commanded the patrol division for over 18 years. We will miss his leadership ability and, most of all, his friendship. This opened up the top position in the Patrol division. After many interviews, which consisted of very qualified applicants, Sergeant Terrence Wilz was chosen to succeed Captain Deitz. I am confident Captain Wilz, with his knowledge and leadership abilities will continue to lead the patrol division in a positive and professional direction. Replacing Wilz as Sergeant was Patrolman Todd Rasmussen. Todd's knowledge and effectiveness will enhance the supervisory staff. Nicholas Kahnke was chosen from the eligibility list to replace Rasmussen. I am confident Nick will be an asset to this department.

In November we went before the Personnel and Finance Committee for additional staff, as 2006 is the second of my three-year plan. This included the addition of a Detective

Sergeant, Patrol Sergeant and a Patrolman. After much discussion we were unable to fulfill my plan, as the committee authorized the hiring of one position with no additional funds. It was an extremely tough decision, as each position is needed. After much deliberation, I chose the Detective Sergeant position. Of the many qualified officers, Patrolman Rob Karski was promoted to the Detective Sergeant position. Patrick Gorchals was chosen from the eligibility list to replace Karski. I am confident both officers will do a fine job in their new positions. Their positions will take effect in January of 2006.

All things considered I believe 2005 was a successful year for the department. I look forward to 2006 with new technology and hopefully the addition of new staff in connection to my 3-year plan, to better serve the citizens of Waupaca County.

CHIEF DEPUTY 2005 ANNUAL REPORT

In reading the past annual reports of the Waupaca County Sheriff's Department and focusing on the individual division reports, it is apparent that the complexity of Law Enforcement is changing each year.

The budget is not the only thing that is increasing. The expectations of citizens and other Law Enforcement Agencies in Waupaca County are increasing as well. It is apparent as the state budget and programs are being cut, the county is looking at changing ways of doing business. Those changes will ultimately increase the number of issues the Sheriff's Department personnel will have to deal with. In turn, the complaint numbers will increase as well as the types of complaints.

In 2006's budget planning, a Detective Sergeant position was approved and added to the Detective Division in order to help with the increasing workload. In hopes to better serve the victims of more serious crimes in getting their cases to the District Attorney's Office for charging decisions.

In February of 2005, Terry Wilz took over as Captain of the Patrol Division and brought new ideas to that Division. Those changes helped considerably in cutting overtime generated by that Division, which helped the overall budget.

The Corrections Division continues to do an excellent job in 2005 as they accept larger numbers of safe keepers from other counties which helps the Sheriff maintain levels of revenue above the projected amounts. That in turn assists in the bottom line for the overall budget.

The staff in the Corrections Area are to be commended for continuing to deal with the added pressures put on them by increasing the daily population.

The Communication Area of the Sheriff's Department experienced a lot of changes in 2005, as a result the overtime which was a focus stayed about the same. It will continue to be a focus until all efforts and methods are exhausted in controlling that part of the budget.

All members of the Sheriff's Department are committed to excellence and it is with that in mind we look into the future with hope and confidence that if we unite and work together for a common goal of serving the citizens of Waupaca County. We will all serve to the best of our ability with the resources provided to us so we can make Waupaca County a better place to live.

ADMINISTRATIVE DIVISION 2005 ANNUAL REPORT

In 2005 we saw a return to housing safekeepers. In fact the year was highly successful in regards to the number of safekeepers we housed. Revenues from the housing of safekeepers totaled \$279,191.00 for the year. This was a welcomed piece of income for the department. Other revenues generated by the jail were, the jail assessment at \$54,836.35, Electronic monitoring program at \$1,097.82, booking fees \$27,416.88 and daily fees collected were \$16,364.14. All in all it turned out to be a very good year for revenues.

In January new officer Michael Snell started on the 21st. He replaces Tim Myers who transferred to the Patrol Division. We welcome Mike and are positive he will be an asset to this division and the department.

The Jail took a large step forward in the field of technology when we purchased a new live scan finger print machine with palm print capabilities. This machine records the fingerprints as you obtain them, rejecting them if they are not of substantial quality and then once they are accepted, are immediately sent to the Crime Information Bureau in Madison with a few keystrokes of the computer. We purposely purchased a machine capable of obtaining palm prints as Madison just recently started accepting them as a routine procedure along with the normal fingerprints. The Livescan was bought in conjunction with a state bid which allowed us to purchase it at a significant savings.

In 2004 the County Board approved the hiring of two new telecommunicator positions in the communications center. These positions were filled in 2005. On February 17th Greta Schmidt-Olson and Kurt Gullixson were hired. Also hired in January or 2005 was Scott Romeis who filled the 2004 vacancy created by the leaving of Betsy Marringa. Kurt left in November to pursue a different career. Filling that vacancy is Lisa Fenske, a former employee with the communications center. We welcome all of the new employees and are sure they will be an asset to the department.

As mentioned in last year's annual report the Sheriff's Office joined 16 counties forming a group called NEWCOM. This allowed us to apply for grants for interoperability in a group. One of the grants possible was for an engineering firm to be hired and conduct a needs assessment for each individual county. The firm of CTA from Virginia was hired to conduct the needs assessment. At the conclusion, they reported their findings to each county. As a result of these findings we applied and were awarded a grant in the amount of \$435,000.00. This amount is divided up among the 16 counties and then when necessary equipment is submitted, it is paid for on a 75% basis, the county only paying 25%. Our portion of the total grant amount is \$33,000.00. This money, coupled with the amount budgeted, will allow us to perform updates on radio equipment, towers and tower

sites, necessary not only to comply with upcoming federal mandates but also being a key component in officer safety.

A grant for the wireless 911 became available in 2005. With the assistance of Communications Sergeant Gary Heschke this grant was filed which allows for recouping money spent on our present radio system and reimbursement for monies to be spent on the wireless 911 mapping system to be installed in 2006 in the amount of \$153,480.96.

With the above listed advancements both in the jail and the communications center, we look forward to a year to better our service and efficiency to both the public and other law enforcement agencies.

Detective Division 2005 Annual Report

2005 was another busy year in the Detective Division at The Waupaca County Sheriff's Department. We have set another record year investigating Child Abuse and Child Sexual Assault complaints. All of these complaints are co-investigated with a Child Protection Worker from the Department of Human Services. The child protection worker ensures that the child is placed in a safe environment and the child has it's needs met. The Detective Sergeant does the criminal investigation. I have kept track of the number of these complaints crossing my desk for assignment to a Detective Sergeant over that past few years. They are as follows by year:

2003= 55 complaints

2004= 80 complaints 2005= 99 complaints

As you can see there has been a significant increase. There are others that are handled by patrol officers that are not counted in the above statistics. Sex Offense Investigations have increase 25% since the year before. Check Fraud cases have increase 39%.

In November of 2005 Sheriff Steve Liebe won the county board's approval to create a new Detective Sergeant position even though the budget was tight. I would like to thank Sheriff Liebe and the Waupaca County Board. Detective Sergeants have been overwhelmed by the number of serious complaints that they have been asked to check on. This will give some relief to those citizens of Waupaca County who have been waiting for a detective to get to their complaint. Complaints are of course being handled by priority, those that are the most serious come first. Robert Karski Junior who has been a patrol officer for most of his thirteen years with the sheriff's department has been promoted to the new Detective Sergeant position. Congratulations to Rob Karski. He will be the Waupaca County's fifth detective sergeant.

Cases of interest in 2005 include an animal abuse complaint in the Township of Royalton in October. A search warrant was executed and approximately 500 animals were seized by sheriff's deputies and volunteers. Those animals included goats, sheep, rabbits, dogs, cats, ferrets, guinea pigs, gerbils, ducks, turkeys, and chickens. Detectives also investigated a report of an armed robbery at the Country Inn Bar and Restaurant in the early morning hours of December 19, 2005. Leads are still being sought in that case.

RECORDS DIVISION 2005 ANNUAL REPORT

Crime Stopper's 2005 Annual Report



To elevate the attention and interest in the year 2006 I have formulated a Waupaca County Sheriff's Department ten most wanted itinerary. This program will focus on a series of individuals who have particular interest within society and the law enforcement community. The debut of this outline will be introduced on the Sheriff's Department web site and included in the public address segments.

Once again the program has been proven to be successful and beneficial to the citizens of Waupaca County.

Annual Report for 2005

During the year 2005, the Chaplaincy Unit of the Waupaca County Sheriff's Department proudly marked 10 years of service for Waupaca County. In 1995, Chaplain Tellock, Chaplain Hoerz, and a Methodist minister from Parfreyville began this program for the Sheriff's Department, and we continue to serve and assist the personnel of the Sheriff's Department on a 24 hour a day, 7 days a week basis.

As Chaplains, we accompanied officers on ride-alongs during the year in an attempt to further foster the trust between the officers and the Chaplains, to keep the Chaplains up to date of current changes within the department, and to stay informed of changes in the lives of department officers.

We have assisted with death notifications and the families of accident victims on more than 8 occasions, and assisted officers and emergency personnel with counseling, care and communications. We also assisted with family members and who often feel confused and lost during times of crises. The assistance with death notifications continue to be one of the most appreciated uses of the Chaplaincy Unit as it frees up officers to continue with their duties while the Chaplains give family members much needed attention and direction – either providing spiritual care for the family, or calling on a local clergy member to comfort the family.

The Chaplains again hosted a Memorial Service for all Waupaca County law enforcement officers in May of 2005 at the Car Show Pavilion in Iola with great assistance from the Iola Police Department.

On the side, Chaplain Hoerz has served for three years on the County's Coordinated Community Response Team (dealing with reducing the abundance of domestic violence in Waupaca County), as an extension of the Chaplaincy program.

The Chaplaincy unit lost one its members because of a change in her call location, and we once again find ourselves down to two Chaplains. On a positive note however, we did aid in the formation of a Chaplaincy Unit for the Waupaca City Police Department, and we are happy to witness the beginning of their use.

We continue to remain ready to serve at all times, and deeply appreciate the growing relationship we have come to experience with the Sheriff's Office.

PATROL DIVISION 2005 ANNUAL REPORT By: Captain Terrence Wilz

The Patrol Division once again saw significant changes in personnel in 2005. On February 28, 2005 Captain Harlan Deitz retired from the County of Waupaca. Harlan began his career in Law Enforcement on January 20, 1971 shortly after returning from Vietnam, where he honorably served his country. Harlan served as a Patrol Officer until 1976 at which time he was promoted to Patrol Sergeant. In 1985 the County formed its first SWAT Team and Harlan was placed in charge of that unit up to the date of his retirement. In January 1987, Harlan was promoted to Patrol Captain and was given the responsibility of the Patrol Division, which included the Reserve Deputies, Water Patrol and the Waupaca County Emergency Response Unit. Harlan will be remembered as providing strength, guidance and leadership to all members of the Department.

As a result of Harlan's retirement, Terrence Wilz was promoted to Patrol Captain. Patrol Officer Todd Rasmussen was promoted to Patrol Sergeant. Nicholas Kahnke was hired from Manawa Police Department to replace Todd Rasmussen as a Patrol Officer.

The County Board approved a new Patrol Officer position and Tim Meyer was promoted to Patrol Officer from the Jail.

With the new hires we were able to implement two cover / float positions to assist in reducing overtime. Their primary responsibility is to fill planned vacant shifts when officers are on vacation or gone to school. When working their normal shift they work an overlap shift, also designed to reduce overtime.

The Sheriff's Department recently trained and now has four Field Training Officers. Through this program, we can ensure that we are putting out the best possible product to the public through our new training program.

Our Officers have issued 2674 citations, 963 more citations than 2004, this includes 208 OWI and 431 speed related citations. Our Officers responded to 14,420 complaints, 947 more complaints than in 2004. We have seen a drop in the amount of traffic crashes however these are more serious in nature as the amount of injuries have increased. We remained consistent with 2003 and 2004 totals of 13 fatal crashes for 2005.

As a direct result of traffic enforcement, Waupaca County received \$49,214.66 for Jail Assessment, \$86,024.95 for Traffic Fines, \$80,448.97 for Driver Improvement Program and Court Costs, for a total of \$215,688.58, this is \$15,087.98 more revenue than was received last year.

In 2005 we applied for Traffic Grants through the Department of Transportation and the County Highway Shop. The Grants we received are the following:

- O Click it or ticket: \$7,000.00 Target specific areas in the county to encourage the use of safety belts by aggressively enforcing traffic violations.
- Weight Restriction: \$10,000.00 Target specific roadways within Waupaca County where there are habitual weight restriction violations.

We remain seeing an increase in the numbers of violent complaints and seriousness of offenses that our Deputies are dealing with.

WAUPACA COUNTY EMERGENCY RESPONSE UNIT

2005 ANNUAL REPORT

The Waupaca County Emergency Response Unit was called out on three occasions in 2005.

- 1. 5-02-05 @ 0130 hrs, ERU was paged to assist the Waupaca County Jail staff with 6 Dane County inmates who failed to get locked-down. Inmates were taken and placed into cells without incident.
- 5-31-05 @ 0054 hrs, ERU was paged for a male in Scandinavia threatening his girlfriend with a firearm. Subject was apprehended prior to ERU intervention.
- 3. 10-25-05 @ 1416 hrs, ERU was paged to assist in serving a drug warrant. Incident occurred over two days with two separate page outs. ERU was equipped and staged on the first day but warrant was not executed. ERU was staged on the second day of the situation where the execution plan was constantly evolving and eventually included a simultaneous, two apartment/two team entry.

Team Leader Darold Krueger left the team after 15 years of service. Detective Sgt. Krueger's leadership and knowledge will be missed.

Sgt. Todd Rasmussen was installed as ERU OIC.

Sgt. Andy Hopfensperger, of Clintonville Police Department was promoted to Team Leader.

Deputy Clint Thobaben, of Waupaca County Sheriff's Department was promoted to Assistant Team Leader.

WATER PATROL ANNUAL REPORT FOR 2005

In 2005 the officers of the Water Patrol spent a total of 1874 hours actively patrolling the waters of Waupaca County. Scores of complaints were handled by the officers resulting in many warnings to boaters along with a total of 265 citations issued including 27 arrests for operating while intoxicated. The citations also included several for underage alcohol violations and drug offenses as well as two other persons who were arrested on outstanding bench warrants. Much positive feedback was received from the Department of Natural Resources for our efforts in OWI enforcement.

The most serious accident occurred on the Chain O Lakes and resulted in \$4000 damage to the boat involved and a total loss of the swim dock which it struck. The operator was arrested for OWI. There were some other minor accidents and there were not any serious injuries or fatalities in any of the accidents.


The patrol boat moored at New London was equipped with a new Mercury 110 horsepower 4 stroke outboard motor at the end of the season which will have a significant positive result in our fuel economy for 2006. The motor was purchased directly from Mercury Marine on its government program resulting in a large savings for our department. The motor was installed by Riverside Marine of New London.

Officers taught boater safety classes at Waupaca, New London and Clintonville and had large turnouts for all three classes. Classes are offered at the three locations again this year.




AVERAGE DAILY POPULATION





TOTAL BOARDING COSTS














TRANSPORTS - MILEAGE






SHERIFF FEES COLLECTED
