COMMUNICATIONS CENTER

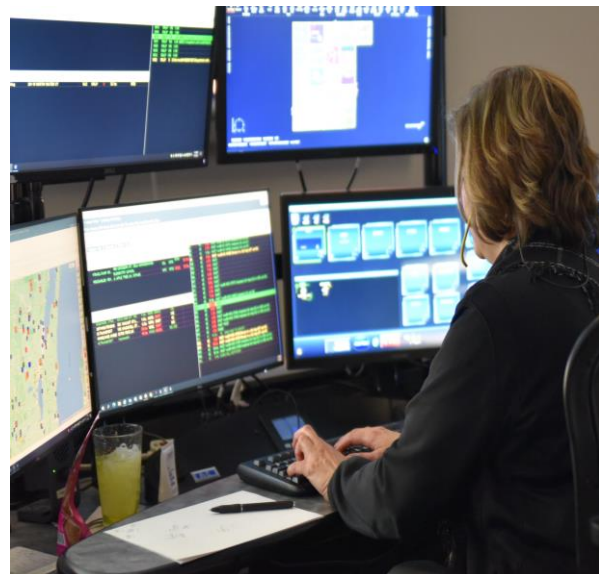


The Communications Center is staffed twenty-four hours a day, 365 days per year with highly dedicated, trained professionals known as Telecommunication Officers. The Communications Center is staffed with 13 Telecommunication Officers, 2 Communications Sergeants, and 1 Communications Captain. These professionals are the vital link between the citizens, emergent and non-emergent agencies and services within Waupaca County. The Telecommunication Officers continually monitor and respond to over 12 radio channels as well as 911 landlines, 911 cell lines, and administration non-emergent calls.

The critical information the Telecommunication Officers receive must be assessed and then disseminated to appropriate emergent or non-emergent responders. The data is vital for the responders as they evaluate the risks and determine the proper response method for each incident. A Telecommunication Officer handles numerous telephone calls for service each day; and answer more than 99% of all phone calls, including 911 and instances of receiving multiple calls simultaneously, in less than 4 seconds. The State of Wisconsin recommended average answering time is 10 seconds.

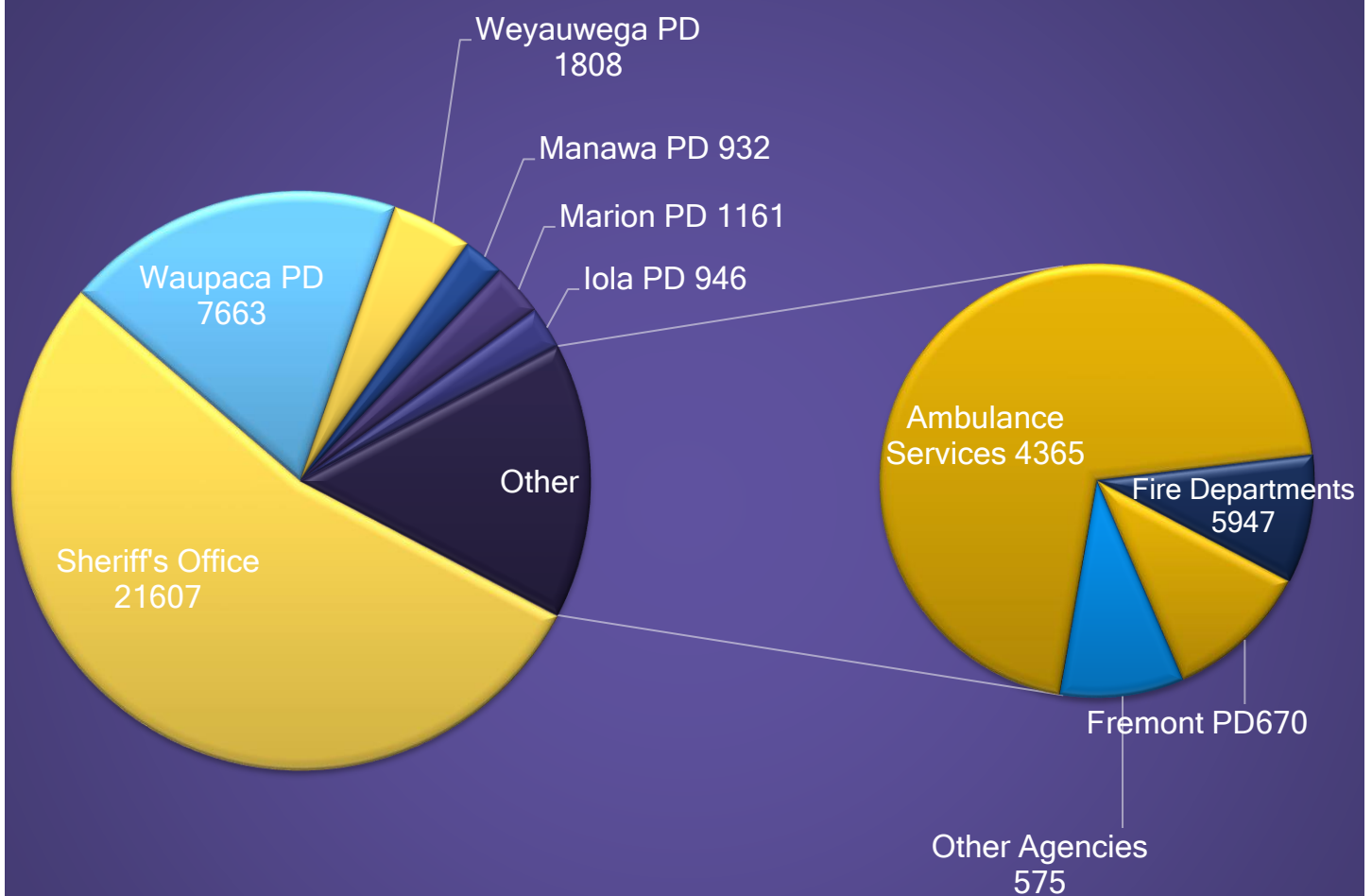

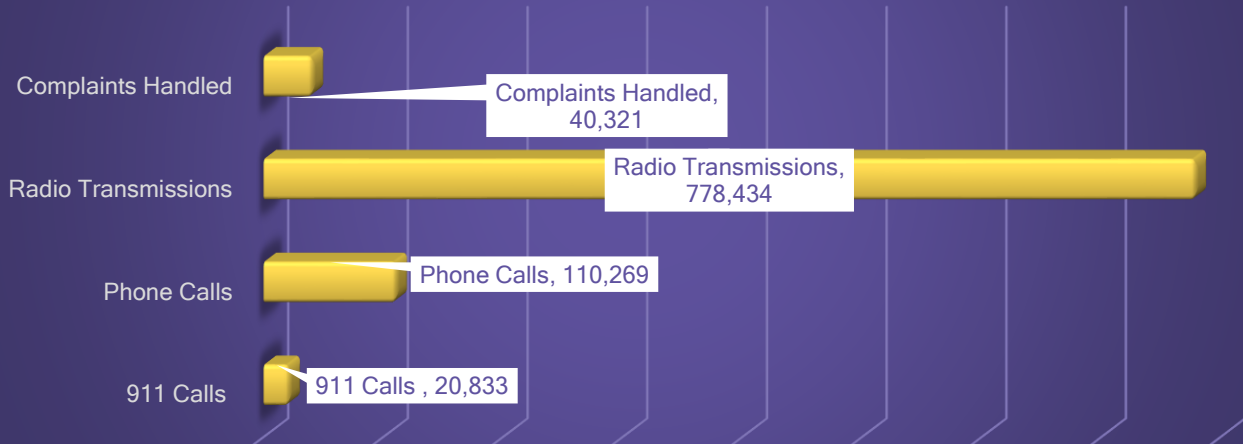

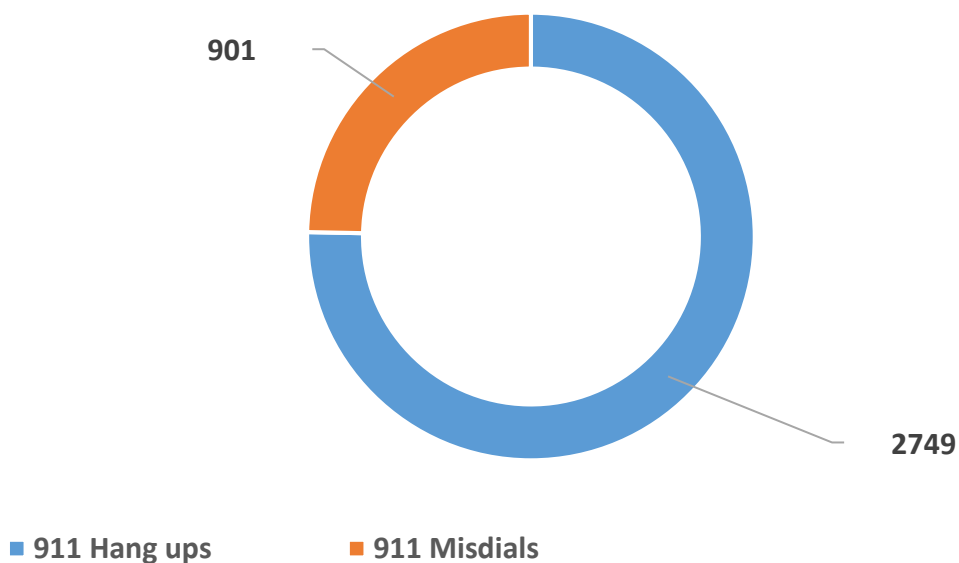

Radio & Phone Call Volume In & Out Of The Communication Center

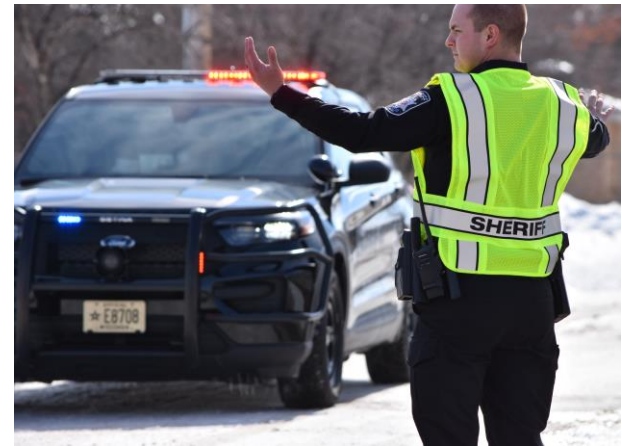


Misuse Of 911 Calls



PATROL DIVISION

The Patrol Division is the most visible and available division of the Waupaca County Sheriff's Office. The division includes 21 Patrol Deputies, 4 Transport Deputies, 30 Part-Time Deputies, 6 Patrol Sergeants, 1 Patrol Lieutenant, and 1 Patrol Captain. Together, they provide law enforcement services 24 hours a day, 365 days a year for all municipalities that do not have a law enforcement agency and assist the agencies that provide law enforcement coverage. These services cover approximately 765 square miles, including 2,085 miles of state, county, and municipal roadways, 240 lakes, and 79 rivers and streams.



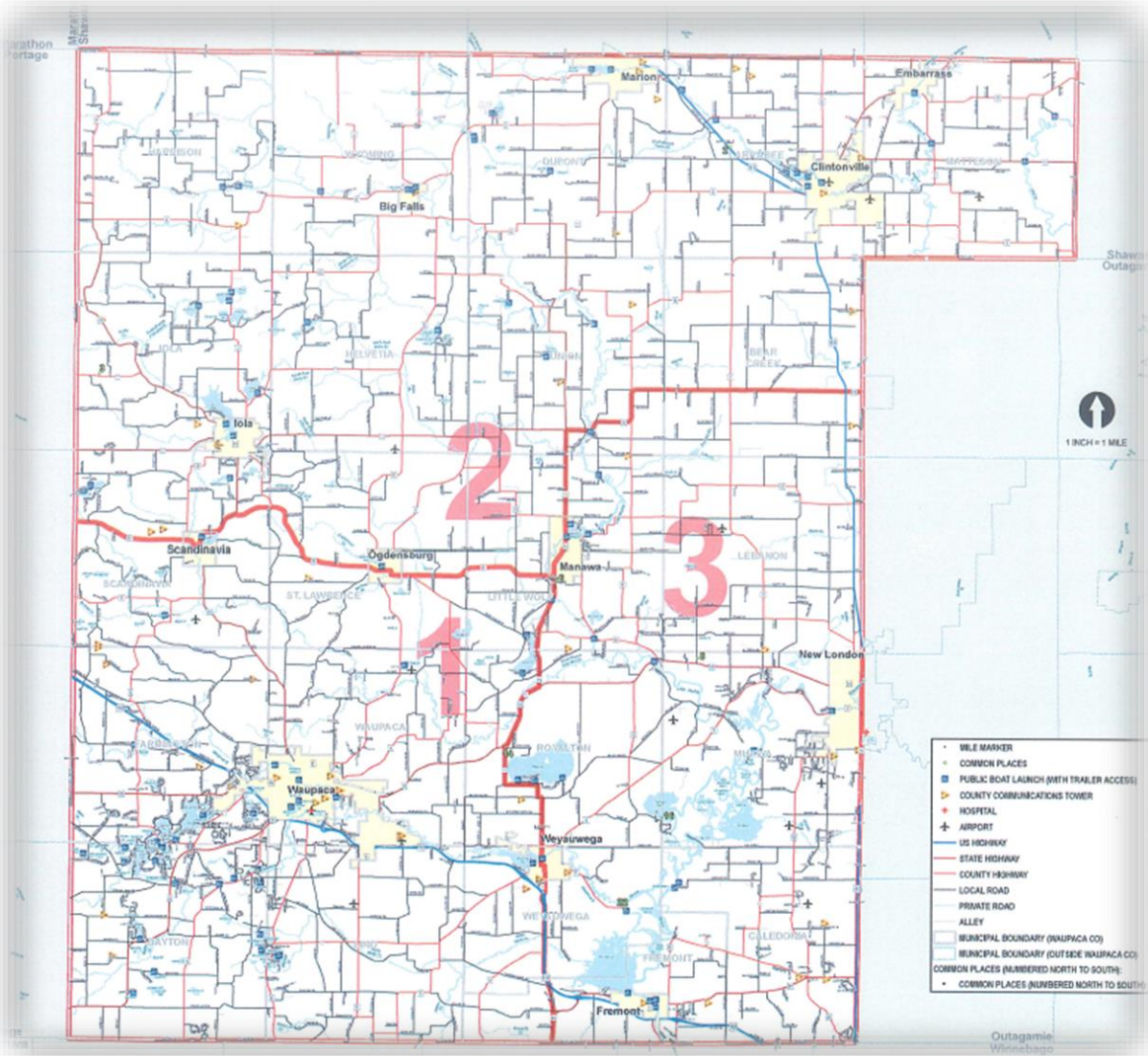
Waupaca County consists of 22 townships, 6 cities, and 6 villages. The population of the County is approximately 52,410.



The Patrol Division is responsible for enforcing state and local laws and handling many different types of calls for service. In addition to their regular duties, many of our deputies have taken on additional responsibilities requiring specialized training. These include:

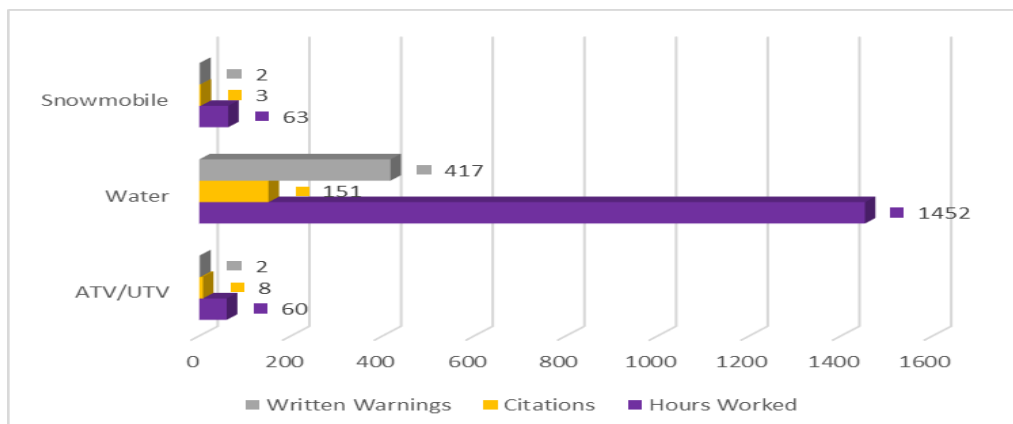
The unit had 60 hours of patrol, including patrol on roadways and lakes for fisheries within Waupaca County. Patrol issued 8 citations during an investigation of a complaint which included Operation in careless manner, refusal to stop, and operation with a loaded firearm other than a handgun. The patrol is starting to see an increased amount of citizens utilizing the roadway trails in townships with ordinances.

Water Patrol

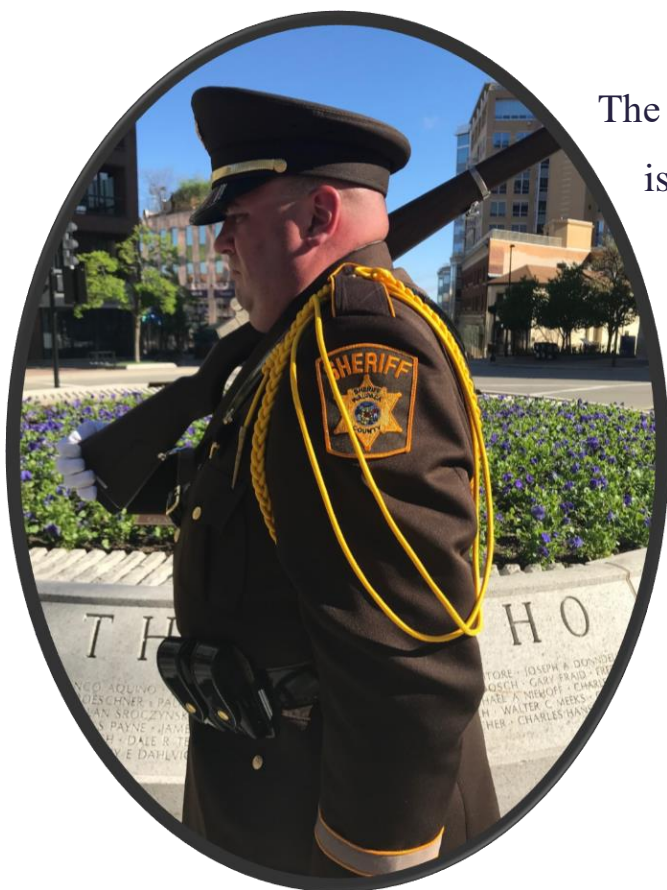
Water patrol assisted 44 vessels and assisted in 1 search and rescue, as well as investigated 2 accidents. Water patrol issued 26 citations for Boating While Intoxicated citations. The majority of the citations were issued for Navigational Rules and Registration Numbering violations.

Snowmobile Patrol

Snowmobile patrol issued 3 citations for registration violations and 2 written warnings for no trail. Snowmobile patrol did respond and investigate one accident. The trails were only open for a short time frame and some zones within Waupaca County never opened.



HONOR GUARD



The Waupaca County Sheriff's Office Honor Guard is comprised of 7 deputies who are dedicated to representing the agency at police memorial services, funeral services, parades and processions, and posting colors.

In 2021, the Honor Guard participated in several community events throughout Waupaca County.

The Honor Guard annually attends the Law Enforcement Memorial service in Madison, which honors Wisconsin Officers killed in the line of duty. 651 officers were killed in the line of duty in the United States in 2021.

K9 Unit

Deputy Santiago and K9 Cuda assisted New London Police Department on a free air sniff of a female kindergarten elementary student's belongings.

School staff became concerned and contacted Law Enforcement when the child arrived late, with the overwhelming odor of chemicals emanating from the child. K9 Cuda gave a positive alert to the odor of narcotics on the child's jacket and other belongings; leading investigating Officers to identify the location of a residence in the Fox Valley the child had been staying at as a potential methamphetamine lab. With assistance from Department of Health and Human Services (Child Protective Services Division), the at-risk kindergartener was then placed in a different safe home environment.

Deputy Santiago and K9 Cuda deployed for a free air sniff of a vehicle involved in a crash where K9 Cuda gave a positive alert to the odor of narcotics; located in the trunk were street signs missing from the Township of Farmington which led investigating Deputies to identify multiple suspects involved in a rash of property damage complaints within the Township of Farmington (30 smashed mailboxes, damaged garbage cans, missing street signs).

Deputy Barden and K9 Nova responded to subjects on the run who posed safety concerns to the public. Nova tracked them through the woods, when located, the subjects surrendered.

Deputy Barden and K9 Nova deployed on a traffic stop. Nova performed a free air sniff of the vehicle. Nova alerted to the odor of narcotics coming from the vehicle. A hand search of the vehicle was conducted. The search yielded; Methamphetamine, Marijuana, multiple drug paraphernalia items, illegal obtained prescription pills, cash, Taser Devices, knives, homemade weapons, homemade explosive device, and multiple other weapons

K9 Dom was requested to assist on a traffic where K9 Dom alerted to the odor of narcotics inside of the vehicle. A subsequent search of the vehicle yielded Cocaine, Methamphetamine, THC, and approximately \$1300 cash along with other items indicating drug distribution.

K9 Dom enjoyed spending time with kids celebrating Halloween at the Halloween on Main St event in Waupaca. Numerous trick-or-treaters were able to pet Dom and take pictures with him.

K-9 RECERTIFICATION



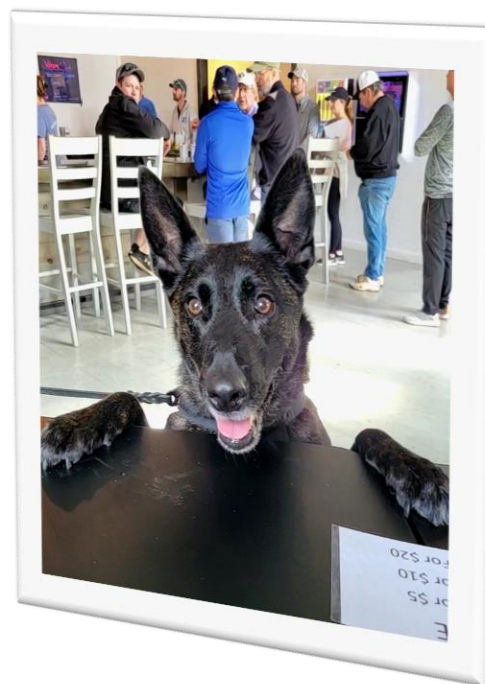

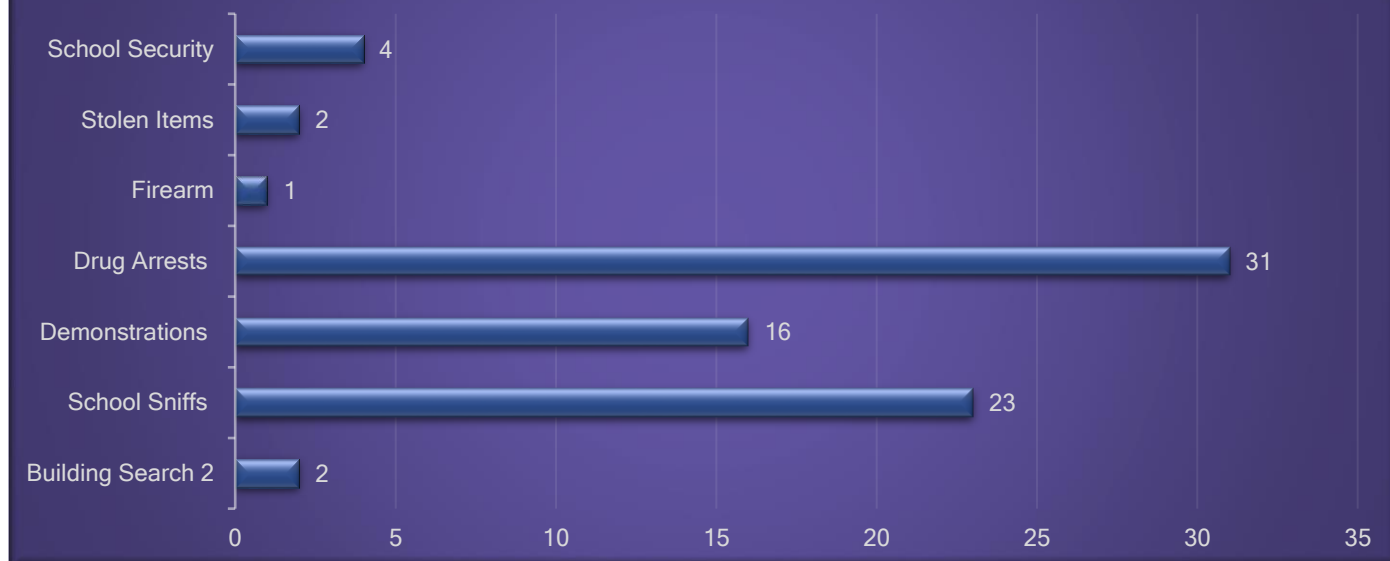
K-9 UNIT FUNDRAISER

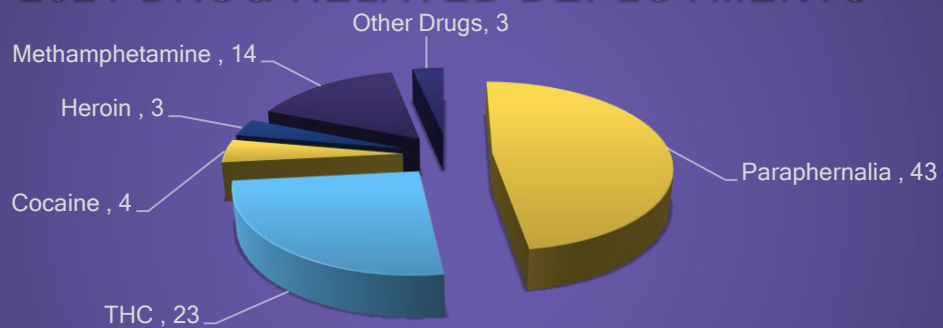

2021 DRUG RELATED DEPLOYMENTS

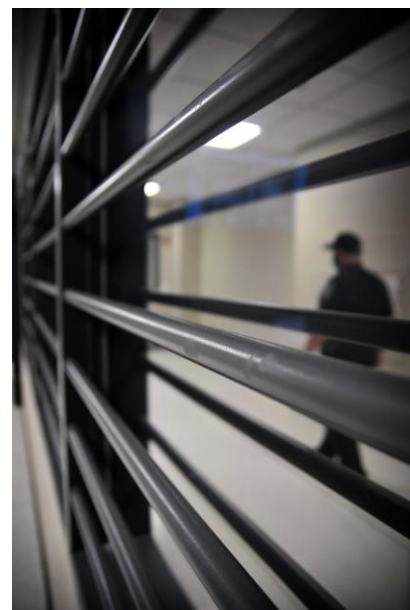

TRANSPORT UNIT

The Transport Unit, when fully staffed, consists of four patrol deputies. The transport unit provides a critical link between the patrol division and corrections, courts, mental health professionals, and parties involved in the court process. Deputies in the Transport Unit complete several primary duties, including: Transport prisoners to and from county jails, state prisons, juvenile detention centers, and hospitals for court appearances, medical appointments, sentences, and warrant arrests.

- Transport mental health patients to and from mental health centers and court appearances
- Serve civil process including small claims, civil suits, evictions, Sheriff sale postings, replevins, injunctions, and restraining orders
- Security of the courthouse including jail inmate escorts to court appearances, courtroom security when needed for court proceedings, periodic courthouse entry point screening
- Serve criminal arrest warrants
- Assist with other Patrol Division functions



In 2021, the Waupaca County Circuit Court system progressed towards pre-COVID 19 operations. As a result, transports to and from court appearances increased from 2020. The Sheriff's Office and the courts continued to use remote appearances when feasible. Despite the advancements of technology making video appearances an option, remote appearances do not replace many personal appearances which will always be part of our judicial system as a constitutional right, such as trials, preliminary hearings, sentencing, and emergency detention hearings.

RESERVE DEPUTIES

The reserve deputies' unit comprises approximately 20 deputies that serve as support officers to all law enforcement agencies in the county. The primary purpose of these deputies is to provide additional security and traffic control resources for special events throughout the year.

In 2021, we again experienced a lot of turnover in the unit. The department interviewed and hired approximately 10 new deputies this year. We continue to have great success in providing an opportunity for those who wish to gain experience in law enforcement and community service.



SWAT

The primary goal of this team is to contain, control, and resolve situations as effectively and efficiently as possible while protecting life and minimizing the risk of injuries to all persons involved.

The year 2021 was challenging for Special Weapons and Tactics and Negotiators of the Waupaca County Sheriff's Office due to safety protocols regarding the pandemic.

The Waupaca County Swat Team was deployed for two separate situations in 2021.

- Violent barricaded subject.
- Execute an arrest warrant for a subject who brandished a firearm.

The Waupaca County Swat Team added two new tactical operators and one additional negotiator. The team comprises 17 Tactical Operators and 4 Negotiators, along with the Commander and Deputy Commander. The team is multi-jurisdictional and includes members from the Sheriff's Office and officers from various agencies within Waupaca County.

The Waupaca County Swat Team possess state of the art equipment, including a Command Post, Armored Vehicle, Equipment Vehicle, various entry tools, and weapon delivery systems.



WAUPACA COUNTY CRISIS NEGOTIATIONS

The Waupaca County Sheriff's Office has four trained Crisis Negotiators. All four Crisis Negotiators have attended training provided by the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) - Milwaukee Division. Patrol Sergeant Josh Krueger is responsible for coordinating trainings with the other three negotiators who are Communications Division Kirk Merrill, Patrol Officer Sara Besel, and WPD Officer Paul Jensen who used to be a Communications Sergeant with the Sheriff's Office until late 2021. In November of 2021, Communications Division Sergeant Paul Jensen accepted a position as a patrol officer with the City of Waupaca Police Department. He still remains a part of the Crisis Negotiating Team.



In March of 2021, Waupaca County Crisis Negotiators were called to the City of Clintonville for a barricaded subject call, in which the Waupaca County SWAT Team was called to as well. During that call, a City of Clintonville Officer had been speaking with the subject and had built a good rapport with them. Negotiators remained on standby.

In May of 2021, the four Crisis Negotiators participated in a training to keep their skills up. During this training, a role player was used in a barricaded subject scenario. Along with communication skills, equipment set up and throw phones were utilized. The reason behind this; is in a situation where these skills and equipment are utilized, Crisis Negotiators need to be ready to deploy this at a moment's notice.

In 2021, the Waupaca County Sheriff's Office responded to 125 Mental Health calls and 563 Welfare Check calls, many of which end up being a person in mental health crisis. While these don't turn into a full blown call out for every mental health call, Waupaca County Crisis Negotiators are able to utilize their communication skills several times a week to find a peaceful resolution and get people who are in crisis the help they need.

FIELD TRAINING OFFICER PROGRAM

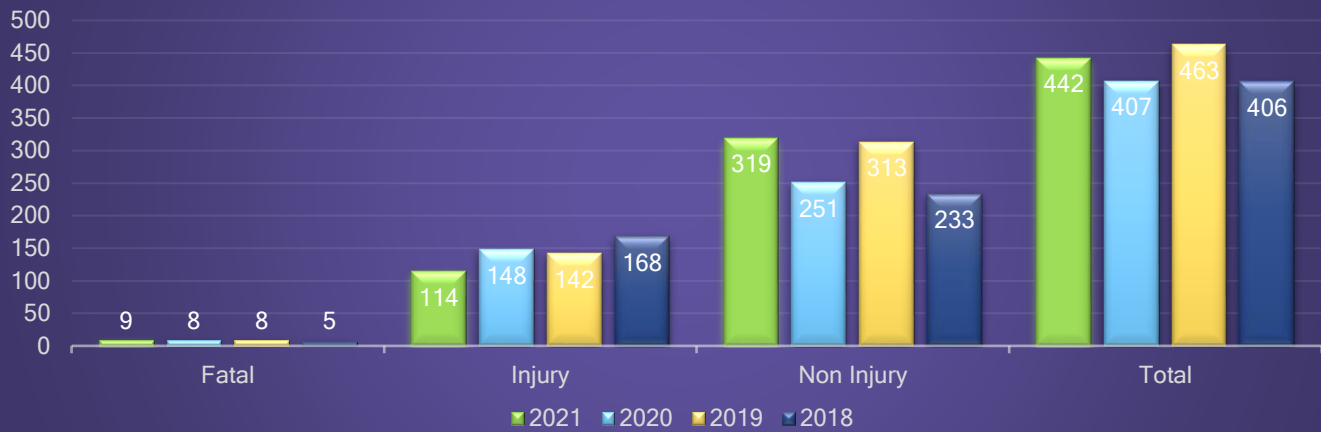


The Waupaca County Sheriff's Office Field Training and Evaluation Program is modeled after the San Jose, CA model. The San Jose model is recognized in the Law Enforcement profession as the leader in the area of field training. Waupaca County's current field training manual has been built through the input of Sergeant Gene Goode (retired), Sergeant Scott Lewis (retired), Sergeant Bill Zeamer, and Deputy David Huberty (retired). The field training program consists of five phases. The new officer will go through a 14 week training program to strengthen their skills that they learned during their time in college followed by the academy.

Waupaca County Field Training Officers are chosen after Deputies submit a letter of interest for the position. By this method, Waupaca County Sheriff's Office gain Deputies that have a genuine interest in the program and mentoring new officers into a safe and rewarding career. Currently, Sergeant Josh Krueger is the Field Training Coordinator and Sergeant Chad Repinski is the Field Training Supervisor. The field Training Officers are Deputy James Santiago, Deputy Curtis Much, Deputy Andy Thorpe, Deputy Graham Barden, Deputy Paul Hanneman, Deputy Bryan Strobusch and Deputy Autumn Curtis.

After a busy 2020 for our Field Training Officers in which they trained six new officers, The Waupaca County Sheriff's Office have two deputies who started in the year 2021. Both Deputies have successfully completed the Field Training Program. They are Deputy Brady Deuman who started January 4th and comes to us from the Waupaca County Corrections Division and Deputy Tyler Guyette who started with us June 21 and still serves his community as a Volunteer Firefighter with the New London Fire Department.

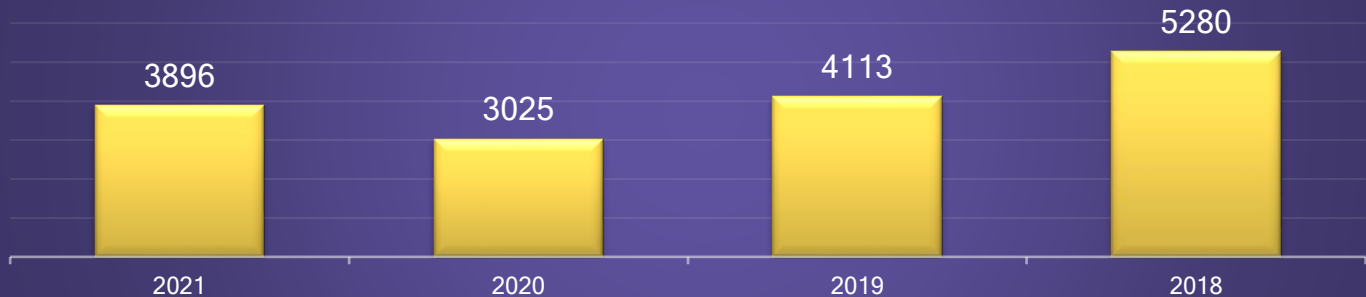
Automobile Crash's



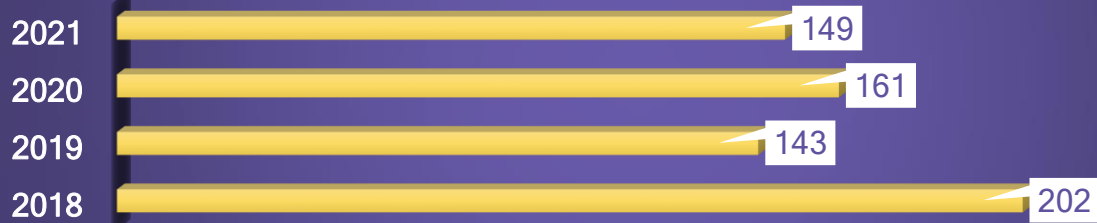
Factors of Automobile Crash's



Number of Vehicle Stops by Year



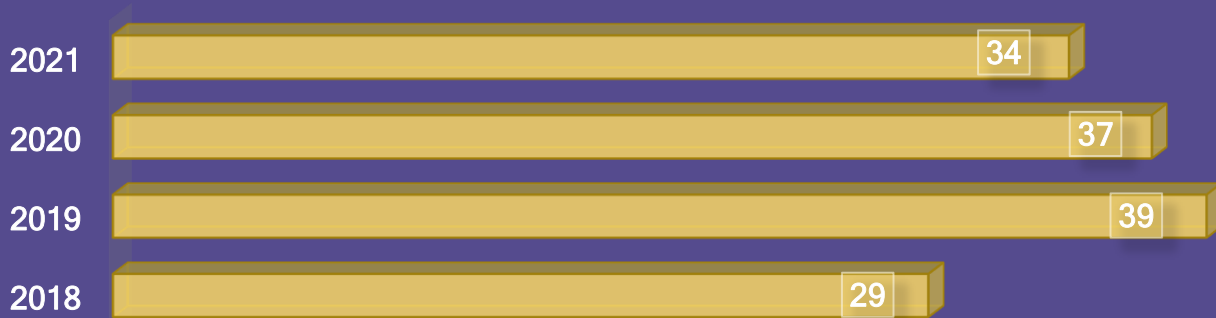
OWI Arrests By Year



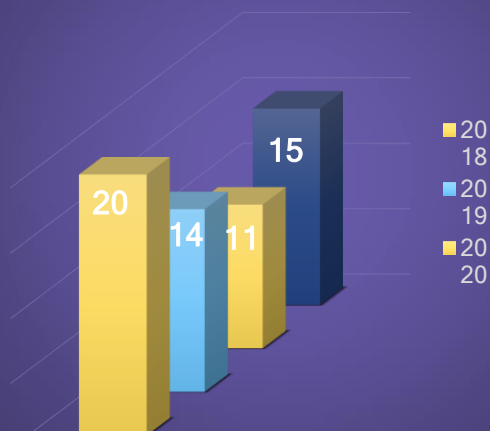
Citations & Written Warnings Issued



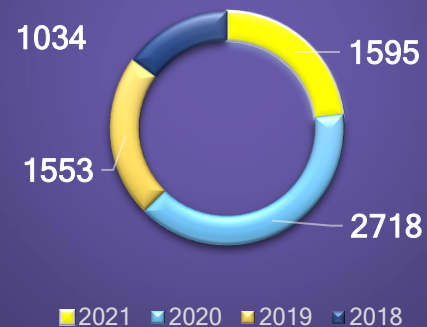
USE OF FORCE BY YEAR

Number of School Extra Patrols Completed by Year

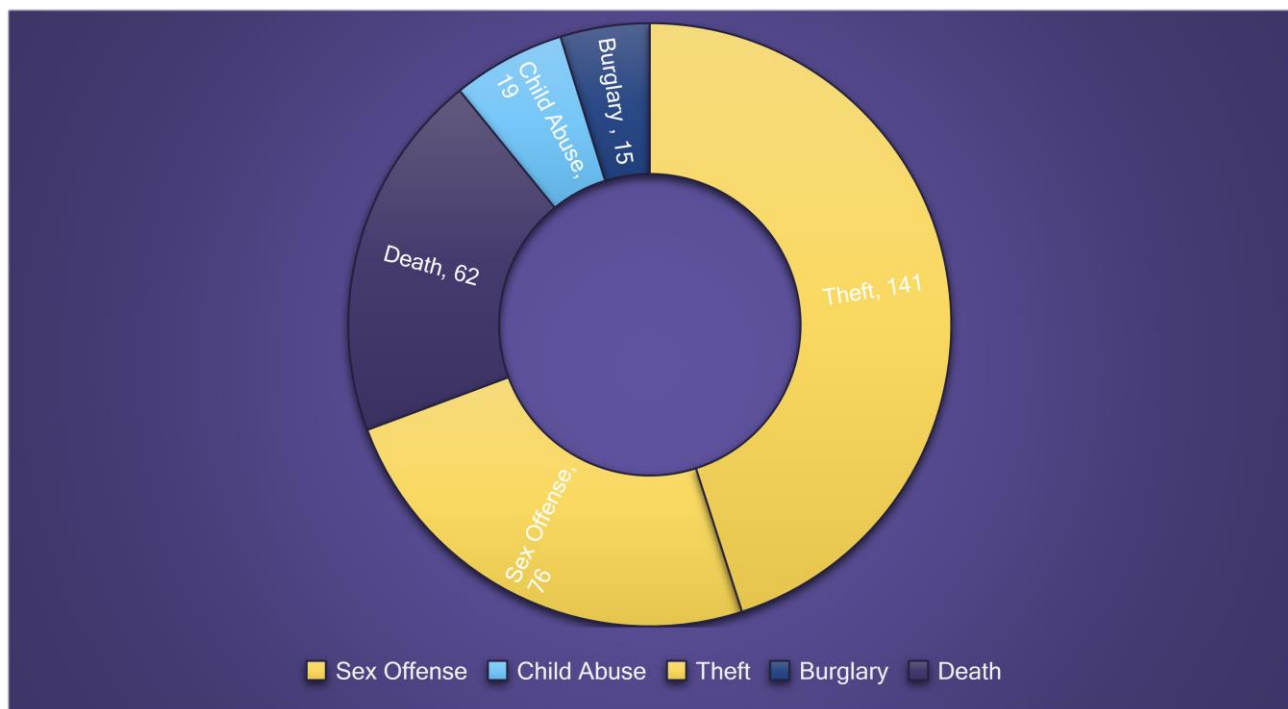


DETECTIVE DIVISION



The Waupaca County Sheriff's Office Detective Division comprises 1 Property manager & Evidence Technician, 2 Narcotics Detectives, 6 Detective Sergeants and 1 Captain. The Detective Division is focused on advocating for victims while conducting fair, transparent, and impartial investigations.

The Detective Division is primarily responsible for investigative follow-up, evidence collection, crime scene analysis, and proactive investigative efforts on many different crimes, which generally require more time or resources. These crimes include sex crimes, child neglect and abuse, death investigations, property crimes, computer crimes, and significant traffic crash investigations. The detective division works in cooperation with other local, state, or federal agencies.



INTERNET CRIMES AGAINST CHILDREN (ICAC) AND DIGITAL FORENSICS



The Waupaca County Sheriff's Office collaborates and is a participating member of the Wisconsin Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force lead by the Wisconsin Department of Justice-Division of Criminal Investigation.

In 2021, Detective Sergeant Timothy Myers received 19 case referrals, called "Cybertips", from the Wisconsin Department of Justice, involving suspect child enticement and child pornography activity within Waupaca County. Cases are received through the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC), the U.S. Department of Homeland Security, and disseminated through the Wisconsin DOJ ICAC online portal.

Many of the cases are ongoing and actively being investigated. However, two of the cases resulted in the arrest of 2 adult individuals. Child victims were identified in the United States and overseas. Charges are pending through Waupaca County Circuit Court for these individuals, including numerous felony charges of Possession of Child Pornography, Child Enticement, and Use of a Computer to Facilitate a Child Sex Crime. These crimes, if convicted, carry a mandatory minimum prison sentence of 3 years and a \$500 assessment for each image or video depicting child pornography.

Electronic devices, including mobile phones, tablets, and computers, carry increasingly more evidence related to criminal activity. Most everyone possesses mobile devices that are constantly recording data such as location, activity, biometrics, messaging and call logs, internet history, and much more. This information proves to be invaluable during criminal investigations as criminals utilize these devices while committing crimes.

The Waupaca County Sheriff's Office Digital Forensics Lab can process these devices utilizing tools such as Cellebrite Mobile Forensics and forensic programs such as Griffeye Analytics and Axiom by Magnet Forensics. With these tools, we can rapidly analyze digital evidence in-house to keep the investigation on track and conclude promptly. Devices are analyzed within hours versus months when using the Wisconsin Department of Justice Digital Forensics Unit.

The Waupaca County Sheriff's Office continues to be a leader in Digital Forensics by keeping up to date with changing technology, continued advanced training, and maintaining compliance with the Wisconsin Department of Justice Standards.

In 2021, the Waupaca County Sheriff's Office Digital Forensics Unit analyzed approximately 65 mobile phones and processed over one terabyte (1,000 gigabytes) of data from hard disk drives, USB drives, cloud storage, and mobile devices. Evidence from this data provided information resulting in the successful outcome of numerous cases referred to the Waupaca County District Attorney's Office.

Narcotics Division

Who are we?

The Waupaca County Narcotics Division is an active member of the Central Wisconsin Drug Task Force (CWDTF), which includes 15 law enforcement agencies within 8 counties. The CWDTF is funded largely through grants provided by the Federal Government, administered by the State of Wisconsin. These grants reimburse member agencies for man-power and other expenses involved in combating illicit drug activity. The Waupaca County Narcotics Division has 2 Detectives assigned to the CWDTF on a full-time basis.



Federal Grant Reimbursements:

The Waupaca County Narcotics Division relies heavily on the grants provided to the CWDTF for funding. Through 2021, the Waupaca County Narcotics Division accumulated \$21,809 in reimbursable funds through the federal grants. That equates to roughly 500 hours of overtime! In addition to federal grants for overtime, the Waupaca County Narcotics Division accumulated \$8,680 in funds allotted for the purchase of controlled substances while utilizing Confidential Informants. Through the CWDTF grant reimbursements, the Waupaca County Narcotics Division was allotted almost \$2,000 to purchase new investigative equipment.

Volunteers were waiting to wrap the children's gifts. Pizza and dessert was waiting for the children and officers when they arrived.

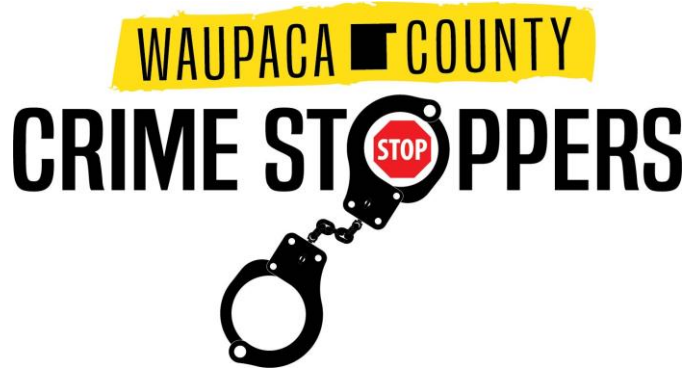
Forty children participated in Shop with a Cop Program. Over \$12,000 was raised for the 2021 program. \$10,500 was spent on gifts and gift cards.



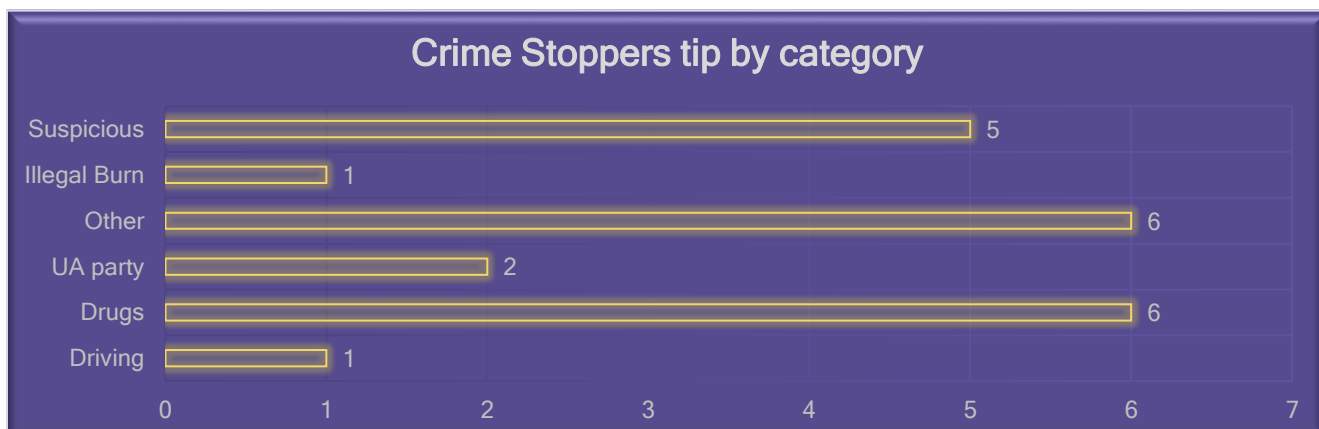
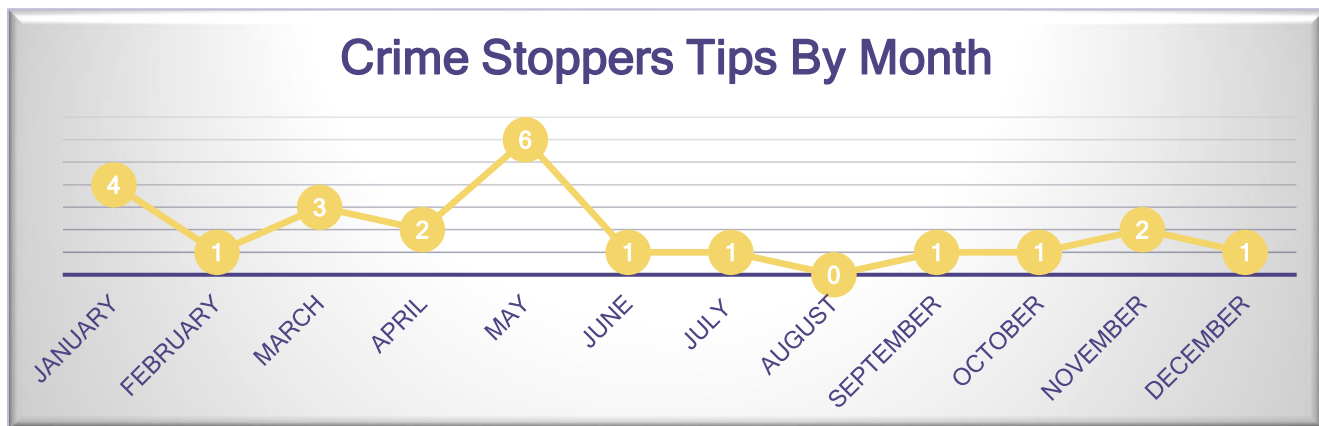
Crime Stoppers

The Waupaca County Crime Stoppers program is a way for someone to report a crime while remaining anonymous. A person is eligible for a cash reward if their “tip” results in an arrest/citation. Crime Stoppers also offers the “quick \$50” program. This program is designed

for school kids and encourages students to report crimes within the schools. A student can receive \$50.00 for providing information resulting in an arrest/citation. In 2020, There were 48 total tips (see chart). There was no money given out for “tips”.



Crime Stoppers transitioned into a new program through Motorola. Currently, every telecommunicator, narcotics officer, patrol sergeant, and detective sergeant have access to the program. In 2020, new posters were made specific to the “quick \$50”. The posters were given to each school district within the county to display throughout their schools.



Law Enforcement Support Program Or 10-33 Program

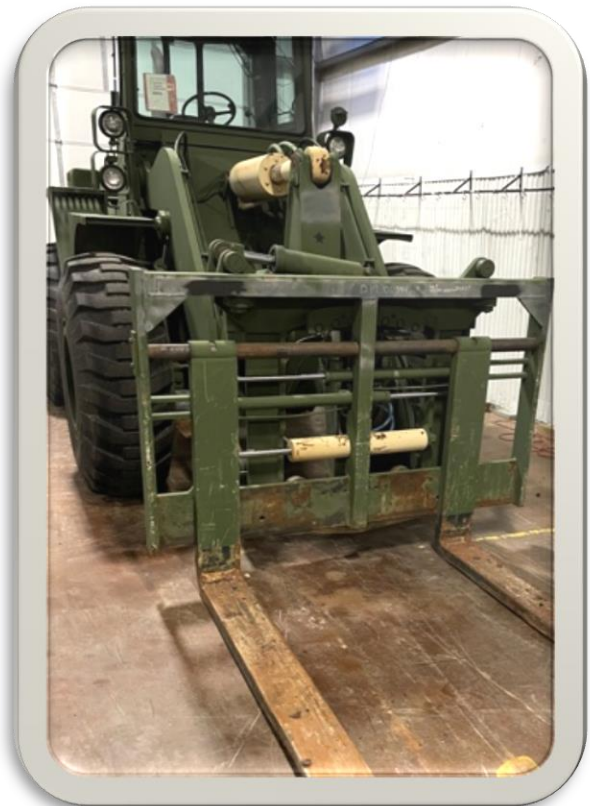


Waupaca County participates in the Federal Excess Property Management Information System also known as the LESO 1033 Program. The U.S. Department of Defense 1033 Program permits the Secretary of Defense to transfer excess Department of Defense supplies and equipment to state and local law enforcement agencies for use in our law enforcement duties.

Created as part of the 1997 National Defense Authorization Act, the 1033 Program allows the Department of Defense to get rid of excess equipment by passing it off to local authorities; we only have to pay for the cost of shipping and maintaining the equipment we acquire.

In 2021 the Sheriff's Office was able to acquire a loader that is equipped with large forks. The loader is currently being used at the Sheriff's Office evidence facility. This equipment would have cost Waupaca County taxpayers several thousand dollars if purchased new, however due to the involvement of our department in this program the only cost was the shipping of property from Fort McCoy to Waupaca.

The Sheriff's Office has had the opportunity to participate in the 1033 Program for several years and over that time we have been able to acquire invaluable equipment to assist in serving the citizens of Waupaca County.



CORRECTIONS DIVISION

The Corrections Division is a critical component in the Criminal Justice System. The Waupaca County Jail is a correctional facility operated by the Sheriff, in accordance with the Constitutions of the State of Wisconsin and the United States of America. Accordingly, the jail will meet or exceed standards established by the Wisconsin Department of Correction, federal, state, and local law. The division includes 38 Correctional Deputies, 6 Correctional Sergeants, a Lieutenant, and a Captain.

In 2001, Waupaca County saw the opening of its new facility at 1402 East Royaltown Street. The jail can house 321 inmates. Currently its average daily population is approximately 200 inmates.



The jail is responsible for the care and custody of prisoners. It also functions as a holding facility for convicted felons awaiting transfer to the Wisconsin State Prison System, sentenced prisoners, and prisoners awaiting trial.

Our facility holds a contract with Wood County to house 75 safe-keepers a day and Portage County to house 35 safe-keepers a day.



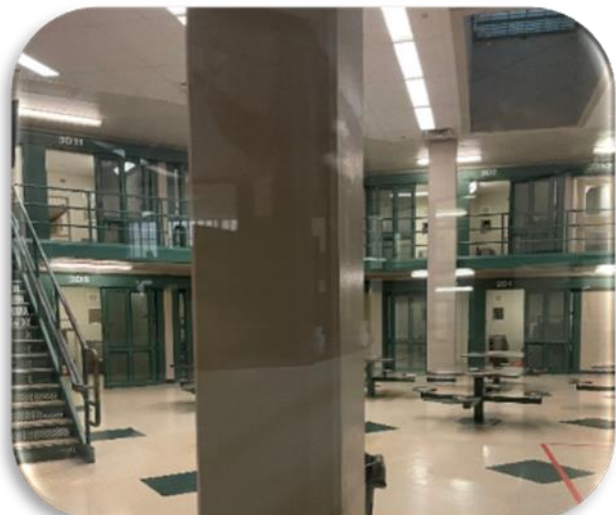
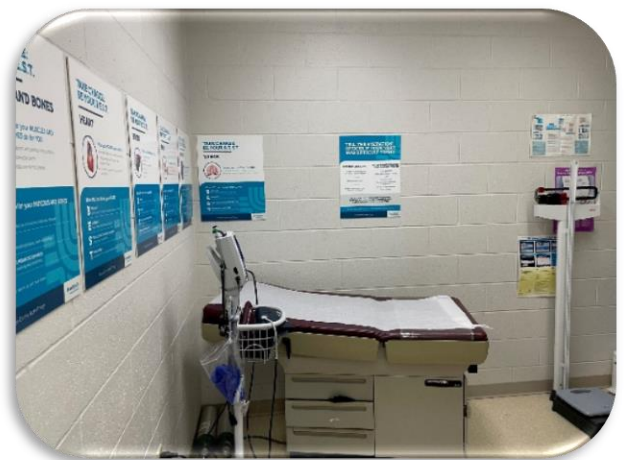
The County Jail is a busy and active facility. Numerous programs are offered to inmates. Our goal is to help the prisoners incarcerated.

CORRECTIONS DIVISION

There are several programming opportunities provided and offered to inmates confined at the facility. All volunteers complete safety and security training to introduce them to the correctional environment and are subject to a criminal background check. Programs have been continually increasing due to the commitment of Jail Administration and support of the County and Community philosophy allocating supporting resources.

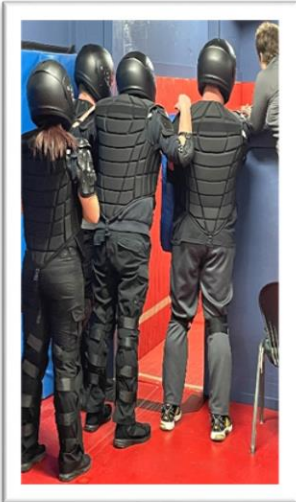

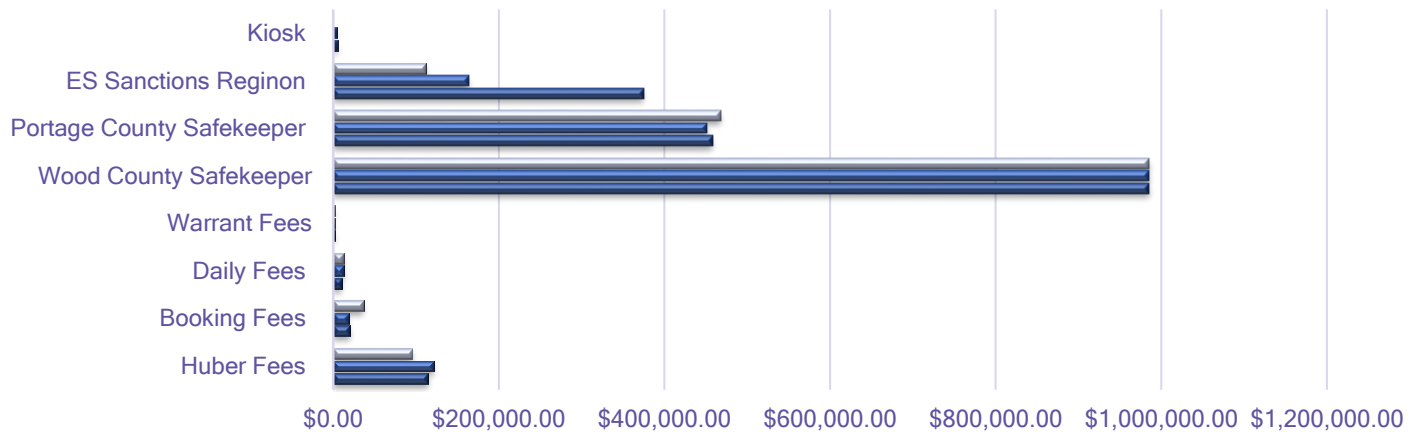

Fees Collected By Correctional Division



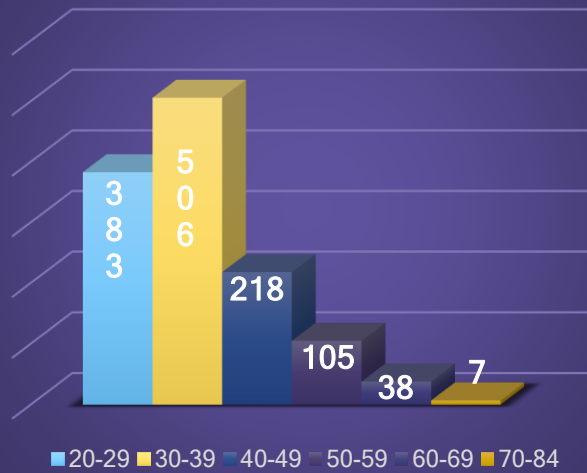

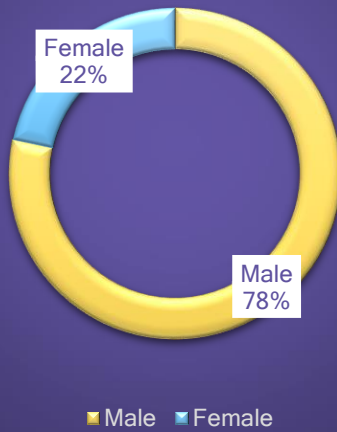

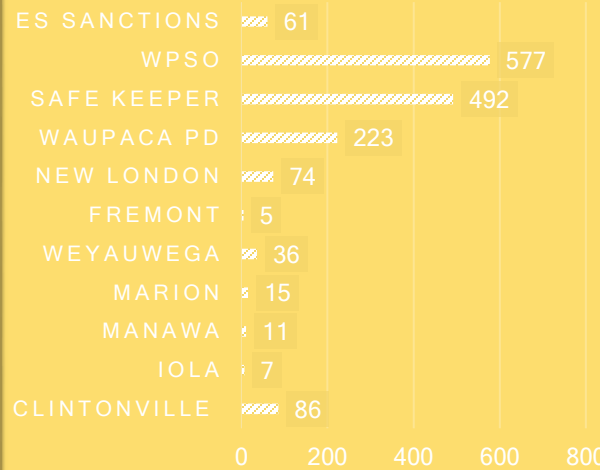
Age Of Person Booked

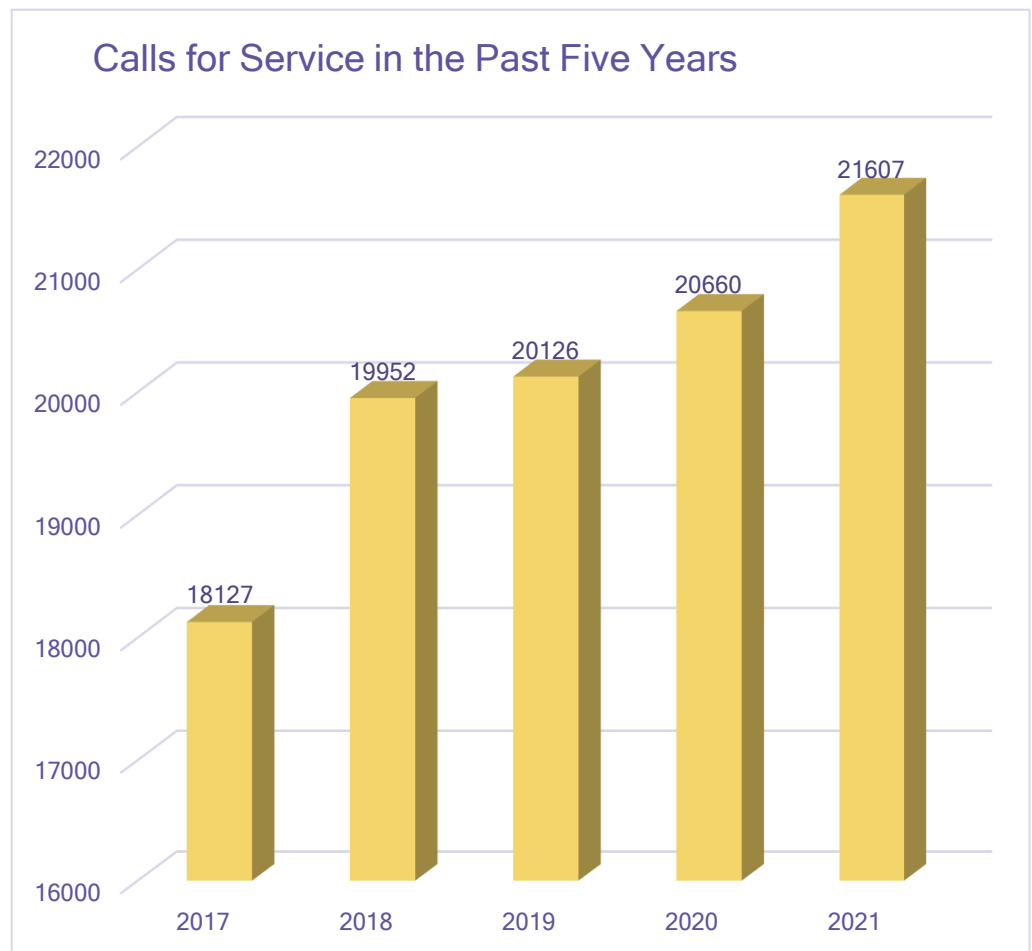

The records division consists of 3 full-time civilian employees. Included in this count are two Records Specialists, and one Records Supervisor/Administrative Assistant. These staff members play a vital role within the Sheriff's Office and are an essential part of every division.

Duties include but are not limited to: reception duties, answering request phone calls, type reports and documents for deputies, managing sheriff sales, background checks, processing all criminal charges, preparing records and legal documents, extracting data from the RMS system, performing duties of Incident-based reports, receiving and preparing all documents related to civil process, processing discovery material for the Waupaca County District Attorney, serving as a notary republic, and also processing some DMV transactions.

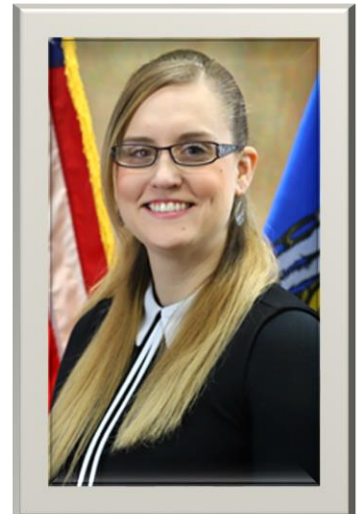


HEATHER GALL
