

# WAUPACA COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE 2006 ANNUAL REPORT

This past year I have seen a dream of mine come true. In the Administrative Division, with the help of my staff and members of the County Board, we were able to open the second floor of the jail and operate it as it was designed to be run. It was quite a challenge and took the cooperation of many, but it has finally been accomplished. This is expected to bring in revenue well beyond what we first thought in 2001 when we opened our new facility. This is evident in the revenue generated by the housing of safekeepers for the last half of November and December. Total revenues for the year were \$635,736.00.

I would like to thank all those associated with this event, from the actual negotiations of the contract to the training of new staff. All involved, put forth 110 percent in order to accomplish this.

The traffic division received numerous grants for 2006. Again this past year we received monies from the County Highway Department to pay our officers overtime in order to patrol the County roads and enforce weight limit restrictions. In 2006 we experienced a downward trend in regards to traffic fatalities. Down from the previous two years of 13, we had 10 fatality accidents. We can only hope that this trend continues.

The County Board approved the hiring of a 5<sup>th</sup> Detective Sergeants position. In March, Patrolman John Mocadlo was promoted to that position. Hired in April to replace John was Jon Loken. Jon has been a welcome asset to this department. In September he risked his own life to rescue a woman from a burning house in the town of Royalton. I am sure his quick thinking and disregard for his personal safety saved her life. I am very proud of Jon and commend him for his bravery and commitment to duty.

In November I received a letter from Captain Christ Brogaard announcing his retirement from the Sheriff's Department after 30 years of service. His retirement will take effect on January 5, 2007. Captain Brogaard grew up through the ranks here, beginning in the Jail/Dispatch, where he trained me when I started, then going to Patrol. He then returned to the Jail/Dispatch as Sergeant. In 2000 he was promoted to Lieutenant and then Captain in 2002. His years of experience and knowledge will sorely be missed. Promotions to fill his position and those that become open as a result of this will be filled and officers will move to their new position on January 5, 2007.

As of this writing there will be a changing of the guards. This is my final Annual Report as Sheriff of Waupaca County. Even though there have been many challenges and uphill battles at times, the experience was extremely rewarding. My successor, Brad Hardel is a

very fine and competent individual. I am sure he will make some changes when he takes over, as all new Sheriffs will do, however I am confident he will lead this department into the future with integrity and professionalism.

# ADMINISTRATIVE DIVISION 2006 ANNUAL REPORT

The past year contained some major changes for the Administrative Division. The year started out like any normal year. We saw an influx of inmates as we do the beginning of every year, however after a month or so it levels off.

The year seemed to flow as usual until late spring when contract negotiations started between Wood County and us. Wood County was experiencing a ballooning effect in the amount of inmates they needed to house out of county. Due to their unusually high volume, they were housing not only with us but also with several other counties. The Wood County Jail Administrator contacted me with a plan in which they desired to house all of their out of county inmates, which numbered in the 75 range, with one county versus the multiple counties they were using now. This plan would require us to open the Jail's second floor in order to house the number of inmates we were discussing.

With this knowledge in hand I approached the Sheriff and we then set up meetings with the Sheriff and Jail Administrator of Wood County. After obtaining a verbal agreement with them, the wheels were set in motion to open second floor. After much deliberation, with finances being the main issue, and hard work a plan was put together and it was presented to the County Board. It passed the County Board. The legwork then began.

Second floor had to be readied to be open. A jail inspection had to be completed. A lot of work was put forth, not only by our staff, but also by the maintenance staff to get the second floor in tiptop shape. With the assistance of the staff from the Personnel Office the process for the hiring of new staff began. I was off for a period of time during this part of the process and the majority of the work fell on Lieutenant Olson. She did a fantastic job in putting all the pieces of the puzzle together so that they fit.

The hiring process took place and 12 new people were added to the division in order to adequately operate 2<sup>nd</sup> floor. Training was the next piece in the puzzle that had to be worked in. A new field training officer (FTO) program had been instituted earlier in the year and would now be put to the test. Officers Tammy Moe, Rob Couillard and Sergeant Charity LePak took on this undaunting task to train the new officers. Once the initial bumps were evened out, this task continued very well. A big thanks goes not only to the FTO officers and Lt Olson for putting all of this together but also to all the Sergeants and present Correction Officers for giving 100% in order to obtain our goal of opening second floor by November 15<sup>th</sup>.

November 15<sup>th</sup> came and second floor was open. Wood County brought over the additional inmates, to fill the 60-bed contract, in groups of 10 or so which made it a bit easier on our staff. All went very well. On January 1, 2007 we received 20 more inmates

from Wood County that they were housing in Adams County as their contract expired on December 31, 2006.

November brought about another change. On November 13, 2006, I submitted my letter of retirement to the Sheriff. I have served Waupaca County for over 30 years. I have forgotten the bad times but remember the many, many good times in my career here. January 5, 2007 will be my last day as a member of the Waupaca County Sheriff's Office.

As a result of my retirement Lieutenant Olson has been promoted to Captain of the Division. I am very confident that she will do an excellent job in her new position just as she has done in every position she has held in the past. Replacing her as Lieutenant is Sergeant Russell. His promotion has opened up the requirement to fill the ranks below resulting in corrections officer James Klismet being promoted to Sergeant and I believe all of them will fill their new assignments with the utmost dedication and professionalism that they have shown in the past.

I just want to briefly state that this being my last annual report, I have enjoyed my years here. They have gone by way to quickly. I want to thank the members of the County Board and Sheriff's Department both presently here and those that have retired, for making these a most rewarding 30 years.

# **Detective Division 2006 Annual Report**

### Captain Don Conat reporting

In 2006 the Waupaca County Sheriff's Department investigated over 100 drug complaints. As a result of those 45 individuals were charged as misdemeanor offenders. There were 14 individuals charged as felony offenders. There are ongoing investigations that will result in more charges and the arrests of other offenders as the cases come to a close.

This was another busy year for the Detective Division at the Waupaca Sheriff's Department. I assigned 73 Department of Health and Human Services related complaints to detectives for follow up investigations with child protection workers. Most of those complaints were for child abuse or sexual abuse of a child. These were in addition to the routine everyday complaints such as burglary, theft, fraud and internet crimes that the detectives handle.

On April 1<sup>st</sup>, 2006 a computer went on line in the evidence garage at the sheriff's department thanks to the staff at Information Systems in the courthouse. I had requested the computer so officers would no longer have to write out their inventory sheets by hand. They now type the information directly into the computer data base when they bring in property to be held in inventory. This eliminated the need for us to go through each hand written inventory sheet and enter the information into the database.

An armed robbery occurred on April 30<sup>th</sup>, 2006 in the Township of Dayton southwest of Waupaca. The homeowners were tied up in their home and robbed at knife point by two intruders. This investigation took a consider amount of time to investigate. Items retrieved from the scene had been sent to the crime lab for further testing. The incident is still under investigation.

In January of 2006 Robert Karski Jr. started as Waupaca County's fifth detective sergeant. He had been promoted from the patrol division.

Three months later on March 1<sup>st</sup>, 2006 Detective Sergeant Eric Helgeson retired from the Waupaca Sheriff's Department after nearly eighteen years in law enforcement. He had served three years as a jailer, six years as a patrol officer, and nine years as a detective sergeant with Waupaca County. Patrol Officer John Mocadlo had been promoted to detective sergeant to replace Helgeson.

# RECORDS DIVISION 2006 ANNUAL REPORT

2006 was the second full year that the Records Division has been renewing license plates and issuing hard plates for vehicles, light-weight trucks and motorcycles. Proceeds generated for the Sheriff's Department in 2006 were \$6,824.50. This is a service well received by the general public. We serve individuals in Waupaca County as well as surrounding counties.

The total number of law incidents for 2006 was 14,008. The majority of those incidents required some type of follow-up by the officers of the Sheriff's Department, therefore, generating a great deal of work for our division.

We are fortunate for the longevity of the four employees in the Records Division, which was created in January of 1997. Employees, Debbie Behnke, Sheila Wolfgram, Linda Hoelzel and I have a total of 27 years of combined experience. This makes for a very solid base of knowledge of their individual areas, as well as a cross-over into other fields.

We appreciate the opportunity to continue training in the areas needed for our Division. Open Records is always a very critical subject that we need to stay current with. This past year, Wisconsin developed a Civil Process User's Group which meets quarterly. Training with others that do the same type of work is invaluable.


# Crime Stoppers 2006 Annual Report

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# PATROL DIVISION 2006 ANNUAL REPORT

As a result of the promotion of John Mocadlo to Detective Sergeant, the Patrol Division hired Jon Loken. Jon is a native of Iola and has past experience with the Iola Police Department and Plover Police Department. Jon completed the Field Training Officers program and has excelled with the Sheriff's Department as a Patrol Officer. Jon is credited with saving a person's life in September when he climbed into a burning residence, woke the sole occupant and assisted her to safety.

The Patrol Division is currently working twelve hour shifts. With this change the officers have an opportunity to have more weekends off, (every other weekend). When working an eight hour shift the officers were scheduled off one out of five weekends. With the twelve hour shifts we have seen improved morale and work load better equalized.

The Sheriff's Department received 14,008 calls for service in 2006. Most of which involved a patrol officer responding to and handling.

The Patrol Division issued 2779 citations, 105 more citations than 2005 totals; this includes 239 OWI and 492 speeding related citations. As a direct result of traffic enforcement, Waupaca County received \$39,546.25 for Jail Assessment, \$99,174.28 for Traffic Fines, \$75,448.54 for Driver Improvement Program and Court Costs, for a total of \$214,209.07 in revenues generated.

Crash totals continue to be on a decline 138 fewer than 2005. We can credit the Highway Department for providing better roadways through out the county and aggressive traffic enforcement for the decline. Unfortunately the crashes we are investigating are more serious in nature, with more injuries and substantial property damage. The Patrol Division investigated 11 fatal crashes compared to 13 in 2005.

During 2006 we applied for Traffic Grants through the Department of Transportation and the County Highway Commissioners' Office. The Grants we received are the following:

- O Click it or ticket: \$4,000.00 Target specific areas in the county to encourage the use of safety belts by aggressively enforcing traffic violations.
- Weight Restriction: \$10,000.00 Target specific roadways within Waupaca County where there are habitual weight restriction violations.

With a staff of three Sergeants and seventeen patrol officer's, I'm extremely pleased with work ethics and volume of work that is being completed by this division.

## WAUPACA COUNTY DEPUTY ASSOCIATION (Part-time Reserve Deputies) 2006 ANNUAL REPORT

The deputy association is comprised of approximately 60 deputies that serve as support officers to all law enforcement agencies in the county. The primary purpose of these deputies is to provide additional security and traffic control resources for special events throughout the year. We also had another opportunity to send a few new people to the recruit academy at Fox Valley Technical College in Appleton WI. this past year. Two new staff changes to report. Pat Kons and Sherry Wiese were promoted to Sergeants. We had a very good year in filling event schedules. All shifts where satisfied and all the deputies performed to their abilities.

### WATER PATROL ANNUAL REPORT FOR 2006

In 2006 the officers of the Waupaca County Sheriffs Department Water Patrol worked a cumulative total of 1501 hours patrolling the lakes and rivers of Waupaca County. Numerous complaints were handled by the officers with the majority of the complaints from the Chain O Lakes. The total number of boating related citations issued by the officers was 110. There were 10 arrests of intoxicated boat operators. There were also arrests made for disorderly conduct and obstructing an officer. Officers gave out many warnings to boaters. Our patrol once again received positive feedback from the DNR at the annual audit and was again complimented for being a very efficient and progressive patrol with good enforcement efforts directed to OWI violations.




Use of the waters in the county continues to increase every year and our officers continue to do a great job in keeping the public and waters safe.







